Joseph Molnar Dies In Action, Parents Told

Another Bethlehemite has been added to those who paid the supreme sacrifice during the scrap on French soil. A telegram recently received from the War Department by Mr. and Mrs. John Molnar, of 1177 Mechanic Street, notified them of the death of their son, Private Joseph Molnar, killed in action on June 9.

He was inducted into the armed forces in February, 1942, and following basic training in camps in this country, he was sent overseas. In one of the major engagements in the African theater, he was wounded, and was awarded the Purple Heart. He subsequently participated in engagements in Tunisia and Sicily, and was sent to England, where he was assigned to one of the units that invaded France on June 6.

He is survived by his parents, two brothers, Private Stephen Molnar, stationed "somewhere in England," Private Anthony, Tenn., and three sisters, Mrs. Joseph Freund, Mrs. Joseph Banish and Mary Molnar, all of Bethlehem.

He graduated from the parochial school of St. John Capistrano's parish; attended Liberty High School, and was a former employe of the Bethlehem Steel Company.
