Lt. Nagy has been enjoying a 30day leave of absence from duty with the staff of Commander Transport Division 41, on board ship in the South Pacific. He has been on duty at sea for over 22 months, during which time he participated in the original assault amphibious landings against Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands, Kwajalein in the Marshall Islands, Anguar in the Palau Island group, Hollandia and Aitape in New Guinea, Leyte and Luzon in the Philippines, and Okinawa in the Ryukus Islands. Between assault operations, the command to which he was attached was engaged in reenforcement and support operations on recently acquired territories. During the landings on Lingayen Gulf in Luzon, the flagship on board which he was stationed was hit and considerably damaged by a Japanese suicide plane.

Among his other duties on board ship, Lt. Nagy is assistant division beachmaster, signal officer, staff photographer and public relations officer and division officer in charge of the enlisted personnel attached to the staff. Upon expiration of his leave, he will report to San Francisco for air transportation to return to his ship. AUG 29 1945
