Headache to the boys in the front lines throughout the world's battle fields is reading about the folks back home who squawk on "meatless Tuesdays" and "double time for overtime" says Lieutenant Kenneth K. Kennedy, Lehigh '37, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Kennedy, Easton.

Lieut. Kennedy, writing from "somewhere" in the South Pacific area, says, "My only objection to reading magazines is that practically everyone tells about how badly the homefront is being handled. It is just as well to know about it if it is so, but it does not help morale to have it happening.

"To read about people complaining of meatless Tuesdays, etc. doesn't set any to well with our boys who know what it is to subsist for months on Australian 'bully beef', occasionally relieved with canned sardines.

"Also, I haven't heard about any of our boys talking of striking for double time for overtime for a 40-hour week, and I wouldn't mind being quoted to that effect, either."

Lieut. Kennedy has two brothers serving in the U. S. forces, Captain Edward Kennedy, Lafayette '32, and David, who was assistant bandmaster on the USS California when she was bombed in the Pearl Harbor attack. He escaped unhurt.

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
