ducted yesterday at Philadelphia  
into the WAVES, the Women's Ap-  
pointed Volunteer Emergency Ser-  
vices, auxiliary to the United States  
Navy. She will report next month.

She is a graduate of Northampton  
High School in 1940 and Bethlehem  
Business College in 1941. Since  
February, 1942, she been associated  
with The Globe-Times. She is an of-  
ficer of the first aid staff of the  
Bath casualty station, a member  
of the staff of the Aircraft Warn-  
ing Service observation post, mem-  
ber of Christ Evangelical and Re-  
formed Church and active in  
dramatics in Bath.

Miss Margaret Bracko, daughter  
of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bracko, 806  
Carlton Avenue, this city, who  
became a member of the Spars, wo-  
men's auxiliary to the U. S. Coast
