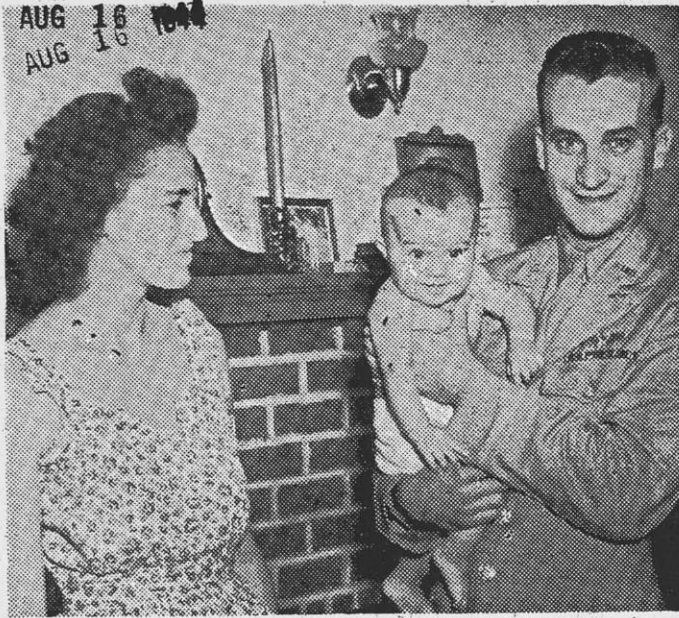


Wolfe, Ralph

Young Nazareth Air Hero Meets His New Daughter

The thrill of holding his four months' old daughter Bonnie Mae for the first time, was experienced by Lieut. Ralph W. Wolfe, East Lawn, Nazareth.

Lieut. Wolfe, who is the proud possessor of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, and has completed thirty missions, is home on a well-earned leave.

The young lieutenant had never seen his little daughter until he arrived home after ten months of action overseas. Bonnie Mae was born on March 20, 1944.

The citation accompanying the Distinguished Flying Cross reads: "For extraordinary achievement while serving as bombardier of a B-17 airplane on a number of bombardment missions over enemy occupied continental Europe. Displaying great courage and skill, Lieut. Wolfe, fighting from his gun position, has warded off many enemy attacks and has materially aided in the success of each of these missions. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by Lieut. Wolfe on all these occasions reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the U. S."

Lieut. Wolfe received his wings and was commissioned a second lieutenant at Big Springs, Texas, on April 22, 1943, and had advanced training at Moses Lake and Geiger Field, Washington. Before going overseas he was stationed at Lewistown, Mont. He was promoted to First Lieutenant on March 8, 1944, overseas.

His wife, Millicent M. Wolfe, and daughter reside at East Lawn, Nazareth.

August 16, 1944
