Bath Soldier Wounded, Now In New York

Word was received by Mr. and Mrs. James Kish, Jacksonville, near Bath, that their son, Technician Fifth Grade Louis Kish, was seriously wounded in action July 4 in France. The telegram was sent by Ulio, Adjutant General, Washington, D. C.

Almost simultaneously with the receipt of the message the Kish family also received another wire from Mitchel Field, N. Y., from their son, stating he had arrived at New York, the past Wednesday, and expected to be stationed near home soon. He stated he was feeling fine. This message raised the hopes that their boy was all right.

The Kish family have three other sons and a son-in-law in the service, as follows: Corporal Joseph, serving in infantry in France; Pfc. Alex, in Anti-Aircraft in France; Cpl. Charles, Military Police at Fort Monmouth, N. J., and Shipfitter John Hlatky, 2C, at San Diego, Cal.

The record of the wounded Kish is as follows: In service since October 17, 1942, in Medical Detachment, trained at Camp Atterbury, Ind., on maneuvers in Tennessee and prior to going across was at Camp Breckenridge, Ky.

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
