
the school store. The school store is a tradition here at L.H.S. They introduced new items and the latest fashions.

This year the D.E.C.A. Club was successful in encouraging students of different classes to sign up for business related courses.






criteria include: knowledge of literature, science, mathematics, and history, among other areas of study.






Fulfilling Clerical Needs


Math Whizzes Show Their Stuff




Spanish Club Focuses On Culture


The Jazz Zone












The juniors and sophomores now have experience and are looking forward to a promising season next year.







Varsity Grapplers Grow Through Season





Many runners used Indoor Track as a time to train for Spring track and to keep in shape year round. The members of the team were all very competitive and represented Liberty High well at each meet.








