Drought watch remains in effect

A statewide drought watch remains in effect for Pennsylvania, the state Department of Environmental Protection announced Thursday.

Precipitation increased recently with streams flow rising, but longer term precipitation deficits persist in many areas. Groundwater levels remain low in some counties, including Lehigh and Lackawanna counties.

Residents and businesses are encouraged to reduce their nonessential water use. While not required, residents and nonfarm businesses are encouraged to voluntarily conserve water by reducing their nonessential water use.

The decision to keep the drought watch in effect came after a meeting this week of the Commonwealth Drought Task Force.

Ways to save water at home

- Run the dishwasher and washing machine less often, and only with full loads.
- Don't let the faucet run while brushing your teeth or shaving. Take shorter showers. For example, consider not washing your hair daily.
- Water your lawn only if necessary. Avoid watering on windy and hot days. Watering grass lightly and efficiently will encourage healthier, deeper grassroots. Overwatering is wasteful, encourages fungal growth and disease, and results in shallow, compacted root systems that are more susceptible to drought.
- When mowing your lawn, set the blades 2-3 inches high. Longer grass shades the soil, improving moisture retention.
- Water your garden less often. If necessary, water only in the cooler evening or morning hours, and direct the water to the ground at the base of the plant. Focus on new plantings, which have shallow root systems. Older plants may endure dry conditions longer.

Wind Creek stage prepped for upcoming Musikfest 2023

Members of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees Lehigh Valley Local 200 have been working hard the week of July 24-28 to have the Wind Creek Steel Stage ready for Musikfest 2023.

Despite searing temperatures, high humidity and thunderstorms, by the end of the week the temporary outdoor concert venue has taken much of its shape. According to the union's business rep, Matthew

Calleri, it takes about 50-60 union members to prepare the venue for its 11-night run, which will be from Aug. 3 to 13.

This year's main stage acts will begin with indie trio AJR on opening night and end with rock band Train and include a performance by comedian Gabriel Iglesias.

ArtsQuest production director Mike Liiro says it takes about 16,500 gallons of water to fill the ballast containers that anchor the entire stage. At the same time workers are setting up seats, bleachers, light towers and VIP seating tents.

Bethlehem man gets prison term

A Bethlehem man was sentenced Tuesday in Carbon County Court to spend between 6 months and 3 years in state prison after pleading guilty to three retail thefts in the area.

Jesus Fonseca, 39, admitted to two thefts from Walmart and one from Lowe's, both in Mahoning Township, over the past year. The incidents mark his 17 to 19 lifetime convictions for retail theft.

Prosecutors said Fonseca stole two speakers from Walmart on Dec. 6, 2022; an HP computer from Walmart on Jan. 10, 2023; and a generator from Lowe's on Jan. 18, 2023.

All three retail theft charges were third-degree felonies.

Fonseca will be evaluated for eligibility into the state's drug treatment program.

His sentence in Carbon County will run consecutive to a 3-10 year sentence handed down in Northampton County in 2018, where he pleaded guilty to seven counts of retail theft and one count of theft by deception.

- Skip the car washing. If you have to wash your car, it's better environmentally to go to a drive-through car wash that recycles the water.
- Sweep your sidewalk, deck, or driveway, instead of hosing it off.
- Check for and repair household leaks. For example, a leaking toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water daily.
- Set up a rain barrel to be ready to re-purpose rain when it does fall. For helpful information, see this Penn State Extension guide. Or just set out a bucket to capture water in the event of rain, and reuse it to water plants or the bird bath.

With the summer in full swing, the July 11 Saucon Valley School Board meeting was quick and uncontroversial, with one notable presentation among regular business.

Perhaps of greatest consequence, Superintendent Jaime Vlasaty reported that the administration completed a first round of interviews for the athletic director and high school assistant principal vacancies.

There were 27 and 25 applicants respectively, with 15 candidates chosen for interviews for each position. Vlasaty said she hoped to have completed the interview process by July 25, in time to present potential hires to the board for approval at that evening's meeting.

The superintendent also shared details on a

school communications assist the administrative services contract with The Donovan Group, LLC at \$3,750 monthly which the board approved. Vlasaty said that the company will

the procurement of such a service had been a topic of interest for several years.

Much of the meeting saw Northampton Community College Vice President of Workforce Development & Community Education Lauren Loeffler provide details on non-credit and workforce development programming offered at the school and through PA CareerLink offices in the Lehigh Valley and Monroe County.

Of particular interest to graduating seniors in the district are the college's "quick-term programs that get people out to work," Loeffler said. Courses offered include specialized skilled trade training with industry-recognized credentials and certifications, with licenses including CDLs, phlebotomy, industrial maintenance, healthcare, informational technology, and more.

Crisis numbers for correctional officers

Lehigh County Board of Commissioners July 26 approved additional extensions to the Temporary Wage Increase for certain employees with the Department of Corrections, Cedarbrook Senior Care and Rehabilitation, as well as within the 911 Communication Center.

Prior to the votes, the board heard directly from correctional officers about realities and needs they believe need be addressed before the situation worsens.

In a letter to County Executive Phillips Armstrong, dated June 28, Director of Corrections Janine Donate asked, to continue a temporary compensation of \$120 for 40 hours worked in a week for unit staff and uniformed supervisors. This is a decrease from the \$200 which was offered back in 2022, under similar conditions.

Union President Jim Irwin, representing corrects officers, told commissioners, there are too

few COs. "We have 135 current officers but at the end of the month, we will probably be down to 130. Just this month, we've had nine leave." Irwin explained the lack of sufficient COs

has led to both mandatory and volunteered overtime. "This weekend, Friday to Sunday, we had 48 mandatory overtimes. That's not including the people who volunteered for overtime. That's 48 people, Friday to Sunday, that were forced to stay there. Right now, they are being mandated, each and everyone of them, almost twice a week."

Irwin concluded that this issue would continue to be examined by the Board and Director of Corrections Janina Donate.

Irwin's views were backed by a correctional officer attending virtually, identified solely as "Chad," who said, "it's crazy how, like Jim said, we are closing different units, cutting staff here, we're cutting positions here, we're cutting positions there. It's a safety issue for inmates, for staff, and we can turn around and say this compensation isn't working so let's cut. That's not the answer."

The temporary wage increase covers the period of July 16 Oct. 13.

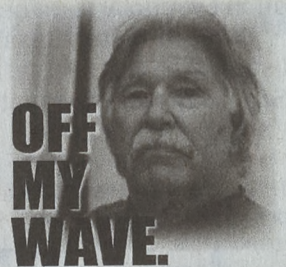

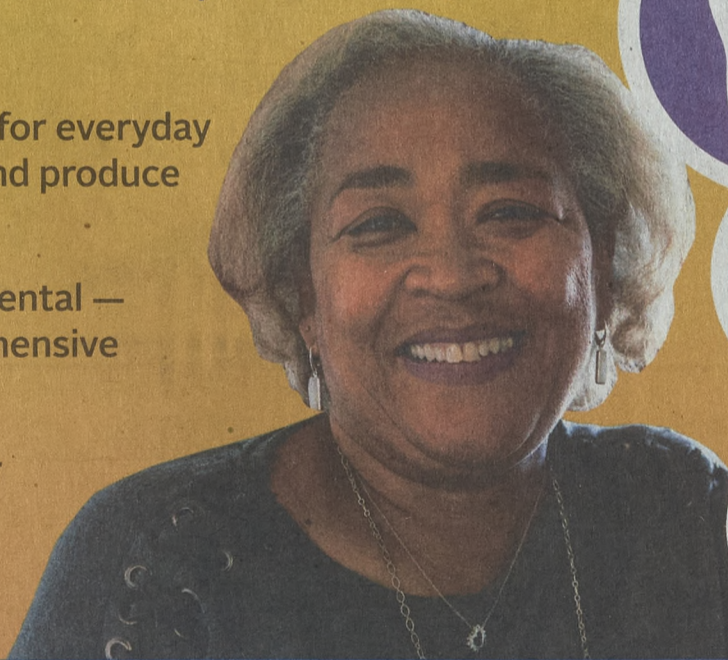

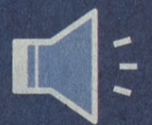

Yesterday: A look at Philly holdouts

Tim Rossovich, Barbie, and Saquon Barkley. If you can make a viable connection between any two of them or all three, you are a very creative person. But both of them were prominent in the sixties and still have some pertinence today.

Rossovich was an Eagles' All-Pro linebacker in the 60 and early 70s who was a self-admitted flake and has a contract holdout. Barbie is back in the news with the "Barbie" movie, and Barkley ended a brief holdout.

In this week's version of my Yesterday column - reminiscing about sports and pop culture in the 1960s, 70s, 80s, 90s and sometimes beyond - I will take a look at some Philadelphia holdouts as well as a look at some legendary action figures and some other prominent pop culture items.

Also, do you have a Phillies' place mat? And do you remember Raymond Lewis? Did you work out with Nautilus?

Grounded Eagles: Rossovich, who was a middle linebacker, and popular safety Bill Bradley both held out before the start of the 1972 season, as they figured they would have more leverage together requesting larger salaries. They were often spotted in an RV during training camp selling drinks to fans.

But the Eagles called Rossovich's bluff and traded him to San Diego, where he never regained his All-Pro status. Ironically, Rossovich later returned to Philly with the WFL Bell before he ended his career with Houston in 1976. When Bradley heard of Rossovich's trade, he soon ended his holdout.

Ron Jaworski had a brief holdout before the 1983 season, and other Eagles who had more notable holdouts were Reggie White, Brian Westbrook, Terrell Owens, Jeremy Maclin, DeSean Jackson, Duce Staley, and Donovan McNabb held out his rookie season.

In 1989, White wanted to become the game's highest paid defensive player, but then owner Norman Braman was stubborn. White sat out most of training camp and missed some preseason games before a deal was struck on August 22.

Phallen Phillie: In 1969, the Phillies believed they had a breakthrough trade by acquiring Cardinal's outfielder Curt Flood. The Phils also acquired pitcher Joe Hoener, outfielder Byron Browne.

Continued from page A7 and catcher Tim Carver for first baseman Dick Allen, infielder Cookie Rojas, and pitcher Jerry Johnson.

Even though the Phillies offered him a \$100,000 contract, Flood refused to play and got the initial wheels of free agency into motion. He sat out the 1970 season, and the Phillies traded him to Washington before the 1971 season. Anyone remember who they got for Flood? It was Greg Goossen, Jeff Terpko, and Gene Martin, all of whom never made an impact in the Phillies system. The Phillies did get Willie Montanez from the Cards as a player to be named later.

The Sixer Who Wasn't: In 1973, the Sixers drafted L.A. street-ball phenom guard Raymond Lewis out of Cal State, Los Angeles, No. 1 and 18th overall and signed him to a three-year, \$450,000 contract. Lewis was a one-man show during training camp, and the Sixers thought they had their savior to hoist them out of the doldrums.

But Lewis soon realized that most of the money in his contract was deferred, and he wanted to negotiate. The Sixers wouldn't budge, and head coach Gene Shue believed Lewis was immature and told him to go home.

Lewis wanted to jump to the ABA Utah Stars, but the Sixers threatened to sue. He tried to return, but staged another holdout. A summer league legend, Lewis never played a minute in the NBA.

They Had Barbie, We Had Joe: Growing up in the 60s and 70s, we all had our time with Hasbro's G.I. Joe. My favorite ones were the scuba diver and the astronaut with the space capsule, the latter being a special one to have. There also was the military police (MP) one, and there was a G.I. Nurse from 1967 that was unique to the series and has continued to be a rare item. You also had to have a footlocker.

Kelloggs had a Phillies' trading card collection from 1976-81, and they also had a 3D line in the early 90s. Pepsi-Cola began a trading card collection in 1977.

Speaking of soda, do you remember Shasta being popular in the 1960s and 70s? And how about Nehi Grape soda?

Ayache, BC football looking to improve

Adjustment to a new coaching staff easily can take some time, but Bethlehem Catholic senior lineman Sammy Ayache doesn't believe it. He and his teammates have acclimated themselves to new head coach Ty Ward this summer.

"I think it has been really good so far," beamed the 6-4, 275-pound Ayache. "Coach Ward and his staff have made it easy for us to adjust. It didn't take long at all.

"We have high expectations this year, and we expect to be better."

Last season, Beca finished with an overall 6-6 record. They beat Blue Mountain in the opening round of the Class 4A district playoffs and then fell to Allentown Central Catholic, 14-3. Beca beat Central Catholic, 14-13, in the final regular-season game to clinch a district spot. Former head coach Kyle Haas abruptly resigned after six weeks.

"Last year, we expected to do well," offered Ayache. "We were probably a little complacent and need to be more focused. There was a lot going on last year, but we managed to get to districts.

"This year, we want to go further."

In his final season, Ayache has worked on being more aggressive

as well as his technique. He has strived to improve his pass blocking, although he allowed just one sack last season.

Ayache admittedly grew as a player last year after he described being "a little scared" his sophomore year. He has been lifting six days a week, three more than with the team. Ayache has raised his squats from 420 to 500, and his bench presses from 200 to 275.

"I feel a lot stronger, and have noticed the difference," he stressed. "I wanted to get stronger this season. We have worked on speed drills, and I just feel better as an overall player."

Ward expects Ayache to excel.

"Sammy is a stud offensive/defensive lineman," boasted Ward. "He has the potential to play Division 1 football. He is an excellent student and leader on the team. He is the perfect senior to have in charge of leading the direction of a new program."

Ayache was impressed with the team's showing at a seven-on-seven competition at Rutgers University, even though he attended a camp.

"I watched film on it, and we looked good," he said. "We played one of the better teams from New Jersey. We didn't show much, but we were

aggressive."

Ayache has been influenced on the gridiron by his family and his father, Sam, was a 1991 Bethlehem Catholic graduate and played football. He has a pair of younger brothers, Emile, who is a sophomore, and Jonjon will be a freshman. Ayache also had an uncle and cousins who played high school football.

Ayache has played in the Bethlehem Catholic system since he was five. One of his fondest memories was in eighth grade when his team lost an opening game to Pohatcong, and then came back to beat them to claim a championship.

"In eighth grade, people thought we weren't going to be good at all," said Ayache. "We were underdogs in almost all of our games. During the first week, we lost to a team called Pohatcong and everyone thought our season was over. We went 9-0 to finish off the regular season and beat Pohatcong in the championship."

Being in an underdog role this season suits Ayache well. He anticipates a solid season ahead.

"We definitely do," he said. "We feel we can get to states this season. We're confident and going to surprise plenty of people this season."

Outdoors: Cooler temps may perk up fishing action

As we're in the dog days of summer, local fishing on streams and lakes is on the slow side. With high temperatures last week, stream waters were warm as were lake waters. But predicted cooler temperatures this week may perk things up.

But according to Mike at Mike's Bait and Tackle in Nazareth, a couple customers are doing good on the Bushkill Creek for trout using predominantly minnows and crawlers, especially when the creek recedes and clears. And there's no one else fishing so they have the stream to themselves.

Same case for the Delaware River. Mike reports some regular customers are picking up stripers, smallmouth bass and channel cats there on live bait when the river calms down.

Bob Danenhower of Bob's Taxidermy and Bait Shop in Orefield, reports he's selling lots of shiners, fatheads and crawlers for anglers hitting Leaser Lake for perch and nice largemouth bass. Muskie action has slowed as they likely went to deeper water. But a few are occasionally being picked up. As for the Little Lehigh, trout action is virtually nil except for the 42 golden rainbows that were stocked over a week ago in a portion of the stream. The trout came from Cabela's in Hamburg and some were in the eight-pound category.

On the Lehigh River, the only action seems to be coming from the northern section, said

Danenhower, meaning up in the Walnutport area that was stocked some time ago by the Lehigh River Stocking Association. Those trout too are looking for meat, meaning live minnows and worms.

Chris from Chris' Bait & Tackle in Mertz town, said Ontelaunee Reservoir has slowed a bit but some regulars there are picking up nice largemouths on weedless lures and swim baits as the lily pads are quite thick and you have really have to work for them. Others are throwing shiners. Some snakeheads are being caught while fishing for bass.

Over at Blue Marsh

Lake, largemouth bass action has been good on plastic lures and bait.

Up at Lake Wallenpaupack, Rick said smallmouth action there is phenomenal. He caught and released 25 smallmouths last week in one day alone from his boat. Striper action has slowed as they went deep, but some boat anglers are picking a few on live trout using downriggers. Back in spring Rick caught one weighing 18.7 pounds.

Smallmouth fishing is good on the Schuylkill River from boat and from shore. One buddy had 27 smallies in one day on artificials. This river is underfished and is a gem for smallies in particular.

SALTWATER ACTION

If you're planning a vacation trip to the Jersey shore, be advised the fluke action is doing good in the river and on the rocks and reefs. There are blues and bass to be had as well according to our reporters from On the Water Magazine. Here's but a sampling of what's hot at the shore.

Rick Hebert, at Tackle World in Rochelle Park, said fluke are biting in all the usual spots but you have to weed through a lot of shorts. He has reports of bigger fish on the reefs farther south.

Capt. Phil Sciortino, at the Tackle Box in Hazlet, said big fluke are on the bite. One customer hooked an 11-pounder off the rough bottom using Fishermen's Choice salmon strips. There are also plenty of bluefish in Raritan Bay and from the Keansburg Pier. He added that crabbing is also good in the Naver-sink River.

That led to a scramble. I called the YMCA first. They have a 25 person waiting list for school age summer care. Even with my older son able to watch my younger son until around 11 a.m., that still leaves a lot of time. At not quite 10 years old, James still lacks the maturity to be by himself for several hours. So I looked at camps. They were also full. Then I set up interviews with some private sitters.

Perhaps it is best that I did not get the new position. Any gains I would have made in salary would not have been realized until after summer was over, and I would have had to burden my already insanely low budget with child care fees in the next several weeks.

I am thankful that the BASD Fit for Life program offered a free camp in June and July. Bethlehem Recreation offers Summer Playground, and I used that to fill in gaps in camp weeks and give myself time to do writing work. But almost everything ends before Musikfest.

The city scrambles to look pretty before Musikfest, too. And it will. I wish that child care was not so close to what I earn. But it is. I feel we are doing something wrong in this country where child care costs are concerned. This isn't just a single mom's issue either. I know of two income provider families who end up sacrificing one income because it won't cover child care. I hasten to add that even child care providers don't earn enough. But I truly don't know the solution.

Someday James will be old enough to stay home alone for short periods of time. I don't know when that will be. Every child is different. Few children are as resourceful as Kevin in Home Alone. Meanwhile, arranging care, if I need it, is a serious challenge.

Tips to control mosquitos at residence

With all the rain that we have recently been having in the Lehigh Valley, the mosquito population is exploding.

Mosquito females bite people to get vital nutrients from our blood. They then use these nutrients to make their eggs. One single blood meal can give rise to about 100 mosquito eggs that hatch into wiggling larvae.

The mosquito life cycle has four distinct life stages: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. Some mosquitoes can complete their life cycle (egg to adult) in as little as eight to 10 days under optimal conditions. The overall amount of time to complete their life cycle will depend on the mosquito species, availability of resources, and weather conditions.

The egg, larval, and pupal stages are found in water habitats. To lay their eggs, adult female mosquitoes identify water habitats that contain organic material (decomposing grass, leaves, dirt, etc.) in order to provide immediate nutrition for larval mosquitoes.

Females will lay their

eggs in "rafts" (clusters of eggs) or singly on the water surface or areas prone to flooding. Eggs may hatch in two to three days under favorable conditions.

It's summer, there will be mosquitoes. Eliminate what water you can from your property since some will not fly far from their "place of birth." Keep in mind, you will never be able to eradicate all mosquitoes. There are some things that you can do to control mosquitoes around your home. Your first line of defense begins at home.

Controlling mosquitoes, and exposure to diseases they may carry, can be done by chemical and non-chemical methods:

- Remove their habitat (where they live and breed). Eliminate standing water in old tires, buckets, plastic covers, toys, or any other container where mosquitoes can breed.

Tires have become the most important mosquito breeding sites in the United States.

- Clean clogged roof gutters every year, particularly if leaves from surrounding trees tend to plug the drains. Roof gutters are easily overlooked, but they produce millions of mosquitoes each season.

- Empty and change the water in birdbaths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels, and potted plant trays at least once a week to destroy potential mosquito habitats.

- Drain or fill temporary pools of water with dirt.

- Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating. Mosquitoes may breed in water that collects on swimming pool covers.

- Alter the landscape of your property to eliminate standing water. During warm weather, mosquitoes will breed in any puddle of water.
- Prevent your exposure to mosquitoes. Use EPA-registered mosquito repellents when necessary and follow label directions and precautions closely. Use head nets, long sleeves, and

long pants if you venture into areas with high mosquito populations.

- Make sure window and door screens are "bug tight."

- Mosquitoes are relatively weak fliers, so placing a large fan on your deck can provide a low-tech solution. Mosquitoes are repelled by high winds, so electric fans may provide some relief at outdoor events. Citronella candles have a mild repellent effect, but do not offer significantly more protection than other candles producing smoke.

- Stay indoors at dawn, dusk and in the early evening when mosquitoes are most active.

Bug zappers do not kill mosquitoes. They kill a lot of beneficials and incidentals that don't hurt anybody.

How to get good-fitting shoes for older feet

Q. Over the years, I've been buying larger shoes. Could it be that my feet are getting bigger, or is it that I've gradually begun to prefer shoes with more room in them?

Feet do get bigger over decades of pounding. Some people over the age of 40 can gain half a shoe size every 10 years.

I know my feet are larger than they used to be. I've gone from a 10½ shoe when I was a young adult, to a 12 in my geezer years.

The foot is a complicated machine. It contains 26 bones, 33 joints, and more than 100 tendons, muscles, and ligaments.

Feet flatten out because the supporting tendons and ligaments lose their elasticity. As the tendon along the length of the sole elongates, the arch lowers. This condition contributes to bunions, which are inflamed swellings of the small fluid-filled

sacs on the first joints of the big toes.

Another reason feet enlarge is that the force of your weight thins the fat pads cushioning the bottom of the feet. The loss of padding can cause corns and calluses, which are protective layers of compacted, dead skin cells. Thinner pads also lead to soreness.

Not all older people notice the reality that their feet have been getting bigger. A study of senior patients at a U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs hospital found that three quarters of them were wearing shoes that were too small.

Properly-fitted shoes are important to the health of your feet. The following are some pointers to remember

when buying shoes:

- The uppers on shoes should be made of a soft material that can match the shape of your foot.

- Leather shoes reduce the possibility of skin irritations.

- If you buy new shoes with leather soles, rough up the surfaces before walking, especially on carpet.

- Consider thick soles to cushion your feet if you have to walk on hard pavement. This is an important consideration if you are visiting countries such as Italy, which has many cobblestone streets.

- Opt for low-heels. They are more comfortable and safer.

- The best time to measure your feet is at the end of the day when your feet are largest.

- Most of us have one foot that is larger than the other, so fit your shoe to your larger foot.

- Don't select shoes by the size marked inside the shoe but by how the shoe fits your foot.

- When fitting shoes,

make sure there is about a half-inch extra space for your longest toe when you are standing.

- Make sure the ball of your foot fits comfortably into the widest part of the shoe.

- Your heel should fit comfortably in the shoe with a minimum amount of slipping. The shoes should not ride up and down on your heel when you walk.

- Walk in the shoes to make sure they fit and feel right. Then take them home and spend some time walking on carpet to make sure the fit is a good one.

St. John's UCC donates to Wildlands Conservancy

The congregation of St. John's United Church of Christ in Emmaus has donated \$600 to the locally-based Wildlands Conservancy. A check was presented July 20 by Dr. Paul Knappenberger, pastor of the church and Irene Kraft, co-chair of its missions committee. Accepting the check were Christopher Kocher, conservancy president and Jackie Jones, its director of development. Church members contributed money for the conservancy in May, as part of St. John's commitment to being a "green church" that carries out missions to benefit the environment. The church had learned the conservancy needed money to purchase woodland maintenance tools, including a utility vehicle and to feed wildlife. In addition to the \$600, about \$150 has been collected by the Christian Education department of St. John's during its recent environmentally-themed Vacation Bible School program. That money also soon will be presented to the conservancy. Based in its 78-acre Pool Wildlife Sanctuary right outside Emmaus, Wildlands Conservancy is committed to protecting and restoring natural areas for future generations — including through its educational programs. Since 1973, it permanently has preserved more than 60,000 acres of land.

START PREPARING FOR SCHOOL NOW

Corvette, America's sports car, featured at Das Awkscht Fescht

The sounds of the Corvette will reverberate through Macungie Memorial Park, Aug. 4, 5 and 6, when Das Awkscht Fescht, in its 60th year, celebrates the 70th anniversary of America's iconic sports car.

The Chevrolet Corvette, which General Motors unveiled in 1953, takes its moniker from the corvette, a small warship. Corvettes, originally manufactured in Flint, Mich., and St. Louis, Mo., have been made since 1981 in Bowling Green, Ky., location of the National Corvette Museum.

You don't have to go to Bowling Green. Hundreds of vintage, classic and collectible Corvettes will be brought to Macungie as Featured Car of the 2023 Das Awkscht Fescht.

On Aug. 4, there are 48 Corvettes expected, and, on Aug. 5, there are 111 Corvettes expected. On Aug. 6, which is Car Club Day at Das Awkscht Fescht, there may even be more Corvettes.

"The ones under the tent are supposed to be the best of the best. I give tremendous credit to the sponsor, the Allentown Area Corvette Club," says Atty. Bob Hobaugh, Das Awkscht Fescht chairman.

There are 15 Corvettes expected under the Featured Car Tent, set up by the Allentown Area Cor-

vette Club.

The Corvette has been a bonafide racing car in GT categories, with wins at the 24 Hours of Daytona, 12 Hours of Sebring, and 24 Hours of Le Mans.

The Corvette is subject of pop culture lore, celebrated in song, on television shows and, yes, in Barbieland.

A mid-1970s third-generation Corvette (C3) was Barbie's first Corvette, dubbed the "Star 'Vette." The 1984-1996 fourth generation Corvette (C4) was Barbie's next Corvette. A 1956-1957 first-generation Corvette (C1) is in the 2023 "Barbie" movie.

Barbie (Margot Robbie) cruises down the road in her Corvette with Ken (Ryan Gosling) along

for the ride, not unlike Tod Stiles (Martin Miller) and Buz Murdock (George Maharis), who began tooling around in a 1960 Corvette on TV's "Route 66" (1960-1964). If Nelson Riddle's instrumental "Route 66" gave piano, guitar, strings and brassy breeziness to a Corvette on the open road, pop songs soon celebrated or warned of the Corvette's prowess.

One of The Beach Boys' car-culture anthems, "Shut Down," on the "Surfin' USA Album" (1963) warned, "But my fuel-injected Stingray's really startin' to go." The Beach Boys stood next to Corvettes in photographs on covers of the group's album, "Shut Down, Vol.

2," and the records, "I Get Around" and "Help Me, Rhonda."

Jan and Dean took the Corvette myth even further on vinyl in "Dead Man's Curve" when they sang "I was cruisin' in my Stingray late one night" and in real life when two years after the song was a hit, Jan Berry crashed his Corvette near the actual Dead Man's Curve in Beverly Hills, Calif.

And there's Prince's "Little Red Corvette" (1982), which was really more about metaphor than four-on-the-floor.

Rick Schreiter of Salisbury Township is displaying his 1965 Corvette Stingray at Das Awkscht Fescht.

Schreiter is a 20-year

member of the National Corvette Restorers Society, with its local chapter based in Warminster, Bucks County.

"I'm a 300-level judge. That means I've been around awhile," says Schreiter. He learned a lot restoring his 1965 Corvette Stingray.

"I bought it in '98. It was in boxes. It took about seven, eight years to restore. The frame and the engine and the tires was in the garage. The body was on a dolly under an apple tree in Hokendauqua."

Schreiter first showed his restored Corvette in 2005.

The Allentown Area Corvette Club (AACC), which is sponsoring the Featured Car at Das Awkscht Fescht, is "Dedicated to America's only true sports car." The AACC, founded in 1969, has more than 200 members. AACC President is Marty Hegyi.

Hobaugh notes that Das Awkscht Fescht is sponsored by the Macungie Memorial Park Association, with Amy Hillegass, Macungie Memorial Park Manager, and Ontelaunee Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America, founded in 1965 one year after Das Awkscht Fescht's first year.

Hobaugh was Ontelaunee Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America Pres-

ident in 2020, the year Das Awkscht Fescht was canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

For the 2023 Das Awkscht Fescht, there are 1,800-1,900 vehicles registered, says Hobaugh.

New this year is electronic registration for vehicles. "We picked up a couple hundred more," Hobaugh says.

"We can't do this without volunteers. I've brought in a number of Rotarians," says Hobaugh, District Governor, Rotarians, 2021-2022.

Hobaugh has written a history of Das Awkscht Fescht, which he gives in PowerPoint presentations to community groups.

Next year, the Featured Car at Das Awkscht Fescht, Hobaugh says, salutes the 60th anniversary of Ford Motor Company's Mustang.

Das Awkscht Fescht is not only about the Antique, Classic and Special Interest entrants and the Auto Flea Market and Car Corral.

There are children's activities, including Crayola Corner; Outdoor Toy Town; arts, crafts, antiques and collectibles for sale; entertainment, and food and beverages.

CGI (Computer Generated Imagery) for backgrounds, certain aspects of scenes and some content. However, most of the stunts seem to be "practical," as in they are done in real time and space.

Much of the fun of watching the movie is the vicarious thrill of witnessing Tom Cruise perform the stunts. Not to worry. He was successful. "Mission: Impossible - Dead Reckoning Part Two" is set for release in June 2024.

"Mission: Impossible - Dead Reckoning" sets an exhilarating, adrenaline-rush, pulse-pounding pace from the film's opening frames in a pre-credits sequence aboard a Russian submarine, the Sevastopol, named for the Russian Navy base of the Black Sea Fleet in Sevastopol, Crimea, now occupied by Russia.

After the opening credits, Ethan Hunt (Tom Cruise) is caught in a firestorm assault in the Arabian Desert in the Middle East and gets out of there with the assistance of sharpshooter friend, Ilsa Faust (Rebecca Ferguson).

At a meeting of the United States Intelligence Community, Ethan Hunt eavesdrops on CIA Director Eugene Kittridge (Henry Czerny), Director of National Intelligence Denlinger (Cary Elwes) and other government officials, discussing the Entity, an experimental Artificial Intelligence (AI), unlocked by a two-piece cruciform key.

Ethan Hunt is convinced that the Entity is a threat to humanity. He and his team, Benji Dunn (Simon Pegg) and Luther Stickell (Ving Rhames), travel to Abu Dhabi International Airport to intercept Grace (Hayley Atwell), who has stolen one-half of the cruciform key, and who is pursued by Gabriel (Esai Morales), a liaison with the Entity. Helping Gabriel is a French assassin, Paris (Pom Klementieff). Also seeking the cruciform key is Alanna Mitsopolis (Vanessa Kirby), an arms dealer.

The action shifts to Rome, to Venice, to the

Orient Express. In each location, there are incredible, eye-popping chase scenes. A car chase involving a yellow Fiat 500, police cars and a Humvee military-style vehicle gives the automotive mayhem in "The French Connection" (1971), "Bullitt" (1968) and "Fast X" (2023) a run for the goosebumps.

A passenger train tops fight scene between Ethan Hunt and Gabriel outdoes that in "Indiana Jones and the Dial of Destiny" (2023) and the many previous train-roof chase scenes in the history of cinema.

A motorcycle jump scene with Ethan Hunt driving off a cliff, jettisoning the motorcycle and parachuting to the moving train is mind-boggling. To top that, Ethan Hunt later leaps from the disabled train and paraglides to a safe landing.

"Mission: Impossible - Dead Reckoning Part One" is one incredible scene after the other. It's more than that. The film has credible characters and action even in the dialogue scenes.

The cinematography by Director of Photography Fraser Taggart uses Dutch angles, whereby a character is shown in a scene with the camera on an angle, to heighten tension. The editing by Eddie Hamilton (Oscar nominee, editing, "Top Gun: Maverick") also keeps the movie-goer off-guard.

All of this is pulled together tremendously by Director Christopher McQuarrie (Oscar recipient, original screenplay, "The Usual Suspects," 1996; Oscar nominee, picture, adapted screenplay, "Top Gun: Maverick," 2022; Director: "Mission: Impossible - Fallout," 2018; "Mission: Impossible - Rogue Nation," 2015; "Jack Reacher," 2017; "The Way of the Gun," 2000), working from a screenplay he co-wrote with Erik Jendresen (TV's "Killing Lincoln," 2013) based on the television series, "Mission: Impossible" (1966-1973, created by Bruce Geller (1930-1978). The score by Lorne Balfe uses the familiar "Mission: Impossible" theme written by Lalo Schiffrin.

None of this would have the impact it does without Tom Cruise as Ethan Hunt at the center

of the action. Tom Cruise is a minimalist actor. He knows when to remain silent and clench his jaw and when to let his expressive eyes do the talking.

"Mission: Impossible" has taken the James Bond 007 formula and updated it. There are no Bond Girls, per se. Rather, there are female agents, who are equal to the task rather than being a girlfriend on the hero's arm.

Hayley Atwell creates a charming yet somewhat malevolent presence as Grace, on who's side one is never quite sure she is on.

Rebecca Ferguson is intense as Ilsa Faust, who fights alongside Ethan Hunt.

Also memorable are Vanessa Kirby (Alanna Mitsopolis) and Pom Klementieff (Paris).

Excellent in supporting roles are Esai Morales (Gabriel), Simon Pegg (Benji Dunn) and Ving Rhames (Luther Stickell).

"Mission: Impossible - Dead Reckoning Part One" sets new standards for action films. It's a thriller from beginning to end.

The movie raises important questions about the future of military intelligence, cyber warfare and the world we live in.

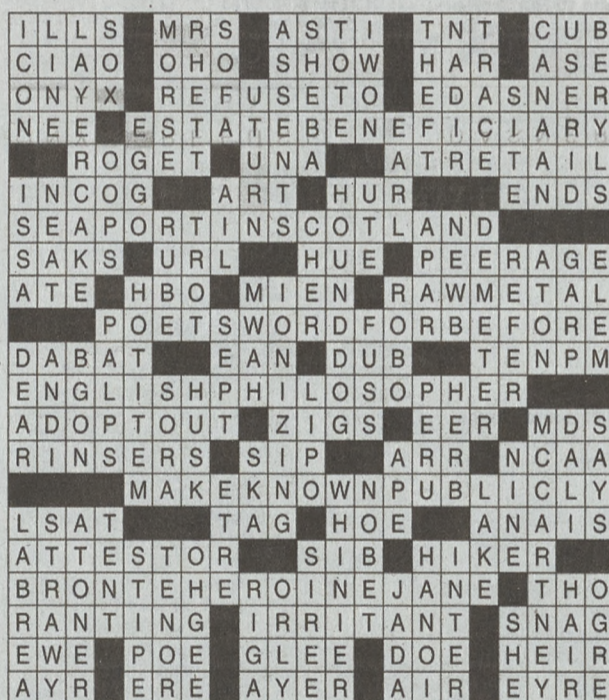
