Allentown Pair With Parallel **Navy Careers Reported Missing**

Two Allentown boys who were sworn into the Navy six months ago as members of the group of "Pearl Harbor Avengers" Tuesday were reported "missing in action" by the Navy Department.

They are Robert W. Wallace, 21-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D. R. Wallace, of 124 North Fourteenth Street, Allentown and John H. Wil-liamson, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey J. Williamson, of 2123 Han-over Avenue (Rittersville), Allentown.

The two Allentonians were ship-mates on a transport ship which was reported sunk off Casablanca during the recent African invasion. The Navy careers of the two boys ran parallel lines. After their en-listment they were assigned to New-

ran paratie lines. After their en-listment they were assigned to New-port, R. I., for three months of basic training, were promoted to firemen, third class, at the same time, and held second class seamen's ratings

The parents have not lost hope for the safety of their sons. Their belief that the landing barges, to which the boys were assigned, may have been away from the transport at the time it was torpedoed was strengthened by the eye-witness story of the sinking told by Sea-man Second Class Albert J. Kline, Jr., of Allentown.

Kline, home Tuesday on a 48-hour leave after his return from Africa, said in an interview that landing barges were busy taking survivors from the water after the transport was hit. His own ship, Kline said, was forced to slip anchor and escape, leaving its barges and their survivors to land on shore. their survivors to land on shore.

A graduate of Catasauqua High School in 1939, Wallace played bas-ketball and was a cheerleader. After graduation he worked as an apprentice at the Bethlehem Steel Company until he joined the Navy on June 7.

Williamson, too, was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company prior to his enlistment. He attended Allentown High School. He is the only son of the Williamsons, who also are parents of a daughter, Mrs. Norman Geisinger, of 922 Hanover Avenue, Allentown.
