**Widow Gets
Condolence
From Marshall**

A War Department telegram and a card of sympathy from General Marshall were received yesterday by Mrs. Richard D. Klotz, of 32 East Union Boulevard, announcing the death of her husband, Captain Richard D. Klotz, as a result of wounds

received in action in Belgium Dec. 28.

The card reads: "General Marshall extends his deep sympathy in your bereavement. Your husband fought valiantly in a supreme hour of his country's need. His memory will live in the grateful heart of our nation."

Mrs. Klotz, the former Anna Borlodan, received word recently that her husband was hospitalized in Belgium. He entered Army service Jan. 3, 1941. On Sept. 3, 1944, he observed his 27th birthday in England. He was an employe of the Bethlehem Steel Company.

Surviving the young man in addition to his wife are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Klotz, of 608 Ontario Street, and the following brothers and sisters: Corp. William M. Klotz, in New Guinea; Corp. James M. Klotz, somewhere overseas; Clayton B. Klotz, Archie A. Klotz, Roland Klotz, Mrs. Raymond Fry, Mrs. Charles Rinker, Mrs. William Greene, Mrs. William Lehman, Mrs. Dellie Iasiello, Mrs. Frances Hofstetter and Mrs. John Gall.

A memorial service will be held Sunday, Feb. 4, at 10:45 a. m., in St. Peter's Lutheran Church for friends and relatives.
