## Freemansburg Soldier Dies In Germany

A telegram informed Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bozilesky, 50 Clearfield Street, Freemansburg, of the death of their son, Corporal John Krich, killed in action March 7, somewhere in Ger-

many.

A member of the First Army, he received his training at Buzzards Bay, Mass.; New River, N. C.; Onslo Beach, N. C.; Camp Blanding, Fla., and Fort Benning, Ga. He left for overseas duty in August, 1942, and landed in Scotland. He was later sent to England and on to North Africa, Sicily, Belgium, France and Germany.

The soldier who had never received a furlough, would have celebrated his 27th birthday anniversary in five months. Before entering the service, he was employed as assistant manager of the Medic Stores in New York.

In addition to his mother and step-father, he is survived by three sisters, Anna, at home; Mrs. Leonard Roman, Mrs. N. Padua; two brothers, Mickey and Joseph, USN, now in Bainbridge, Md., and a brother-in-law, also in the service, S/Sgt. Leonard Roman, somewhere in France.
