Raymond F. Huston, Musician 2/C, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank R. Huston, 1353 Easton Avenue, is spending a 30-day leave with his parents. Musician Huston served aboard the USS Yorktown for 29 months in the Pacific.

The Yorktown, from which 25 per cent of the action scenes in the motion picture "The Fighting Lady" were taken, has quite an illustrious record, her anti-aircraft gunners having established an excellent record for shooting down enemy planes during day and night attack, and her own air groups having been successful in all of their offensive operations.

M2/C Huston has seen action at Marcus and Wake islands, Gilberts, Marshalls, Hollandia, Truk, Mariannas, Philippines, South China Sea, Okinawa and off the shores of

Japan. He wears the American Theater Ribbon, the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with 10 battle participation stars, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one star and the Good Conduct Ribbon.

The battle veteran will report to the Navy School of Music in Washington, D. C., for reassignment, upon completion of his leave. He graduated from Liberty High School in 1939 and attended music school in Brooklyn, N. Y., before entering the service in October 1942. Before being assigned to the Yorktown, Huston completed his boot training at Sampson, N. Y.
