
## D.E.C.A.: Successful Year









guests included Michael Solomon, Campaign Manager, Simonetta for Congress along with the candidate himself and a representative of the Don Ritter office.


PAC provided its members with an outlet to express their political beliefs and learn the views of others.



#### Model U.N.: Students Impose Sanctions





#### Scholastic Scrimmage: Testing Of The Minds





#### German Club: A Germanic Touch


The German Club is one of three foreign language clubs that have traditionally enriched the cultural awareness of the student body at Liberty.

necessary resources within the Liberty Library. They also order material from other libraries within the school district if it cannot be found within our library.






#### Computer Club: Grappling With Megabites

#### Interact Club: Lends A Helping Hand




#### Outing Club: The Outdoor Experience






This year's Vespers had a very special meaning to two key people. Mr. Donald Snider and Mr Glenn Koplin who participated for their last time at Liberty.






## Royal Stewart Jazz: Performing Excellence









## Liberty Theatre: Drama At Its Best


























1) Liberty Theatre Presents Jesus Christ, Superstar.

### LHS—Steeped in Tradition

It is being debated whether the Class of 1987 will break one of the most hallowed traditions at Liberty High School. This year's senior class may hold commencement ceremonies at Stabler Arena instead of on Liberty High School grounds, where every class has held graduation since Liberty was built in 1922.

The proposal was brought before the student government, which was unable to come to a decision as to the place for graduation. Leonard Jago, senior class advisor, sent letters to the students' homes, adressed to the students' parents. Many students would never have thought to read the letters. The first time the students were informed directly was in a student government newsletter passed cut in homeroom last week. Liberty High School is steeped in tradition, and one of its most honored traditions may be forsaken in favor of ample parking.



The underclassmen, too, provided stability at times during the season.





The 1986-87 football season ended with a big victory over crosstown rival Freedom, spoiling Freedom's chance to tie a school record for the most wins in a season.







The natural talent expressed by these young men, along with the great desire they have will ensure an exciting and memorable but work-filled season for these gentlemen next fall.







#### J.V. Soccer: Kicking Towards The Future




Some of the players showed excellent skill and talent






Lance Morabito, a junior, finished second in District XI and placed third in the N.E. Regional tournament.



#### Frosh Wrestling: Working Toward Next Year


This years Liberty High School Freshman Wrestling Team worked quite different than in past years. They competed not really as a team but on a more individual basis. This was due to the lack of membership.



### Varsity Boys Basketball: "The Dream Team"




The team certainly achieved its goal this year. Overall, the team had 17 wins, 11 losses and finished fifth in the EPL. It was a very rewarding season.








## Girls' Swimming: A Rebuilding Year



pressive performances were put in by Jennifer Saraceno, Megan Phillips, Joan Kline, Lynn Kaufman and freshman Rebecca Bergman.





The comraderie encouraged by Coach Janice McKellin has been most effective in strengthening the team. Fre-





### Rifle Team: Undefeated Again




Considerable skill, both mental and physical, is important for success in this activity. Coordination as well as the ability to perform under pressure affect one's opportunity for success in the art of riflery.



### Chess Team: Meeting Mental Demands




