Boscola announces funds for 2 projects

ctober 24, 2016 -State Sen. Lisa Boscola announced two state grants totaling \$344,121 for projects in Bethlehem and Heller-

"These funds help our communities advance recreational development and infrastructure improvement projects," Boscola said. "I will continue to seek state resources that help fund and expedite local proj-

Approved by the Commonwealth Financing Agency Board in Harrisburg, the projects are:

• \$264,121 to restore a half-mile tributary of the East Branch of the Saucon Creek along Applebutter Road in Bethlehem. The funds will be used to realign sections of the stream bed, repair culverts, remove debris from the stream and install streambank armaments along several sections of the stream to prevent erosion. They will also be installing stilling basins to reduce flow velocity and grade control structures to re-establish the stream cross section and connection to the floodplain. The total project cost is \$350,000; and

More snow, longer winter season likely

ccuWeather is reporting that the upcoming winter season may produce more snow and ice than last year, and extend further into the spring.

"Last year, this area had about 36 inches. This year should be a little bit more than that, around 40 inches," AccuWeather senior meteorologist Paul Pastelok said in regard to the upcoming season's snow measurements.

While last year's winter was defined by one very heavy snow-storm, 2016-17 will most likely experience a greater number of snow events that stretch the season into April. Usually, November and December experience low snowfall in this area, and that is likely to hold true this season.

The Old Farmer's Almanac predicts "winter will be slightly warmer than normal, with near-normal precipitation and above-normal

While snow accumulation will be limited in areas south of New York City, Pastelok warns January and February may experience more snowfall that could transition to rain and sleet. The Almanac agreed that this season's snowiest periods will take place in late January and early to mid-February, though they also claim that mid-November could see plenty of snowfall. These conditions could prove especially difficult for commuters.

The problem I have with snowfall this year is ice," Pastelok said. "I think February may have more of a mix of ice and snow.

AccuWeather is predicting that temperatures will average 3 to 5 degrees Fahrenheit lower than last year, though that would place temperatures within a more normal

Coldwise, I think it's going to be colder than last year, but more typical for the season," Pastelok said.

Ninth no-tax-hike budget in a row

When Hanover Township supervisors met Oct. 25, a brightly lit firetruck was parked nearby. There were no emergencies, but a volunteer firefighter was running tests on the township's new 100-foot ladder truck. "We just put it into service last night," he beamed. That truck came with a \$1.2 million price tag. Hanover Township

just wrote a check. There was no line of credit or bond with accompanying debt service. In fact, the township has been debt-free for over a year.

Manager Jay Finnigan has an aversion to borrowing. He does something virtually unheard of in local government. He saves. He refuses to spend money until he actually has it. He also plans ahead for capital projects.

Once the meeting got underway, few were surprised when Treasurer Beth Bucko announced that there will be no spending plan next year, based on an \$8.4 million general fund budget will keep taxes at the same level they've been for the previous eight years. at 3.9 mills, which includes a 0.5 mill fire tax. the community center. Chairman John N. Diacogiannis believes the township is in good financial shape because of work done over the past 15 years. He acknowledged that supervisors had concerns when Manager Jay Finnigan first proposed a 0.5 mill fire tax and establishing capital reserve funds, but it worked out very well. "We planned ahead, John," Steve Salvesen.

Finnigan said carving out the fire tax in 2006 has really paid off. Not only could the township afford a \$1.2 million ladder truck, but it will be able to purchase an ambulance next year without borrowing. Avoiding finance costs and debt payments is what leads to a stable budget, he said.

Northampton County, Executive John Brown has been following this approach in his past two budgets for capital projects like the purchase of the centralized human services building and a bridge-bundling project. But Northampton County's debt is still over \$100 million.


