

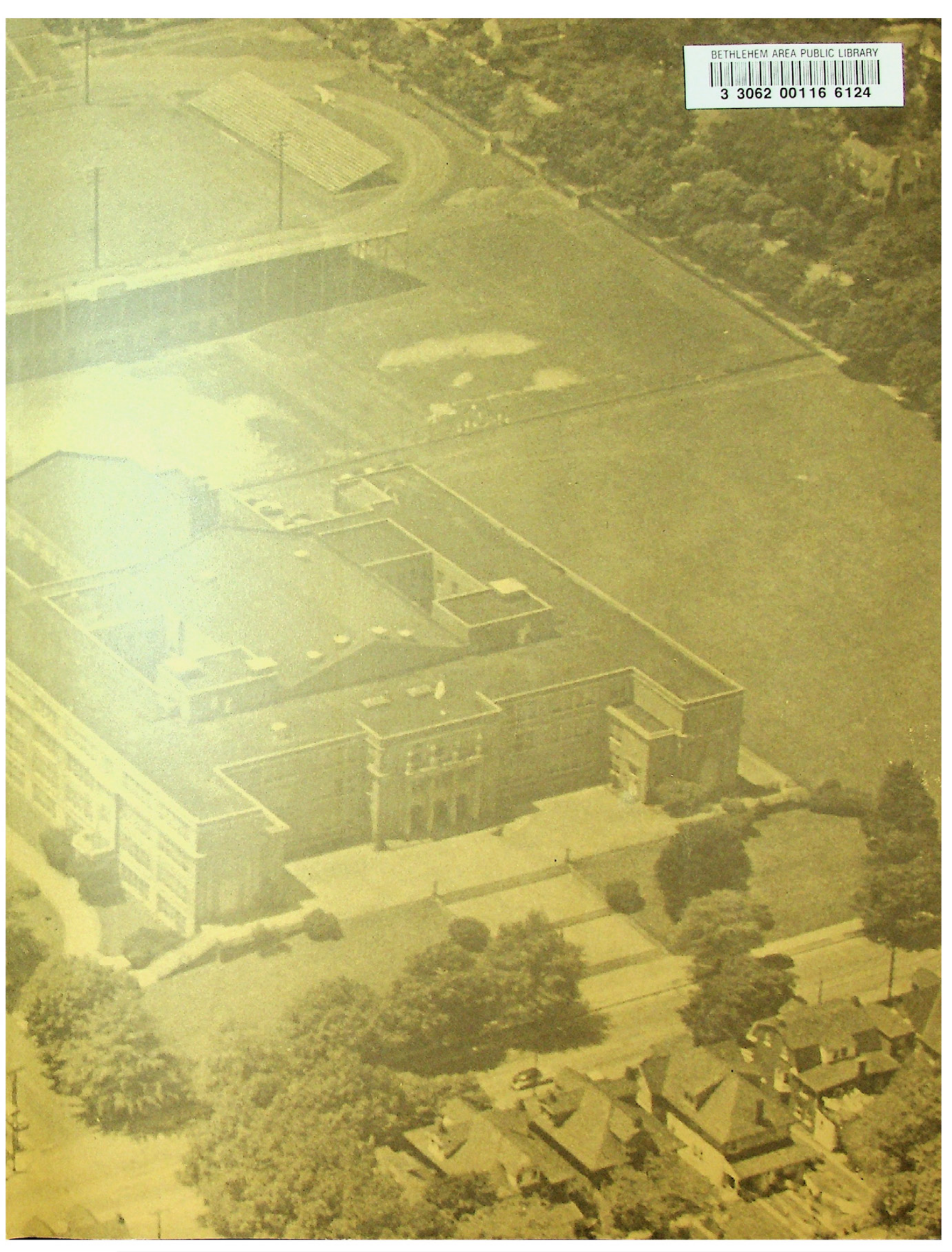

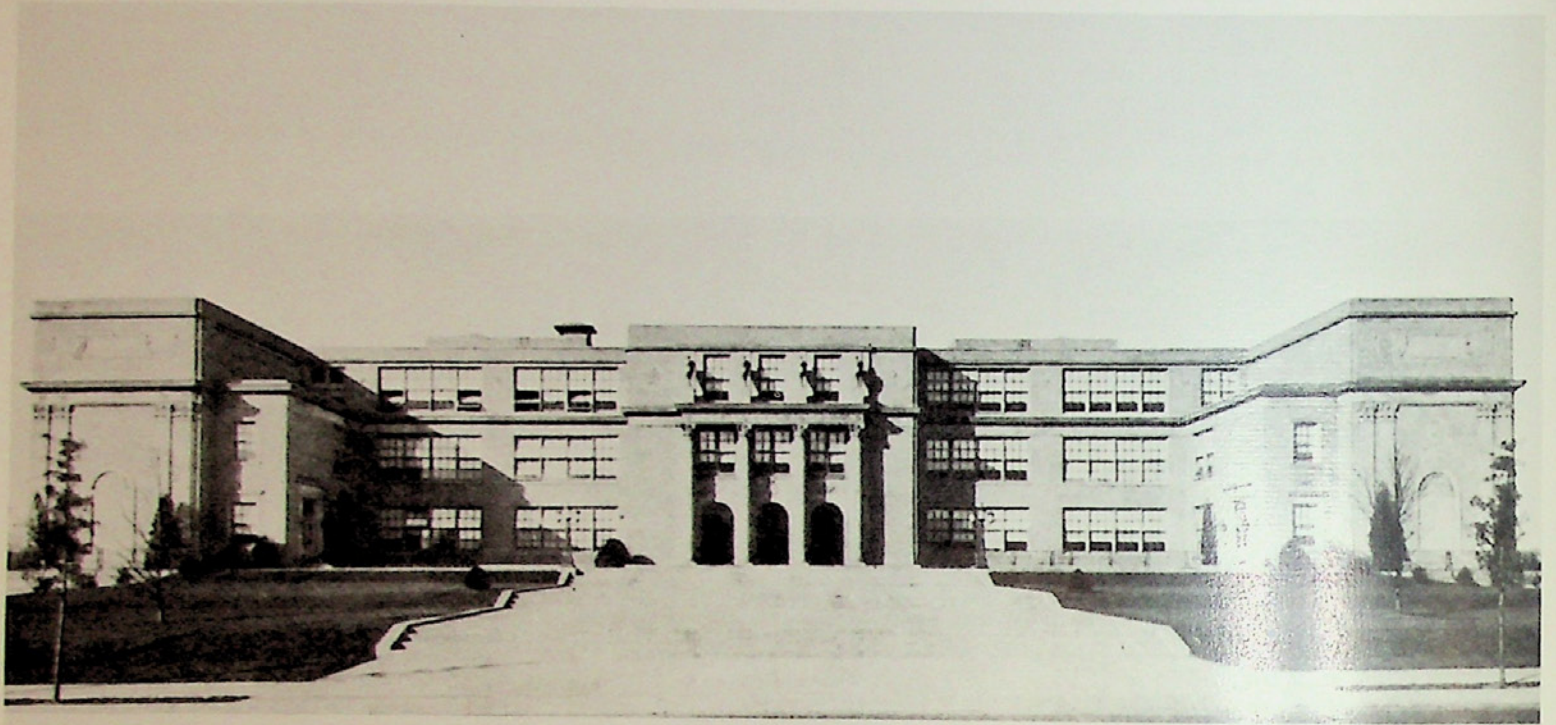

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# Cauldron marks 50th anniversary



## LIBERTY HIGH SCHOOL

NINETEEN SEVENTY-FIVE MARKS the golden anniversary of the *Cauldron*. Exactly fifty years ago the very first copy of this publication found its way into the hands of 237 eager seniors who looked back with fond memories on four years of high school life. In keeping with the spirit of the occasion, we thought we'd take a brief backward glance just for the sake of curiosity to see what Liberty High School was like when the Class of 1925 left.

Bethlehem was, of course, a different city. A walk downtown would have taken you to some familiar business establishments like Weinland's, Tom Bass, and Farr's. But gone forever are such stores as Bush & Bull's, currently the site of Orr's, Foering Motor Company, a Ford dealer located at 1029 Linden Street, and the East End Confectionery and Ice Cream Parlor at the corner of Linden and Laurel Streets. It was a time when telephone numbers consisted of no more than four digits and the *Bethlehem Globe-Times* was known only as *The Bethlehem Globe*.

As for the *Cauldron*, it was a smaller book with a handsome softbound cover printed by a firm in Allentown. The naming of the book is explained in this manner: "We have called this book the *Cauldron* because of its similarity to the witches' cauldron of the Middle Ages, into which all imaginable odds and ends were put. Into this book we have stirred the important and interesting doings of the term."

The yearbook covered the events of one of four city high schools in existence at that time. The other three in addition to Liberty were Franklin, which is currently the site of the Interim school, South Side High, better known to today's students as Broughal Junior High, and Central High School, located near the present College theater.

The highlight of the 1924-25 school year was the then annual Bethlehem-Allentown Thanksgiving Day football game, played on what is now Moravian College's home field since BASD stadium had not yet been constructed. Television was still a dream and radios were scarce, so an important game might well draw between 15,000 and 16,000 spectators. Basketball and wrestling were also very popular sports that drew a large following of adults as well as the to-be-expected student support. Wrestling meets and basketball games were held in the current girls' gymnasium where rabid fans lined the track and stepped right up to the out-of-bounds lines to torment visiting teams.

Another important highlight of the school year was a performance of the opera "The Chimes of Normandy" featuring members of the Glee Club.

At that time the Liberty High School Band was just getting started. The 30-piece ensemble, exclusively male, sported white sailor suits and hats. According to a 1925 *Cauldron* staffer with considerable powers of prediction, "As time passes, undoubtedly, this important organization which had such an auspicious beginning, will become greater and better each year."

Other activities that year included the glee clubs, Dramatics Club, Industrial Arts Club, Art Club, Orchestra, German and Spanish clubs, and the school newspaper, then known as the *Libertas*. Judging from the accounts of these organizations in a 1925 *Cauldron*, all enjoyed a great deal of popularity and student support.

As for the students themselves, though their goals may have been more modest by today's standards, they share with today's seniors the desire to enjoy life to the fullest and to succeed at whatever they attempted to achieve.



## with a brief glance at the past

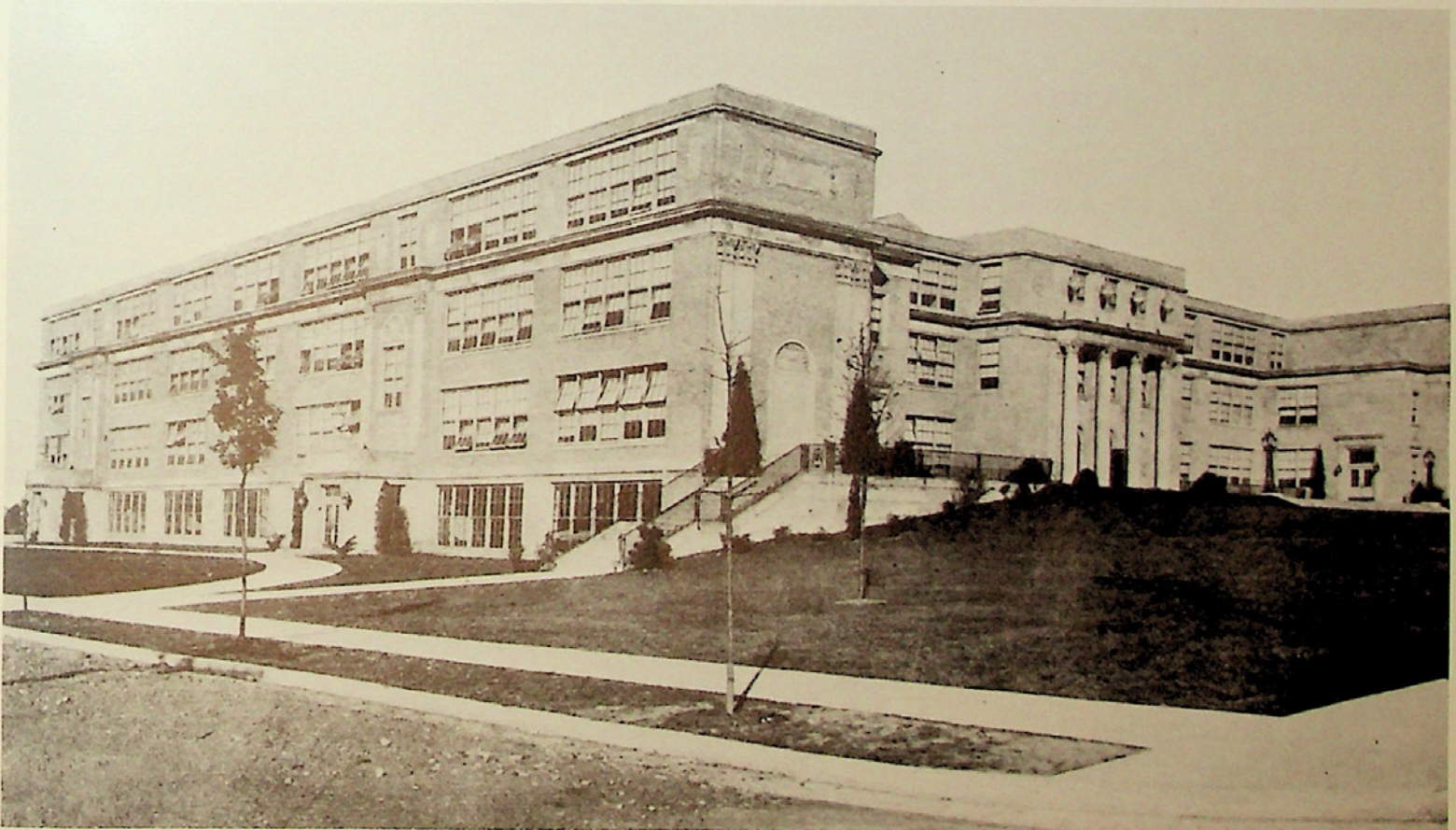
For those who could afford it—and there weren't that many — college stood in the immediate future. For those who couldn't, plenty of job opportunities awaited the graduates, and most stayed around Bethlehem.

Students showed a great deal of respect to teachers and seldom got to know them on a more informal basis as is more often the case today. The teacher's word was law, and a brief but thoroughly unpleasant visit to the office of the principal served quite effectively to convince those who thought otherwise that this was so.

Those who were seniors in 1925 had a special feeling

about themselves and about Liberty High. Underclassmen dreamed of the day they would become seniors because of a certain almost undefinable social status enjoyed by those "privileged" few. Perhaps Elta Unangst, Class of 1925, summed up that feeling best when she stated: "Lower classmen were filled with awe when they saw seniors go through the halls with the 'just-look-at-me' expression spread over every face, and the 'I-am-the-law' swing to their gait."

And so it was in 1925.

## SRO audiences cheer Senior Class's "Mame"

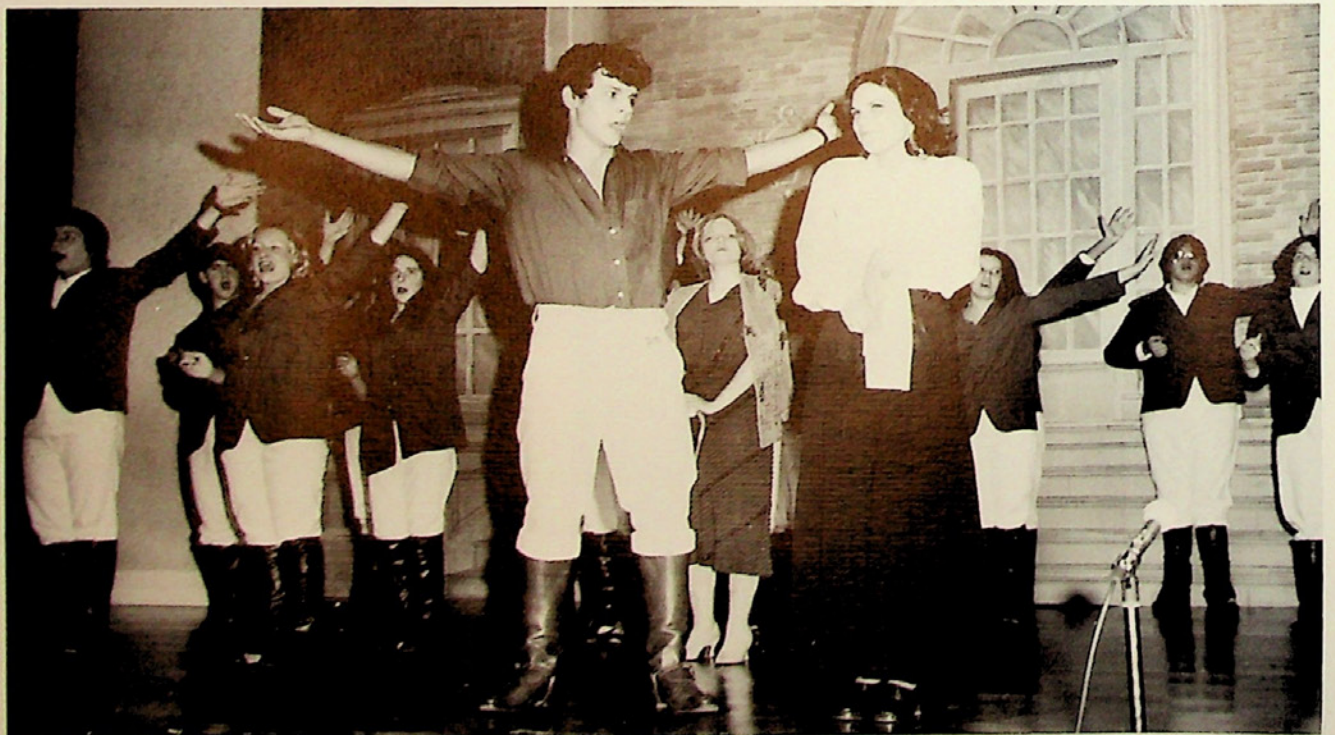

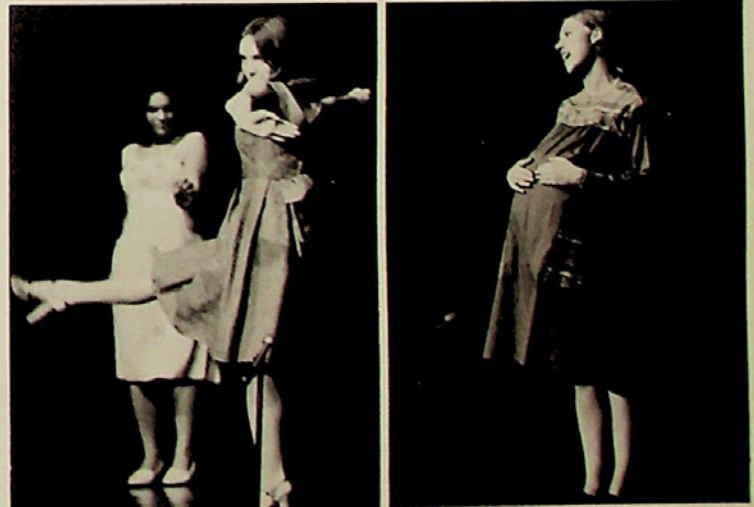

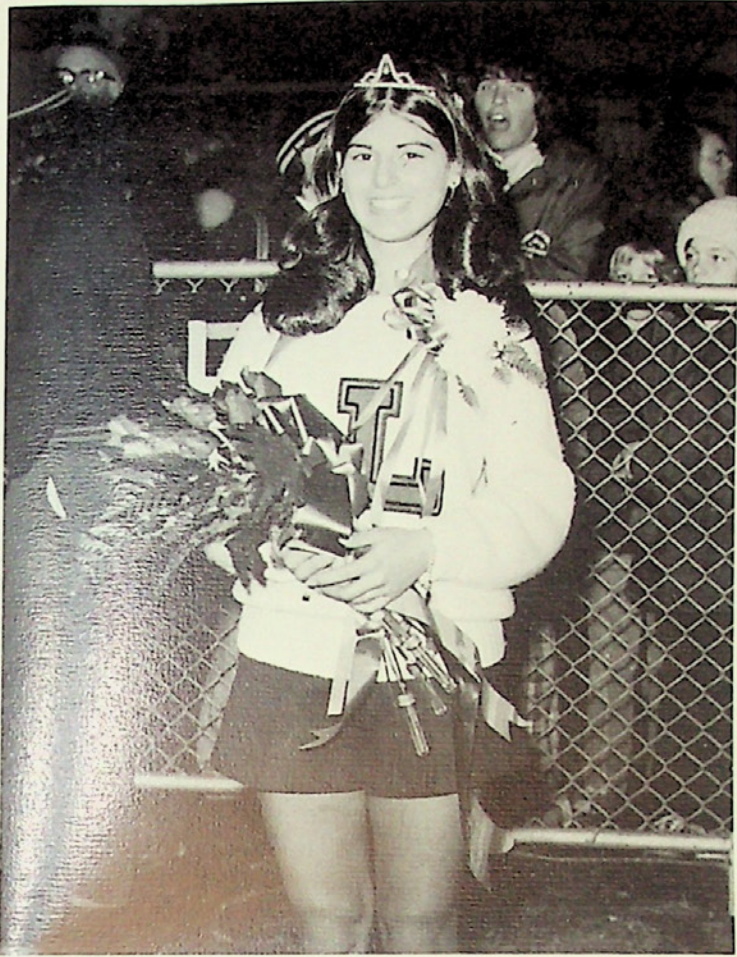

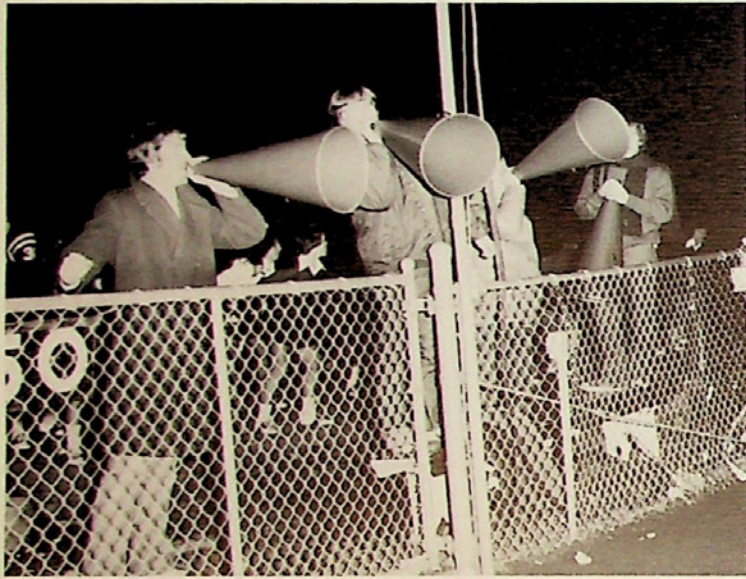
## Contests, skits, win highlight Homecoming

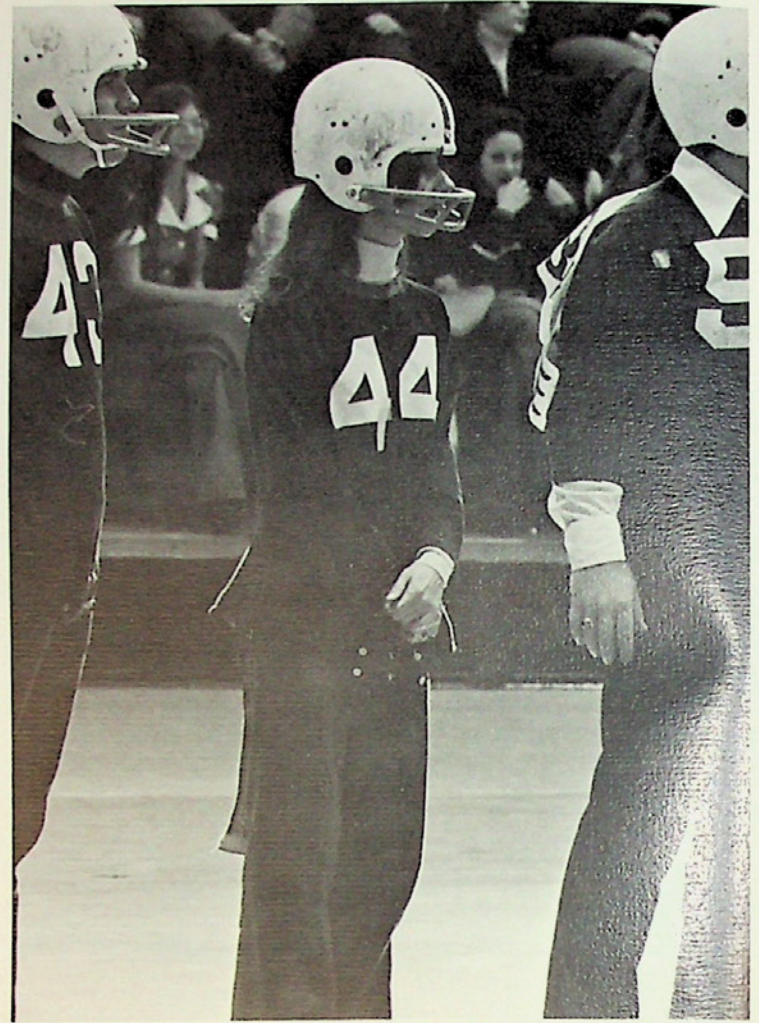

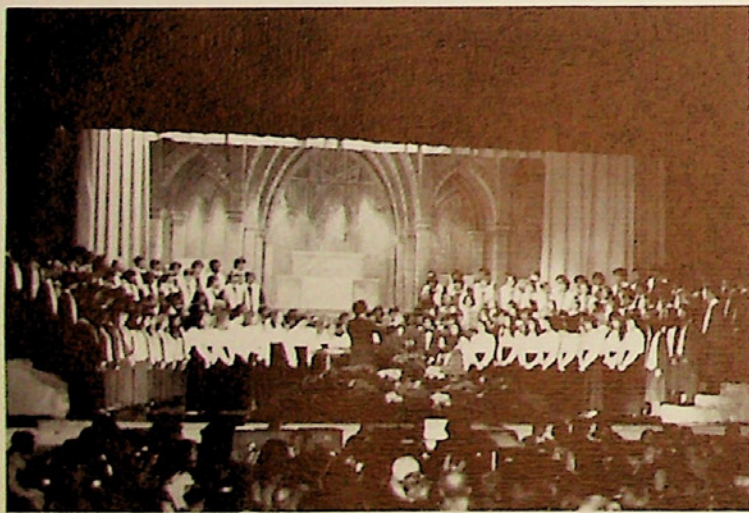

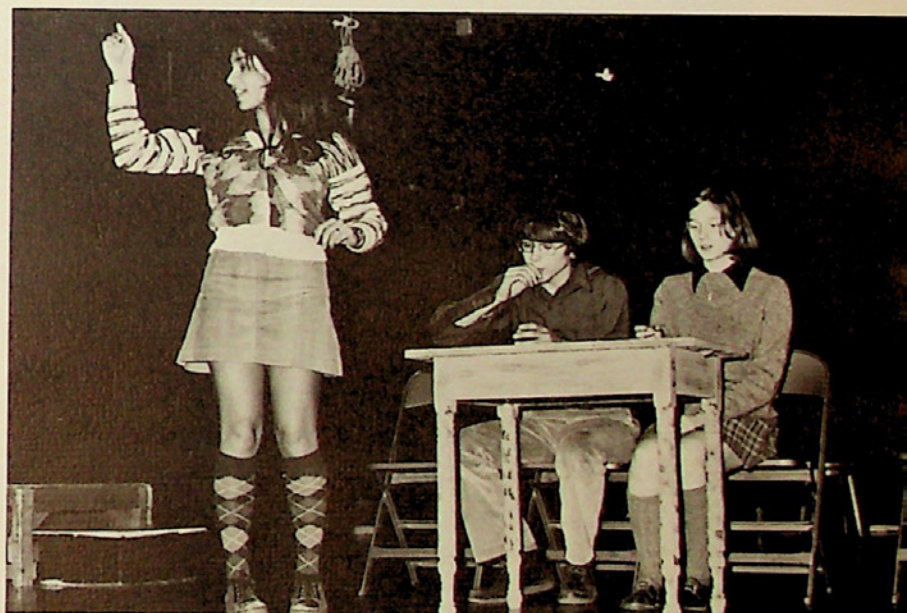

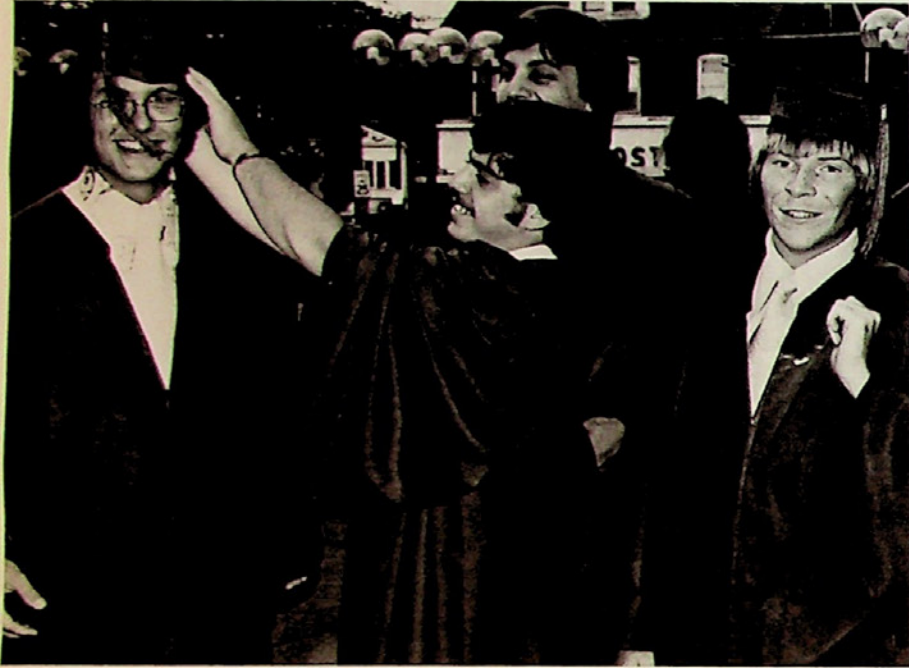

## Graduation Day — 1975

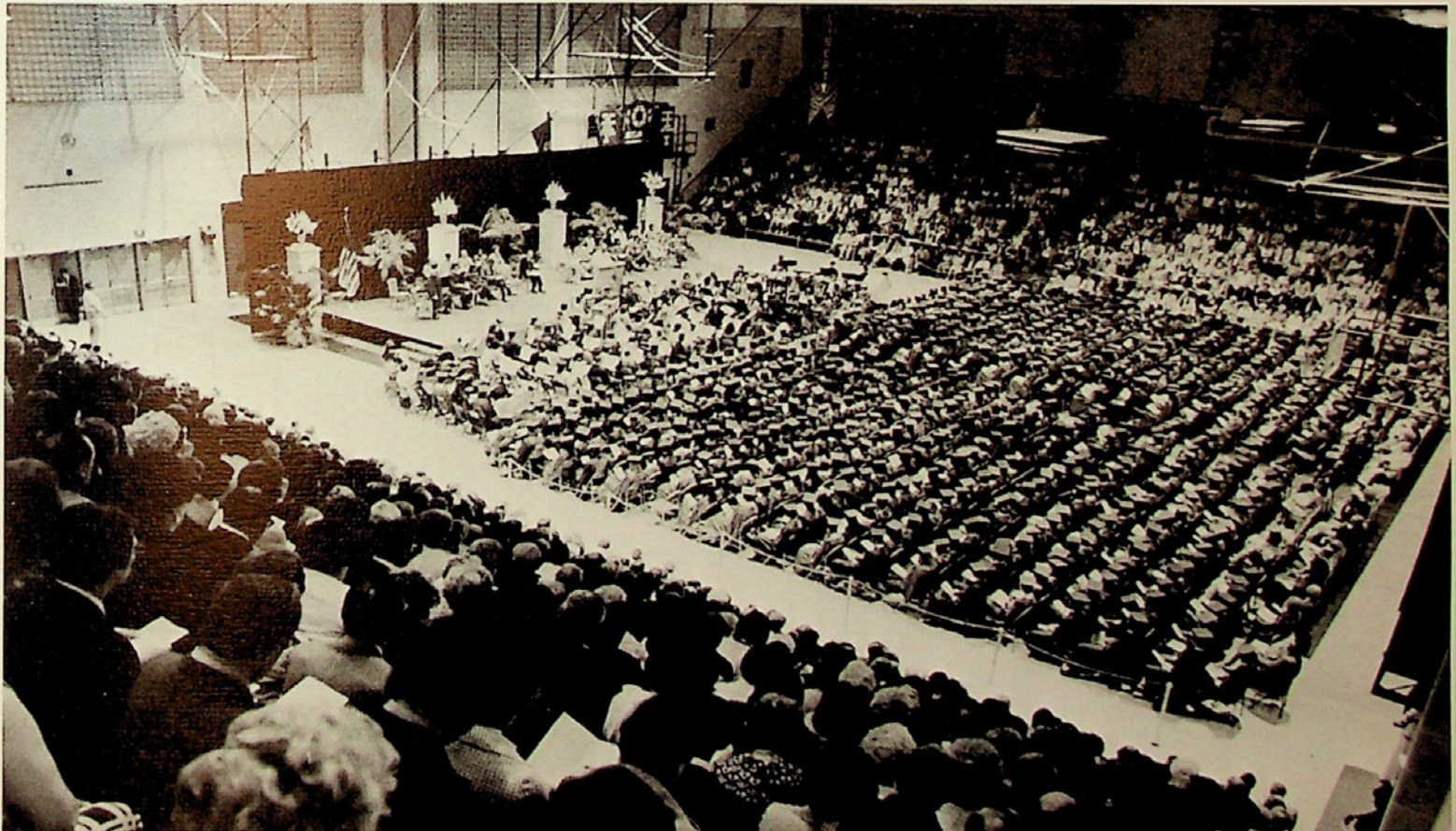

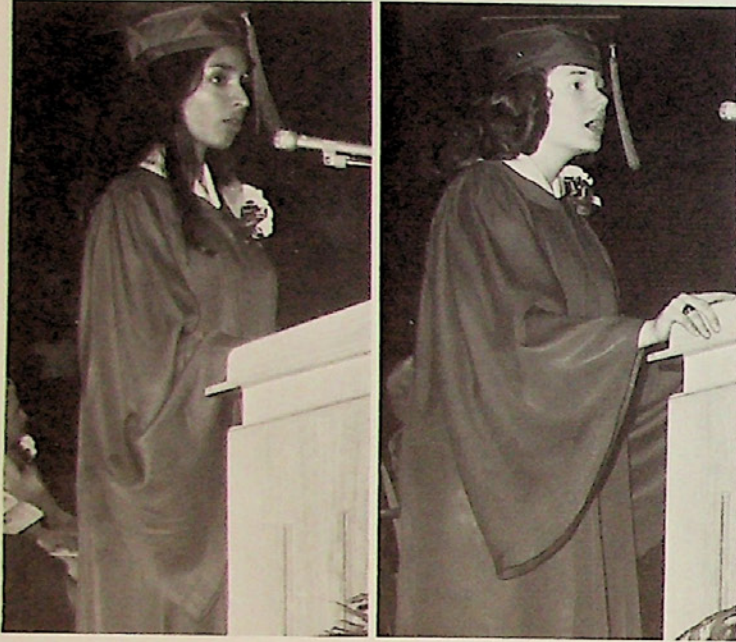

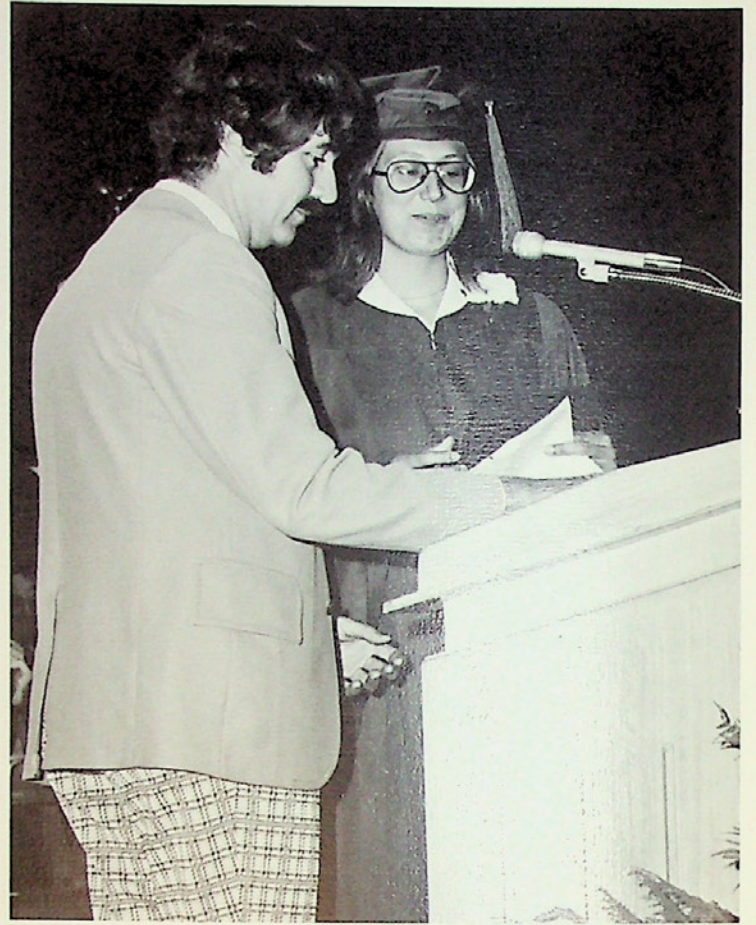

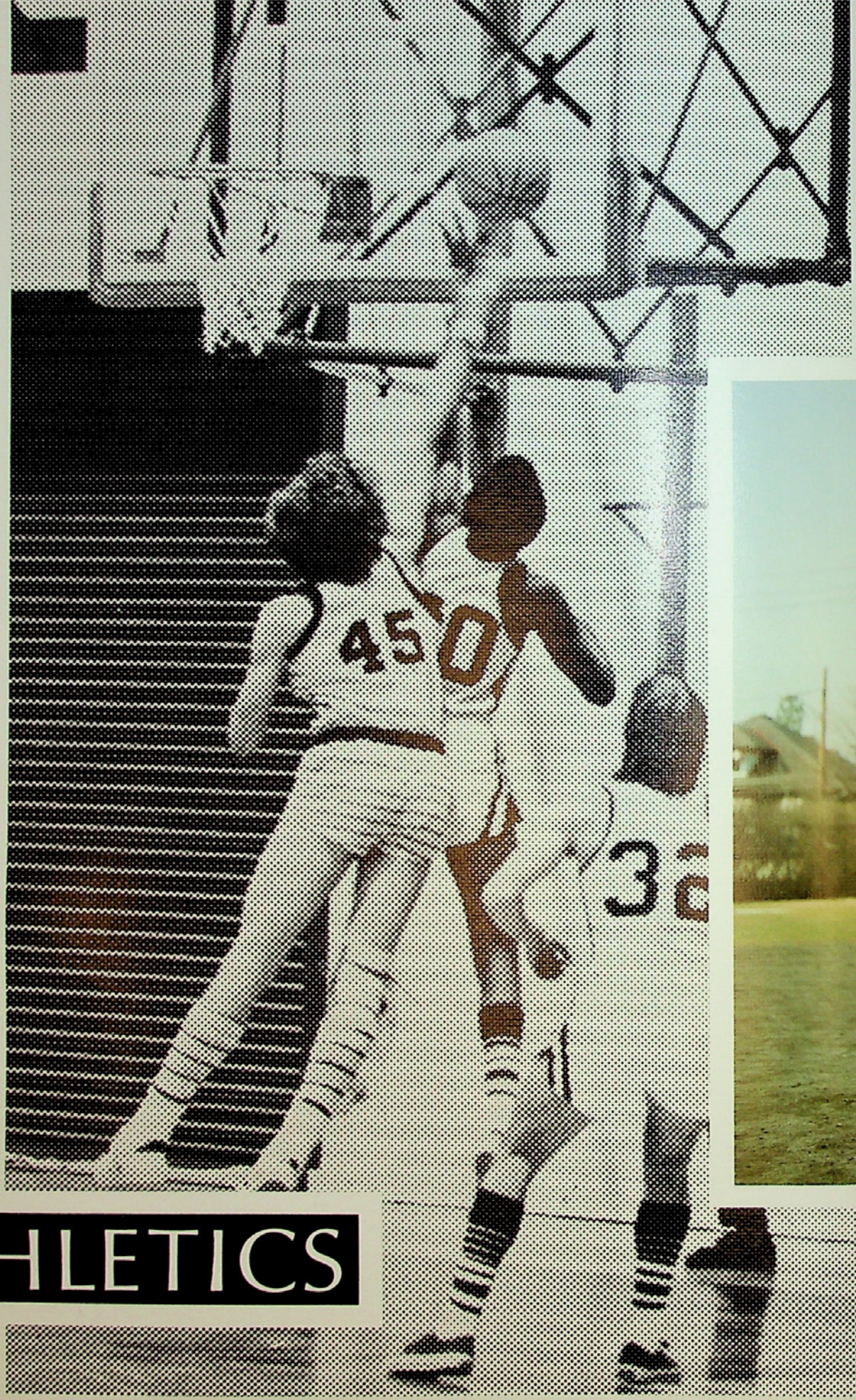

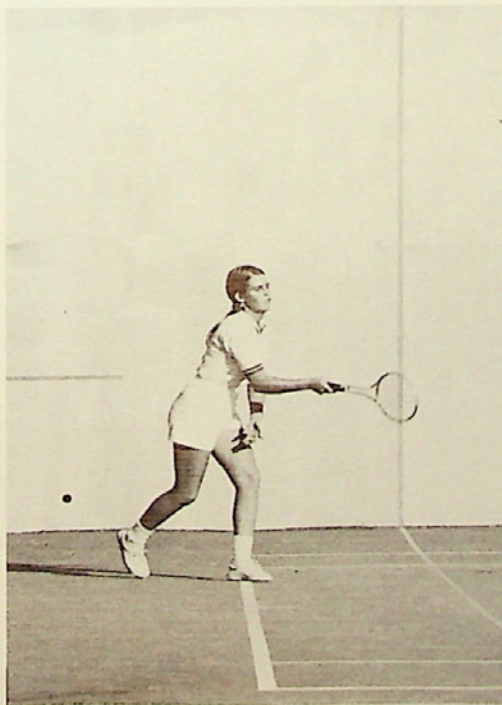

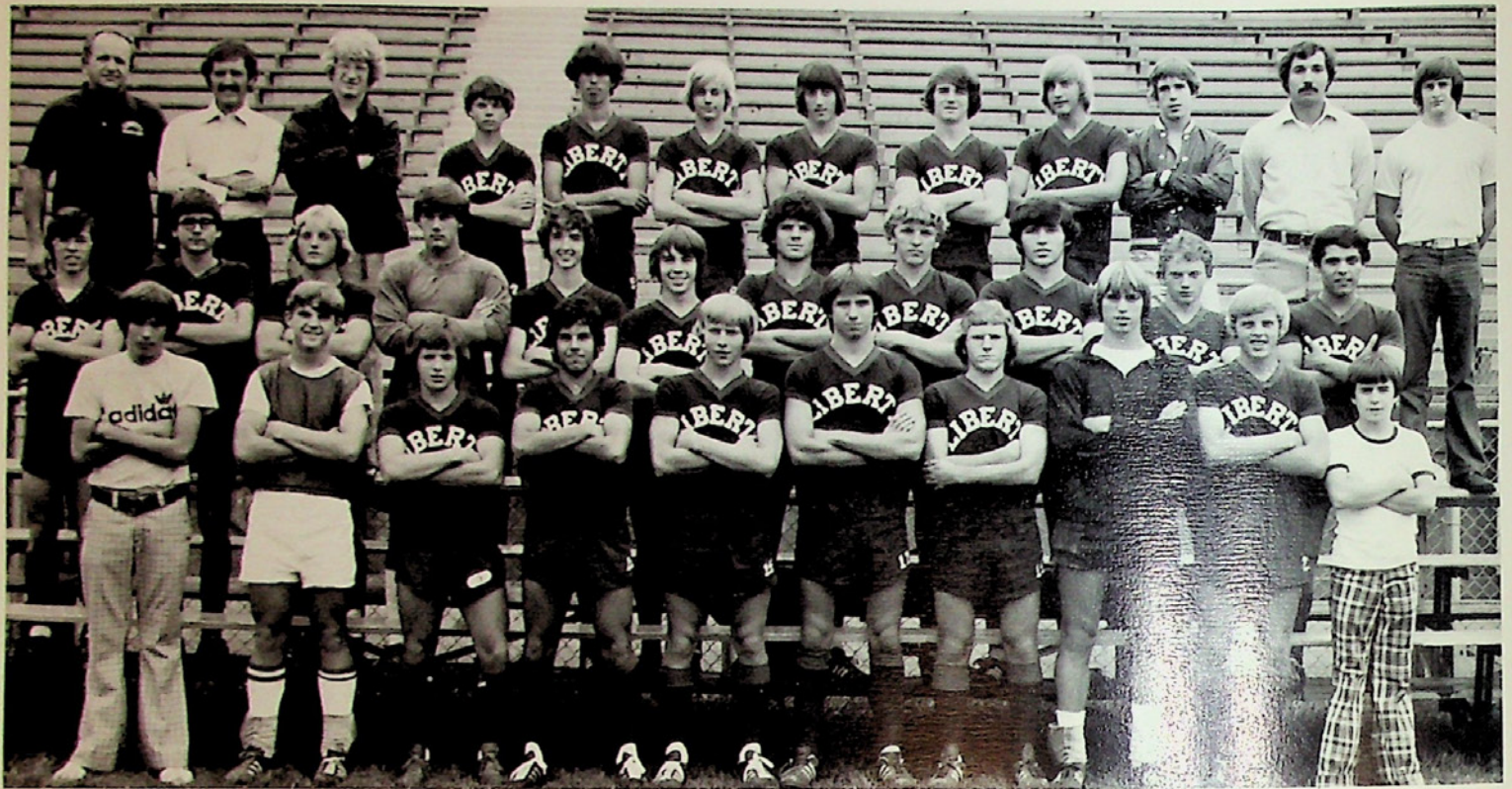

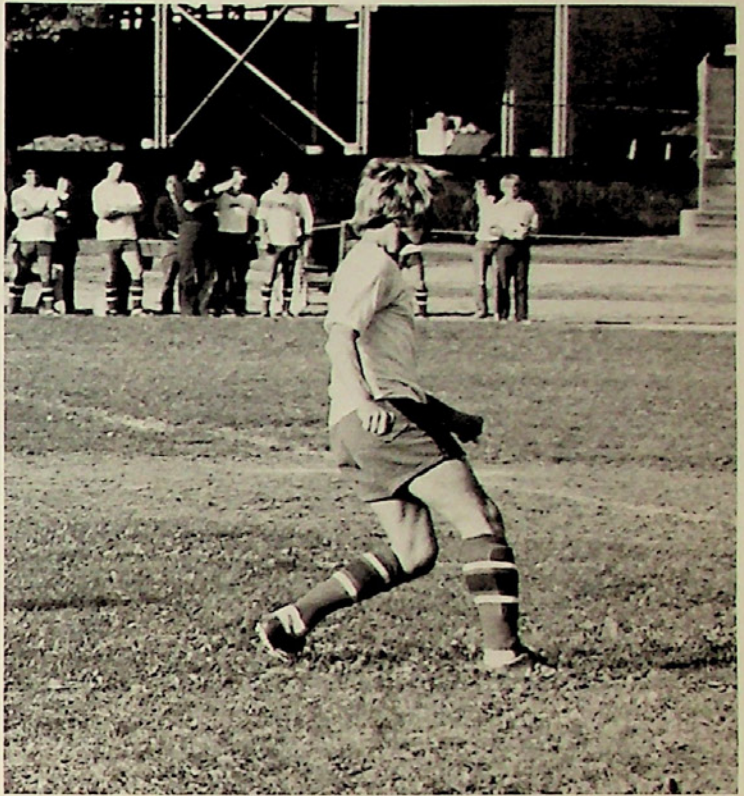

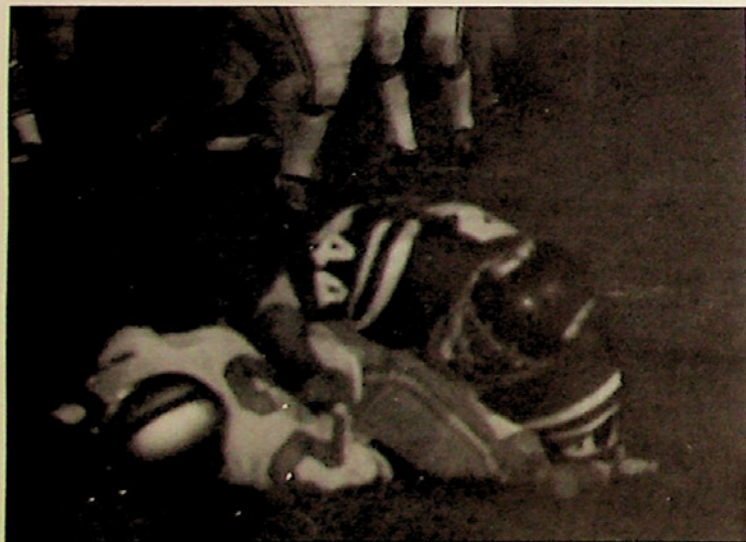
## A season of success

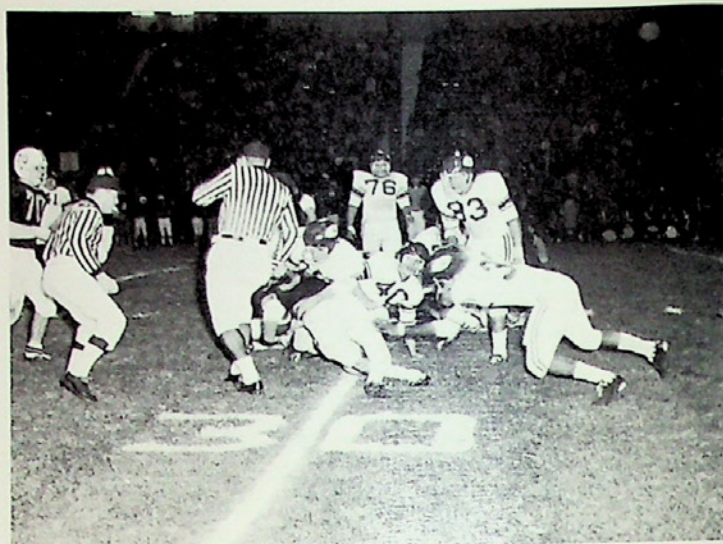

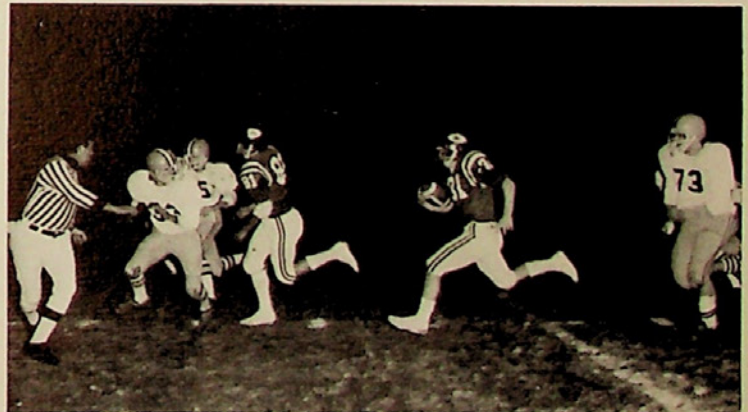

## Cross country squad suffers losing season

As far as most people are concerned, any race apparently boils down to who crosses the finish line first. But in cross country, fifth, seventh, or even ninth place can be decisive in determining which team walks away from the course with a victory. Unfortunately for Liberty, some of those needed finishes failed to materialize at the right time. As a result, what had been optimistically considered a year when the Hurricane would finish above .500 ended with a 3-5 log including a 28-27 heartbreaker to league power Phillipsburg.

Yet in this most demanding sport often held in the loneliest of locations, some good things happened. The relatively young squad — most members had but a year's experience — placed ninth among a field of twenty in a tri-county meet. The Hurricane also took a sixth spot in district competition while avenging two earlier dual meet defeats.

Leading Coach Jay Schuler's charges was Senior Larry Talotta who established a new school record of 14:25 for the 2.52-mile home course. Other top harriers included Seniors Ken Porter, Malcolm Hall, and Jon Terry, and Juniors Bill Haglegans, John Couch, and Dave Oravec.

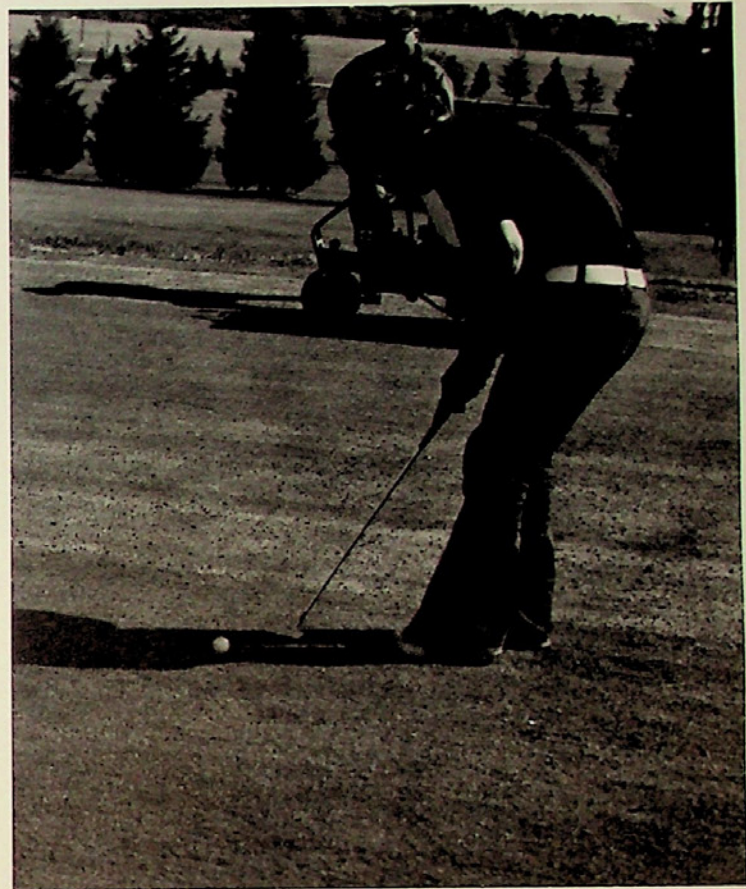

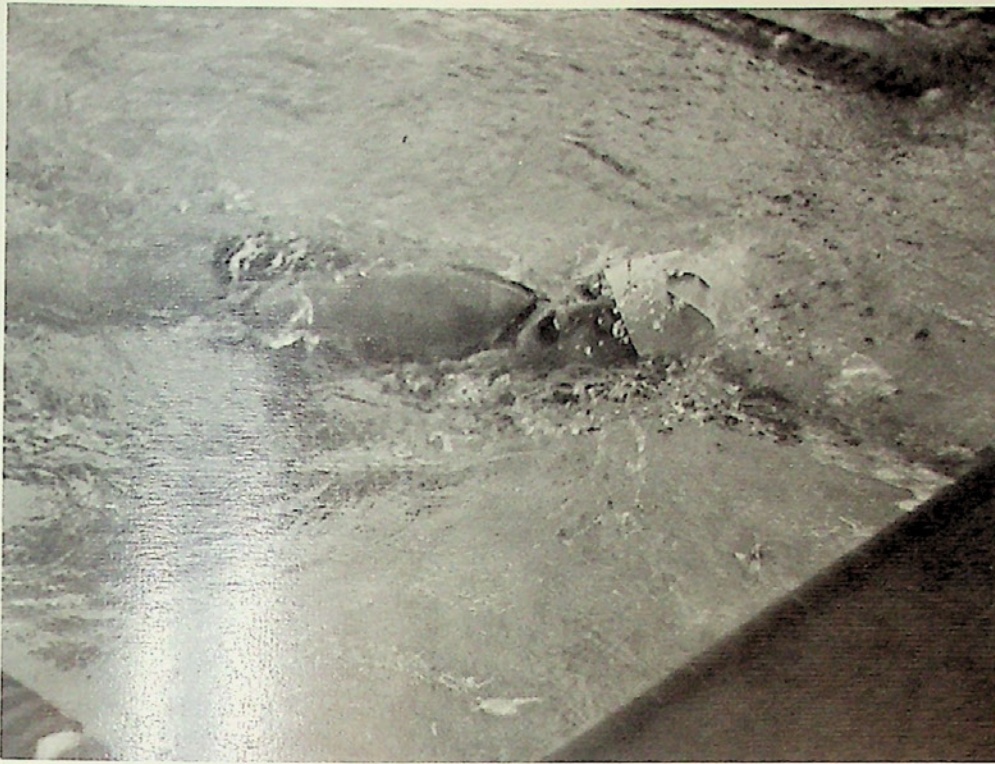

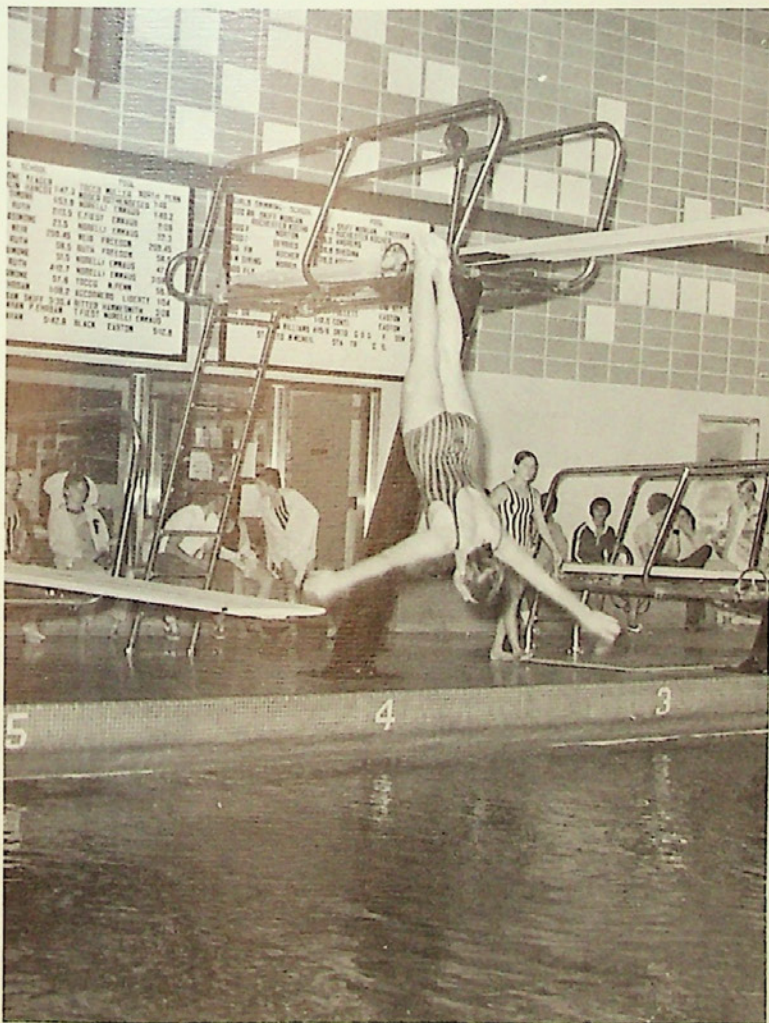

## Disappointing year for intramural sports

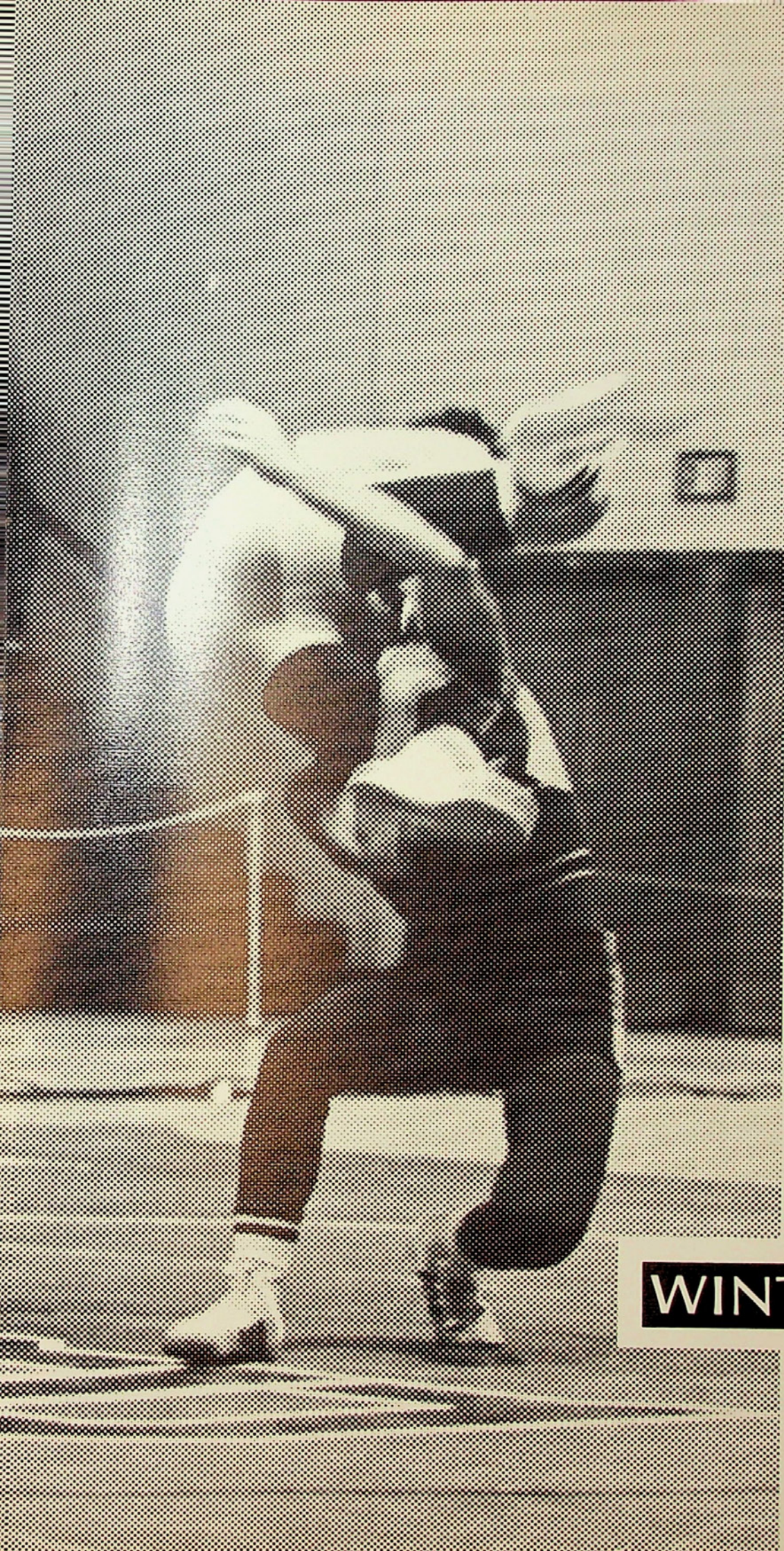

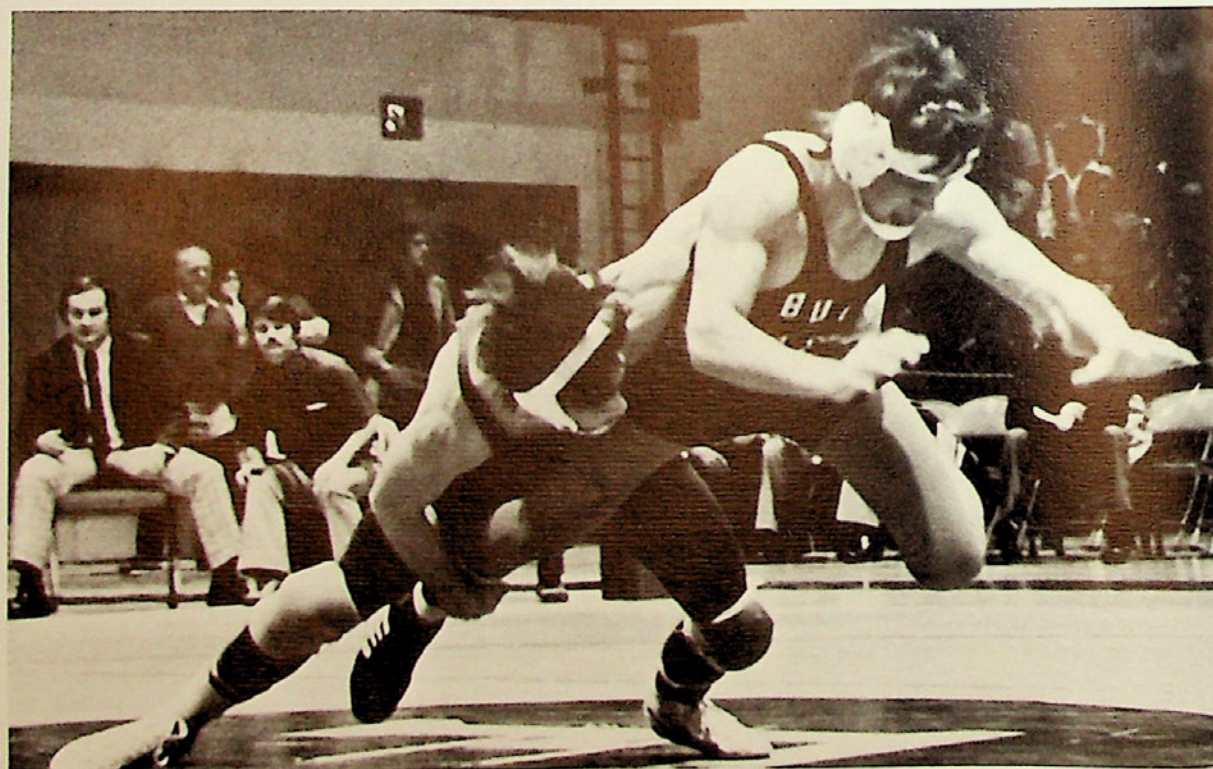

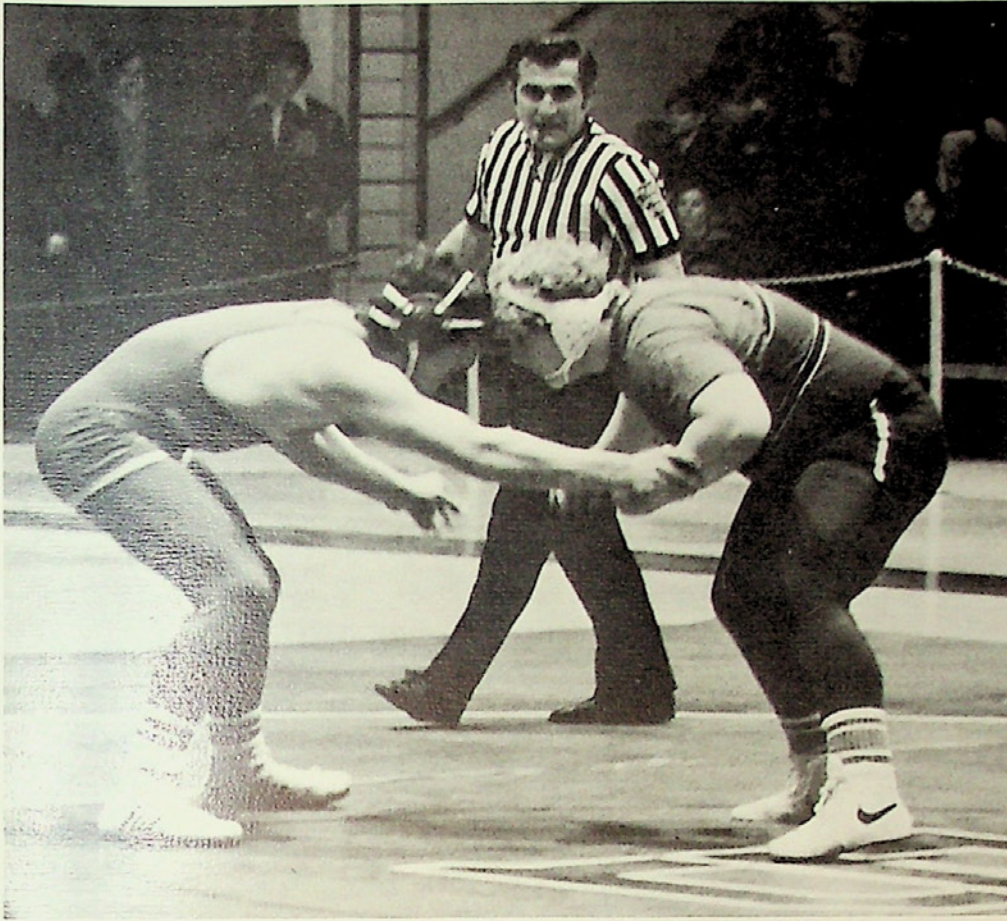

John Unangst works for a takedown during the Becahi meet.

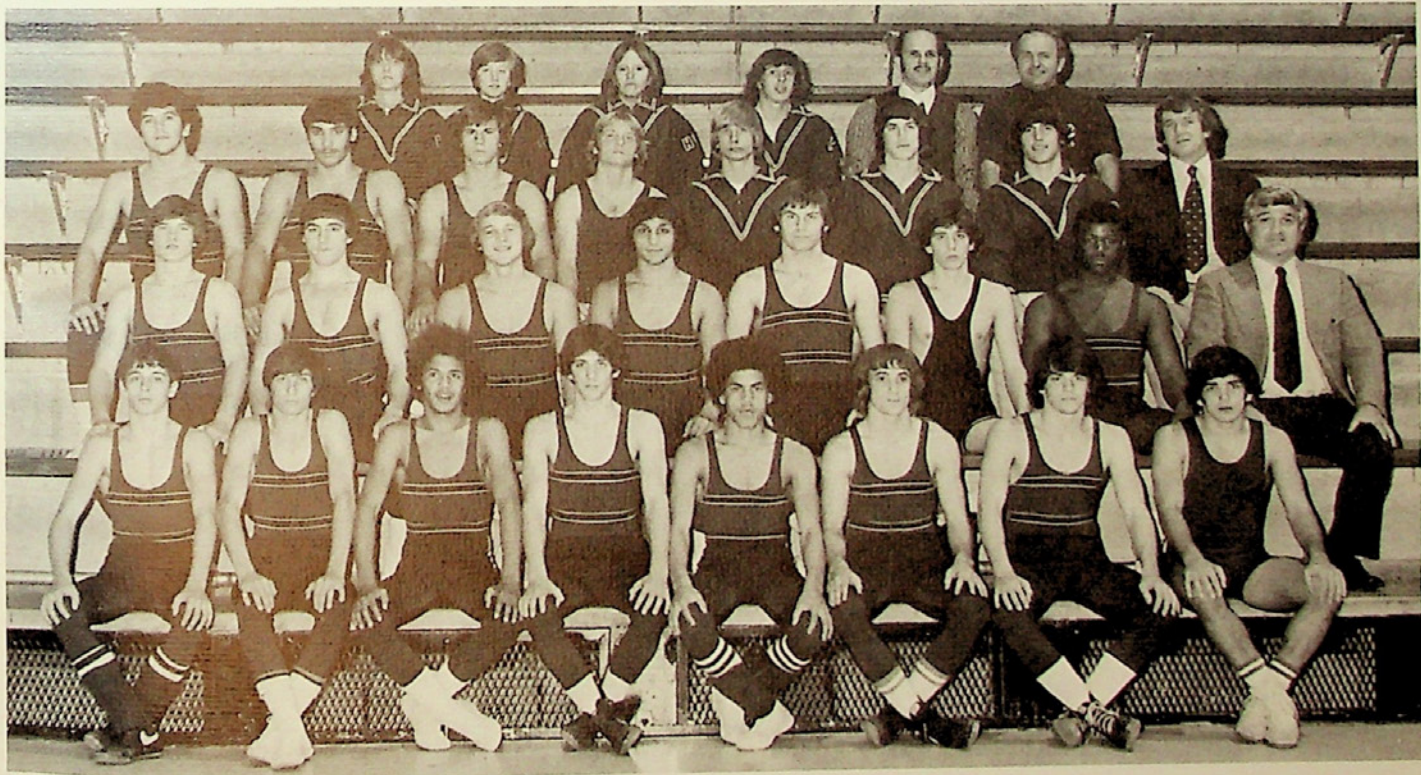


Senior Jon Bittenbender scores a quick two with this takedown in Districts.

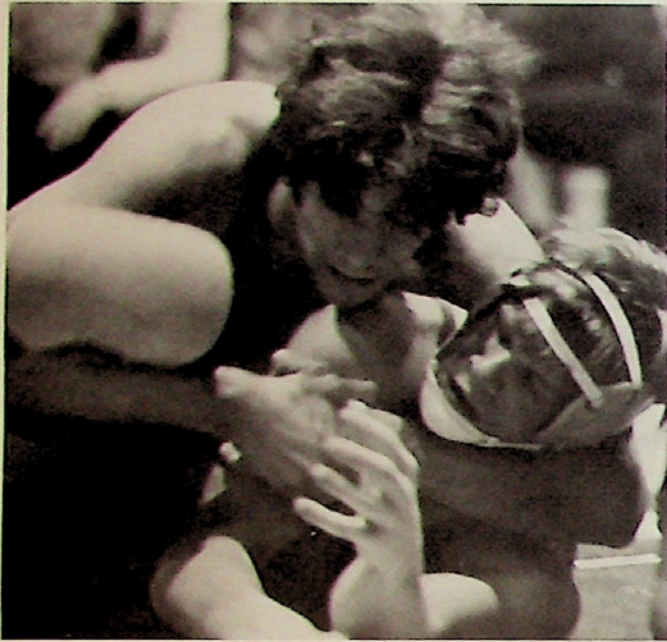


Senior Scott Schneider tangles with Dieruff's Heavyweight George Atiyea.

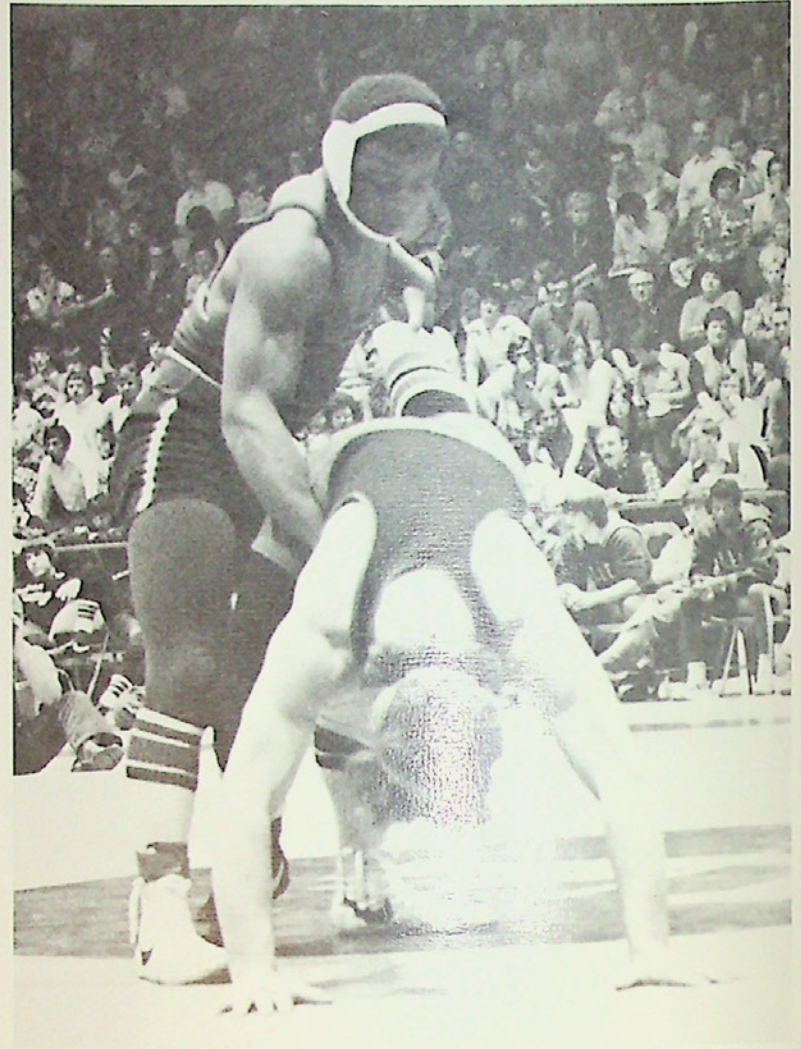

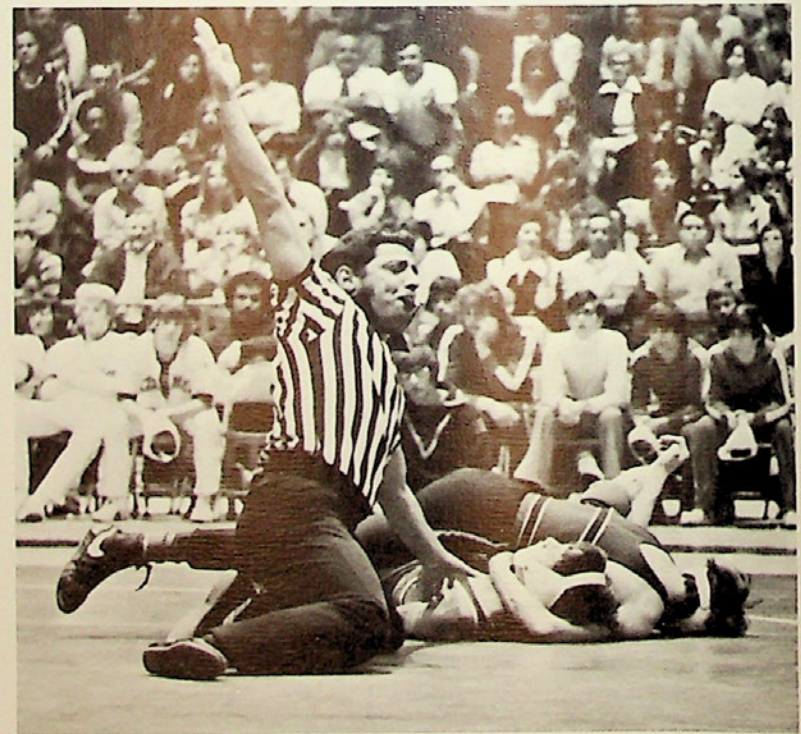

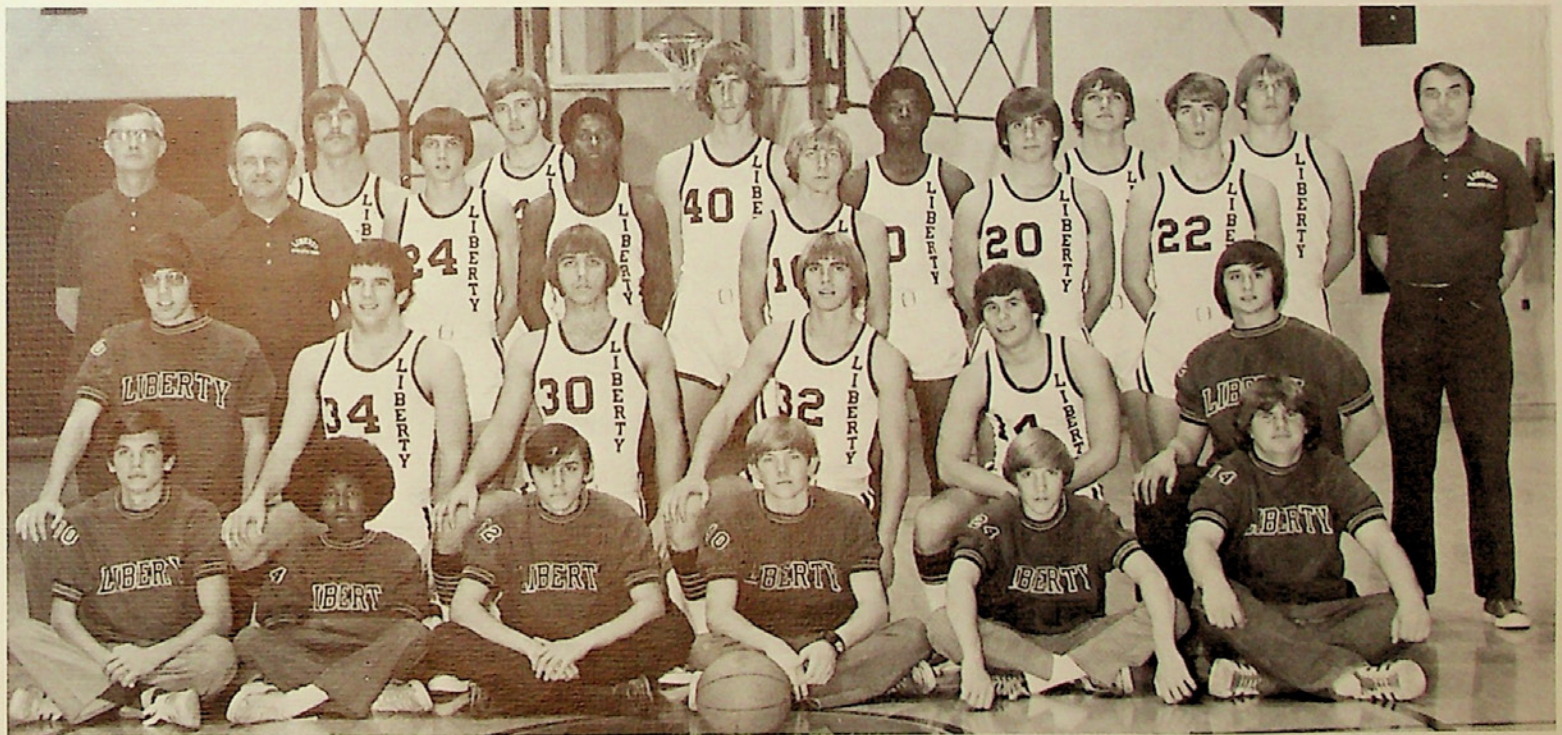

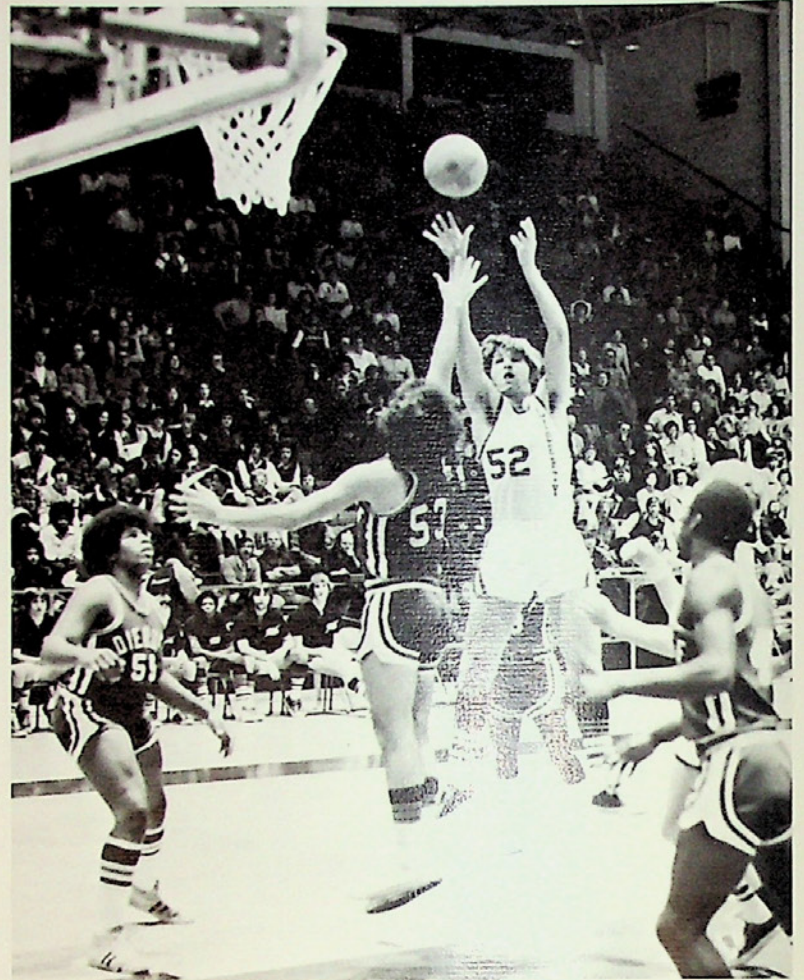

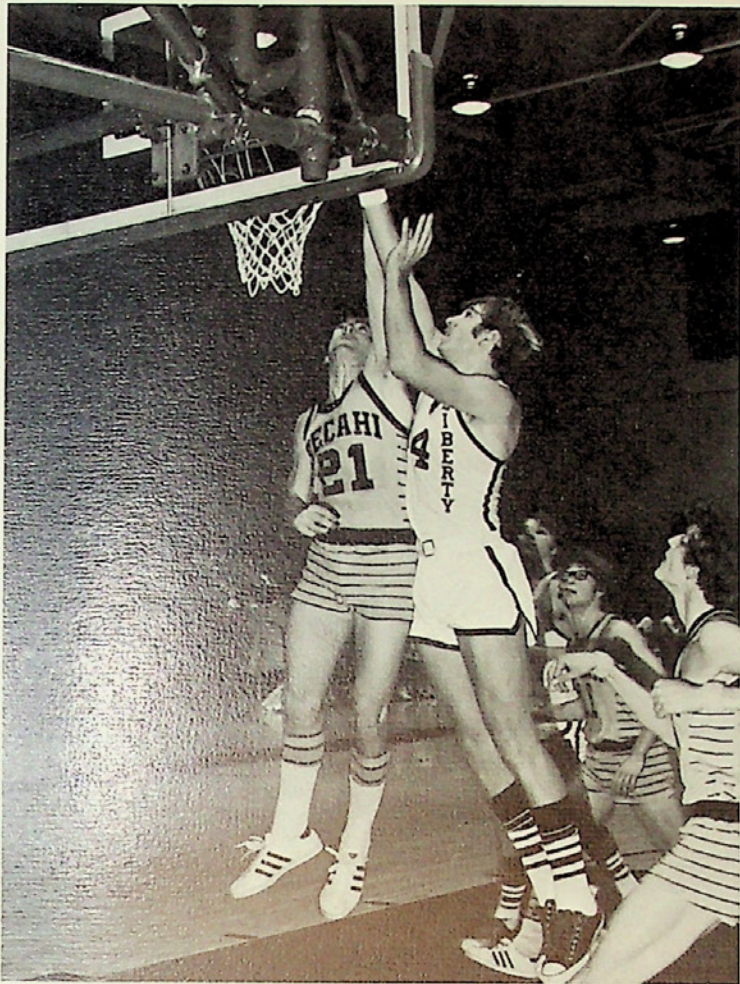

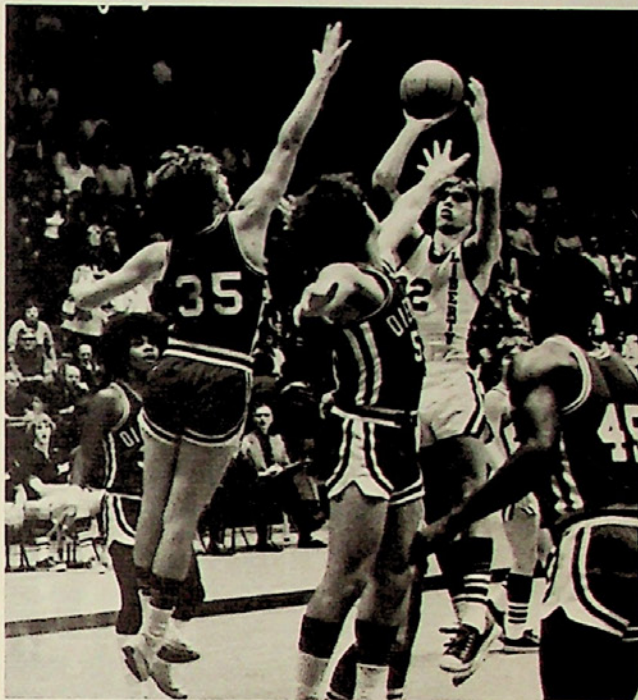

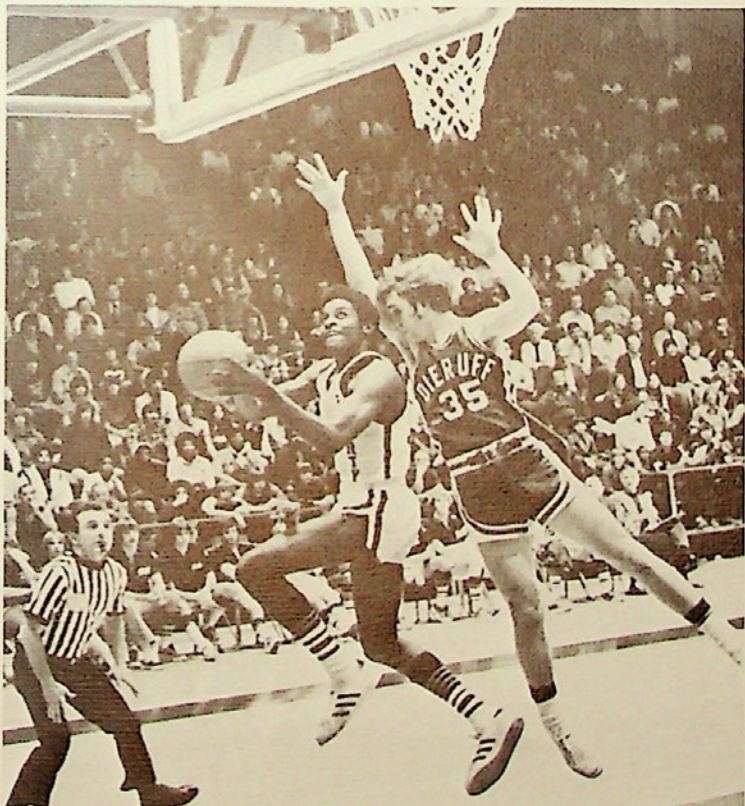

## Williams, Petko pace Hurricane swimmers

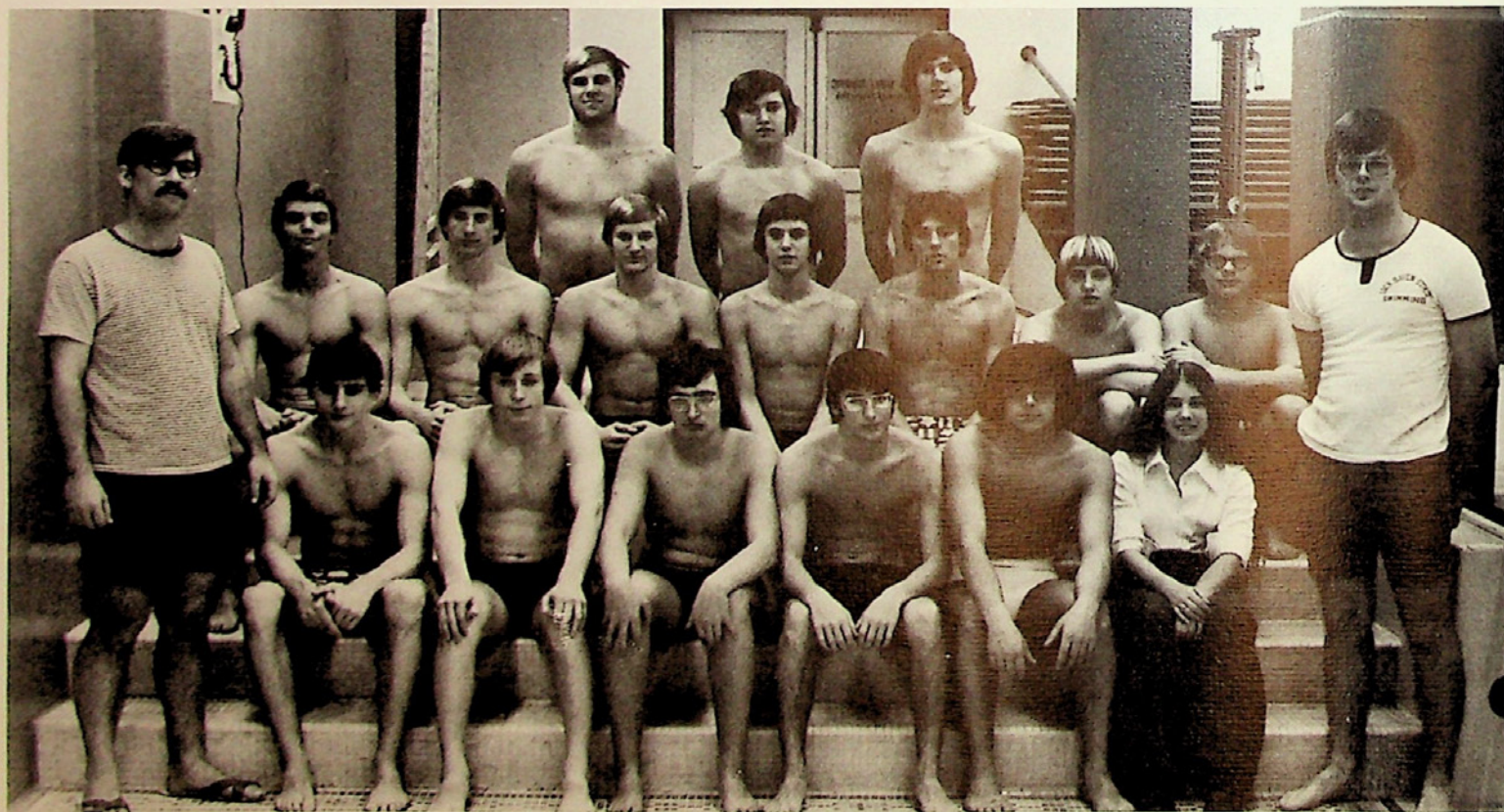

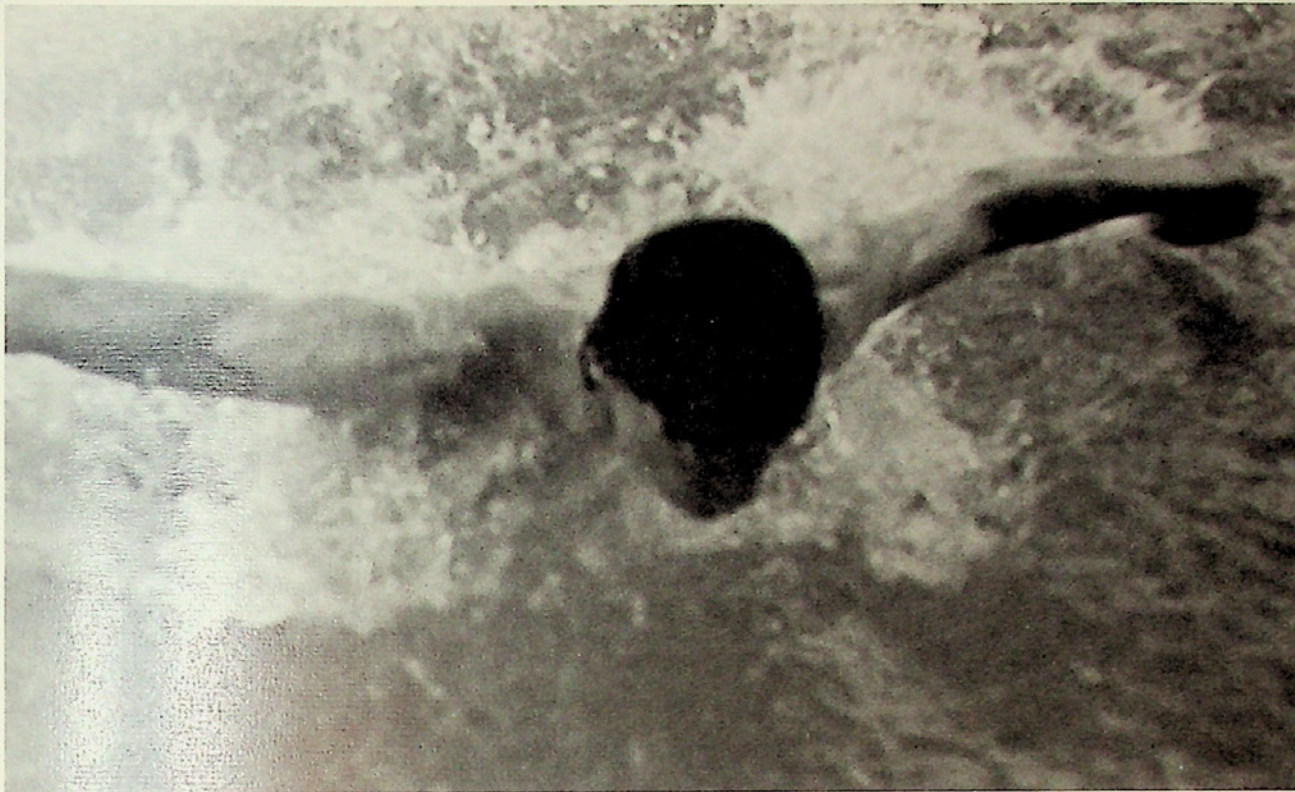

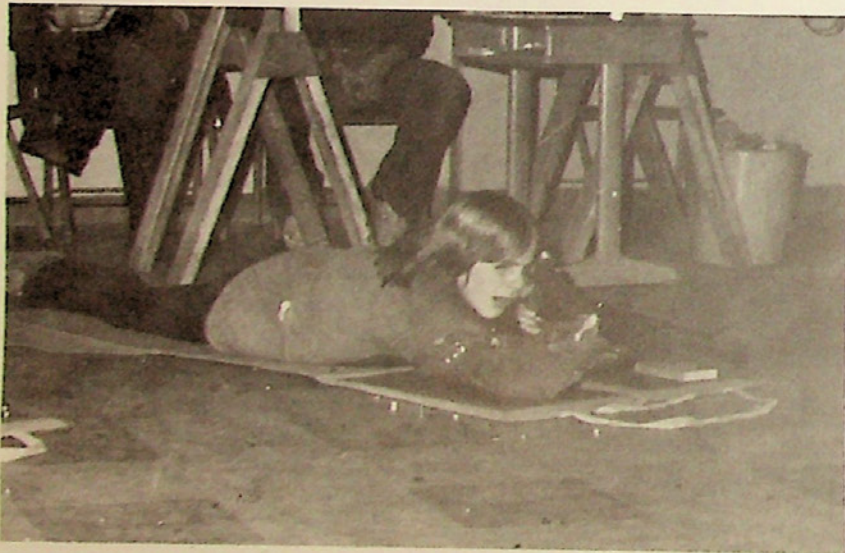

## Volleyball team finishes in third-place tie

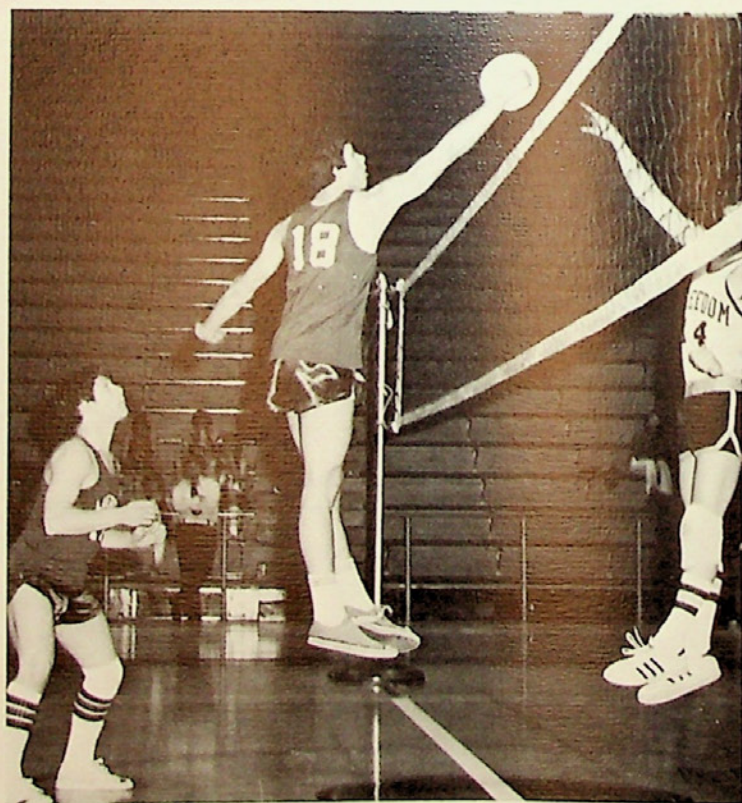

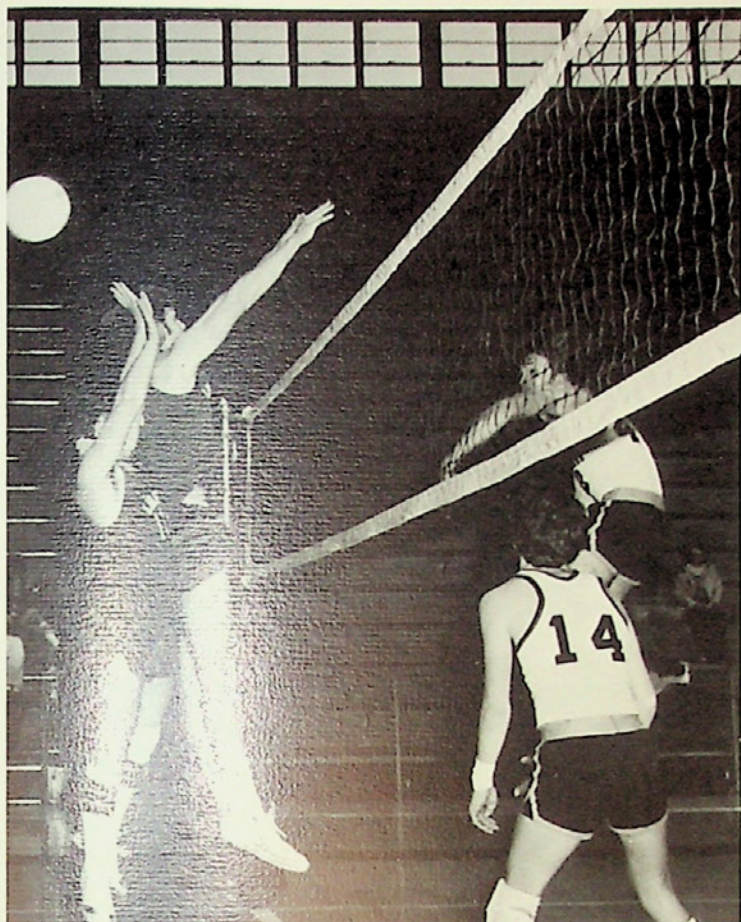

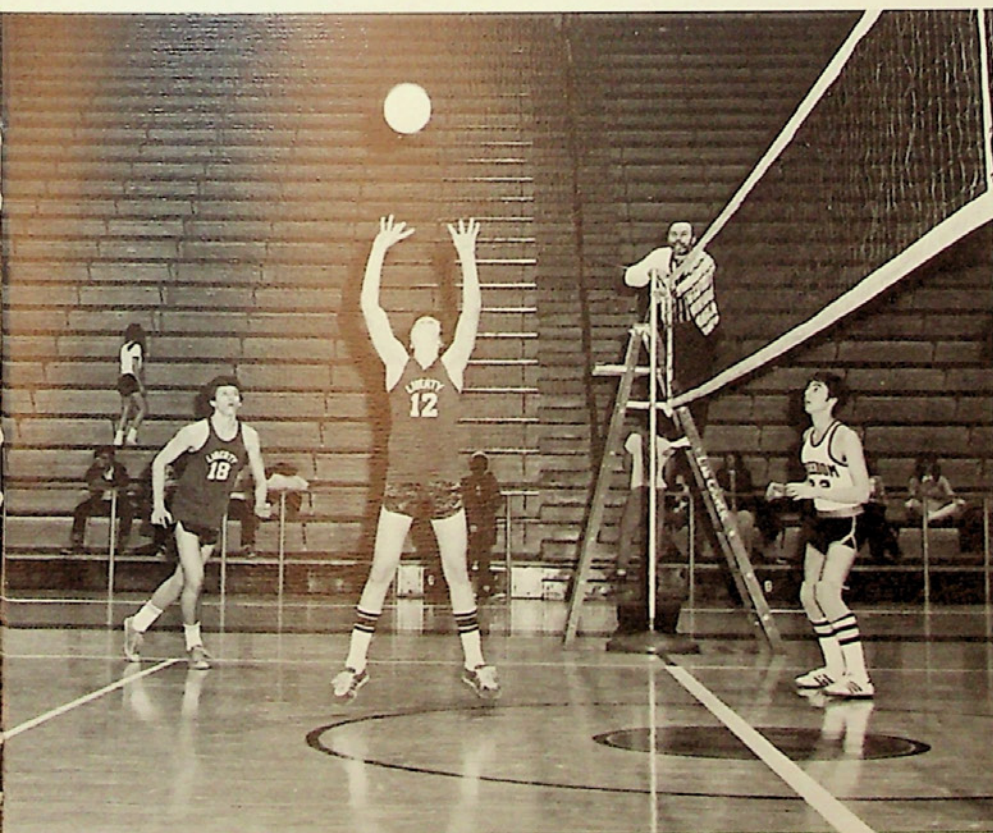

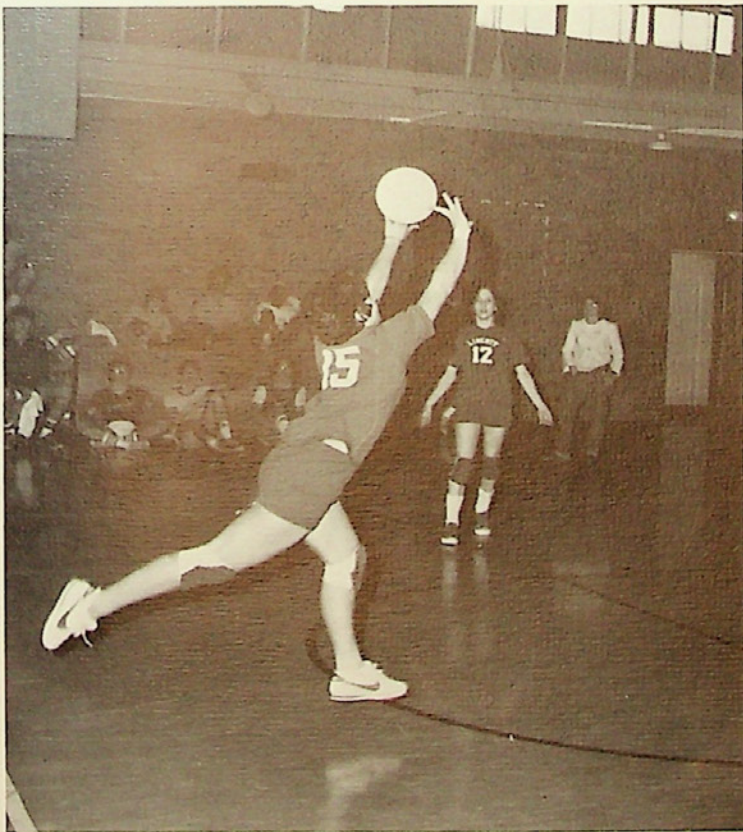


Junior Dawn Drust returns a shot as Karen Zweifel moves in.

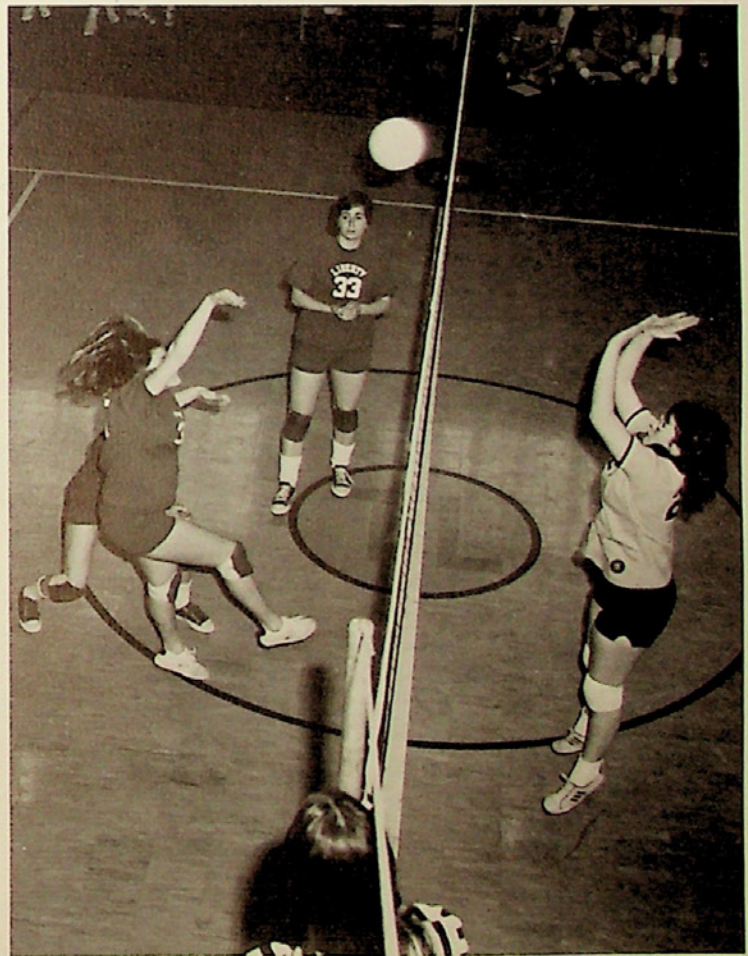


Dawn Drust and Linda Balogh go high to block a shot.

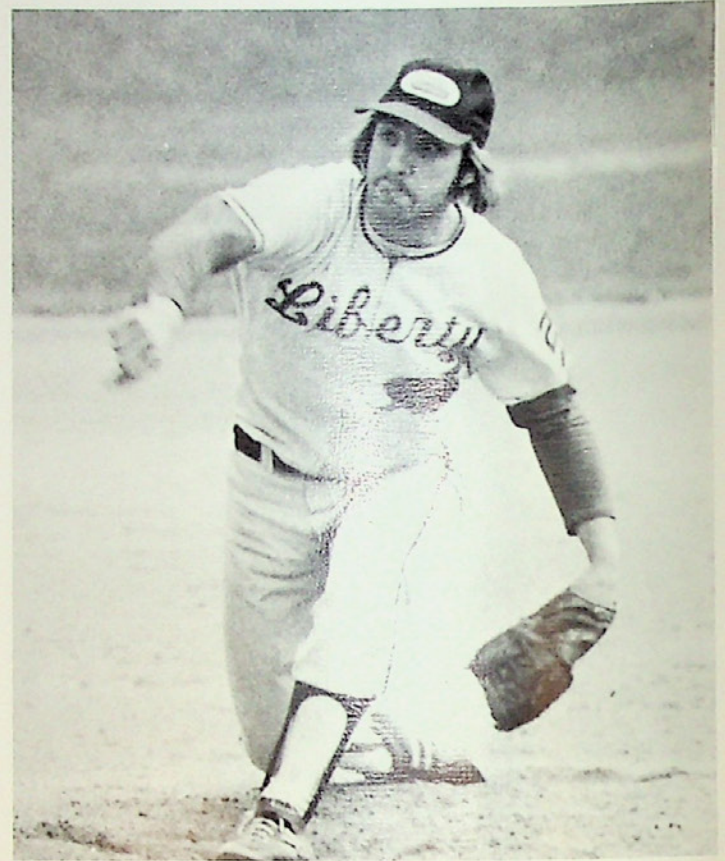

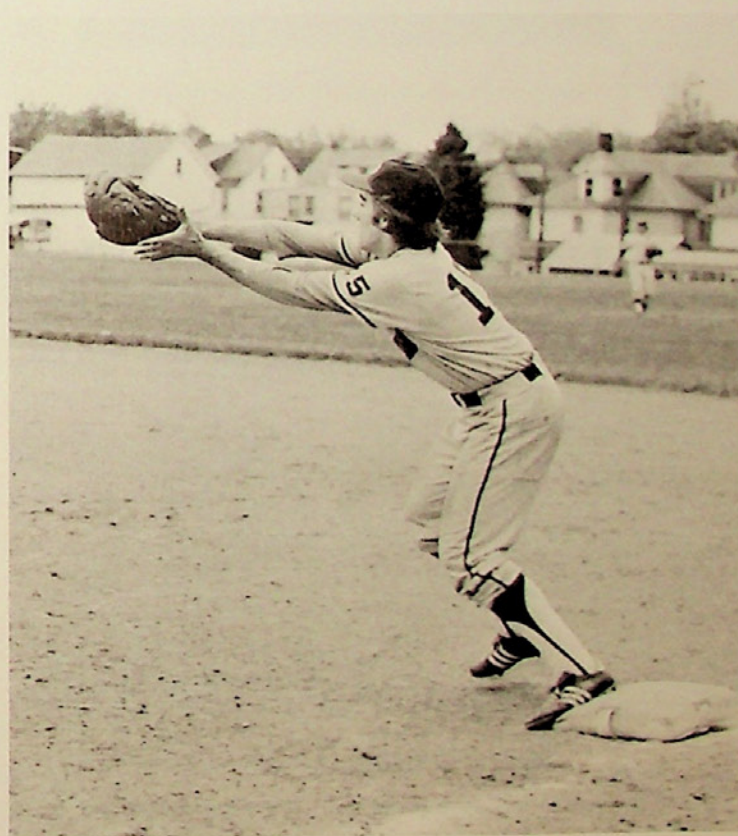

# Strong track team completes 8-3 season



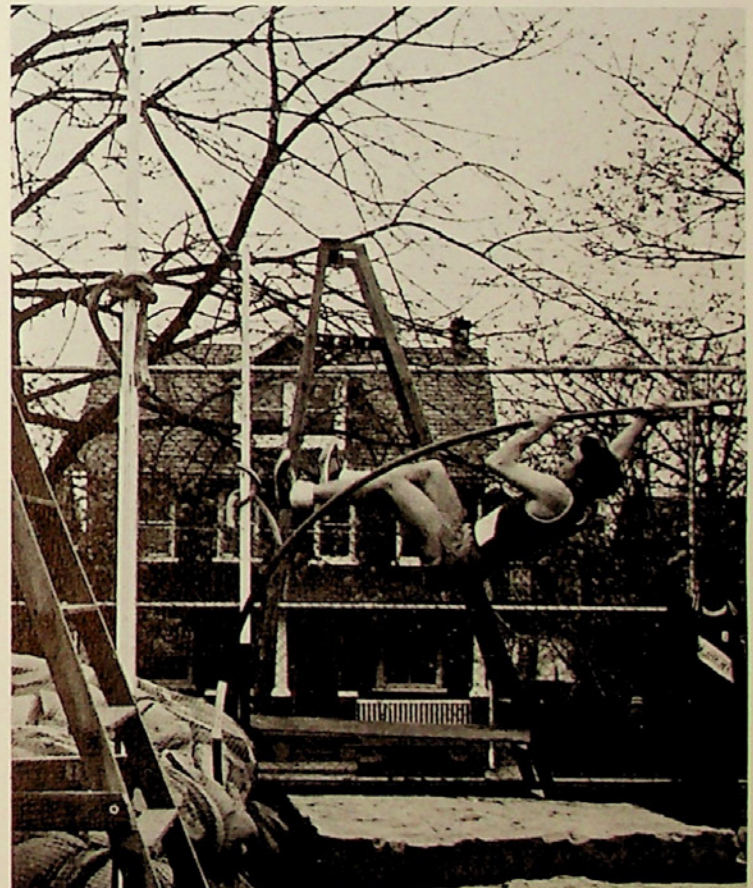

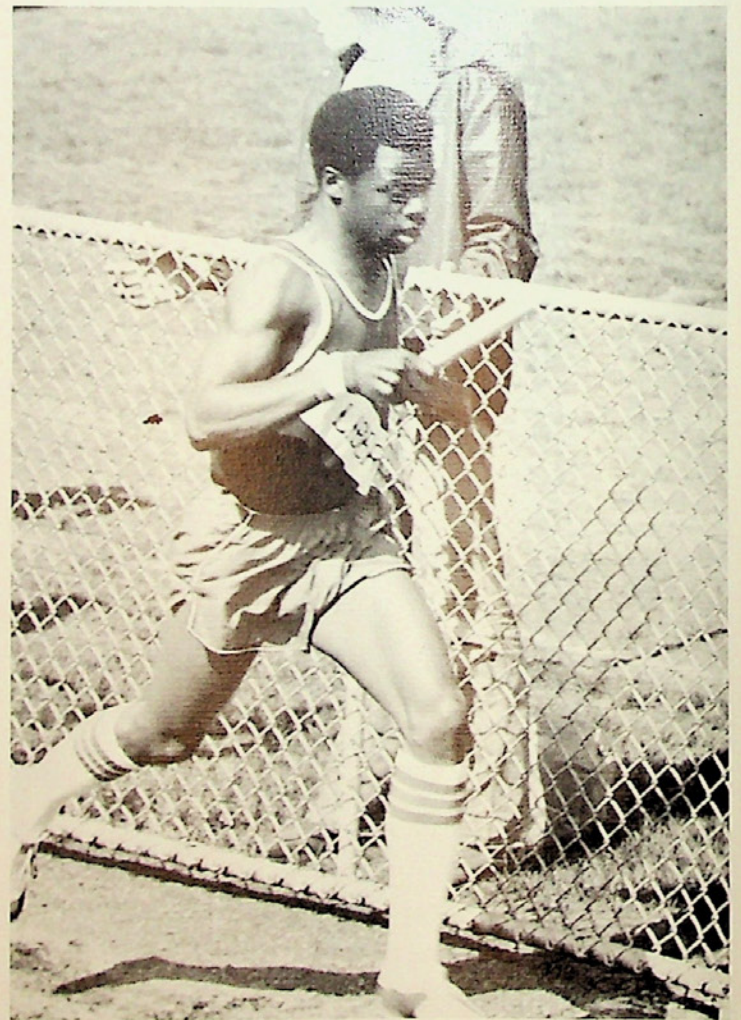

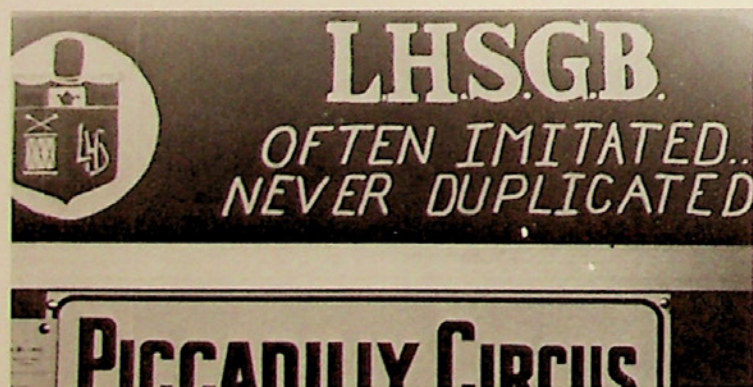




## Grenadier Band wins honors in Kentucky

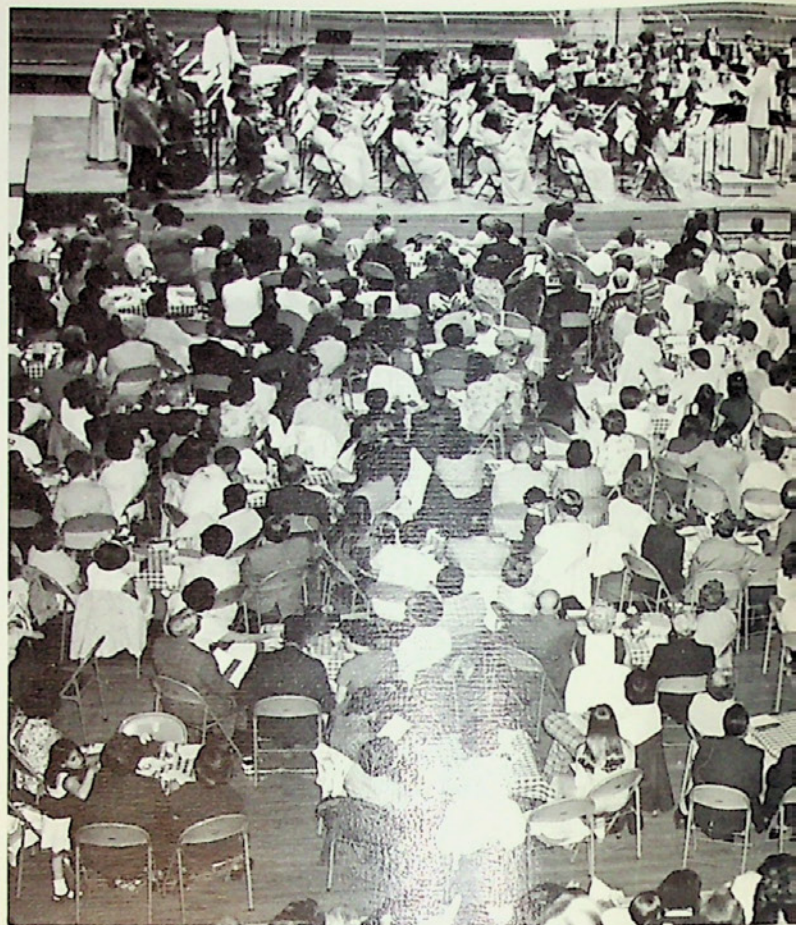

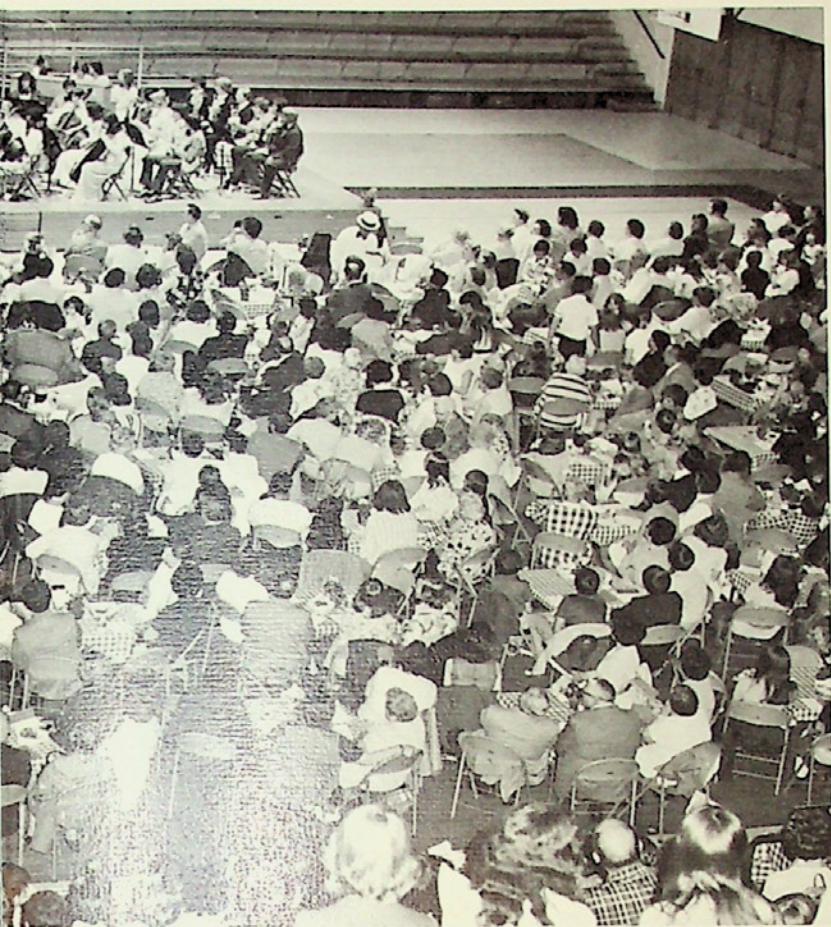

At the end of the performance, Director Donald Snider was presented with a plaque as a token of appreciation from the Glee Club for his dedicated and spirited leadership throughout the year.



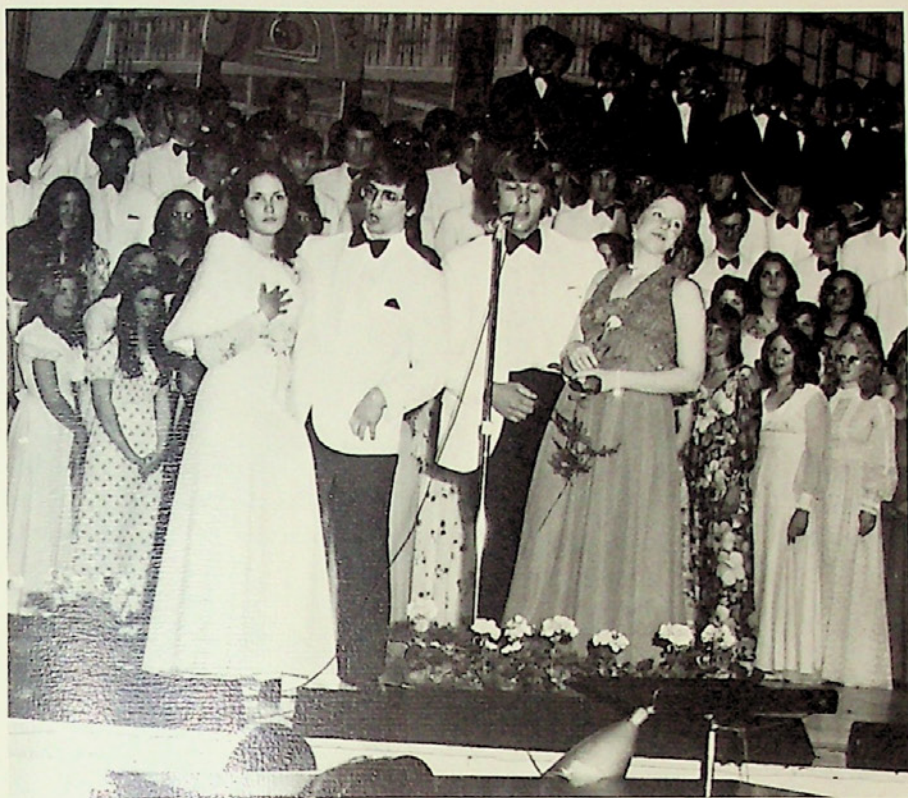

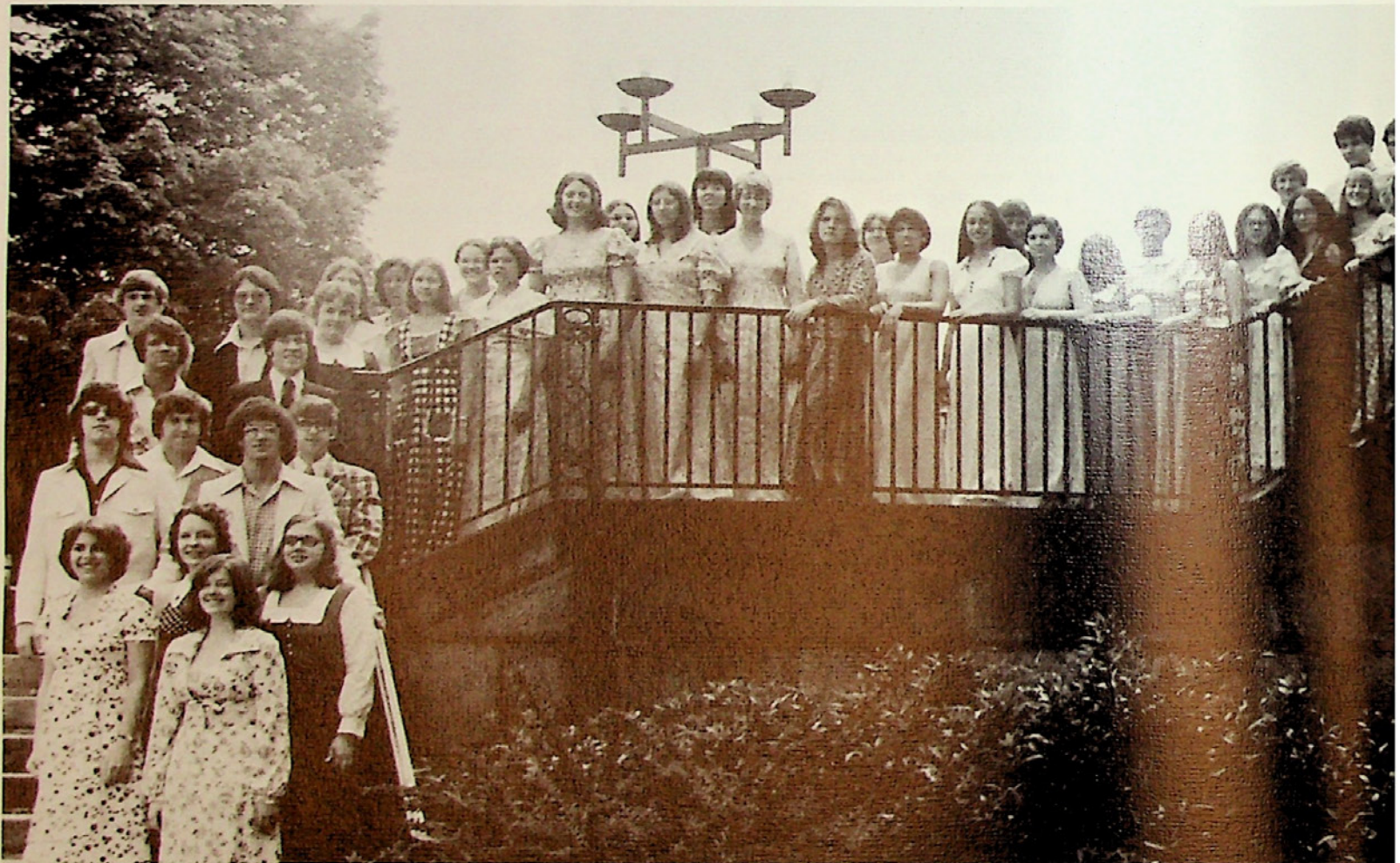

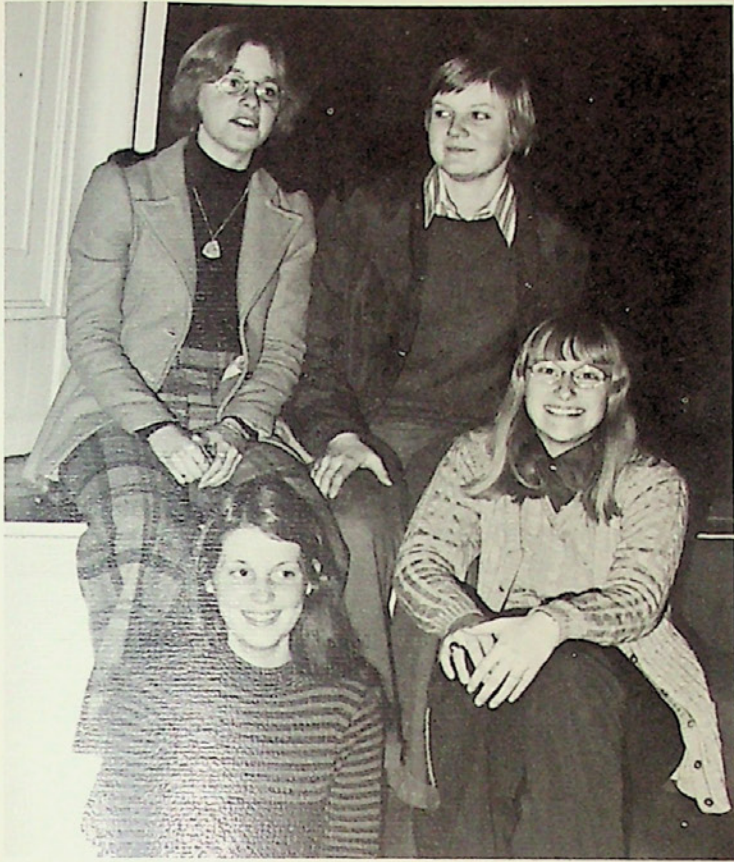
## Choraliers provide entertainment for community

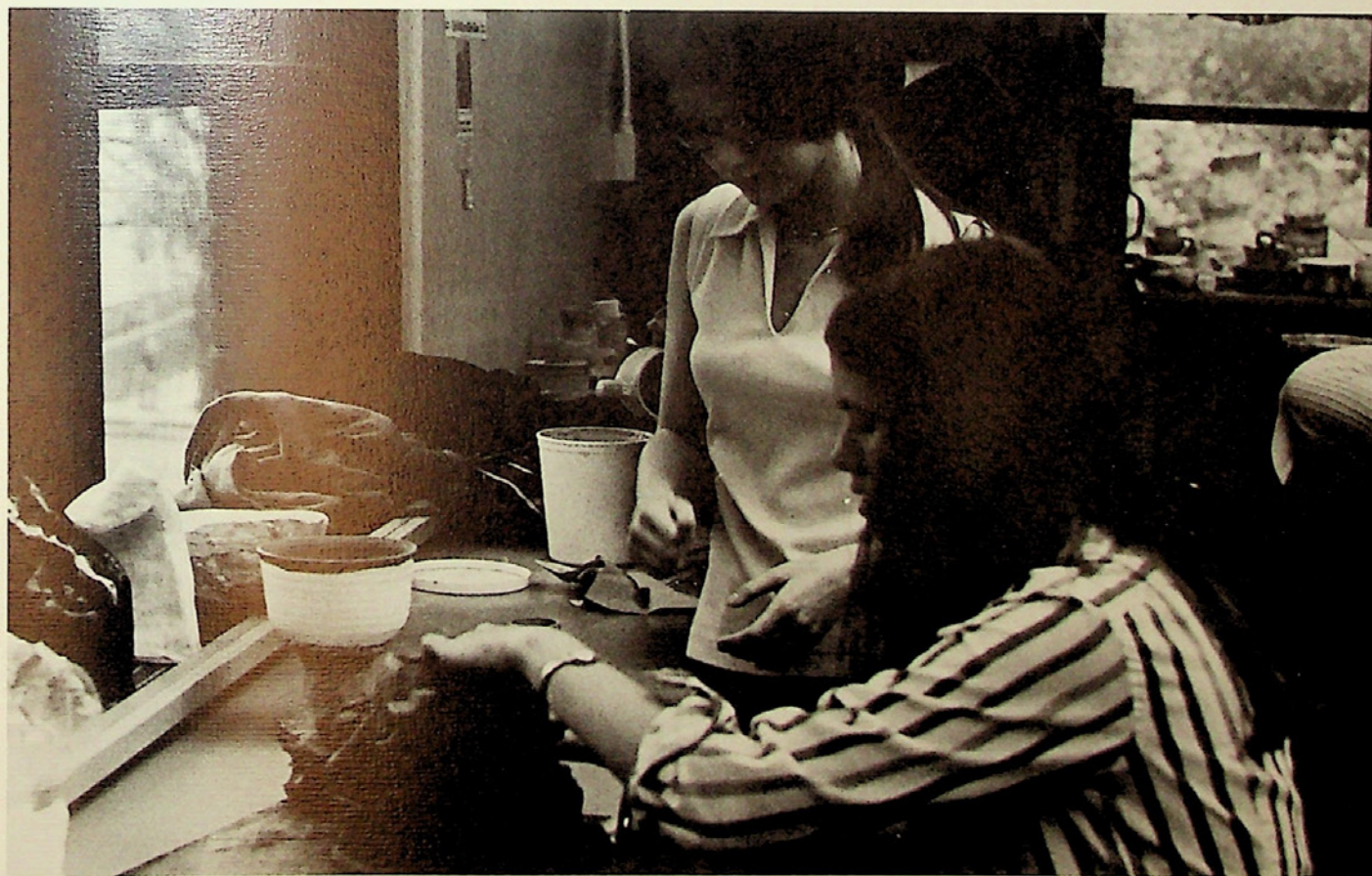

## Canoe trip highlights year for Outing Club

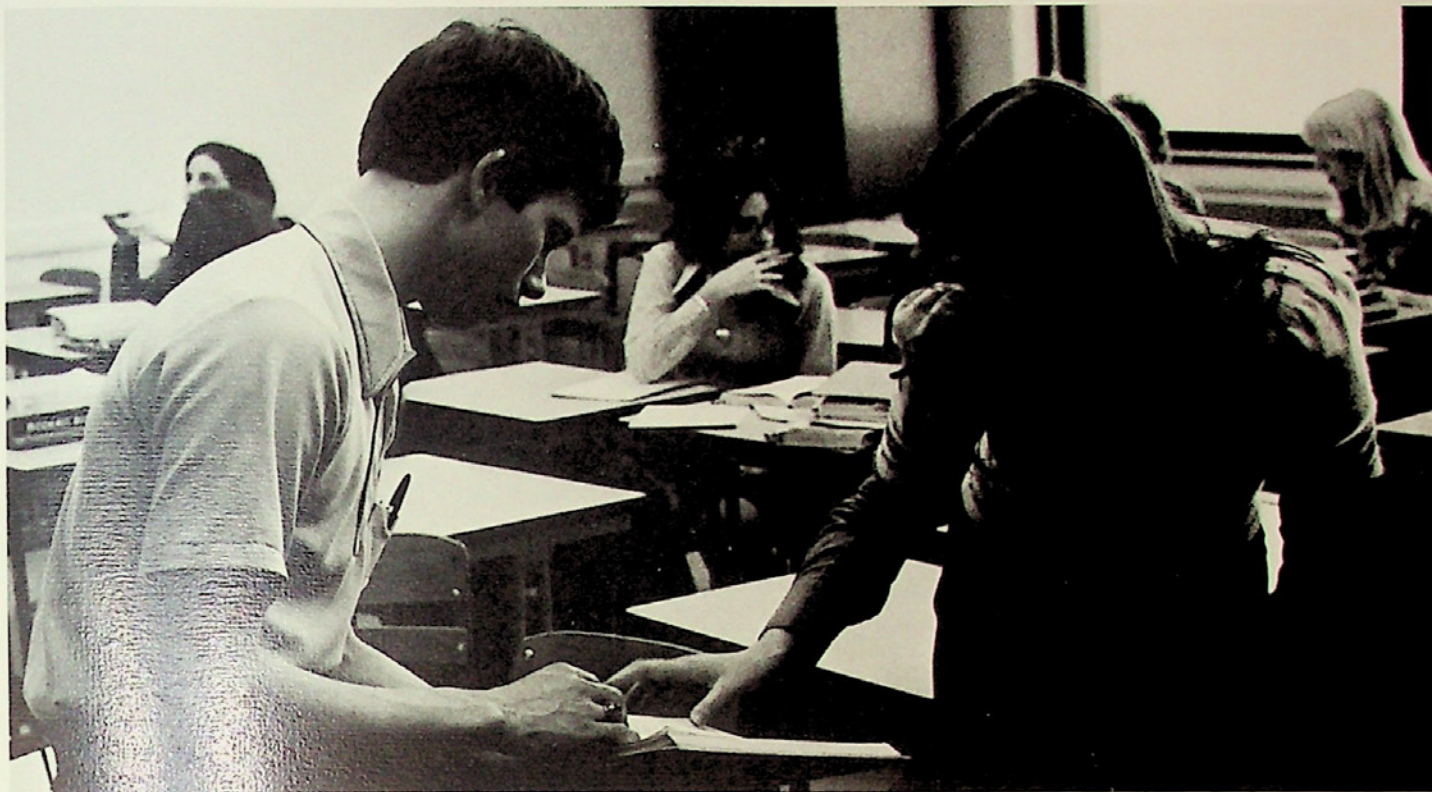

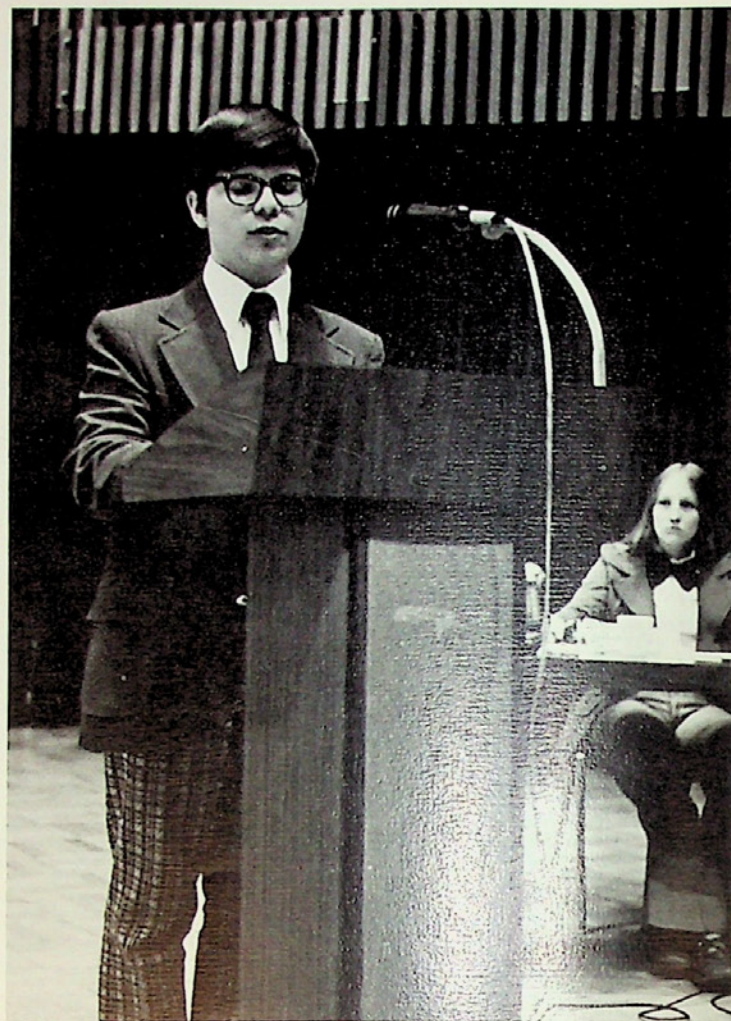

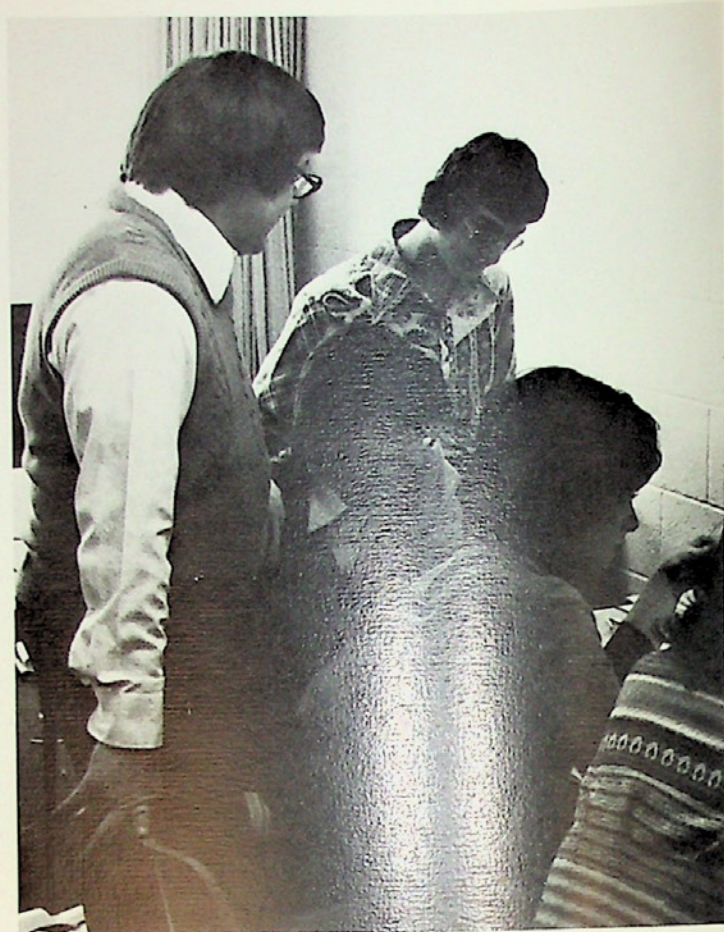
## *Liberty Life* keeps students informed throughout the year

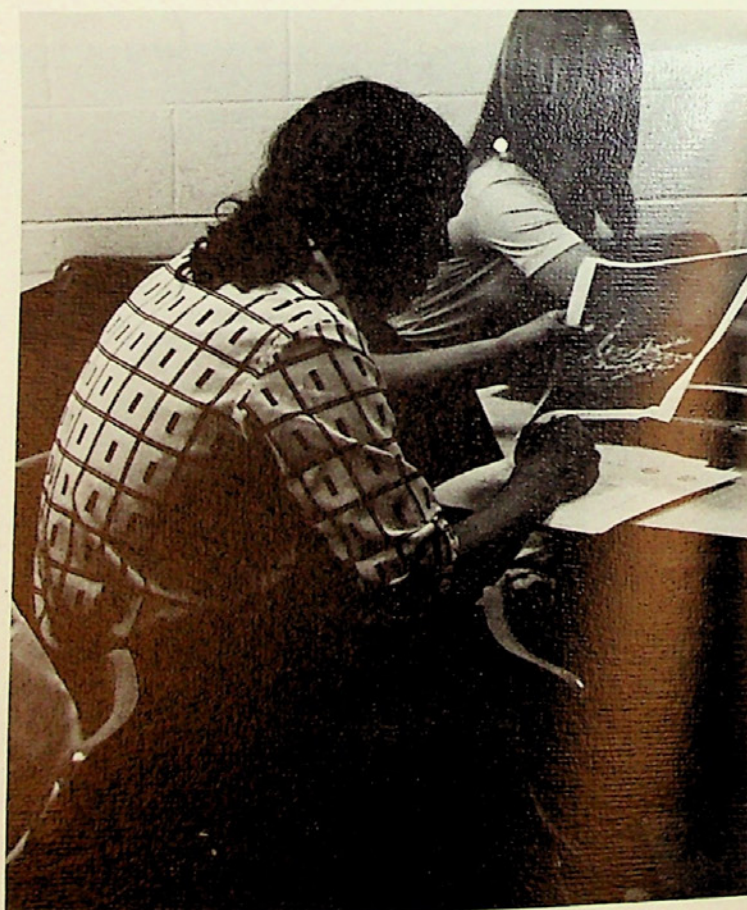

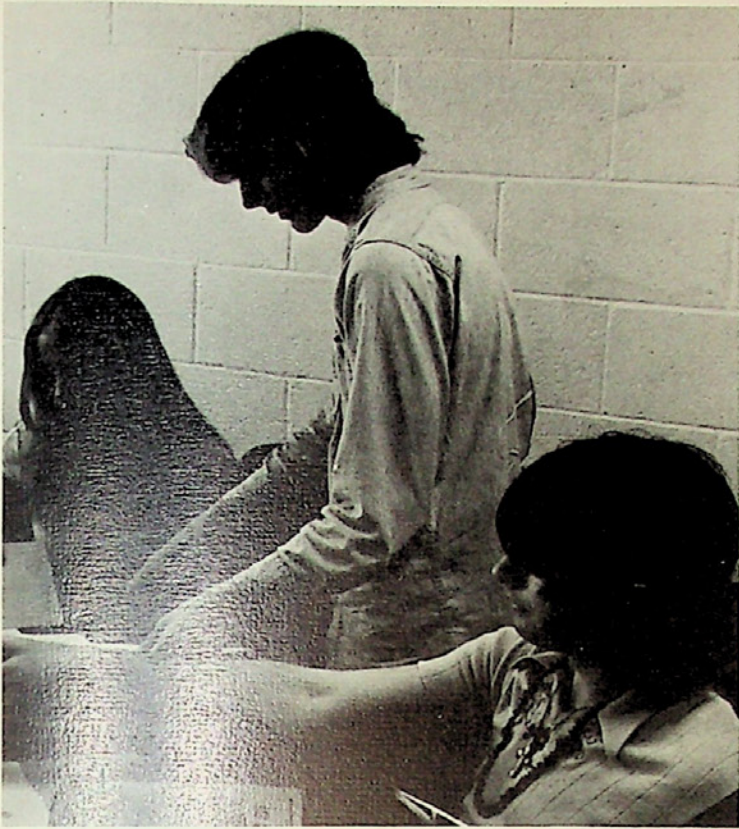
## Student writing, art, photography featured in *Young Writer*

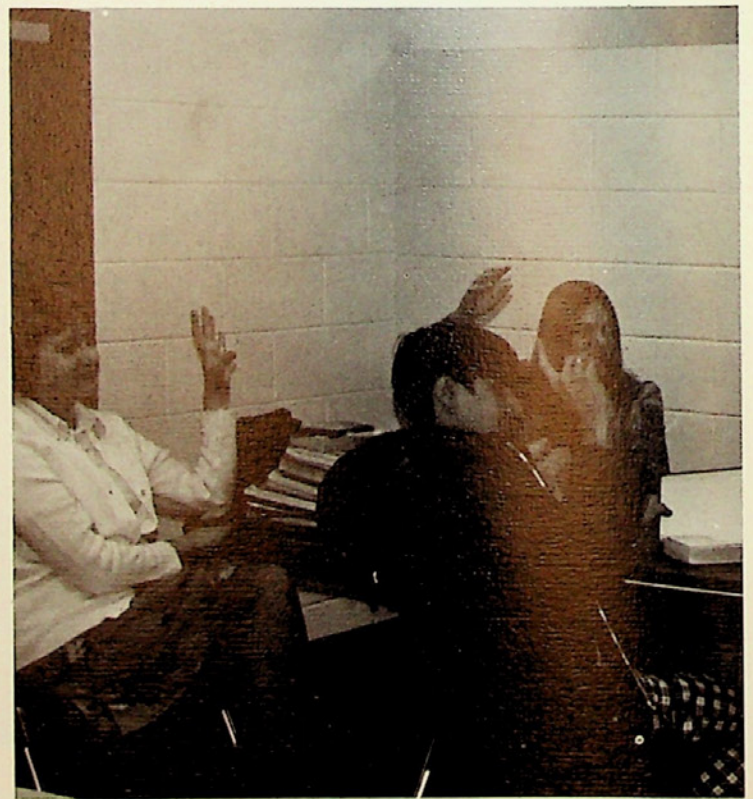

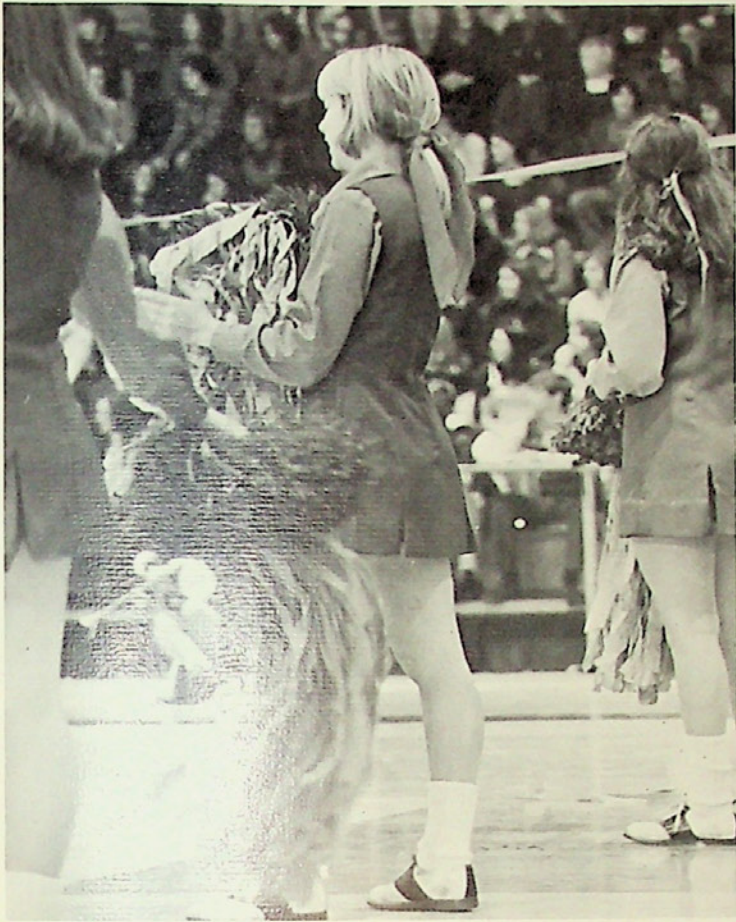

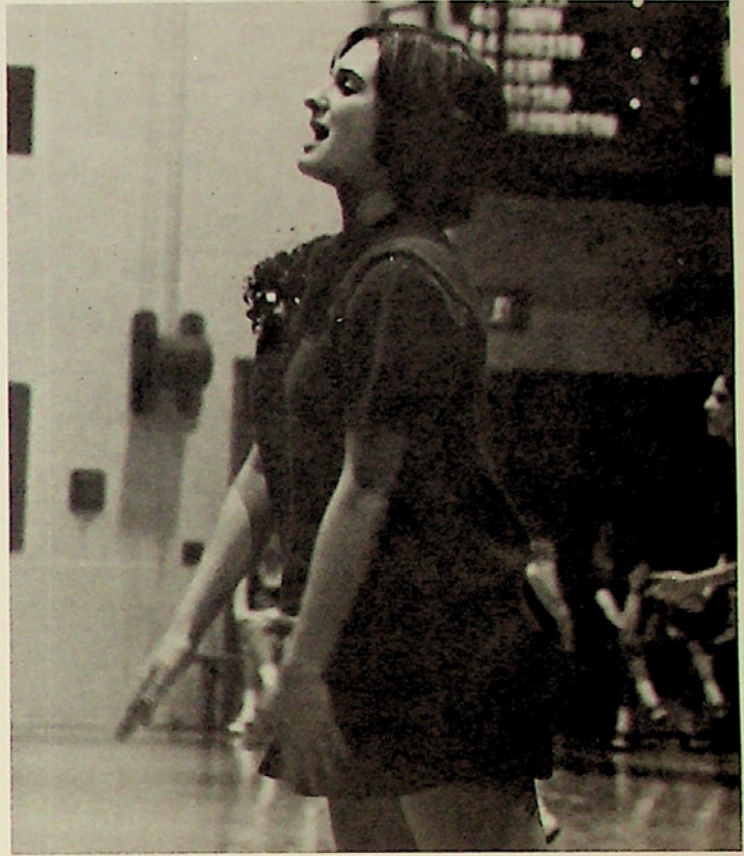

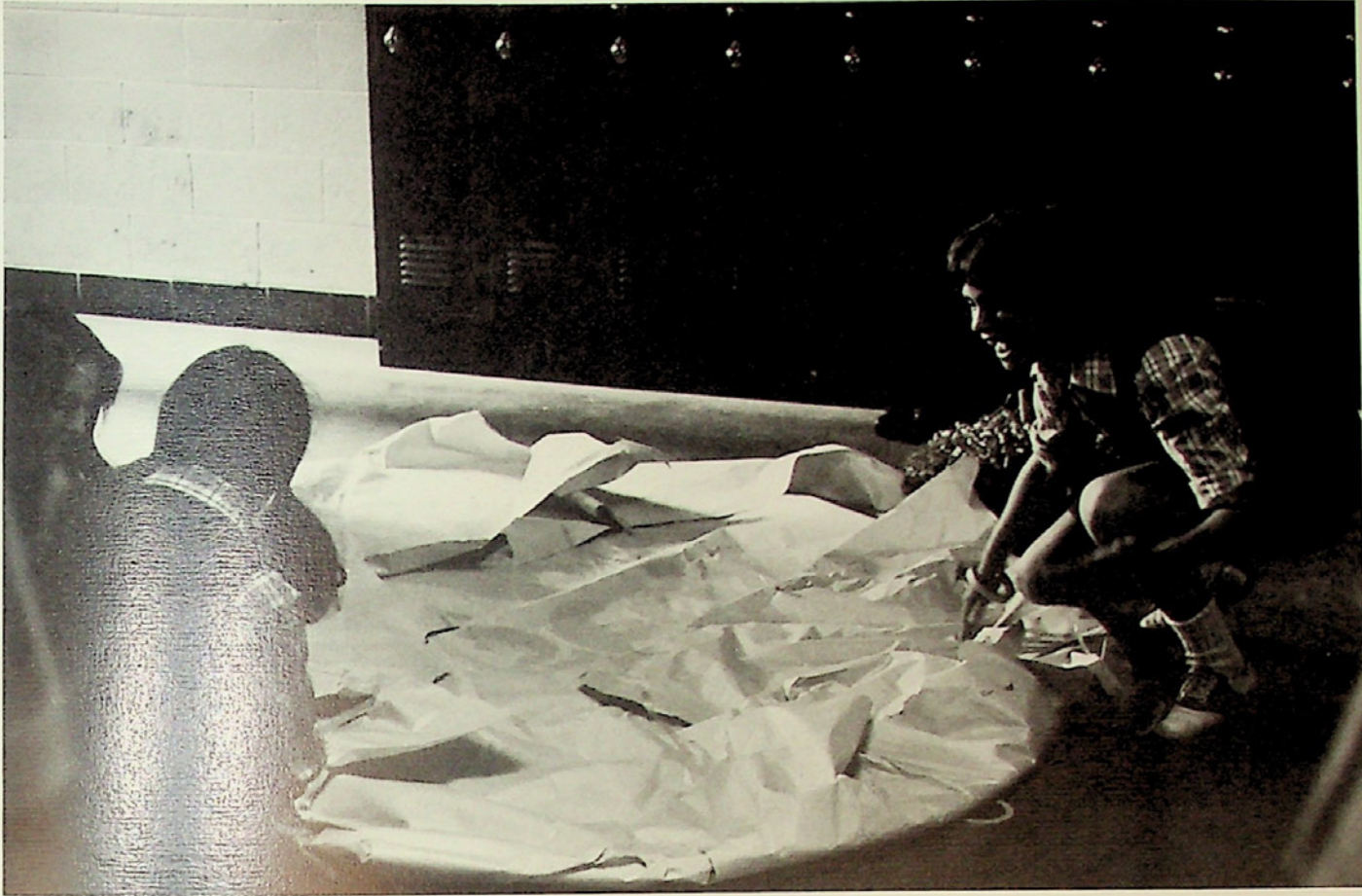

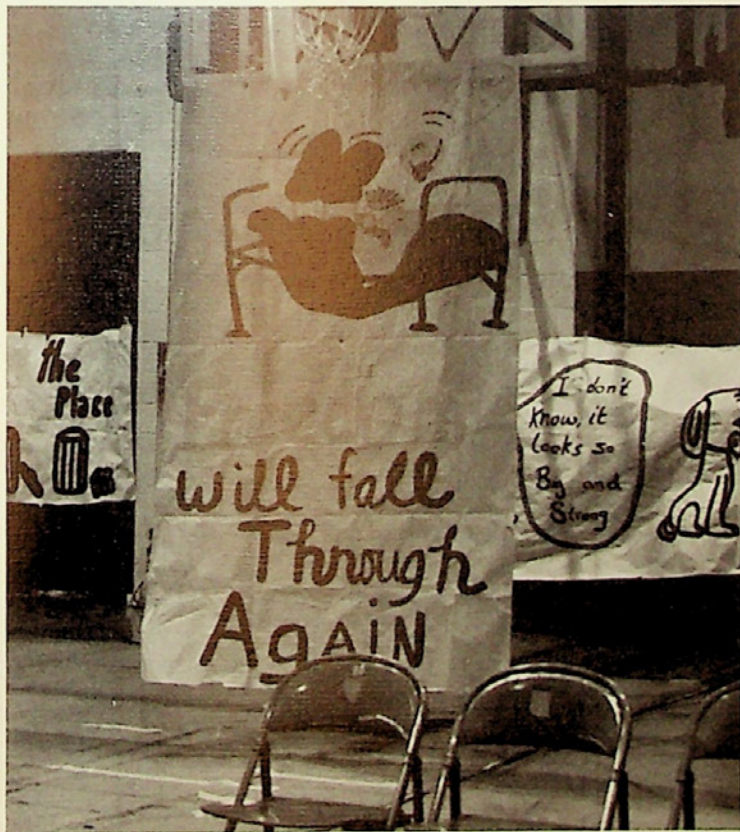

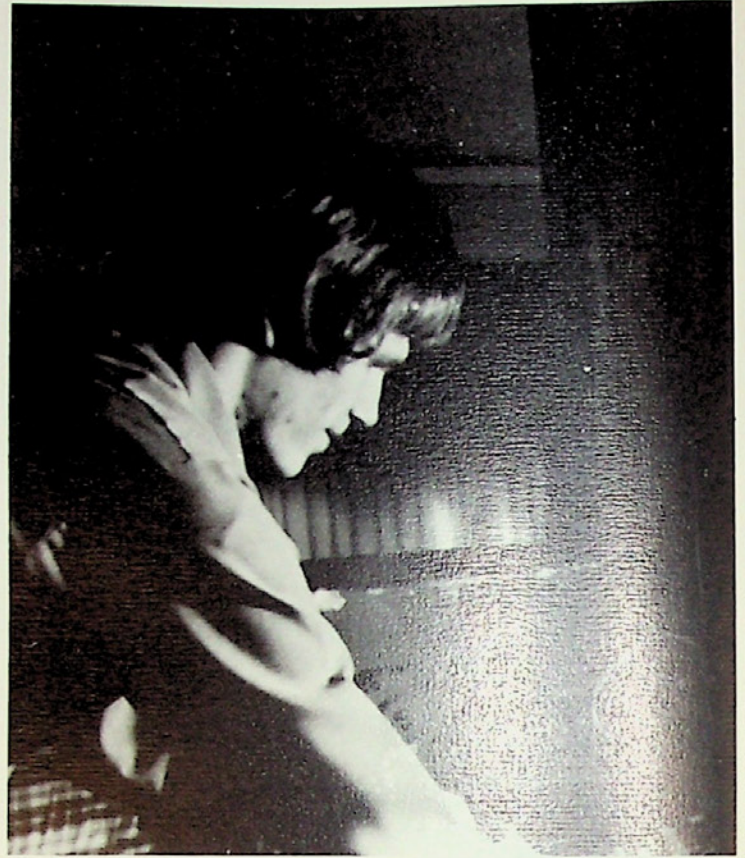

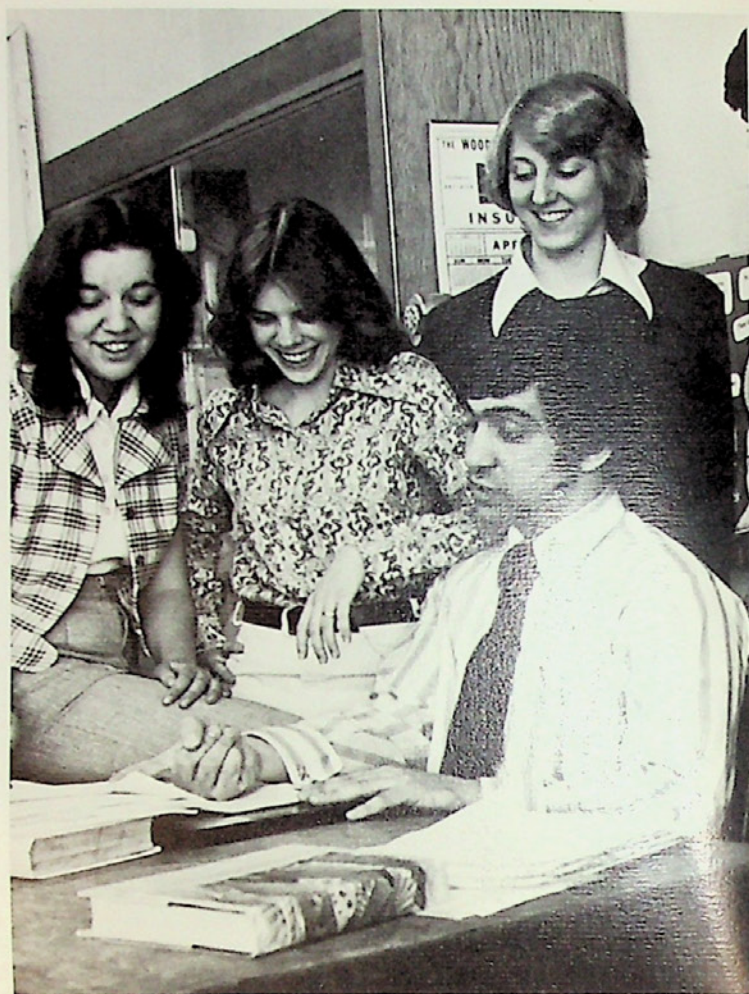

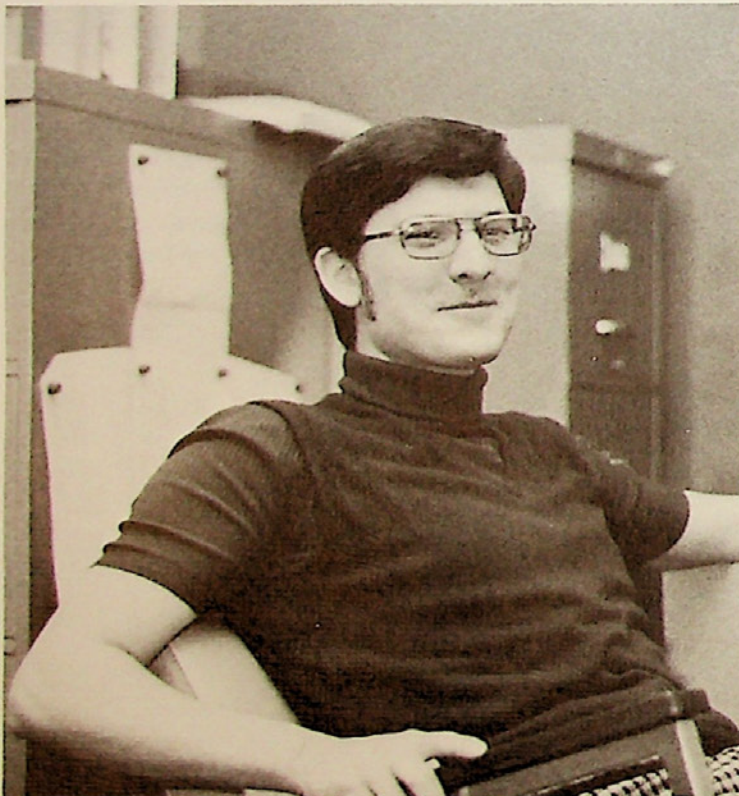
## Guidance Department solves difficulties of Liberty students

## Computer construction highlights latest offerings in Science

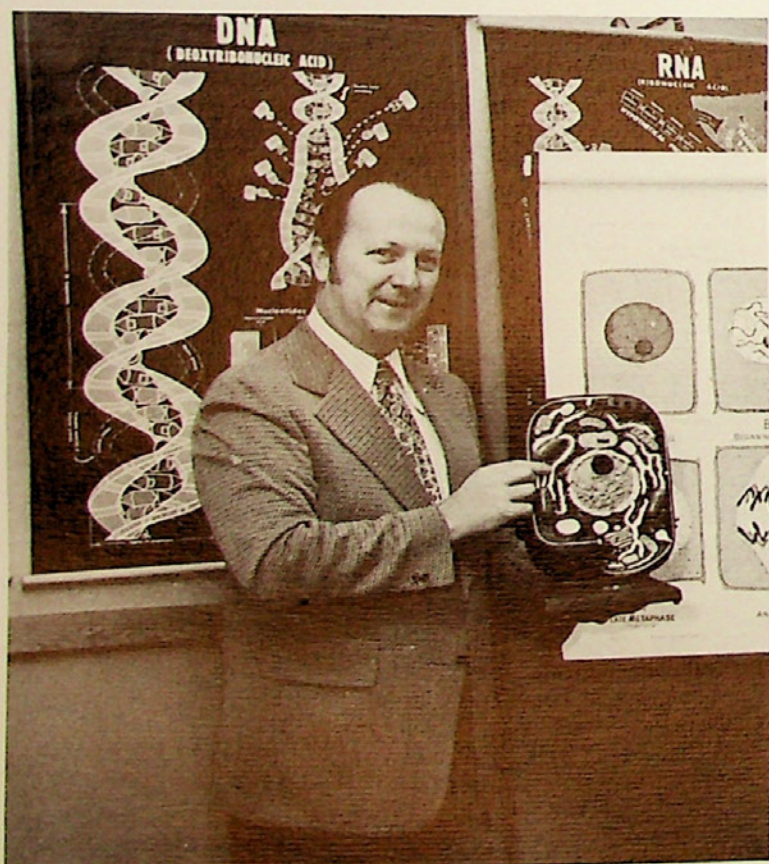

Regular literature topics were supplemented throughout the year by the use of video tape replays and other audio-visual aids to give the students a better understanding of the topic they were covering.

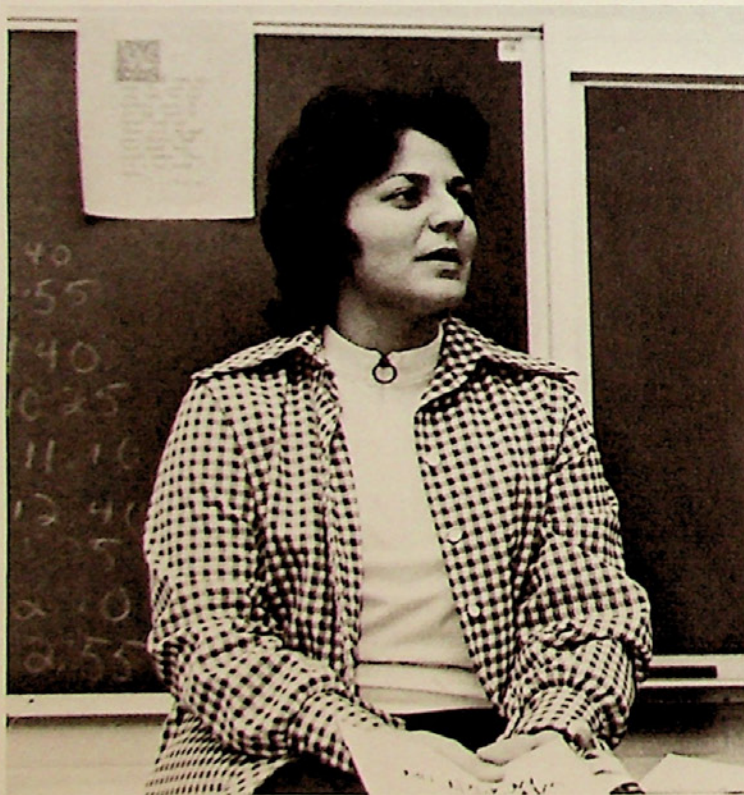

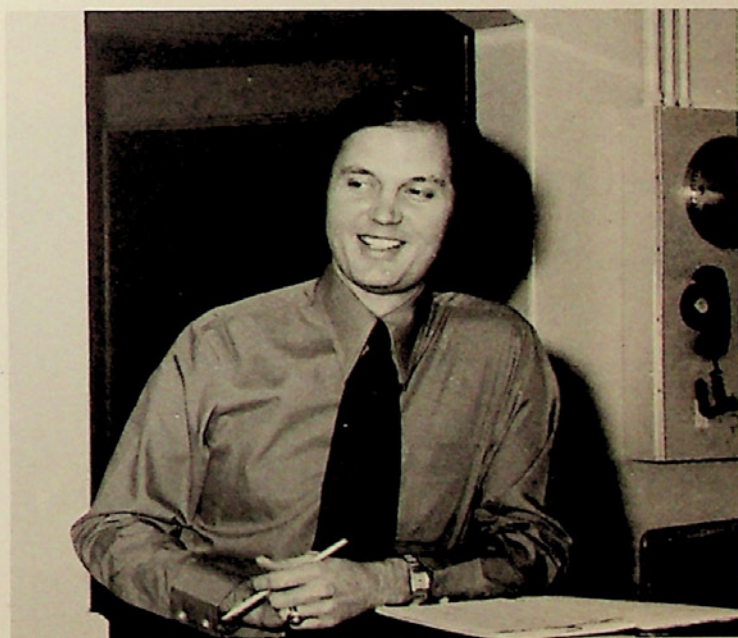

## Practical side of life stressed in courses

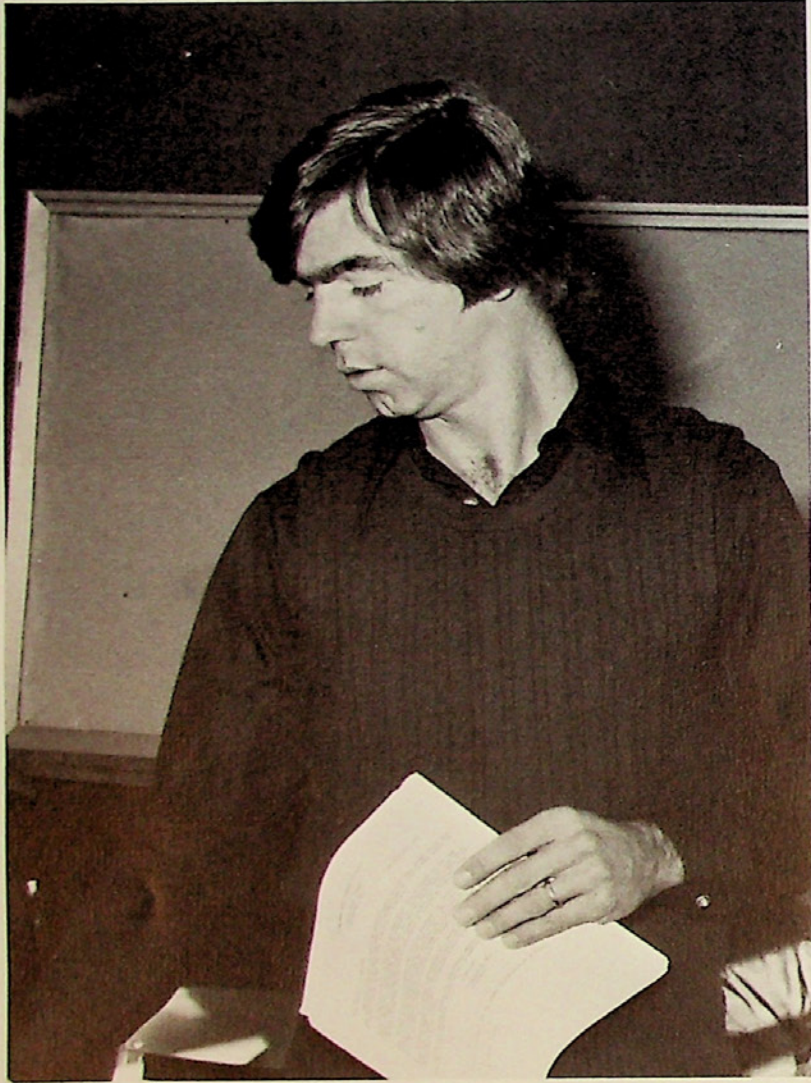

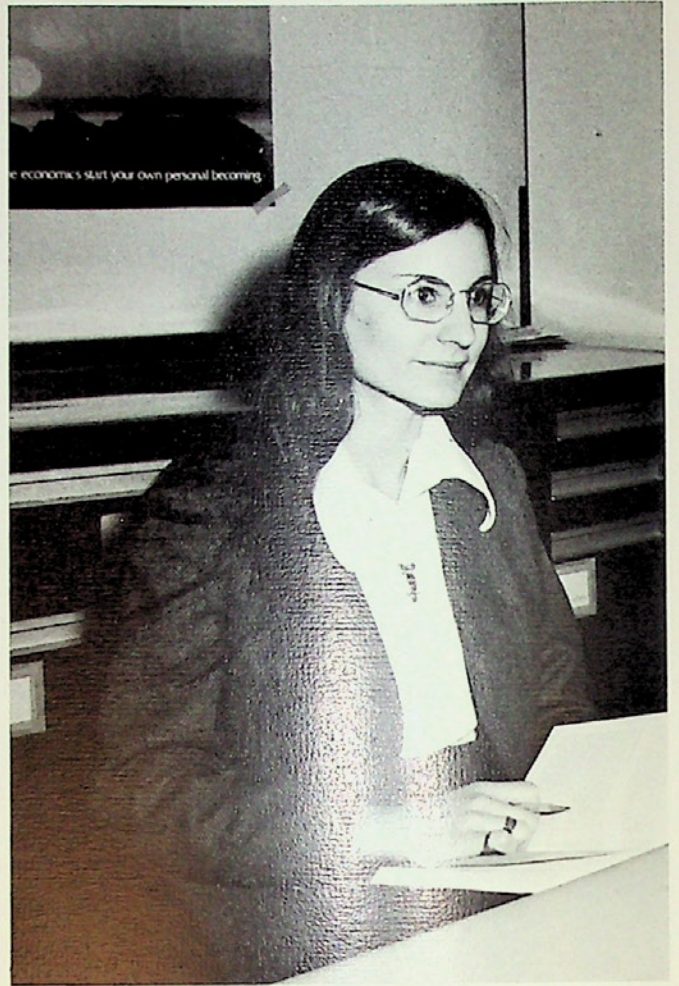

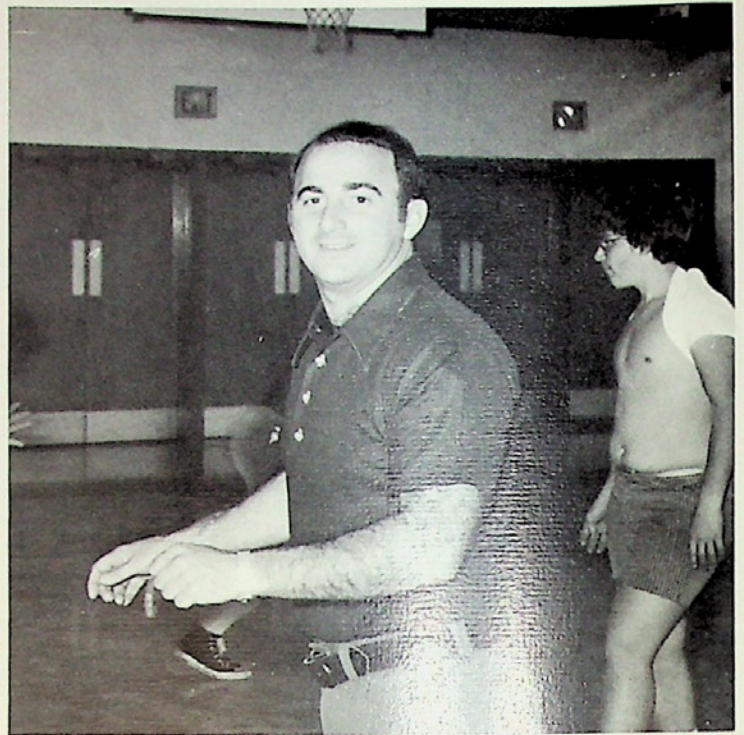
## Physical Education modifies courses, adds instructors

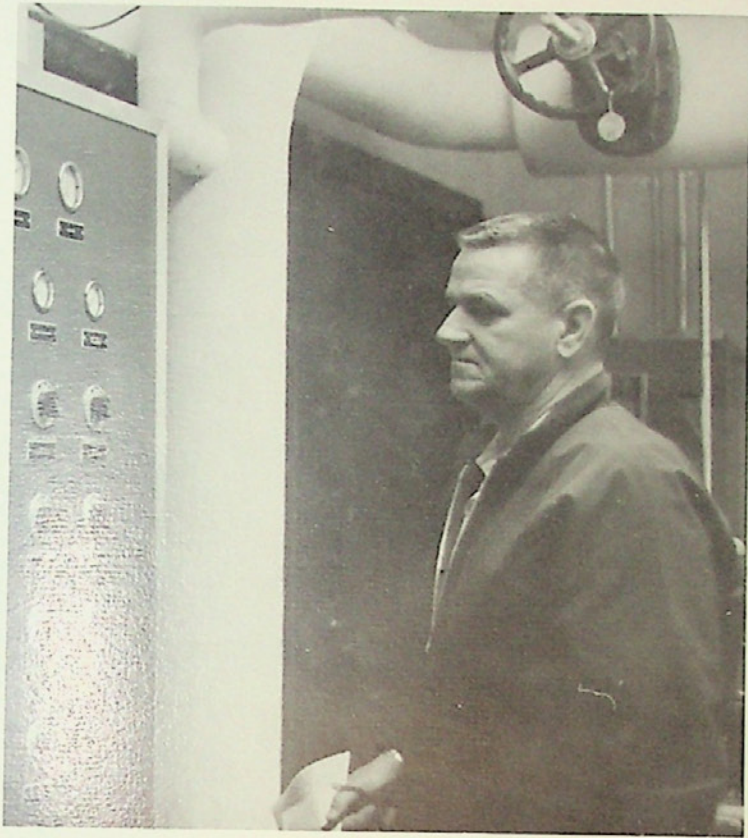

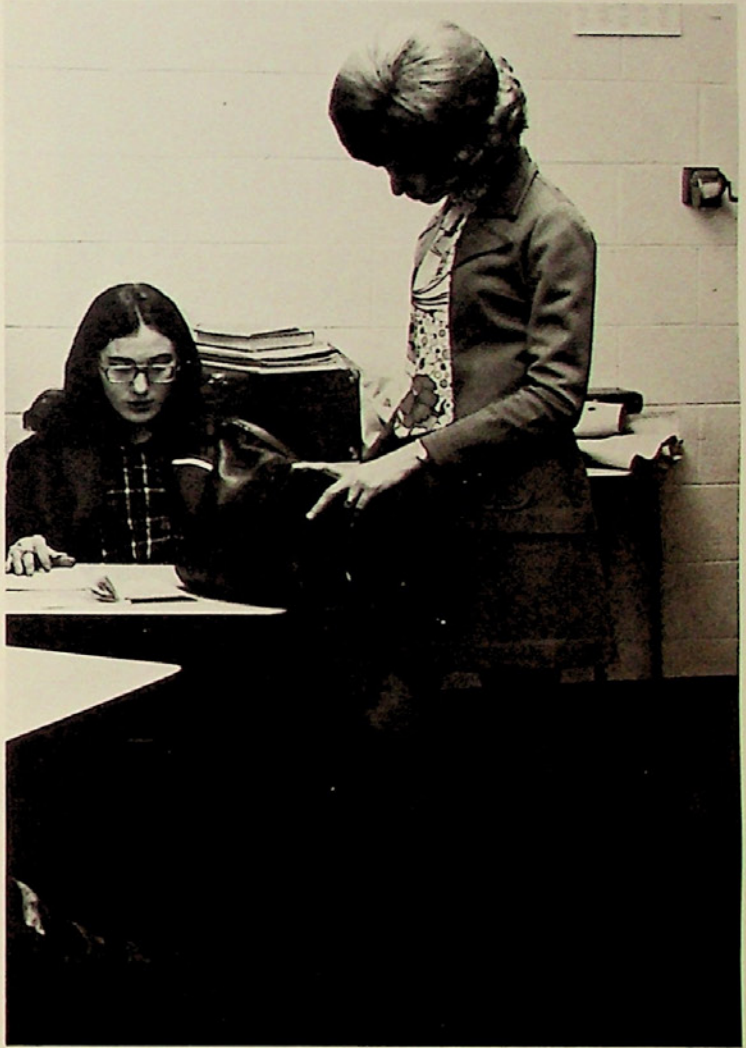
