Colonel E. J. Buckley Mapping Tokyo Assaults in New Role of Assistant Chief Of Staff of Pacific Fleet Marine Force JAN 18 1945

SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC (Delayed) .- Marine Colonel Edmond J. Buckley, of Bethlehem and Ard-more, Pa., has been named assistant chief of staff of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.

In his new post the Pennsylvania Marine officer will have an important part in formulating plans for operations which have Tokio as operations which have their ultimate objective.

Veteran of the Guadalcanal, New Britain and Palau Islands cam-paigns, Colonel Buckley has been a staff officer for four years, earning rapid advancement to higher eche-lons through the display of marked ability in combat.

Only one Marine Corps reserve officer has attained a higher rank than Colonel Buckley. He is Briga-dier General L. W. T. Waller, Jr., commanding general of Marine Garrison Forces, 14th Naval Dis-trict. The General is also a former Philadelphia Main Line suburbanite.

Colonel Buckley was elevated to his present rank in March, 1944, at the conclusion of the Cape Gloucester offensive, during which he served brilliantly. He was recalled to Washington at the same time to take a staff position at Marine Corps Headquarters.

But six months later when his old organization, the First Marine Diviwent into action on Peleliu for sion. its third campaign within two years, Colonel Buckley was on hand helping direct the assault as a member of the staff of Major General Julian C. Smith.

With operations in the Palaus in the mop-up stage in October, Col-onel Buckley returned to Washing-ton to resume his former duties. Later he received his current assignment.

Colonel Buckley began his 18-year career with the Marines as a private, enlisting in 1926 with an organized reserve battalion in Philadelphia. In 1930 he was commissioned a second lieutenant. He was with the same unit when it was called into active service Nov. 7, 1940. 1942.
