He is one of four sons of Mr and

George Peter Knecht, having had Army ex-perience, but having received an honorable discharge from army ser-vice. Of the three brothers in ser-vice. Elwood is stationed in Ger-many; Raymond is stationed in the Pacific theater of operations and Robert is in action in the European theater of operations.
