"Musikfest, over the next 10 days, will represent all that is great about the city of Bethlehem," said Bethlehem City Council President J. William Reynolds. "[It] really is a celebration not just of music, but of everything that we are, on a cultural level, on a diversity level, on a community level.

Gregg Feinberg, chair of the ArtsQuest Board of Trustees, took a moment to acknowledge the recent recognition of SteelStacks before presenting the 2017 Founders Awards.

"On June 15, Steel-Stacks beat out projects in Boston, Chicago, Los Angeles and New Orleans to win the 2017 Rudy Bruner Gold Medal for Urban Excellence, which celebrates places of exceptional physical design that contribute to the vitality of American cities." Feinberg said. "In 2014, SteelStacks received the Urban Land Institute Global Award for Excellence. These are two really big awards."

## Summer camp fun takes a turn

NAACP concludes first program in the face of a possible hate crime

It's a plot line right out of a summertime horror film: Kids playing in a park happily until the monster arrives. In this case, the children were part of a summer camp experience hosted by the Bethlehem NAACP. It was the organization's first time offering the camp for young people ages 5 - 18 at Saucon Park on Williams Street in Bethlehem.

The monster itself didn't show up at the camp, but it left its droppings: the head of a dark-skinned baby doll ripped from its body and impaled on a stick.

The head was found by one of the campers in a muddy parking area near the pavilion rented for the camp. The rest of the doll's body was found in a trash can nearby


Bethlehem NAACP president Esther Lee said the boy who found the doll was frightened by the incident.

Lee said she is suspicious of the intent of the act. "I do think it was deliberate. Things seem to be reverting to the way it was - people doing hateful things to others," Lee said in a telephone interview, and telling another Valley newspaper, "We've come from hanging people now and transitioned over to doing hate in another fashion.'

Lee called the act cowardly.

Bethlehem Police Chief Mark DiLuzio said it was "disgusting and despicable.'

Police are investigating the incident as a possible hate crime and are asking for help from park neighbors who might have seen some-



What is the integrity any more, if you can't keep these buildings at four stories?"

Seth Moglen, a Southside resident who serves on the board of the Community Action Development Corp. of Bethlehem, said, "The guidelines are pretty clear about scale," adding, "This is the latest in a series of projects that seems to any lay person reading the guidelines, to fly in the face of those guidelines." Moglen implored commissioners to base their decisions on the guidelines.

BHCC historic officer Christine Ussler reported her findings that the proposed new building, "is not historically appropriate in height or proportion. The height of the building will dwarf the adjacent buildings to either side." She said, "Three or four stories would be the maximum recommended." The penthouse roof would be inap-propriate for the neighborhood, she said. Ussler also recommended that the first floor storefront be of stone or ceramic tile with a cornice separating it from the brick-faced apartments above.

With a 1940 square-foot lot, "Seven stories is too tall," said board member Roger Hudak, an opinion shared by the most of the board. Vice chair Gary Lader expressed a need to see the building in context with the neighborhood before he could form an opinion on height.

Twiggar and Dunn were advised by BHCC to go back to their client and have the project redesigned to follow the recommendaboard's tions to make the building comply with the historic district guidelines. Twiggar agreed to return with street views of the structure that include adjoining buildings and to bring samples of proposed construction materials.

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

Ross also was granted approval to install a window and door sign at 7 E. Third St. The circa 1920 commercial building is owned by

Shale Road, LP. BHCC recommended a certificate of appropriateness for Marco Justo to re-face the projecting sign at 738 E. Fourth St. Justo's Rice 'N Beans Puerto Rican & Mexican Fusion establishment now occupies the former home of the Boringuen Restaurant. Justo agreed to Ussler's modifications adding a pin stripe to the red, yellow and white sign, and moving the phone number and some additional copy on it to the window. City building Inspector Philip Roeder requested the restaurateur have his

sign maker send him and Ussler a scale drawing of the revised signage.

Before adjourning,

Roeder informed the rest that NYC Village Pizza at 129 W. Fourth St. had finally complied with their decision to have flat black steel decorative grills installed on the building's façade to replace the missing cast iron grills. He also announced that a curved porch at 110-112 E. Fourth St. was being restored properly at last.

The Bethlehem HCC is charged with the task of determining if new signs or other alterations to a building's exterior would be an appropriate fit for the neighborhood in one of three designated historic districts. Hearings are regularly scheduled on the third Monday of the month. With nothing on the agenda to discuss. the June hearing had been canceled.

Obtaining a certificate of appropriateness is only a first step for business owners and residents in a designated historic district who wish to make alterations to a building's exterior. The BHCC's recommendations are later reviewed, then voted on by City Council before any project is allowed to proceed.



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

**BASD: Vaccination requirements explained** 

The Bethlehem Area School District health services has announced vaccination requirements for all grades.

On the first day of school, unless the student had a medical or religious / philosophical exemption, the attendee must have had at least one dose of the following vaccinations or risk exclusion: four doses of polio and of tetanus, diptheria and acellular pertussis; three doses of hepatitis B; and two doses of varicella (chicken pox) or evidence of immunity and of measles, mumps and rubella

## Dealing with cultural trauma

Racism, and dealing with the trauma that it causes, was one of more than a dozen related subjects discussed at the International Institute of Restorative Practices' 2017 Summer Symposium at the Hotel Bethlehem in July. A total of 78 people from around the world attended the three-day event titled, "A Restorative Journey: Transforming Relational Harm.'

Kevin Cutter of Toronto, Canada, and Kevin Jones from Bloomington, Ill., shared their experiences working with traumatized children from residential and transitional schools.

Cutter, a trainer for IIRP Canada, has extensive experience dealing with the consequences of 400 years of colonialism on the Inuit people in Canada. "The natives moved around. They didn't live in communities as they do now. As colonialists, we found that problematical. We wanted them to stay in one place and go to school. Otherwise, they were no use to us if they couldn't read," Cutter said. "So, we actually relocated them.'

Starting around 1870, Cutter said social service workers went into the villages and took the children away, placing them in residential schools for indigenous students 100 or 200 miles away from their homes. "The philosophy being we can save the people

"People have separated themselves for a very long time. Having the tough conversations with people who discriminate against you or with people who have differences is important. If we avoid it, we never get past it."



Despite what many are claiming, this year marks Jethro Tull's 49th anniversary, not its 50th anniversary.

"I come across that all the time. People just seem to want to jump the gun," says Ian Anderson, lead vocalist, flautist, acoustic guitarist, and founding member of Jethro Tull.

"But honestly, even if it was, this has been just another tour. It's been just another tour since the beginning. I'm not an anniversary guy. It's just not on my mind. I don't think that

With Anderson having been in the music business for as long as he has, one must wonder what motivates him to continue to create and be such an active member of the community. To him, though, the answer seems almost matter-of-fact.

"It's that you have a great sense of this being what you do as a creator and as a person. And in terms of touring, it's romantic. It gets in the blood.

There will be a time when I'm not enjoying the idea of doing it. Some day, it will lose the appeal. But as long as I can physically and mentally be able to do it, I'll keep doing it."

Turning attention back to the Musikfest concert, Anderson hopes that listeners find his music evocative of imagery in ways that he sees his music.

"I want people to try and hear the music and paint their own pictures as to what it's about. That's where I start with most visual ideas. It's a pictorial focus. I think in visual terms, so it's logical to me that people listening will just close their eyes and create their own pictorial ideas of what it means. 

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## Bud Cole 'Celebration Of Life' soars over Blue Mountain

Kestrels circled in lazy patterns in the brilliant sky. A parasailer glided gracefully, looping back and forth. Far below rolled the green expanse of the valley and beyond, the hazy blue outline of the Pocono Mountains.

A long line formed in the lobby of Blue Moun-Resort-Summit Lodge, Lower Towamensing Township, Carbon County. There were hugs, words of condolence and anecdotes as Bev Cole, Bud Cole's widow, greeted all.

The occasion was a "Celebration Of Life" service for outdoors columnist and educator Bud Cole. On the last day of July, an estimated 250 sought shade at umbrel-la tables on the Summit Lodge patio. They wore name tags with images of fishes (rainbow trout, large mouth bass, etcet-Reminiscences, chuckles and banter about Bud were shared as they enjoyed a buffet and cold beverages.

Easels displayed dozens of photographs of Bud through the years with family and friends. Bud's multi-pocket fishing-photo journalist's vest hung below a reproduction of his last "Bud's View" outdoors column and an appreciation article from years. the July 26 and 27 Focus section of Lehigh Valley

The kestrels, the parasailer, and the panoramic view symbolized the free spirit that was Bud Cole, in life and in eternity.

Family, friends, and acquaintances made their way down the path in 1966. to a wooden trellis where they sat on chairs or stood. Bud's ashes were the in a carved chest, a family heirloom, on a table. Bev plans to scatter Bud's ashes in places they en-

joyed visiting.
The song, "You Raise

Me Up," played to a slide show on a large television screen of photos of Bud, family, friends and his beloved pets. Pastor Curt Kemmerer, a friend of the family, gave the invocation.

Quoting Neil deGrasse Tyson, Director of the Hayden Planetarium, New York City, Kemmerer said, to paraphrase: "We are ultimately each of us stardust. I like to believe Bud Cole knew that. and spread that belief."

More recordings of songs were played, including "I Hope You Dance" and "Amazing Grace." Those attending were encouraged to share memories of Bud.

recalled Kemmerer Bud singing along to Elvis Presley songs. He spoke of the humor of Bud, a Northampton Area School District elementary school teacher 1966-1999 ("I've been in the fifth grade for 25 years.). He mentioned the Three B's Mobile Nature Center for youths and nature lovers that Bud and Bev ran in association with Northampton Community College during the summer. He described the backyard of Bud's and Bev's Northampton area home as a "nature preserve." He spoke of Bud being on the Ski Patrol for some 47

"He had that youthful spirit that sees things for the first time," Kemmerer said of Bud.

Bud Cole was a Whitehall High School graduate, Class of 1962, and received a BS in elementary education from East Stroudsburg University

## The 'Dunkirk' spirit abides

"Dunkirk" is a bru-tally-realistic film based on the true story about MOVIE a World War II battle REVIEW in which the retreat of Allied Forces became a rallying cry for United Kingdom Prime Minister Winston Churchill with the military and civilians to fight the Na-

Soldiers from Belgium, the British Empire and France were surrounded by the Nazi army on the beaches and harbor of Dunkirk, France, between May 26 and June 4, 1940, in the Battle of France during World War II. An estimated 300,000 Allied soldiers were evacuated by British civilians in "Operation Dynamo," navigating a flotilla of approximately 700 private recreational and fishing boats, known as "The Little Ships," across the English Channel from

France to England.
"Dunkirk" not only depicts the brave rescues, but the bombing by Nazi war planes of Allied ships, many of which apparently flew the Red Cross banner. An even more major segment of "Dunkirk" concentrates on dogfights between Allied Spitfire fighter plans and Nazi bombers.

"Dunkirk" is gripping from the very first moments to the end, with unrelenting tension. In the genre, it is comparable to some of the best contemporary and classic World War II movie dramas.

"Dunkirk" is not an easy film to watch. The explosions, the sinking ships, the men swimming and drowning as oil-fueled flames burn on the water, are horrific, startling and realistic. Nonetheless, "Dunkirk" is a must-see. Don't miss it during its theatrical release

"Dunkirk," filmed in the 70 mm Imax format, was seen in the standard format for this review. Some of the aerial scenes would be spectacular in the premium-priced format on the huge screen.

The film stars several young, relatively unknown, but facially-striking, actors, who portray soldiers, including Fionn Whitehead (Tommy), Damien Bonnard (French soldier), Aneurin Barnard (Gibson) and Jack Lowden

(Collins, a fighter pilot). There are also wellknown actors portraying soldiers, including Tom Hardy (Farrier, an Allied fighter pilot), James D'Arcy (Colonel Winnant), Cillian Murphy (Shivering Soldier), Kenneth Branagh (Allied Commander Bolton), as well as British pop band One Direction's Harry Styles



## 'Troilus And Cressida' ruled at PSF

The Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival (PSF) 2017 season was a fight to the finish: "Evita" (fight for power), "The Hound of the Baskervilles" (death and detective work), "The Three Musketeers" (sword fights), "As You Like It" (wrestling), and "Troilus And Cressida" (also, wrestling, and the deaths of Hector and Patroclus).

'Troilus And Cressida," which in its PSF debut concluded Aug. 6 (as did the PSF 2017 season), Schubert Theatre, Labuda Center for the Arts, University, DeSales Center Valley, is challenging for actors and audiences. I won't even begin to try to unravel the plot, which in way, a Shakespearean way, you might say, is somewhat beside the point. Suffice and visage that was it to say it's about the Trojan War. Cutter said, "Teachers are at a crossroad of talking about intergenerational trauma," but he cautioned, "We have to be careful that we are not using our white colonialist privilege to work

with these people." Kevin Jones, who

trained in the same restorative practices class as Cutter, has been working in transitional schools for the past 20 years. "My journey started working with students dealing with trauma.'

After having everyone in the room give his or her name and nationality, Jones commented,
