AN AIR SERVICE COMMAND STATION, SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND—Lt. Philip E. Vooz, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip E. Vooz, 715 Fifth Avenue, is now overseas and has participated in a course designed to bridge the gap between training in the states and soldiering in an active theater of war. At one of the Air Service Command Stations known as Control Depots, Lt. Vooz was carefully processed by classification experts who make certain that he was well fitted for the job assigned to him.

Security training, personal hygiene, a talk by a special service officer informing him of facilities for healthful recreation and a lecture by the chaplain are all in turn a part of the soldier's preparation for duties overseas.

His next station will be one from which America's fighting planes take off to smash the Nazi war machine.

Before entering the Army he was employed as a metallurgical observer by the Bethlehem Steel Company.
