## WHEREABOUTS OF YOUNG MARINE IS REVEALED

### Uncle and Aunt of Stephen G. Stier See Picture in Paper.

Now and then the whereabouts of some long-unheard from member of the armed forces is discovered through pictures or articles in the press and once in a while such an incident occurs in which residents of this section recognize a son, brother, husband or sweetheart.

The other day Mr. and Mrs. Edward Albertson, Sr., 1506 Second Street, city, were looking through an issue of the New York Daily News when there, among a group of grinning U. S. Marines pictured in a truck, they saw the face of their nephew, Pfc. Stephen G. Stier.

According to the caption the men were "being transported towards Buna to take part in the gigantic operations of the United Nations' forces in that region. At Buna the Japs are making a last ditch stand against Australian and American troops.

Stier is now serving his second enlistment of overseas duty. He first served with the U. S. Army in Hawaii and upon completion of his "hitch" returned to this country and resided again with Mr. and Mrs. Albertson, by whom he was brought up. Just before the outbreak of hostilities he enlisted in the Marine Corps.

After completing his basic training he was transferred and his uncle and aunt did not know where he was sent. His picture in the newspaper was first news of his present station.

Stier is a member of St. John's Hungarian Catholic Church and of the Hungarian Catholic Club. He also belongs to SS. Peter and Paul Athletic Society.
