dr. bost seeks greater teacher responsibility

The position of Superintendent of Bethlehem Area Schools consists of varied obligations. The Superintendent must work closely with the principals and the school board, carefully supervise the expenditure of public funds, and continually seek for improvements of the curriculum.

Dr. William A. Bost, the Bethlehem Superintendent of schools, performs all of these duties and more. This school year was Dr. Bost's second in the Bethlehem Area Schools. Having worked in a number of places, he is a most knowledgeable and competent man.

His first year was devoted to restoring faith and confidence in our system. "Confidence was lost during traumatic years," Dr. Bost pointed out. He spent several months getting acquainted with the area and helping the teachers, board, and people heal the wounds. The work of his second year was guided toward putting into practice his philosophy of a school system. "I believe very deeply that individual schools, individual principals and staffs need just as much responsibility as possible. You can think of the system as an inverted triangle with the teachers at the top narrowing down to the superintendent. The principals and teachers then have more responsibility and accountability for what occurs in the school."

Another objective of the year was to pursue the development of the elementary open space schools which he thinks "are a better way of students and teachers living together."

The completion date for the Liberty complex was scheduled for July. The completed campus includes the Commons Building, Laboratory Center, Classroom Center, and the Memorial Gym, connected by modern walkways, halls, and overpasses. "It ought to be one of the finest high schools in the United States and it can be with the aid of the students and teachers."

Reading, health care, and the instruction of non-English-speaking students were among the many services offered to the pupils of Liberty High School. A speed reading course was also available to students who wished to increase their reading ability.



This was a general shop course which primarily involved working with leather and wood. However, the students were also permitted to work in other areas. Vocational and Technical students of the area attended Bethlehem Area Vocational-Technical School. 

majorettes master synchronized marching










The Orchestra performs in the gym before a capacity crowd.




glee clubs present vespers, musicale



art gallery club views area art exhibitions








"bach to bacharach" theme of mermaids








season filled with mixed emotions






liberty cheerleaders capture honors







harriers finish 5-5, ruth and stewart pace squad














wrestlers finish 7-6







tankers hold their own despite small team








Assistant Coach Bill Rapp, Team Captain Jamie Hunsicker, and Coach Garramone review schedule planned for the Whitehall Meet.





Senior members of the team were: Greg Egbert, Thomas Whilden, Ronald Richards, Frank Brensinger and Mike MacMurtrie.




speed and desire lead batsmen to epl title






thinclads finish 5-3; mile relay decisive









junior class presents broadway's "harvey"






musical of 60's success with class of 1972


Much talent is displayed by the seniors in their acting. As was evident by the song and dance routines, the cast put a great deal of time, cooperation, and effort into the play.































homecoming receives enthusiastic response







At Ralph's suggestion, the graduates switched their tassels making them alumni of LHS.

The orchestra, with herald trumpets, played the "Triumphal March" from Aida as the graduates took their places.




































