The colorful LHS Grenadier Band once again demonstrated its marching and musical abilities to many appreciative audiences throughout the year. Playing everything from the traditional "Rule Britannia" to the catchy "Budweiser Song," the Grenadiers turned in consistently fine performances at football and basketball games and numerous local parades. One of the highlights of the year occurred during the Liberty-Freedom football clash when both bands combined for a spectacular halftime show portraying the Battle of Bunker Hill.

Assisting Director Ronald Sherry were Senior Officer Bill Gruenewald, Junior Officer Jack Wear, Secretary Sue Ford, and Treasurer Alison Pinczok.

National recognition and television exposure became the rule as the Grenadiers appeared at pro football games in Philadelphia and Baltimore and marched in the Miss America and Indianapolis 500 parades. The band further showed its versatility by performing a pair of outstanding concerts for nearly 4000 people who jammed Memorial Gym for the occasion.

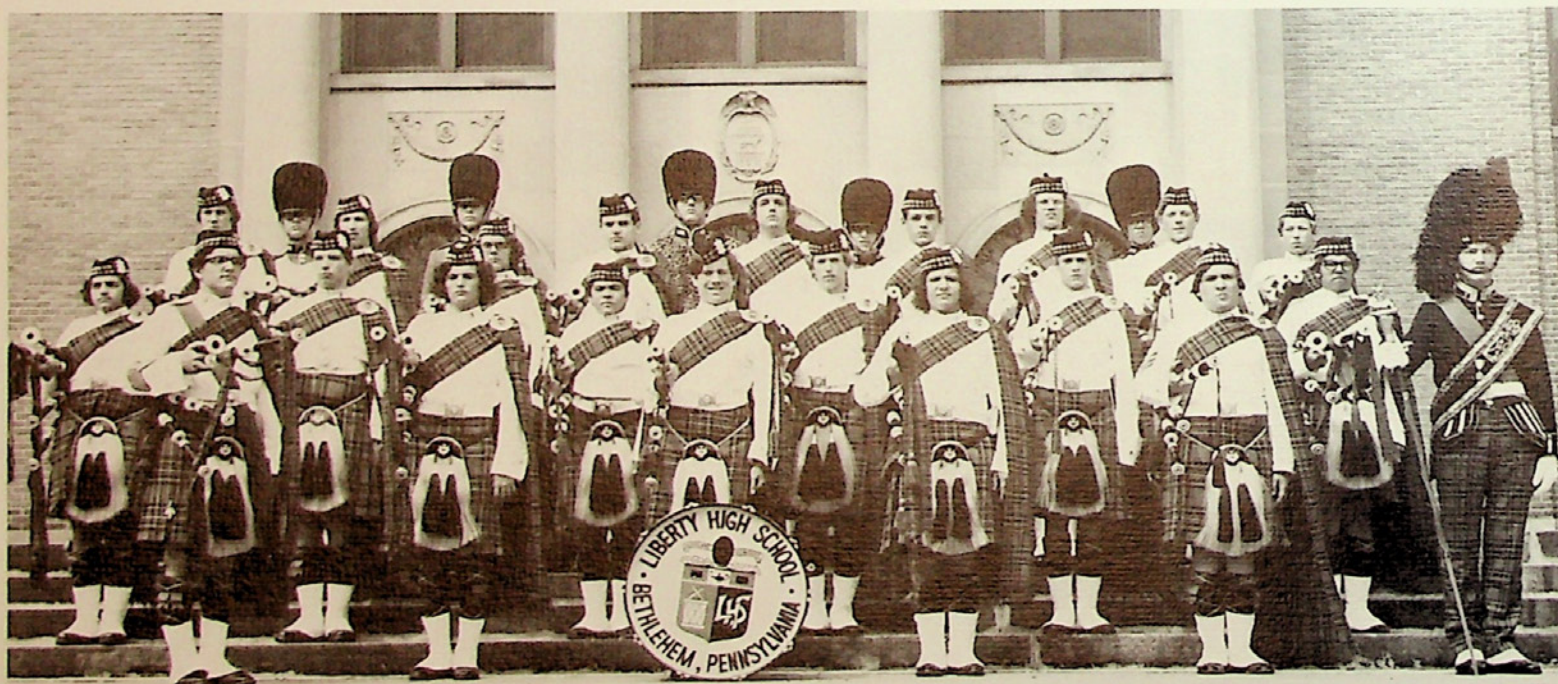
pipers add touch of british authenticity

His orchestra shines at annual pops concert

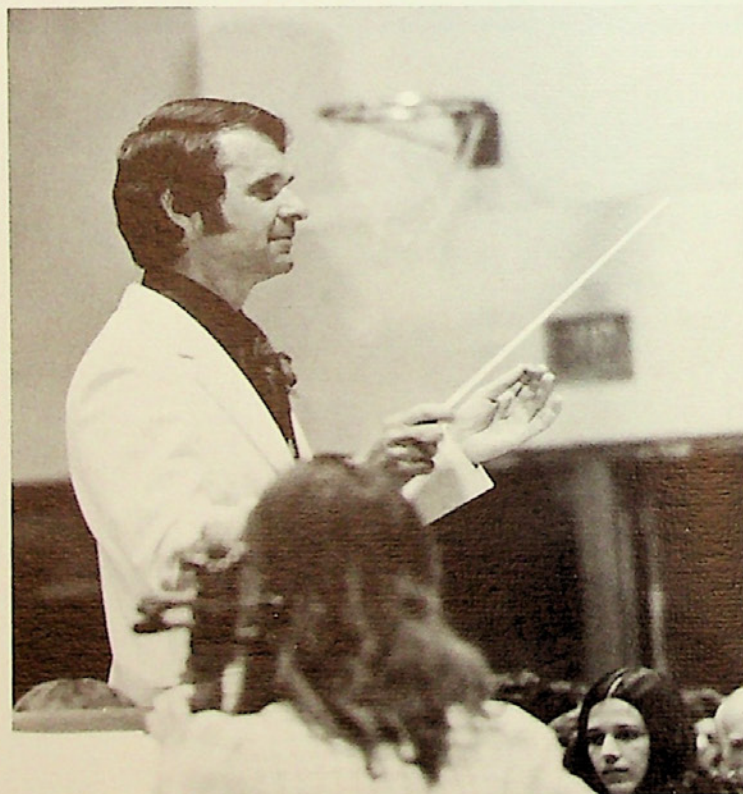

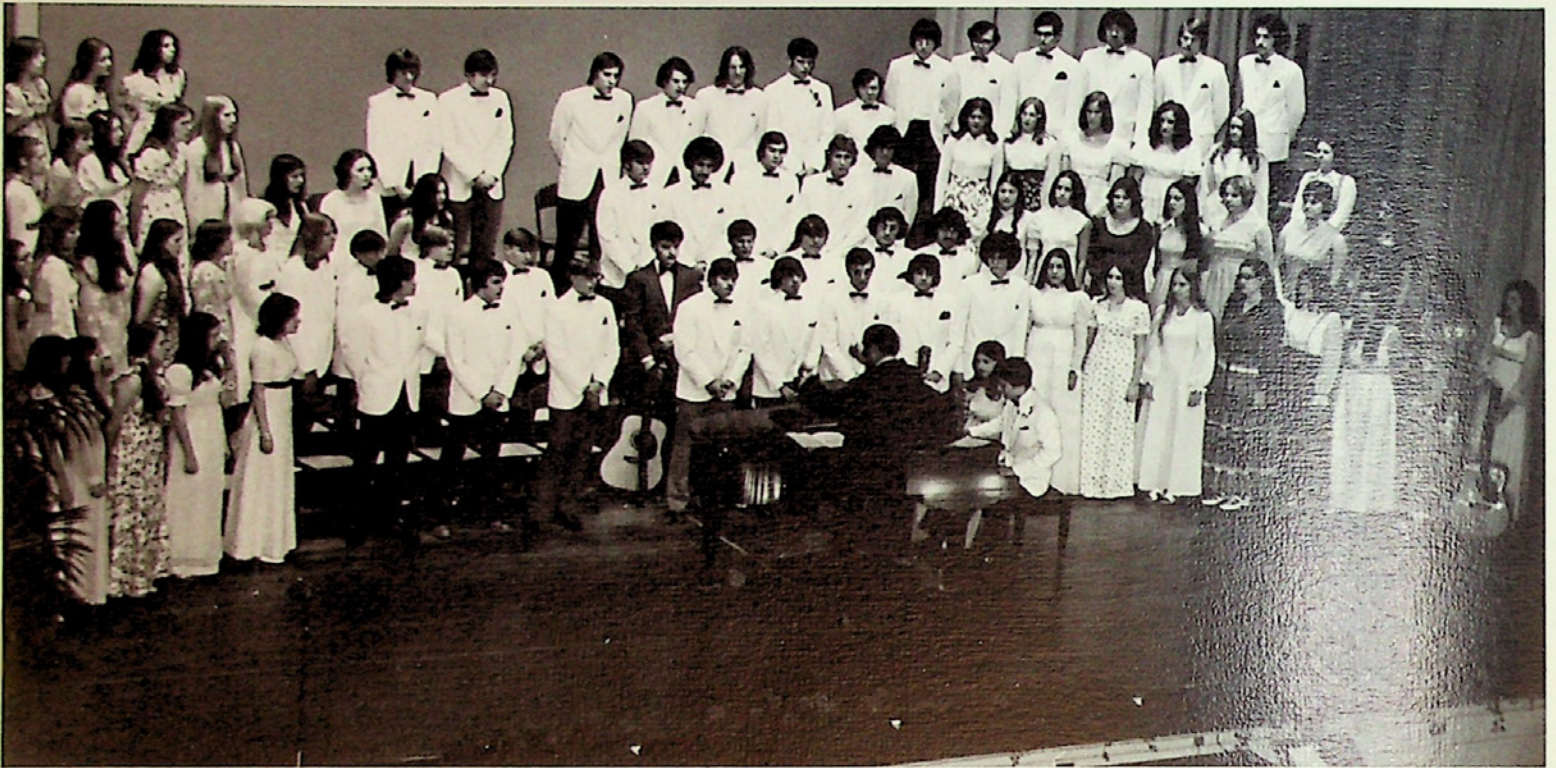

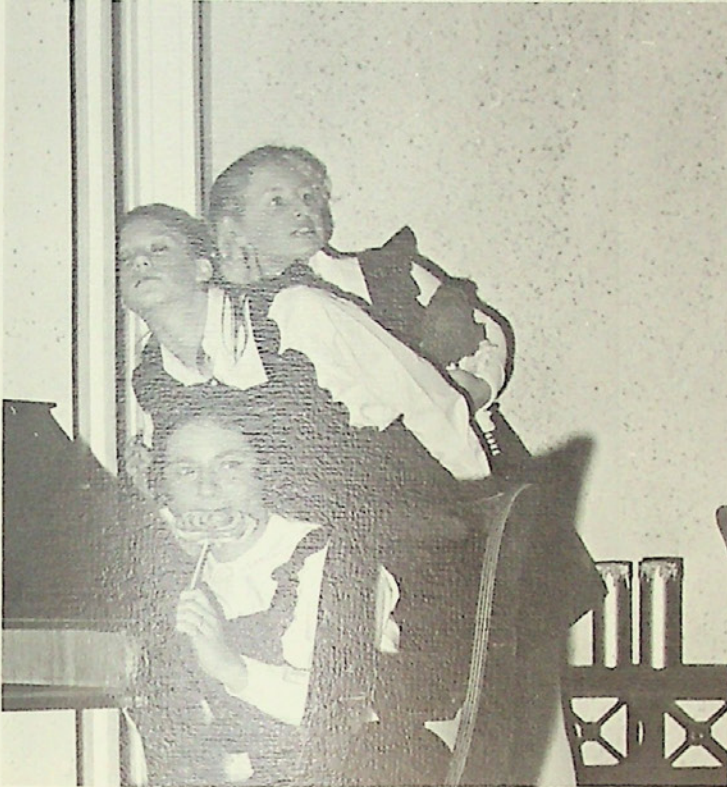

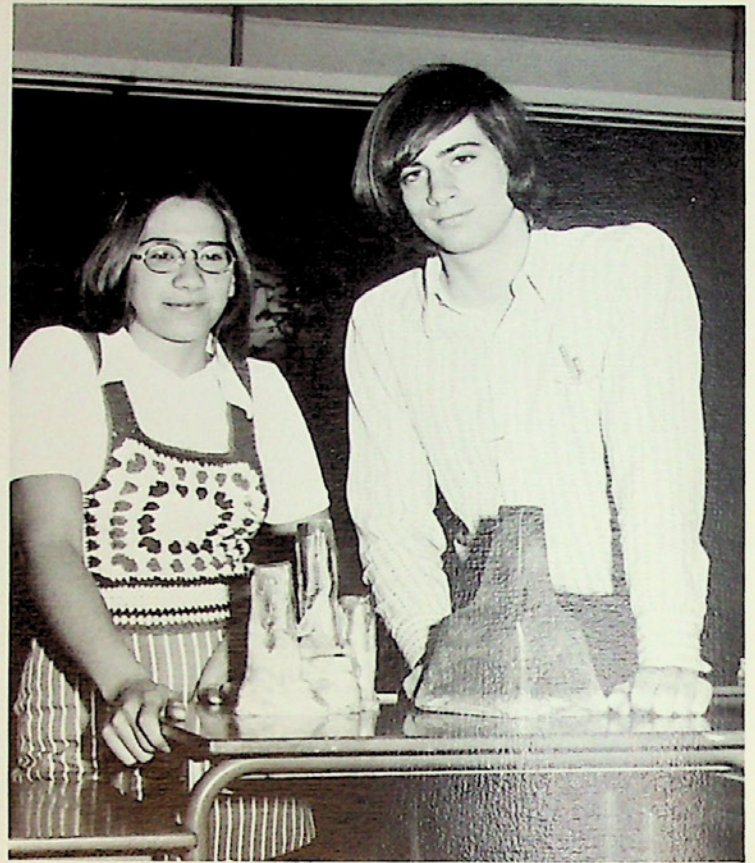

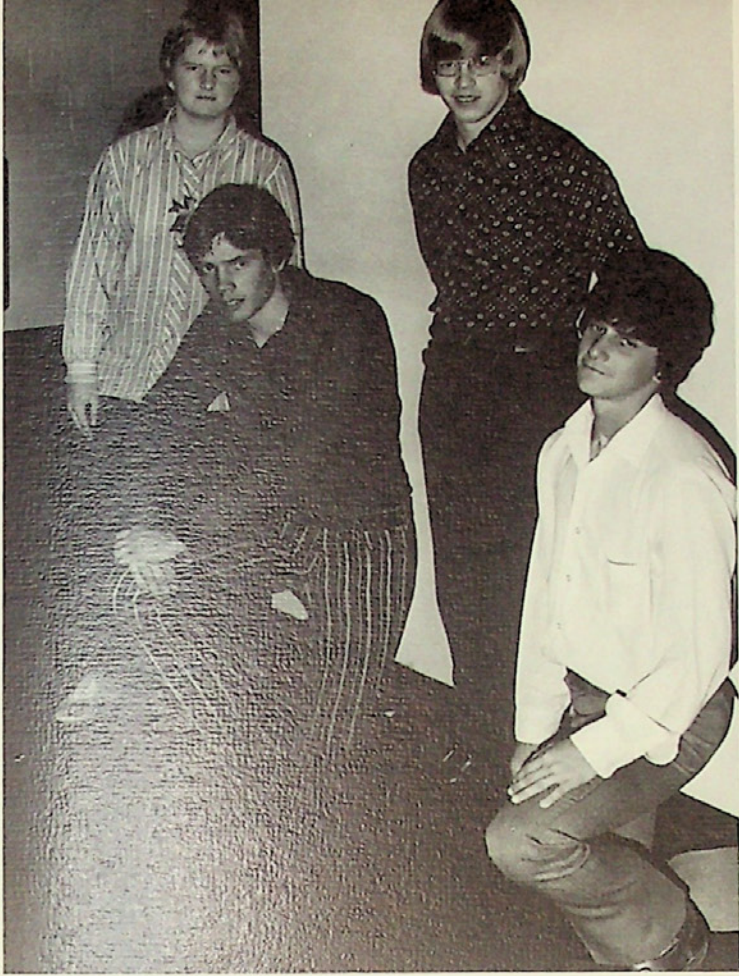

Scores in the debates were arrived at by considering the content of the argument, the manner in which it was presented, and the amount of courtesy shown to opponents. Results indicated that each of the teams had come away with one victory.

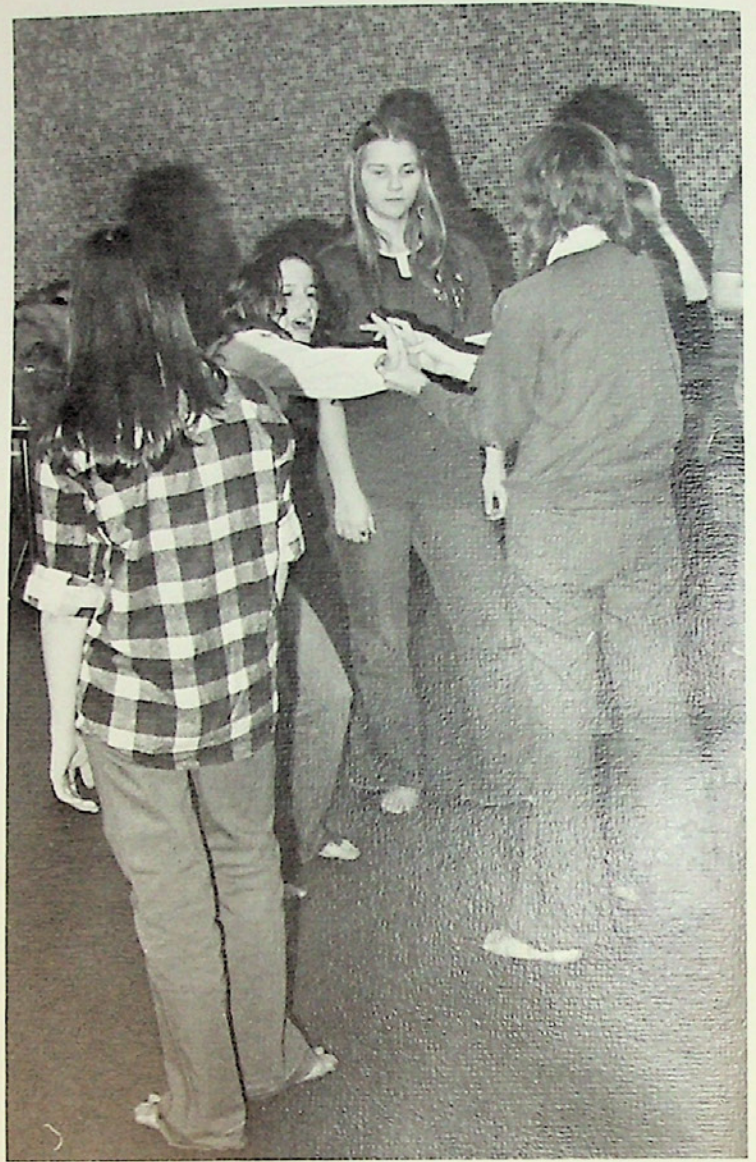

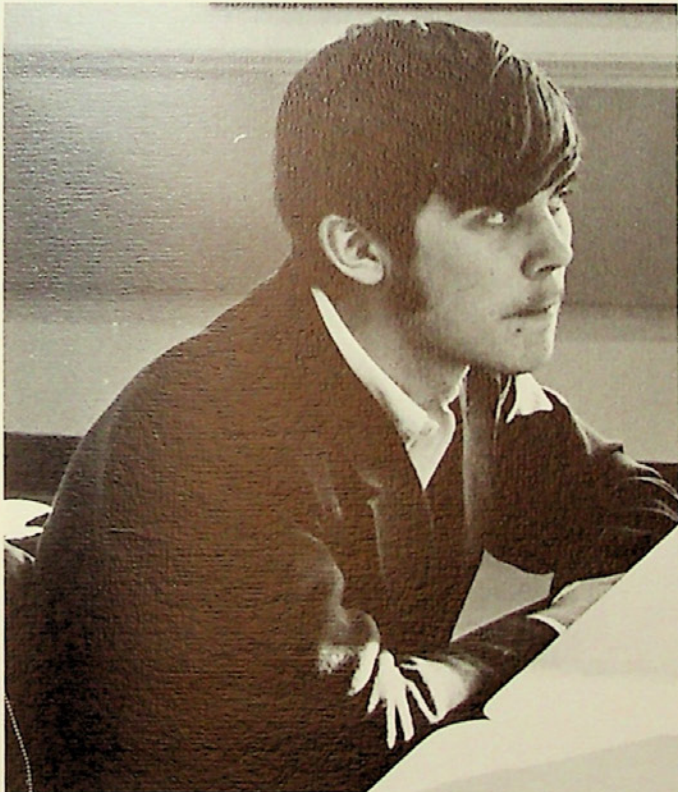

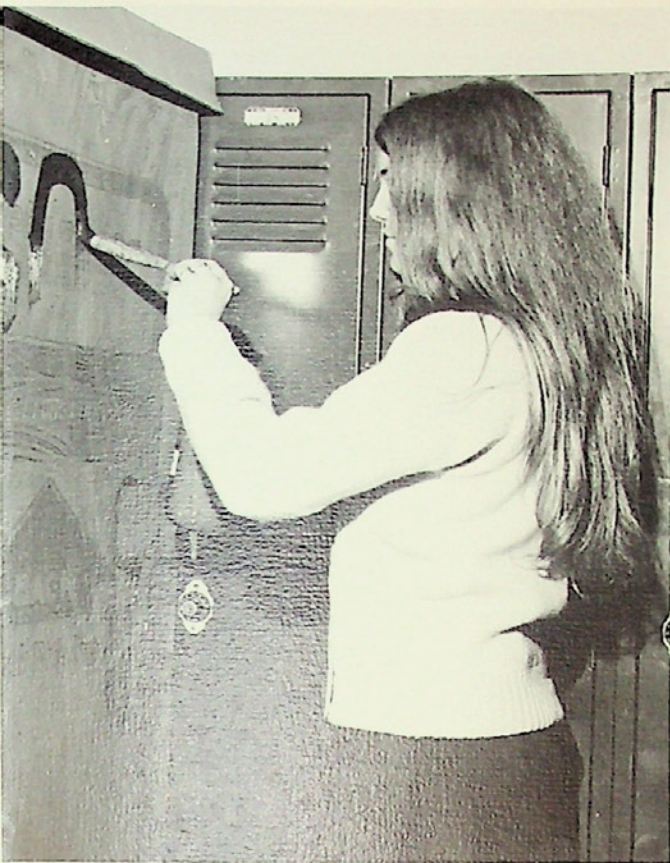

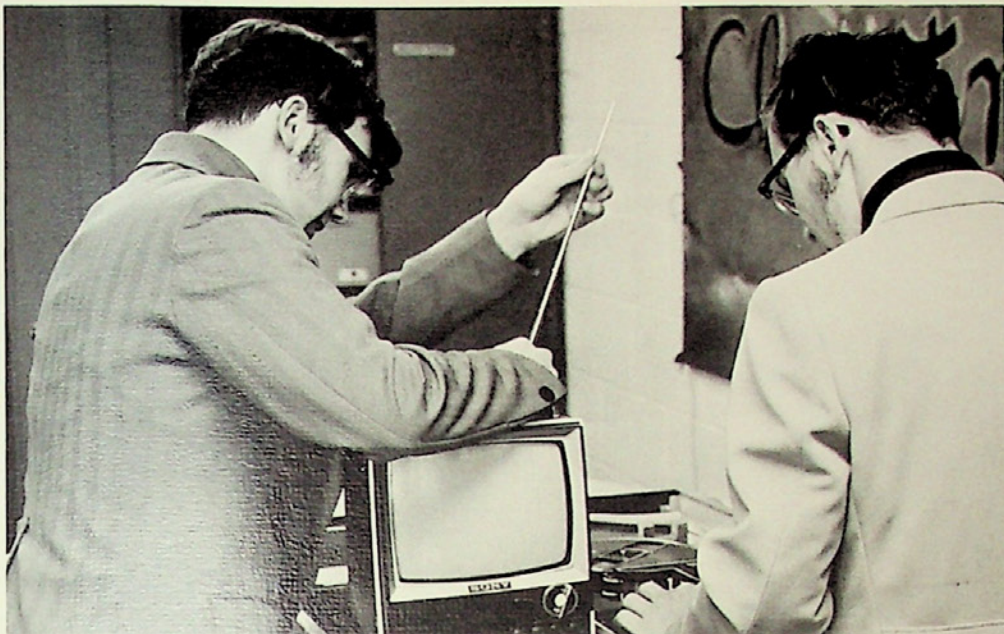

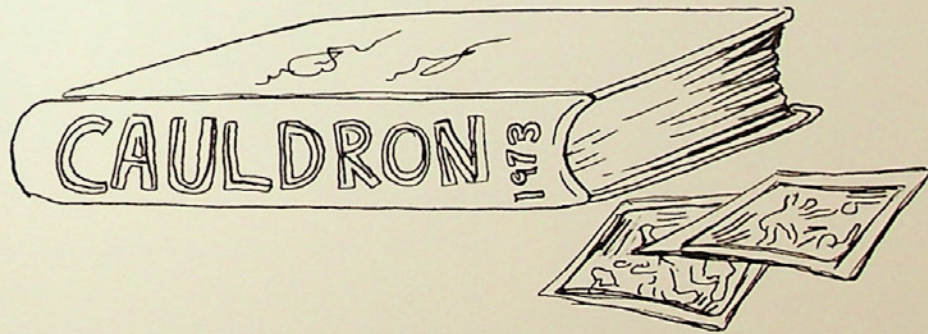

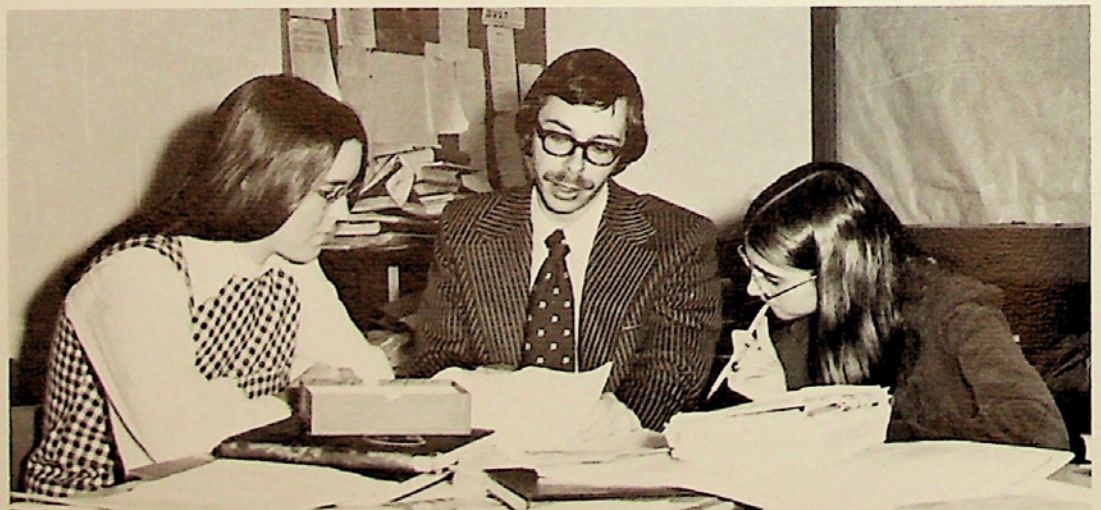

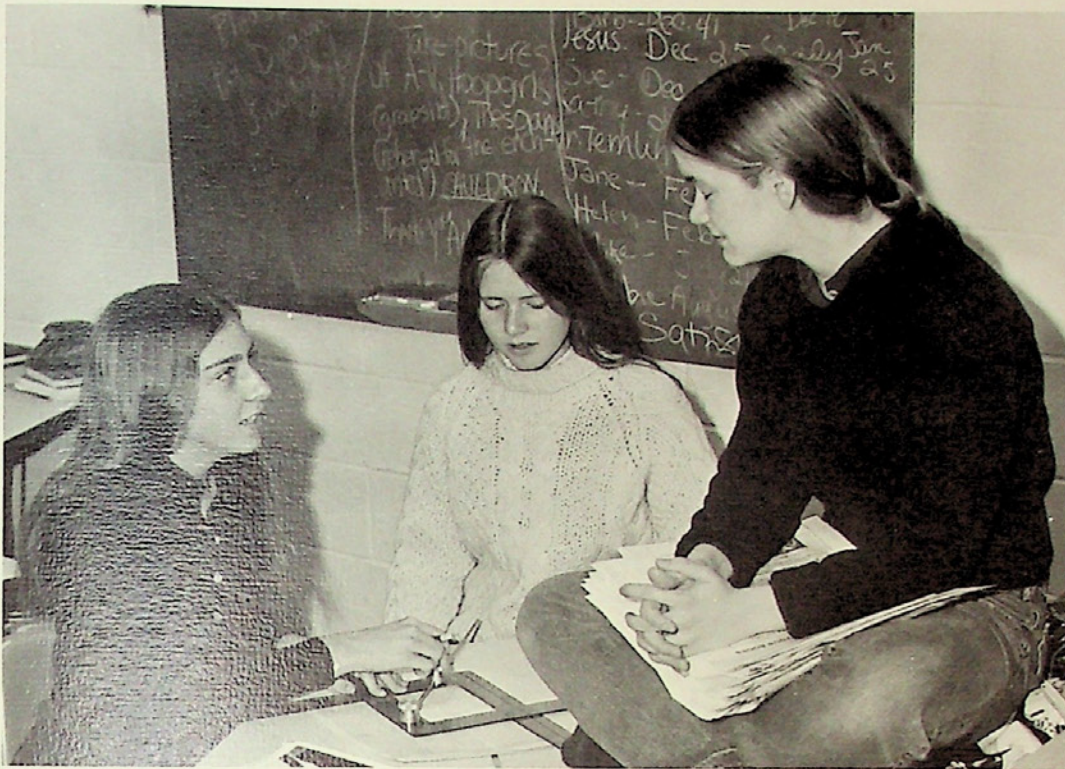

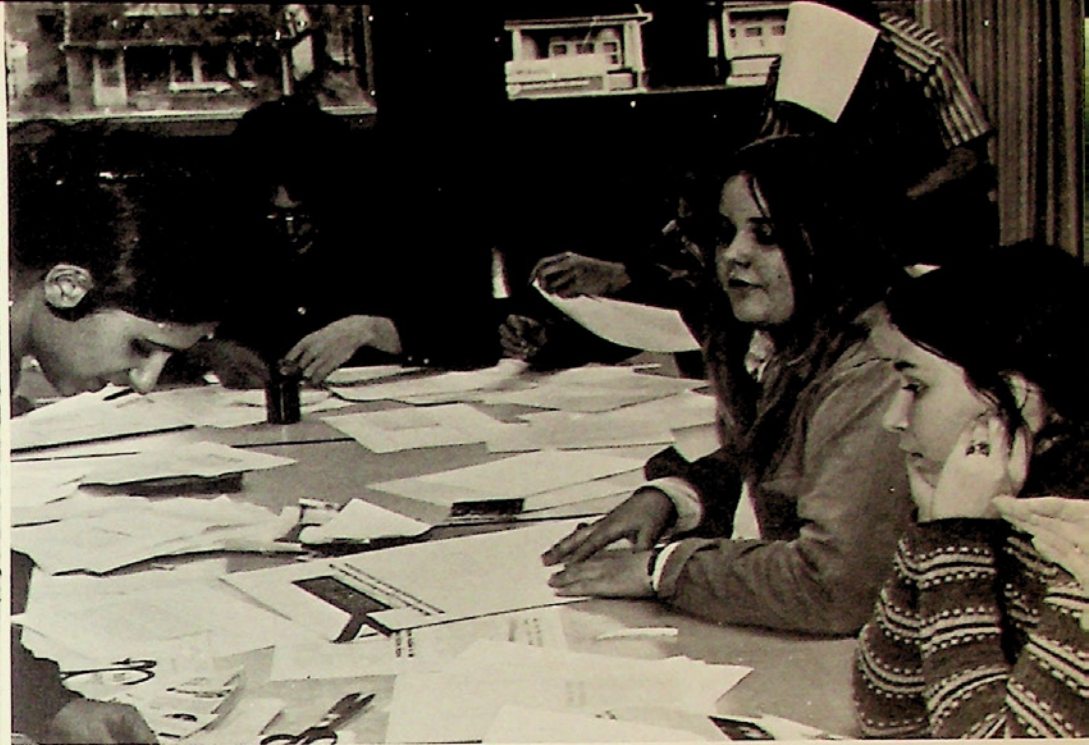

young writer displays creative talents

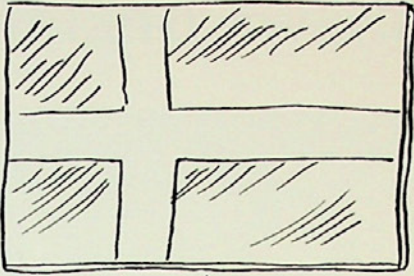

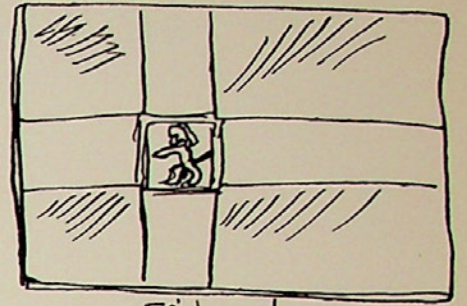

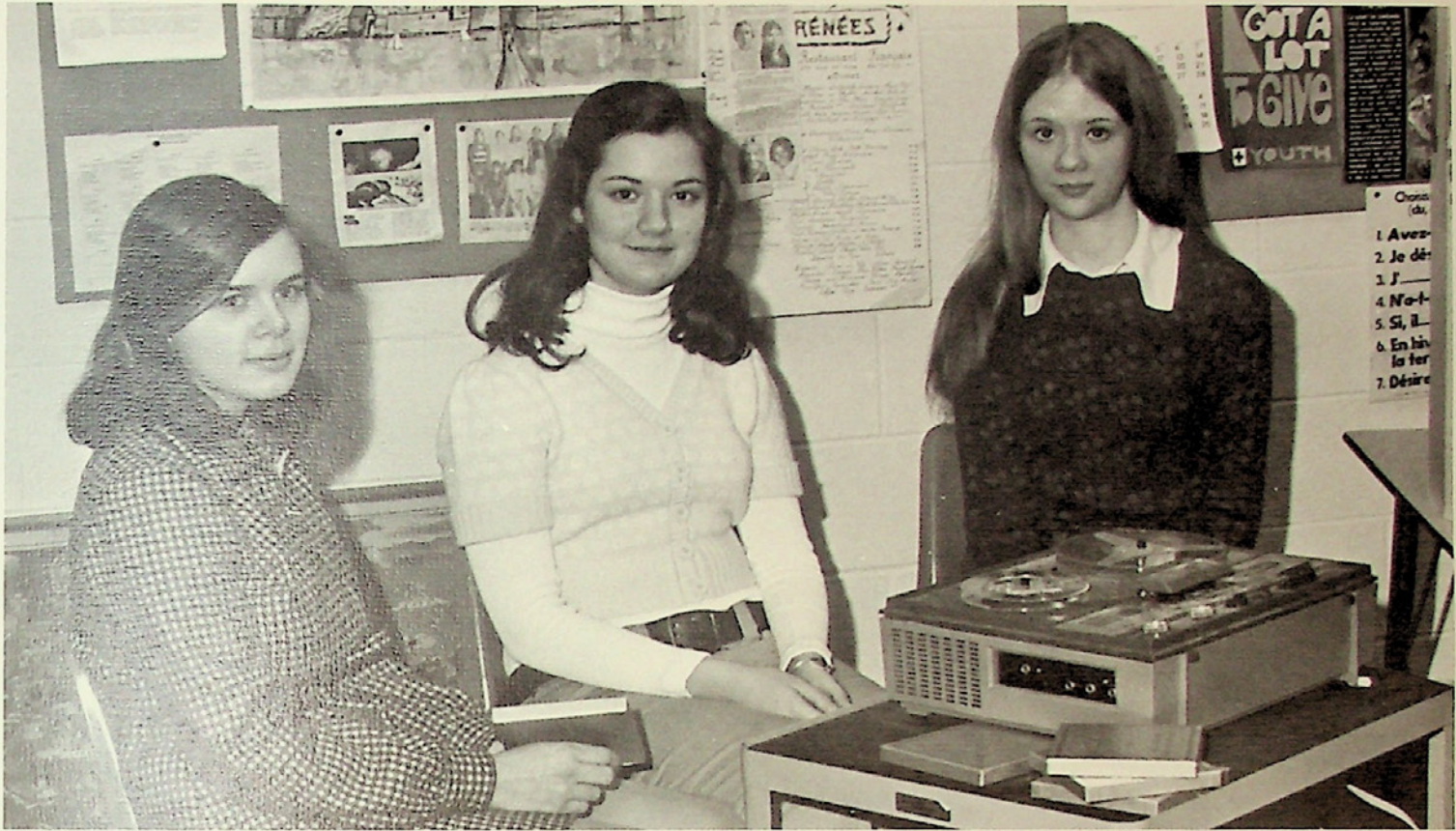

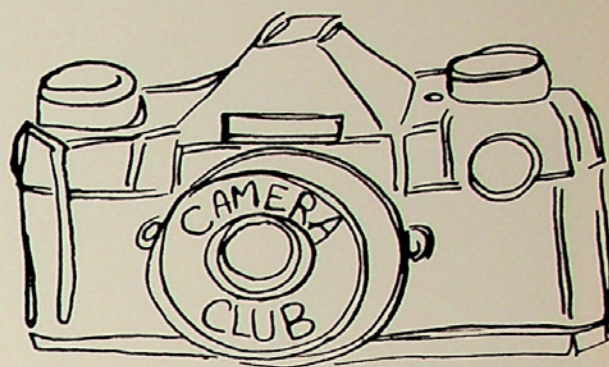

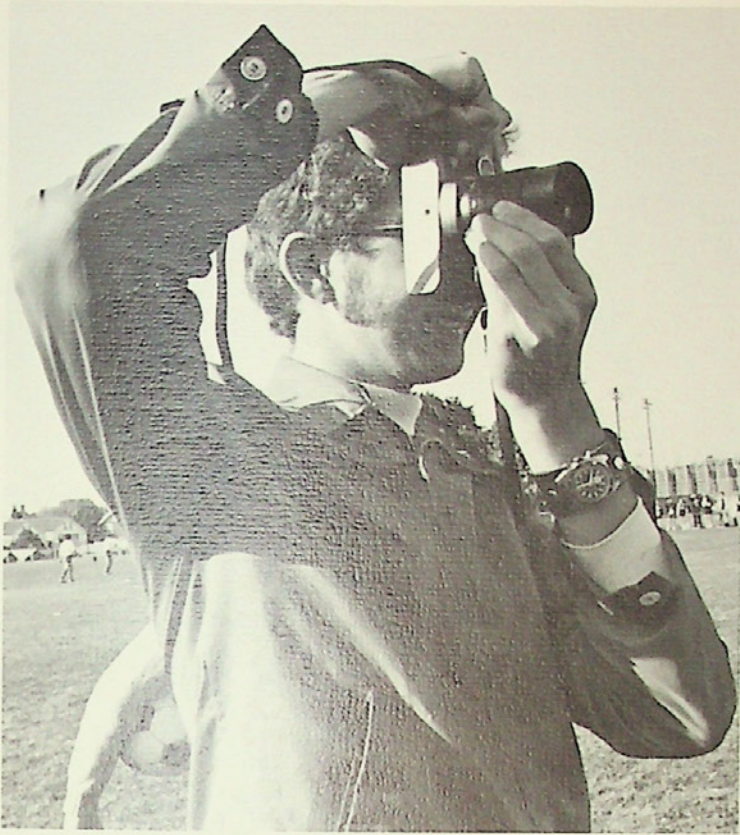

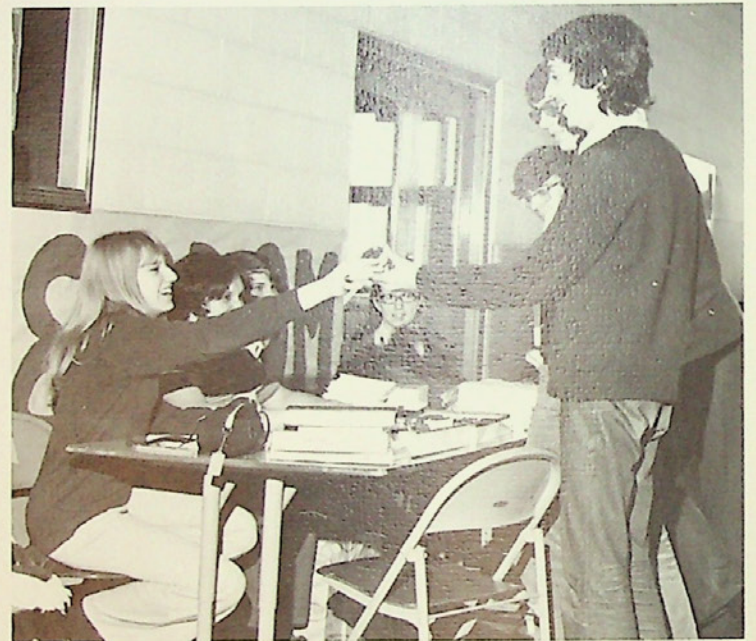

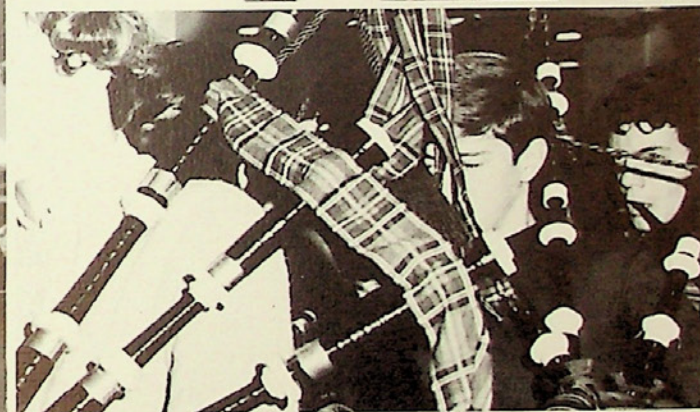

injuries key factor in gridgers' dismal year

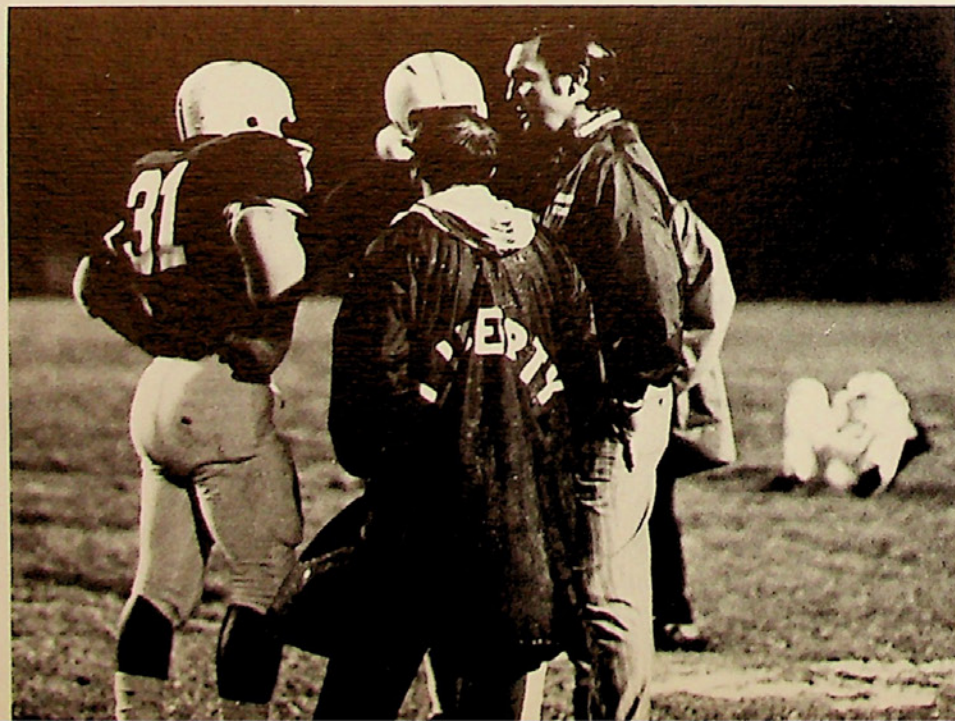

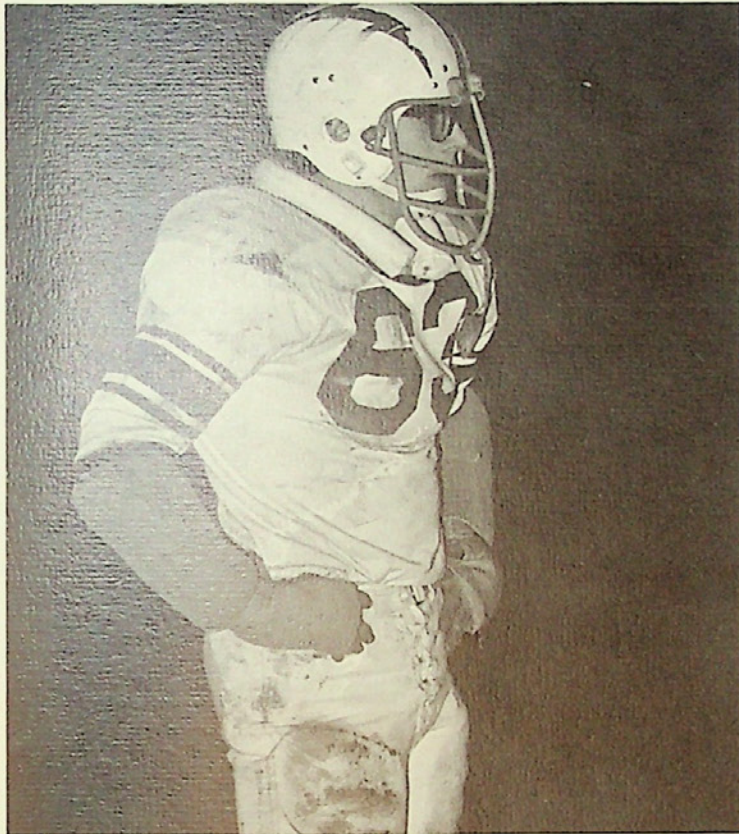

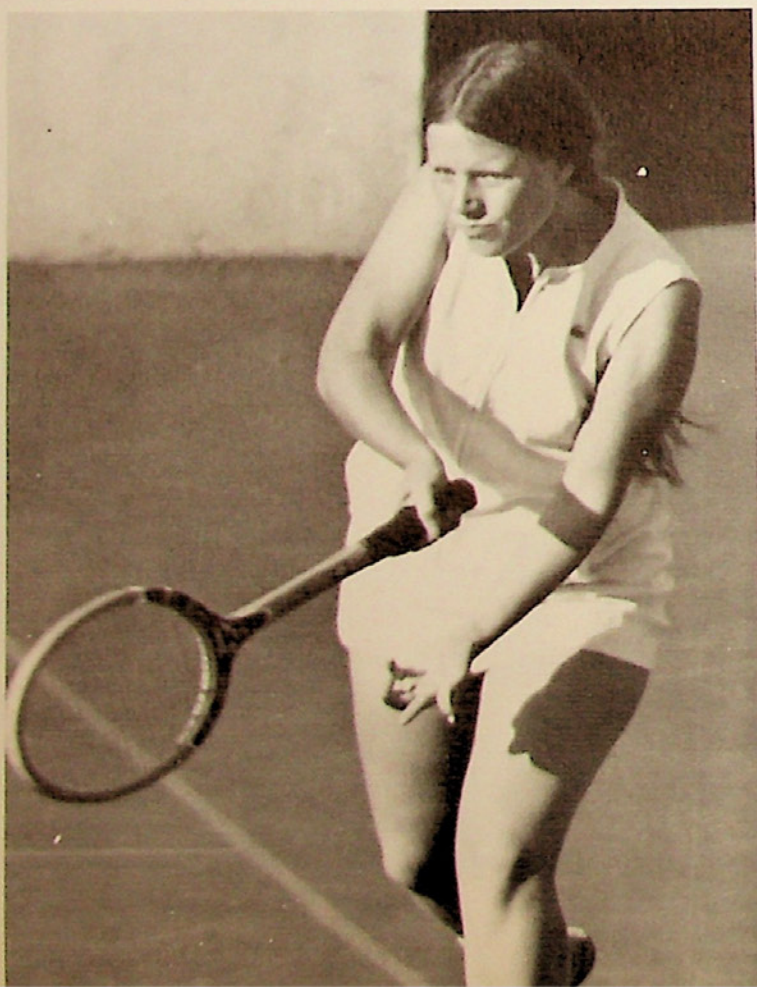

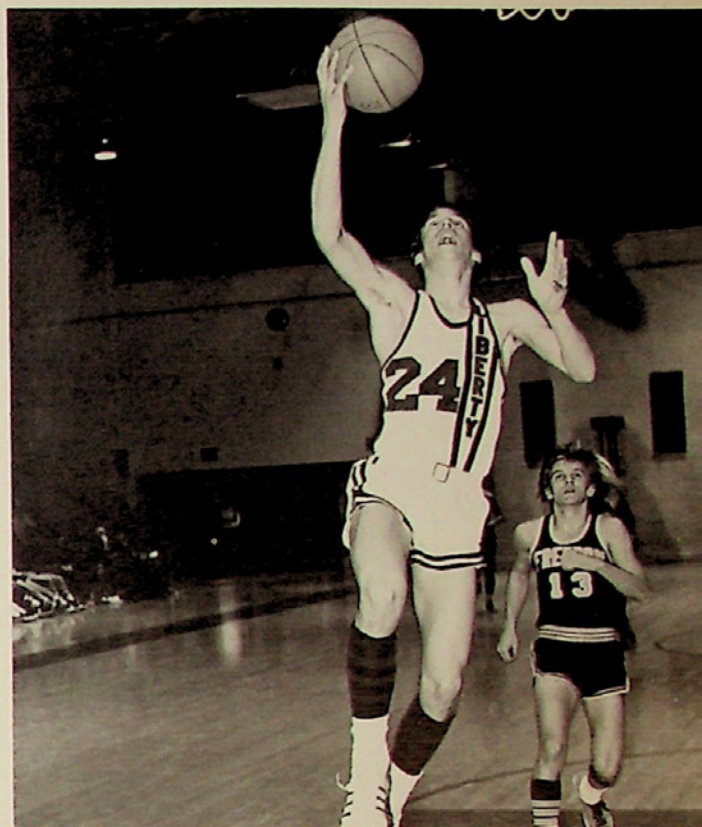


His basketball team suffers losing season

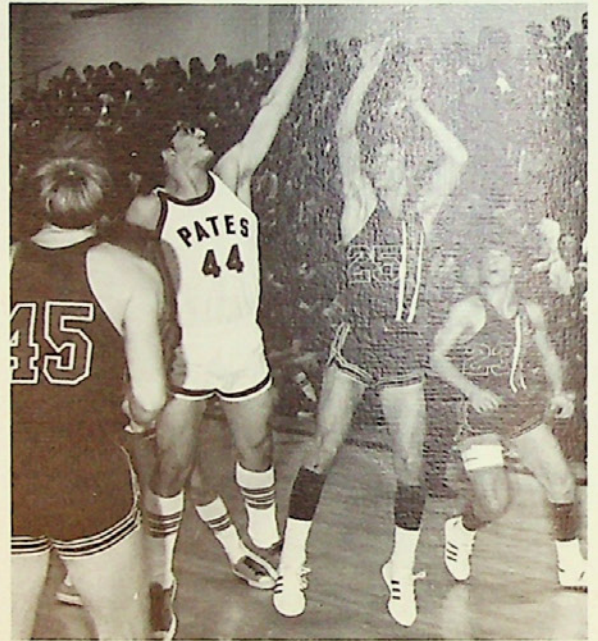

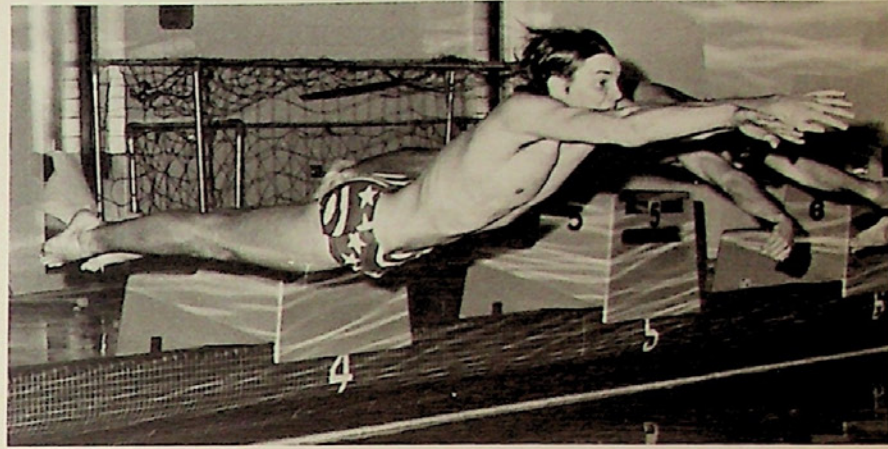


swimmers splash to 3-6 log under new coach

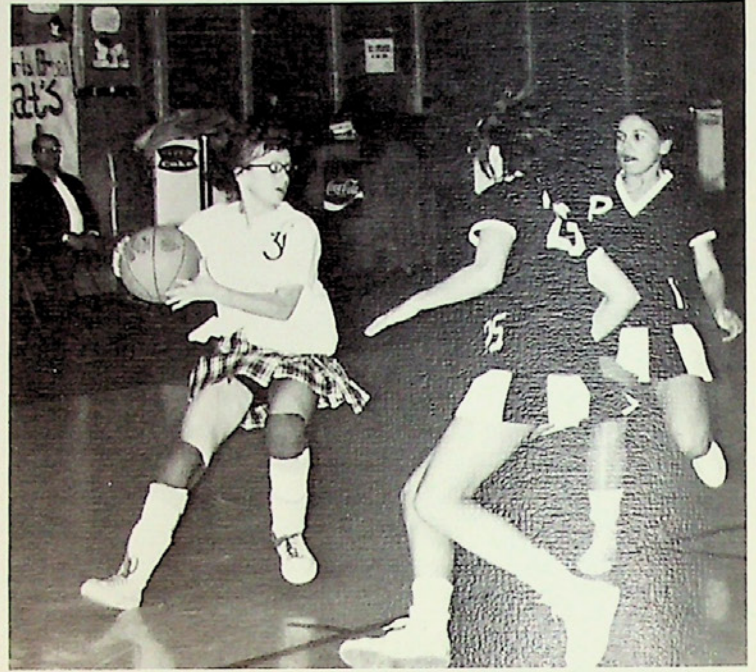

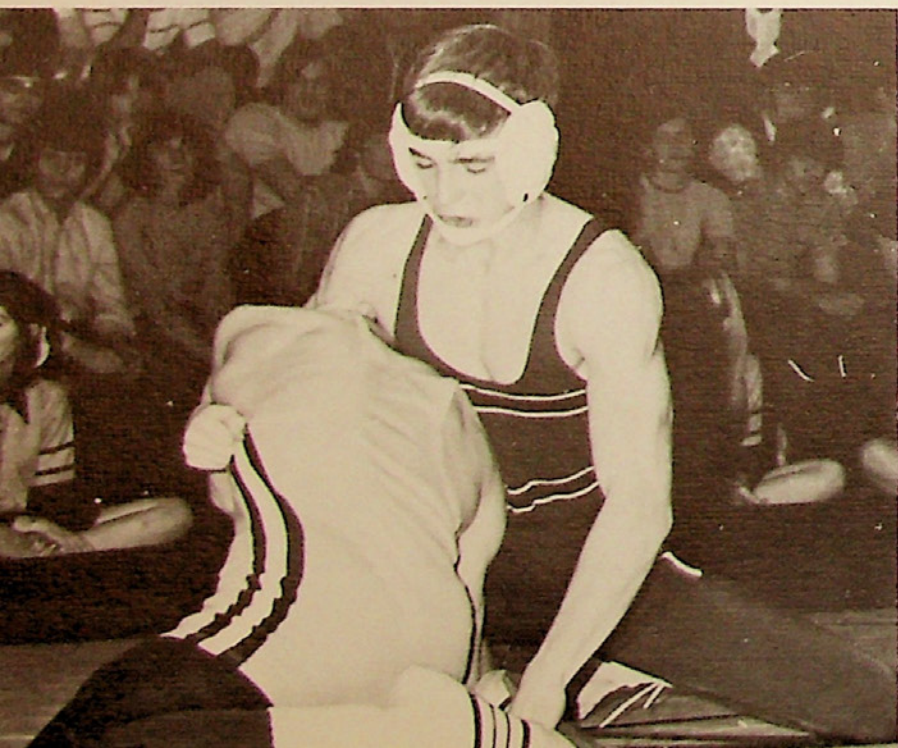

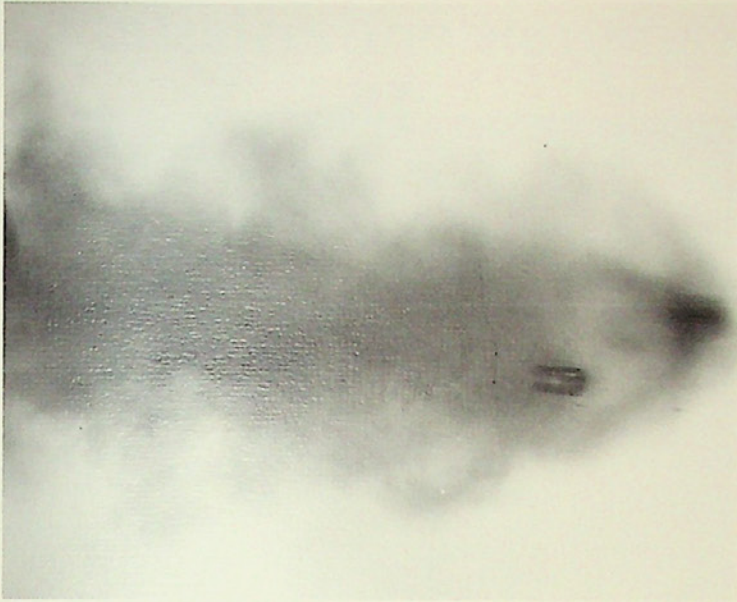

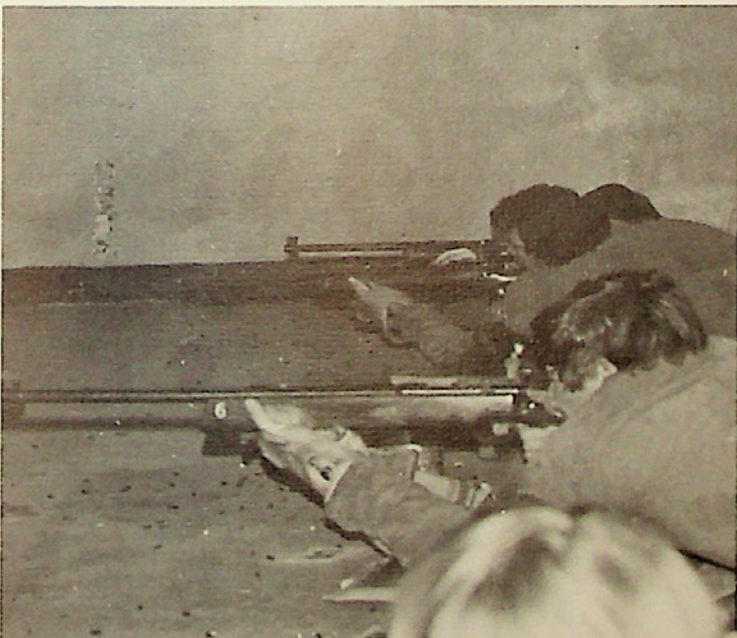

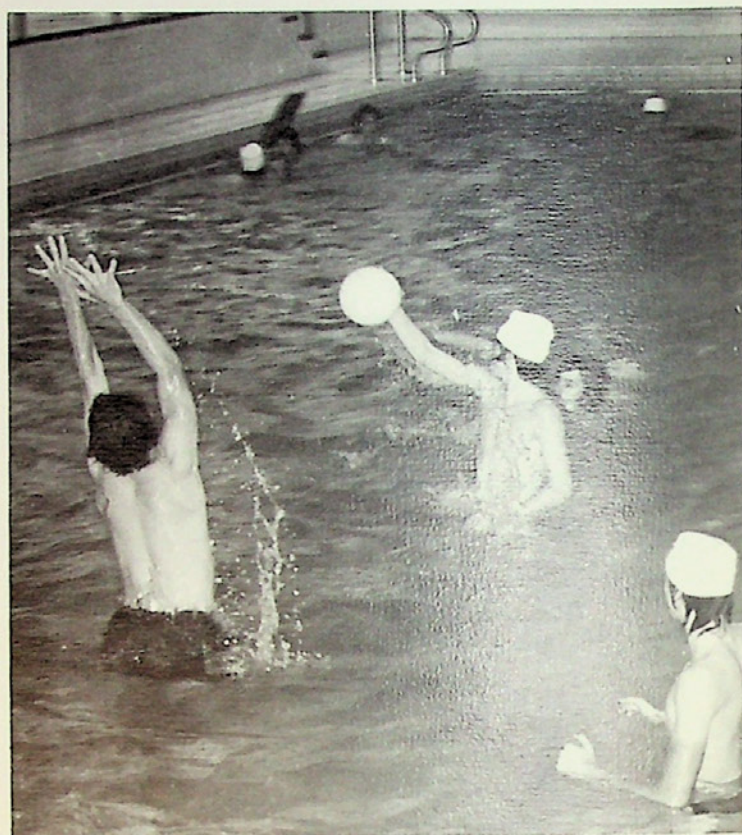
student response to intramurals enthusiastic

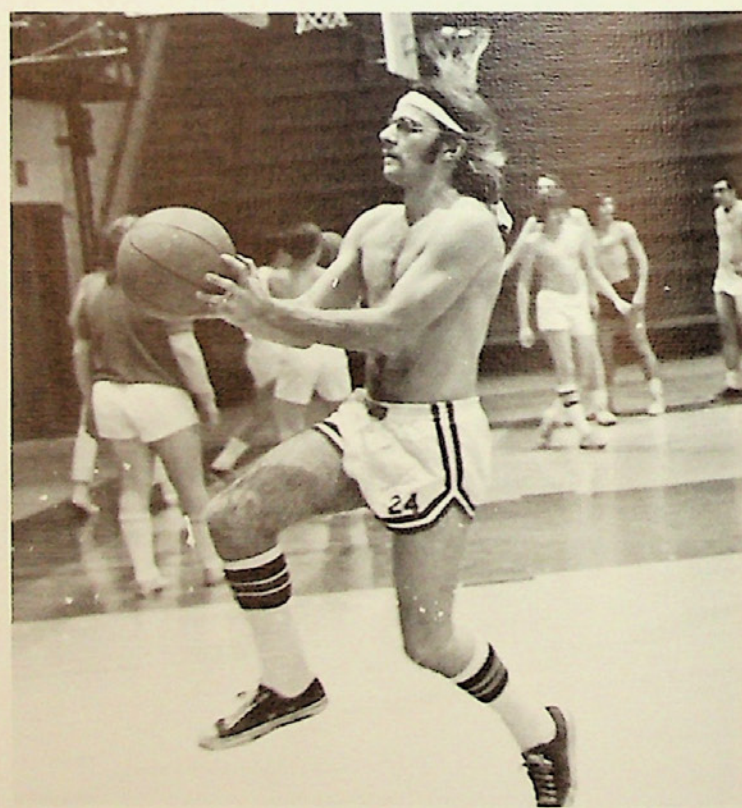

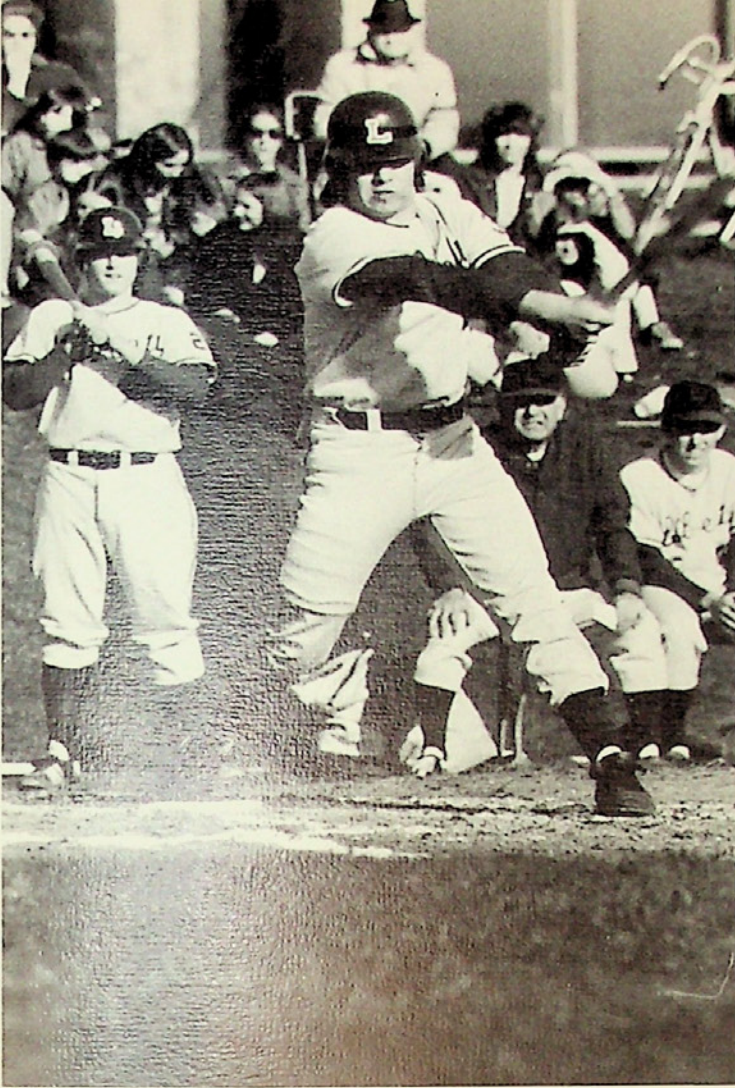

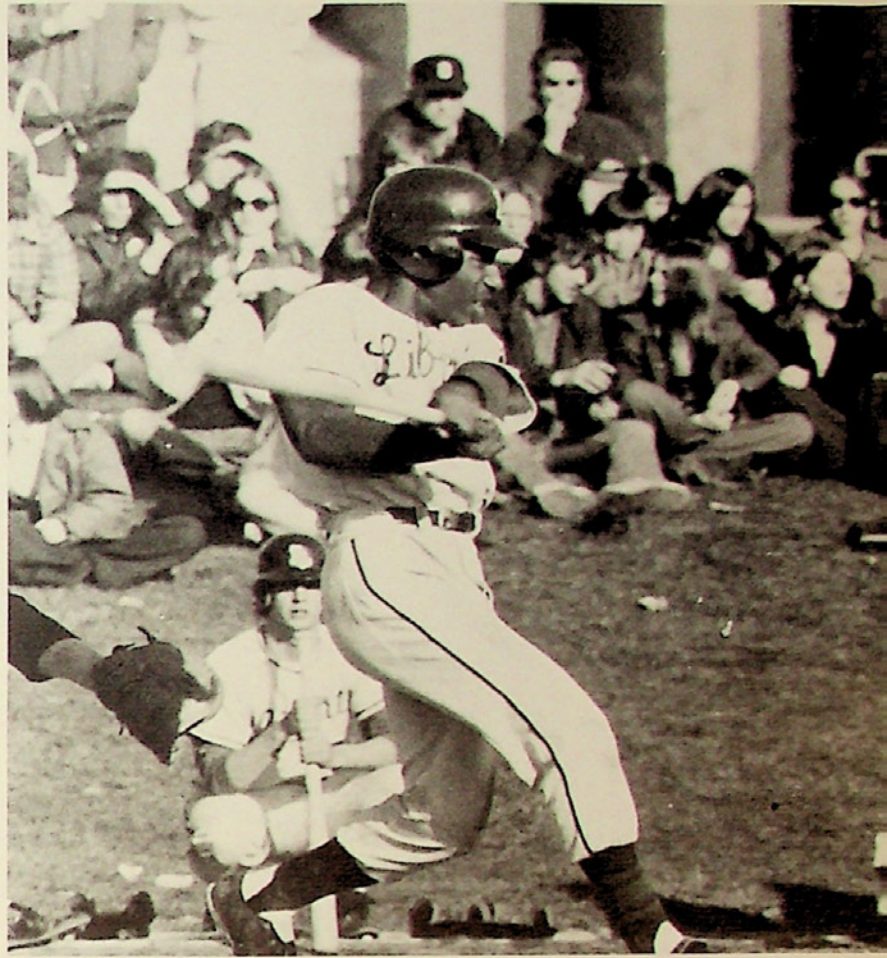

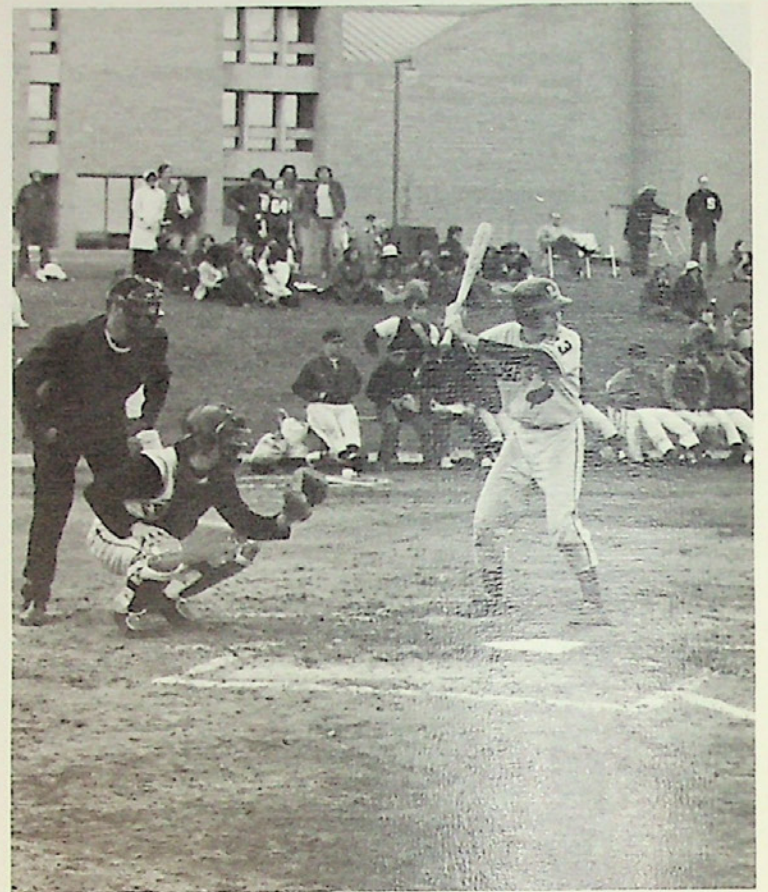

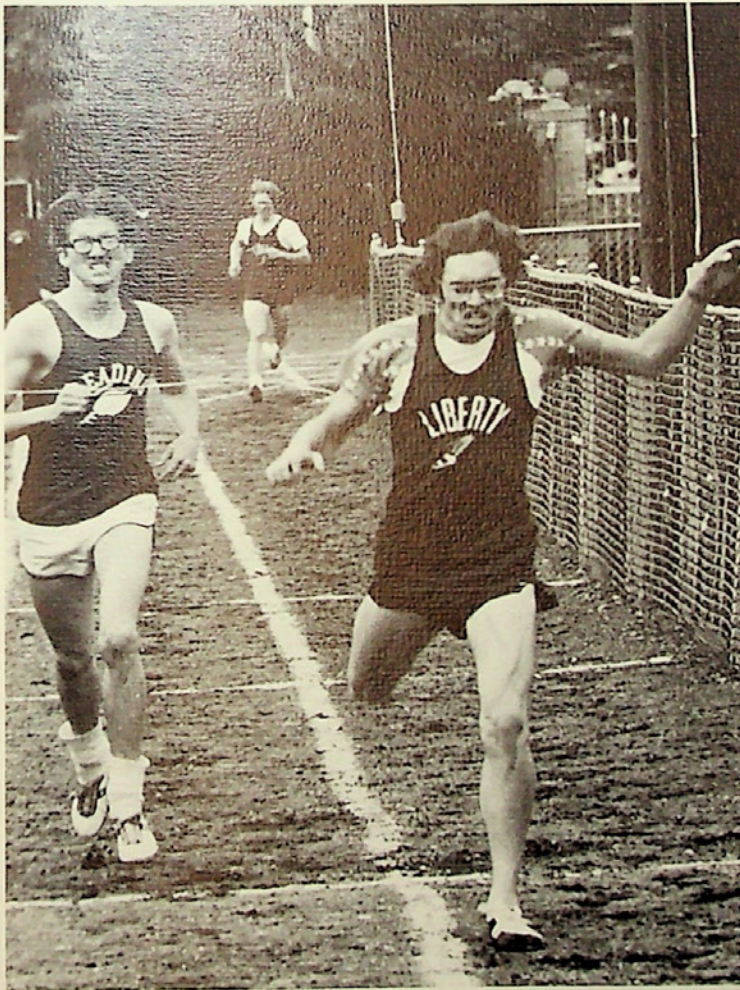


hurdlers shine for hurricane trackmen

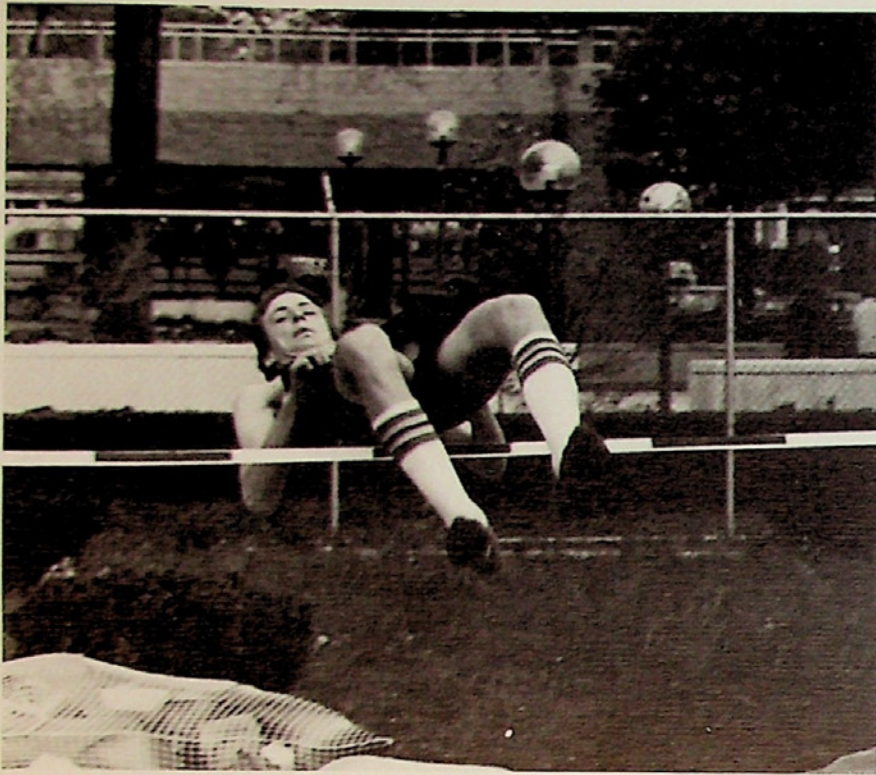


Jeff Ortwein clears the 11-foot mark with ease in the pole vault.

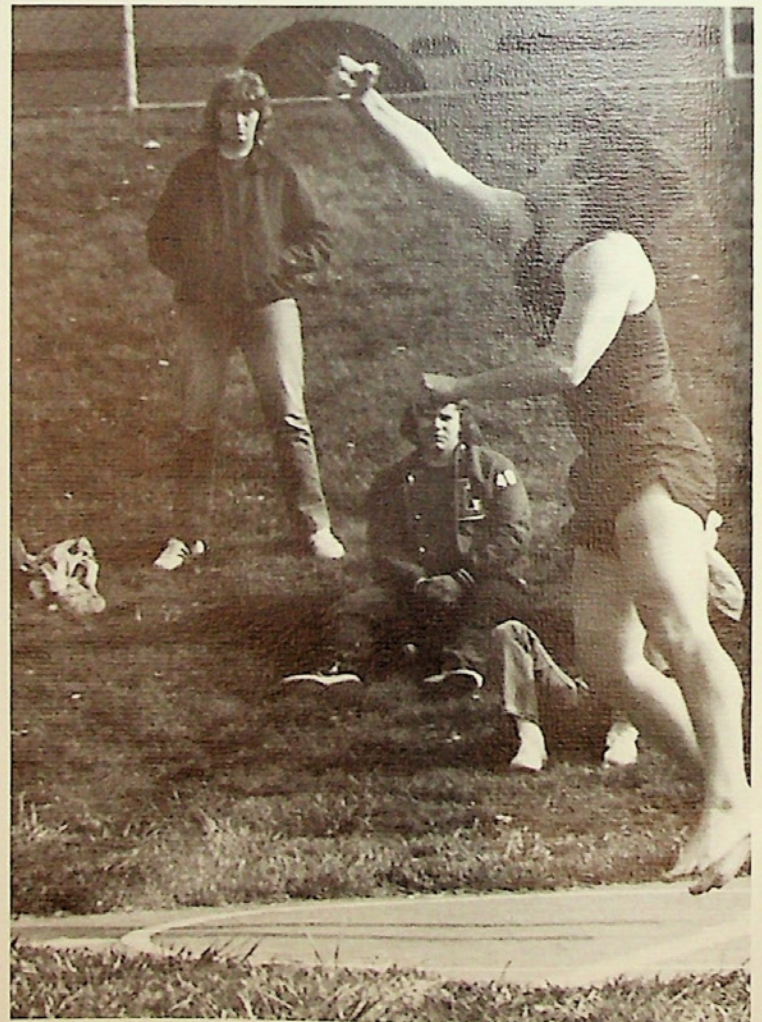

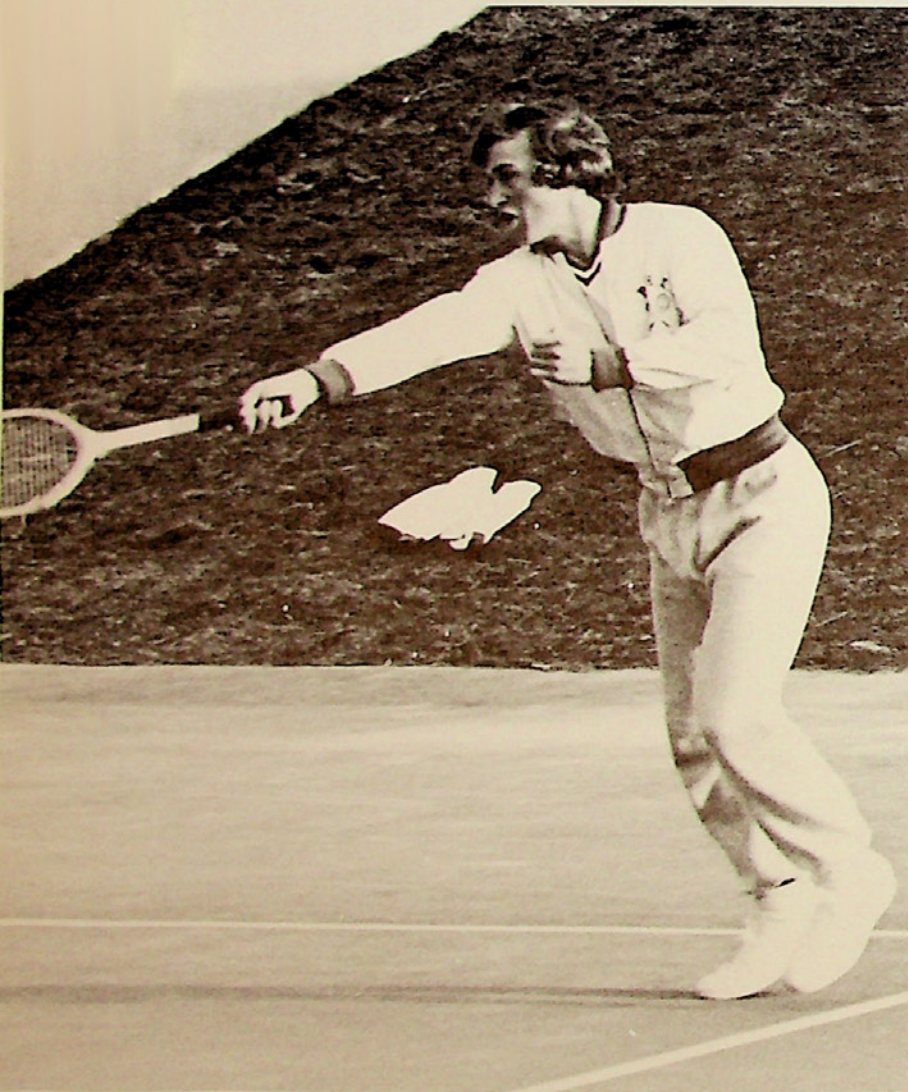

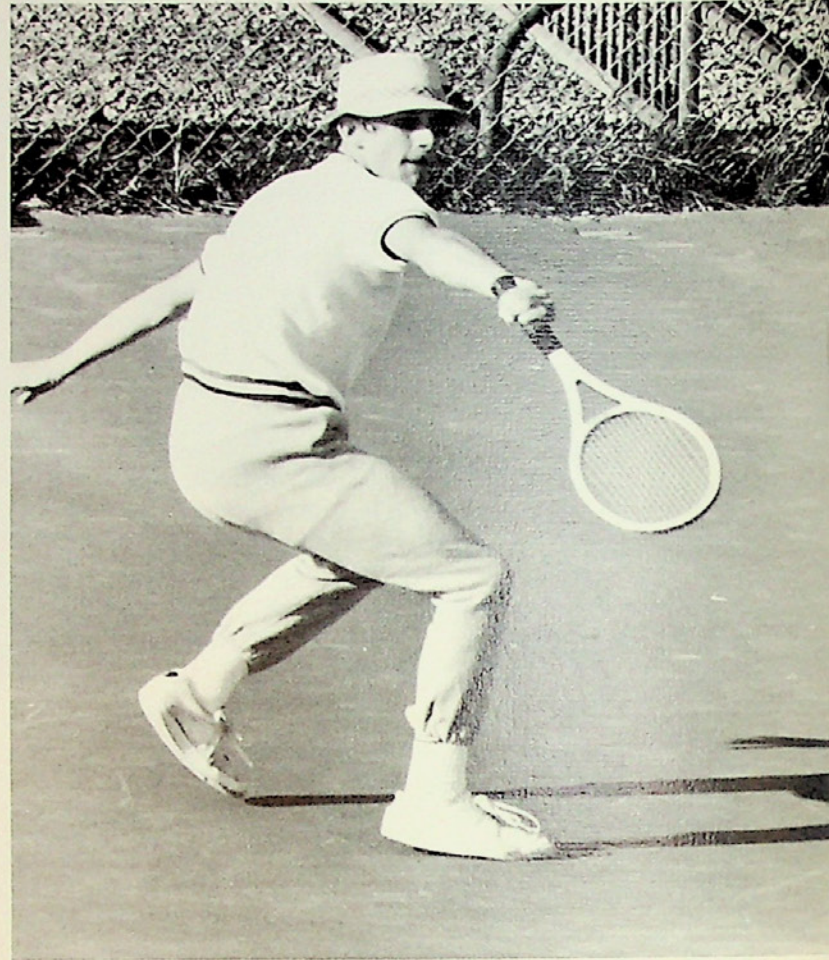


tennis finishes 9-2; speers pace the squad

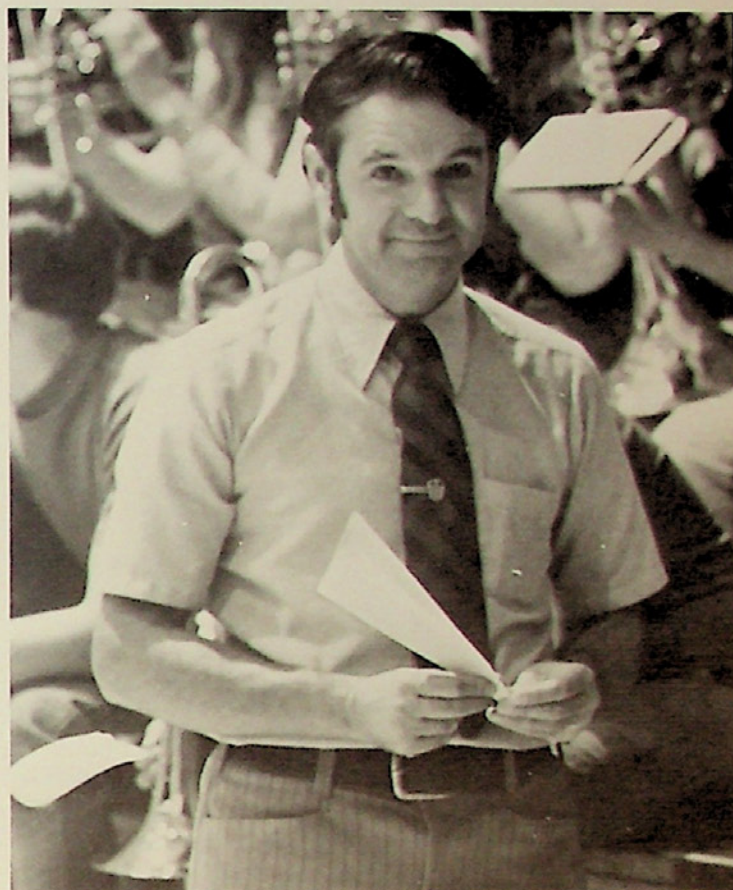
electives supplement students' schedule

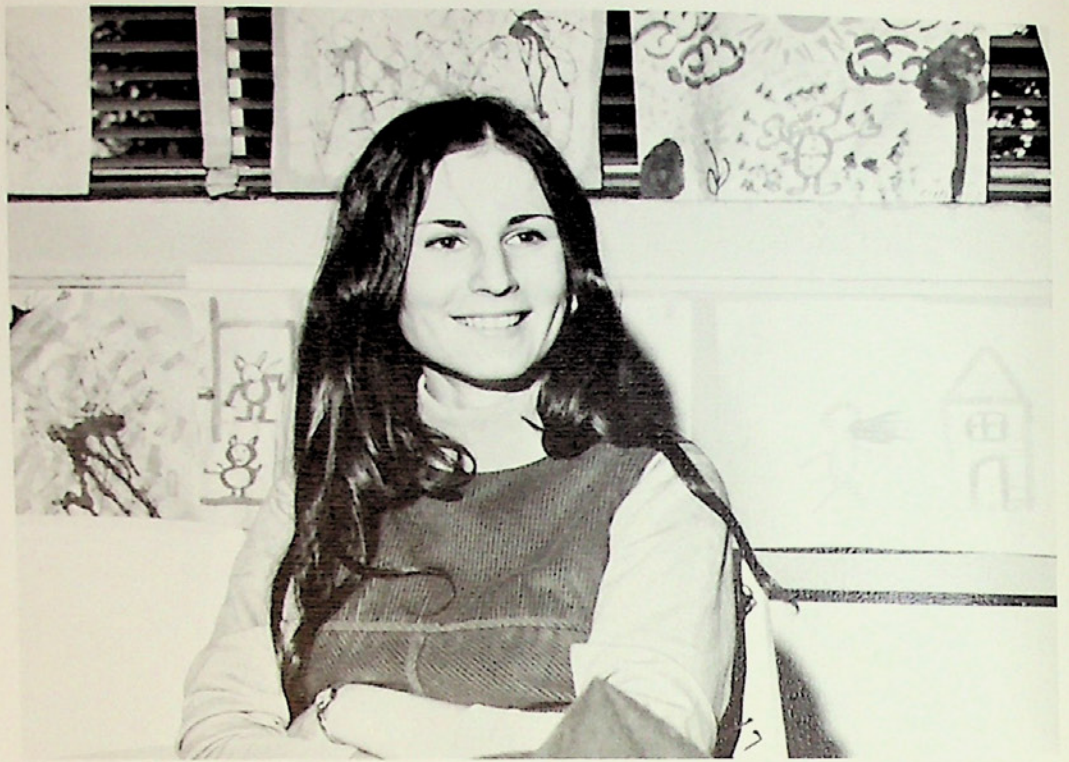
The students of the Practical Arts program were instructed in methods of practical living. The two divisions of Practical Arts were Home Economics and Occupational Education.

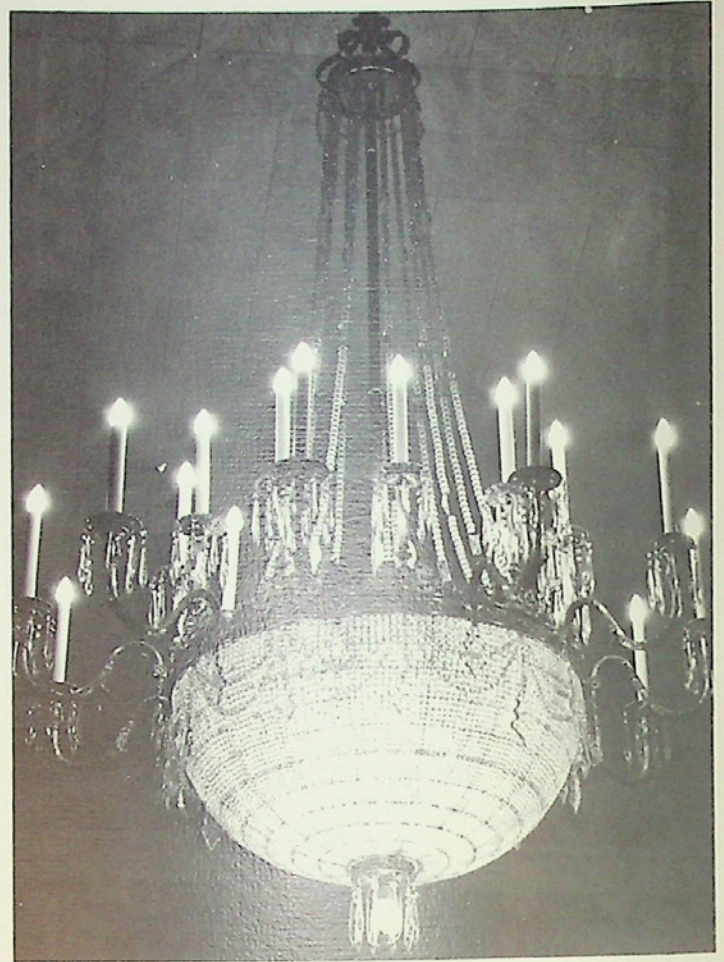
reflections of a wish fulfilled

The 1972-73 school term was a momentous one in the history of education in the city of Bethlehem, for it marked the 50th anniversary of Liberty High School. Originally built on the outskirts of town, LHS now stands near the center of a busy and thriving community of almost 80,000.

The school board of 1918, headed by James N. Muir, decided that their primary goal was to provide every child in the city of Bethlehem with educational opportunities unsurpassed by any other district in the United States. To partially accomplish this, it was decided that a new high school should be constructed, and when Liberty — then known simply as Bethlehem High School — was completed and opened its doors in September of 1922, the community could indeed lay claim to one of the finest high schools in the country.

Of course the passing of time brings change, and by 1966 over 4000 students crowded the halls of Liberty, making it obvious that not only a new high school was needed to drain off some of the student population, but that renovations and expansion were in order for the old school. Six years later, with all work completed, Liberty once again rates as one of the best educational facilities in the nation. Students this year enjoyed such alterations as new labs, modernized kitchens, bright classrooms, remodeled lockers, and a colorful cafeteria, all of which made for a more comfortable and effective learning environment. Extensive revisions resulted in a luxurious auditorium, and an intercom system was installed, allowing important messages to be relayed easily throughout the school.

For the past 50 years, Liberty High School has been of great service to the community. With the new facilities and an enthusiastic administration and faculty, the student body will continue to receive the benefits of secondary education at its best.

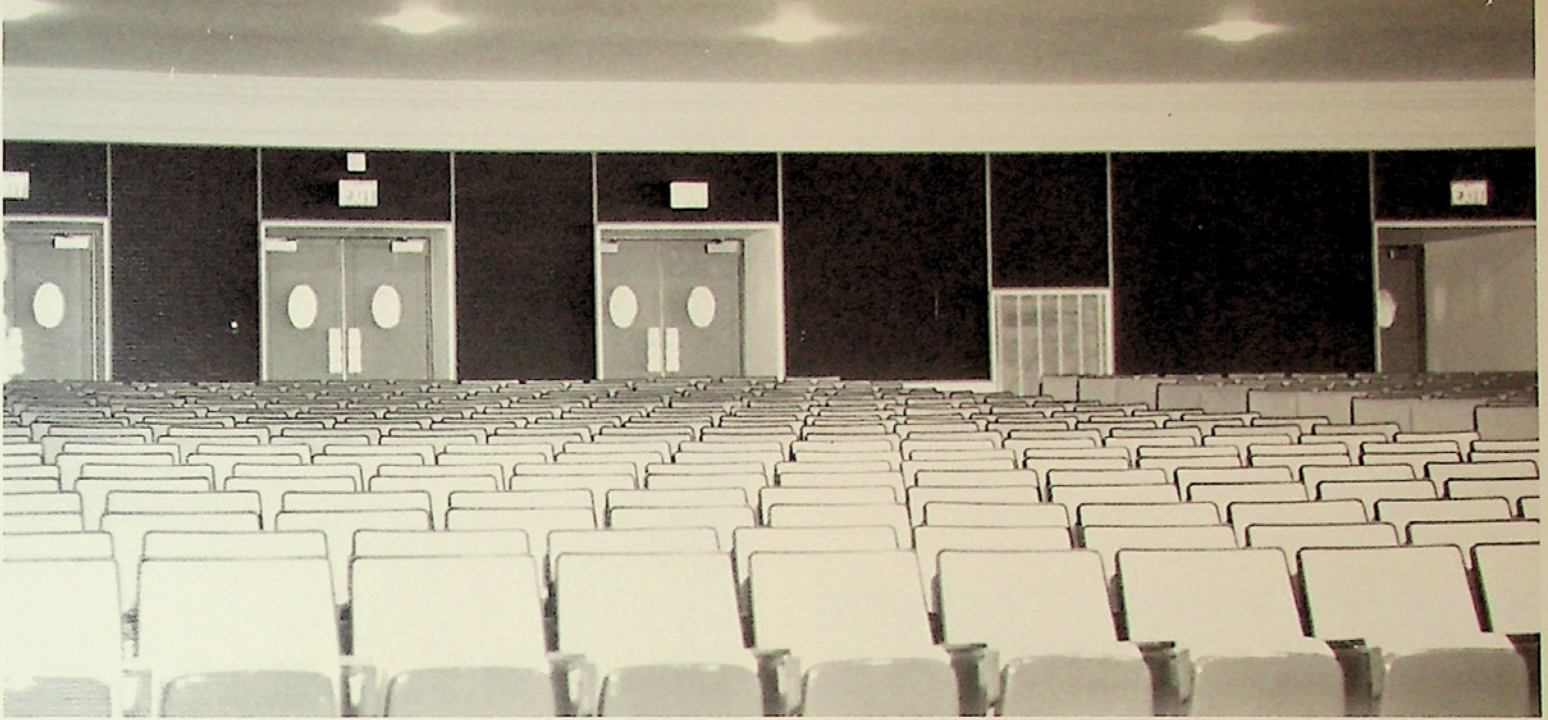

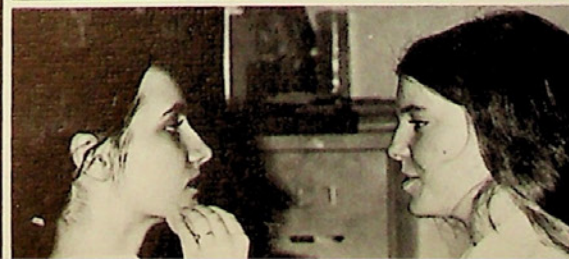
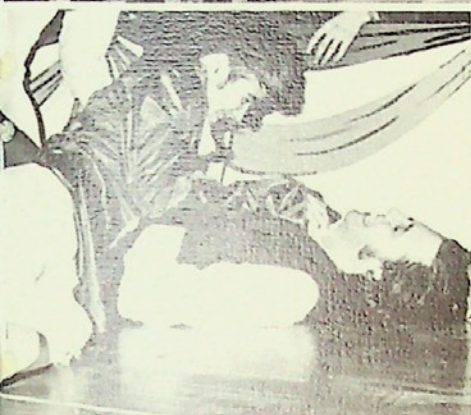
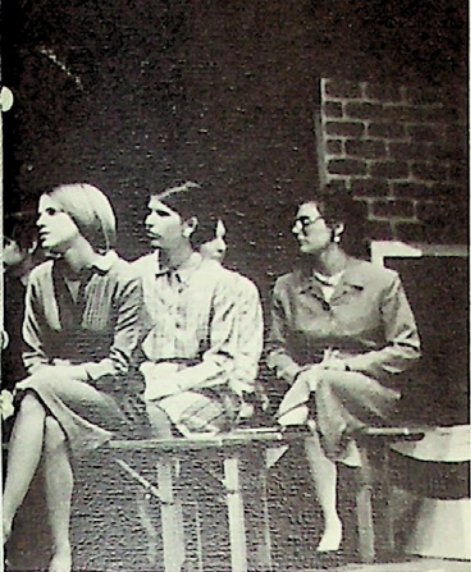
juniors recapture "fabulous 50's"

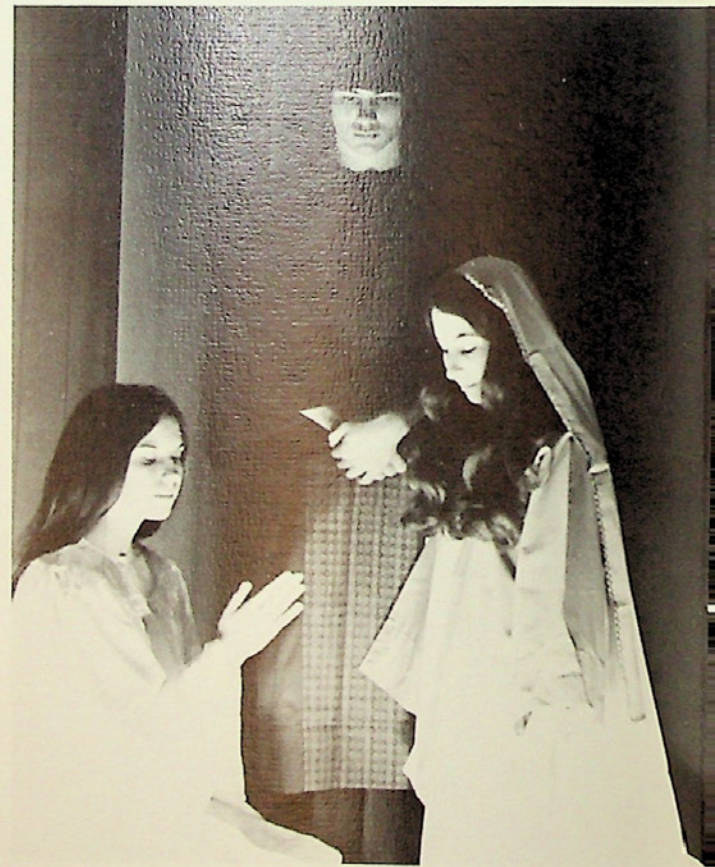
christmas spirit captured magically

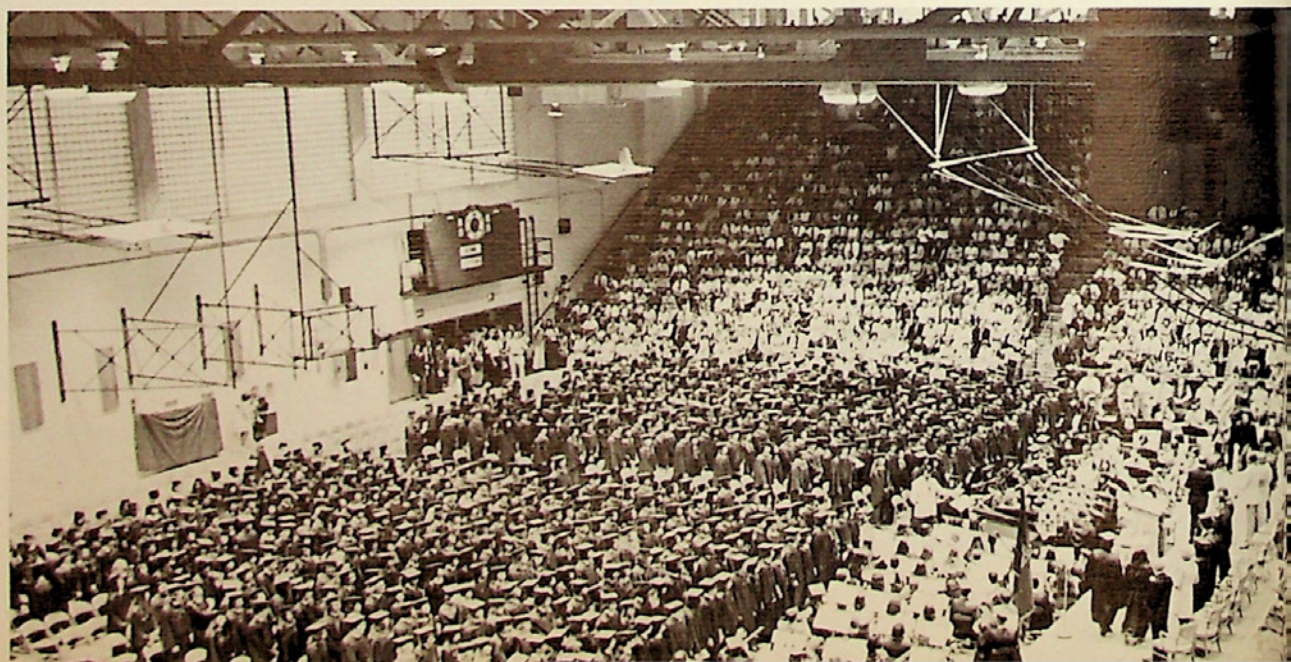

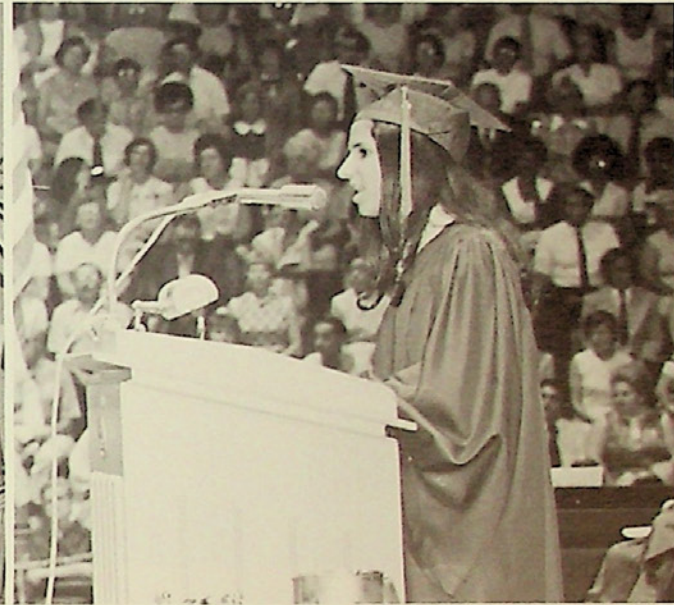
