Bath Marine Succumbs in **Battle Zone** 0 1924

Dottie Lone Corporal Quentin E. George, U. S. Marine Corps, son of Mrs. Mamie A. George, Chapman Quarries, Bath R. D. 2, was reported as a war casualty in a telegram received from the government yesterday. The message read: "Deeply regret to inform you that your son, Corp. Quentin E. George, died January 15, 1944." The message, which was signed by A. A. Vandegrift, Lieut General, U. S. Marine Corps, com-mandant, did not disclose the place where the death occurred, but stated that additional information would follow in due course. Corp. George, who is 24 years old, one of three sons of Mrs. George, and the second oldest, was in the Marines the past two years. He saw active service in the Guad-alacanal sector until relieved by the Army and transferred to Australia

for a rest period. Corp. George was a graduate of the Nazareth High School, and prior to enlisting in the Marines, was employed at the Lone Star Ce-ment plant, Nazareth. He was a fine ball player and was well liked by his fellow players. Two other brothers are now in the service. One, Joseph, the oldest, is in a landing craft unit in the U. S. Navy, and Donald is in the Naval Air Force, serving on the home front.' His father, Joseph George, died
