Bednarchek enlisted in the Marines September 12, 1940, took his "boot training" at Parris Island, S. C., was sent to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba from December 21, 1940 to April 17, 1941, then to New River, N. C., thence to an embarkation point on the West Coast and ship-ped to the South Pacific. There he met and fought the Japs and, as he said. "had everything in the book said, "had everything in the book thrown at him."
