### Dies From Wounds

Pvt. Fred Yavorsky, who was seriously wounded in the fighting in France, October 1, has died as a result of his injuries, according to a War Department telegram received by his parents, Albert and Frances Zsvini Yavorsky of 944 Sullivan Street. His death occurred October 17.

Pvt. Yavorsky was inducted into the Army September 13, 1943, following graduation from Bethlehem Technical High School in June with high honors. He was sent to Fort McClellan, Alabama, and in February, 1944, was sent to Fort Meade, Maryland, from which point he was sent for overseas duty. He was in North Africa and in the action at Anzio Beach. In the engagement around Rome he received the campaign ribbon with one star for that offensive.

Pvt. Yavorsky had been cited by the regiment of the Third Marine Infantry Division and awarded the Combat Infantryman badge for combat while serving on the Fifth Army front in Italy. He was 19 years old May 18.

In addition to his parents, Pvt. Yavorsky is survived by two brothers, Sgt. Albert W. Yavorsky and T-5 John J. Yavorsky, both of the Army Engineers, and a sister, Miss Tess Yavorsky, at home.

Mass will be held November 29 in St. John Capistrano's Roman Catholic Hungarian Church.
