Lt. Vooz Safe, Liberated By U. S. Tank Men

MAY 21 1945

Long months of anxiety over the safety of their son ended this morning when Mr. and Mrs. Philip E. Vooz, 705 Fifth Avenue, received word from their son Lieut. Philip E. Vooz, Jr., informing them that he had been liberated from a German prison camp and hoped to follow the letter home.

"I was never so happy in my life as when on April 29 American tanks rolled into Moosburg and freed us from the prison camp," Lieutenant Vooz wrote his parents.

Lieutenant Vooz was reported missing over Germany on May 29 of last year. For months nothing was heard from him. Then on New Year's Eve he wrote a letter that he had been taken prisoner and was held at a camp at Saagen in Germany. This was the last the family had heard from him.

Lieut. Vooz, after graduation from the Selman Air Field, Louisiana, December 4, 1943, arrived in England, May 12.

He was graduated from Fountain Hill High School and attended the University of Virginia and Muhlenberg College, being a sophomore student at the latter university before enlisting in the air corps. He was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity.
