DESCRIBES AFRICAN SCENE FOR PARENTS

**Pvt. John Molnar Writes Fruits,
Etc., Plentiful, Climate Mild.**

North Africa is described by Pvt. John J. Molnar in a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Molnar, of 117 East Mechanic Street, as a land where dates, figs, oranges and olives are plentiful. In the first letter his family here have had from him in some time the young soldier says the climate of the land

where so many Bethlehem young men now are fighting, the Germans is "mild" and agreeable.

Before going into the Army Pvt. Molnar was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company. He will have been in the service one year on February 3. He was first stationed at Camp Wheeler, Va., moved to Fort Benning, Ja., and thence to Indiantown Gap. After crossing the Atlantic he was at first trained at a base in Scotland.

A brother, Anthony J., is in the armed forces, too, and is at present in Virginia with the Coast Artillery.
