#### SCORNS NAZI "KULTUR"

"Even an idiot would have a hard time to believe it," writes Walter B. Gosling, a private in the U. S. Army Armored Division now on duty in Africa, to his father of the German propaganda which daily bombards the ether waves. **MAR 20 1943**

Pvt. Gosling, 31, is the son of Walter A. Gosling, formerly of this city but now residing at Saylorburg, Monroe County. Mr. Gosling dropped in at the Globe-Times with his boy's latest letter, in which the writer sketchily describes the country and climate and waxes slightly eloquent on the subject of the German's efforts to convert the natives to Nazi ideology.

He remarks that the music is excellent but the propaganda is "weak." Being a radio operator for the force he probably gets plenty of chance to tune in and listen.

He was inducted the latter part of March, 1942, and after the usual training at various camps, the last one being Ft. Bragg, N. C., was shipped overseas. Gosling was scheduled to meet his dad here in

Bethlehem on December 12, but found himself at sea instead.

The father is a veteran of the Spanish-American War and is one of the founders of Volunteer Camp, No. 120, U. S. W. V. He lived in Bethlehem from 1906 to 1939. The son was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company before his induction.

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
