**Bethlehem GI
Hurt In Holland,
Now In England**

A U. S. ARMY GENERAL HOSPITAL, England—Smashing an enemy position in a skirmish near Eindhoven, Pvt. Steve J. Myer, 25, of 317 East Fifth Street, Bethlehem, Pa., a paratrooper, was wounded in the leg by a rifle bullet. He is recovering in this United States Army General Hospital in England.

"Pvt. Myer is making normal progress and will soon return to duty," said his ward surgeon, Capt. Louis Licciardi, of New York City.

Pvt. Myer, an intelligence scout, landed in Holland. After five days of hard fighting he was wounded while attacking a Nazi position.

"The Battalion medic dressed my wound, and carried me to an aid-station," Pvt. Myer related. "They took me to an air strip and I was flown to England."

Pvt. Myer took part in the invasion of Normandy for which he wears a Presidential Citation. He has two brothers in the service, Joseph, a soldier in England, and Harry, a Marine. His mother, Mrs. Rose Myer, resides at the Bethlehem address. Before entering the Army he was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company in Bethlehem. He has been a paratrooper for three years.
