The death of Pal Milton I. Clymer, Quakertonian, in the Japanese Ho Ten prison camp in the Asiatic area was caused by an intestinal ailment, according to information received by his father, James Clymer, 47 South Main Street, Quakertown, from the American Red Cross.

Death of the Quakertown soldier had previously been reported but not until the Red Cross supplied information as to the cause did the family know how Pvt. Clymer died in the prison camp.

One of the first inductees from Quakertown, Clymer attended the Quakertown High School and later worked in a clothing factory.
