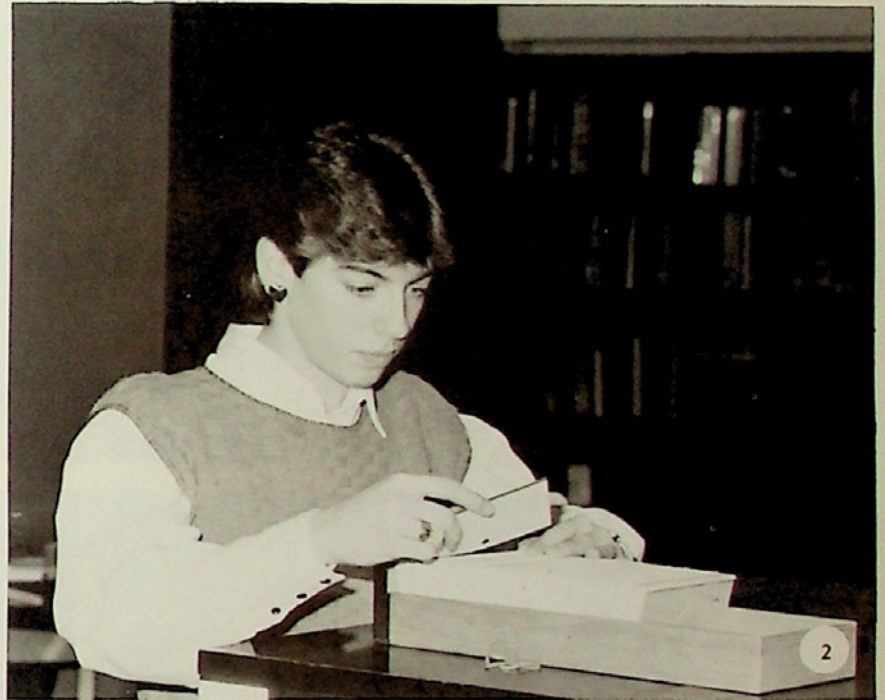




## Service With A Smile

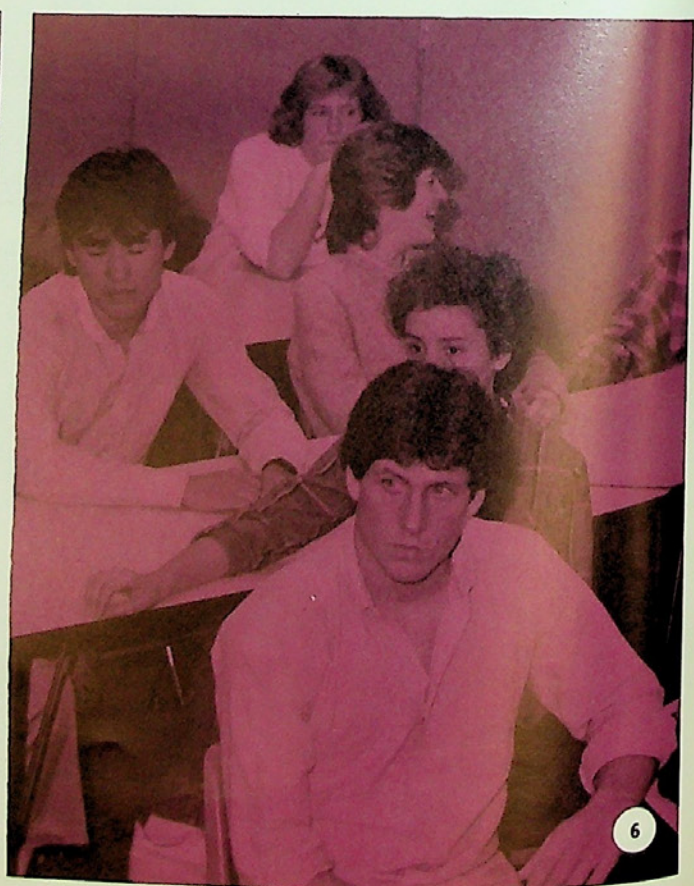

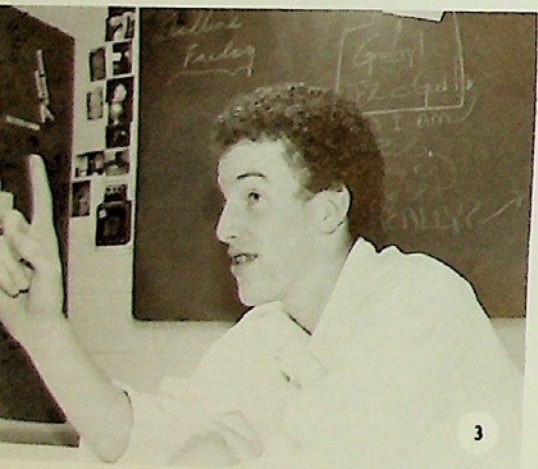

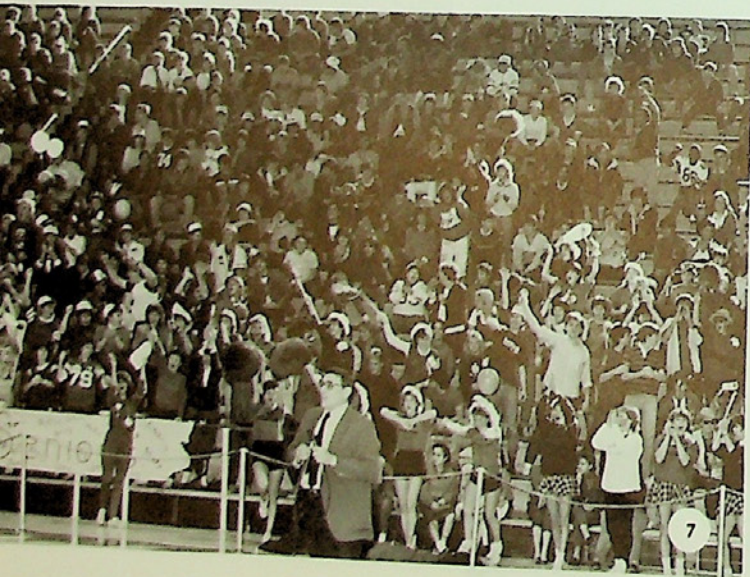

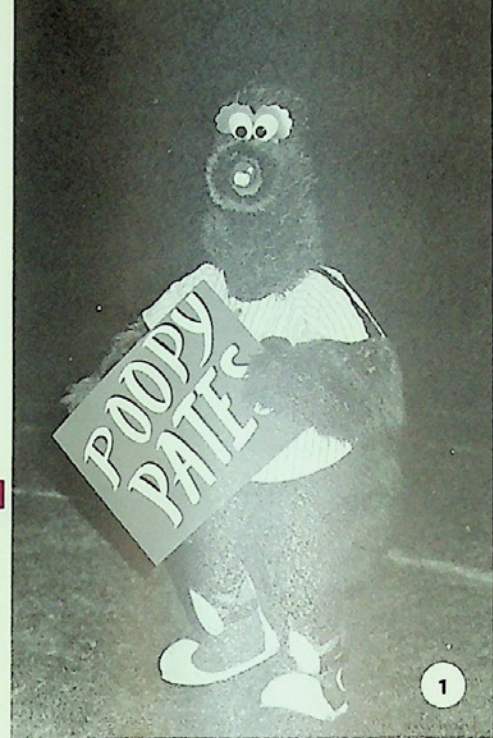
## LHS Spirit Undampened By The Weather

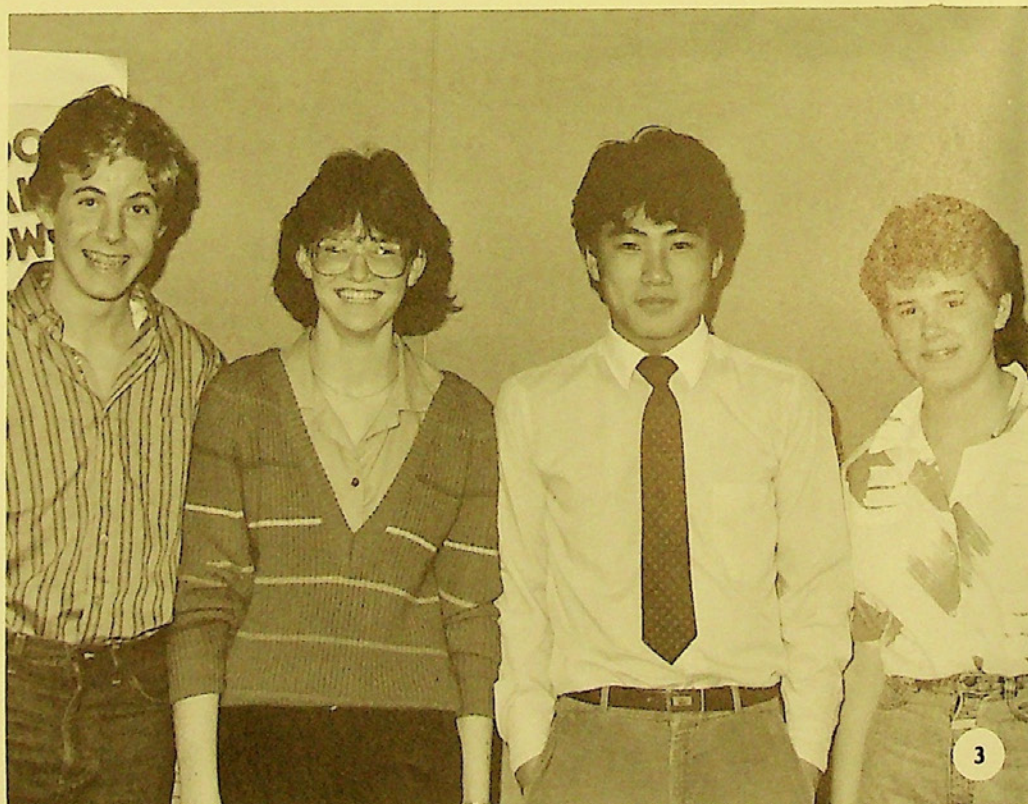
## Bonjour, Mon Amies!

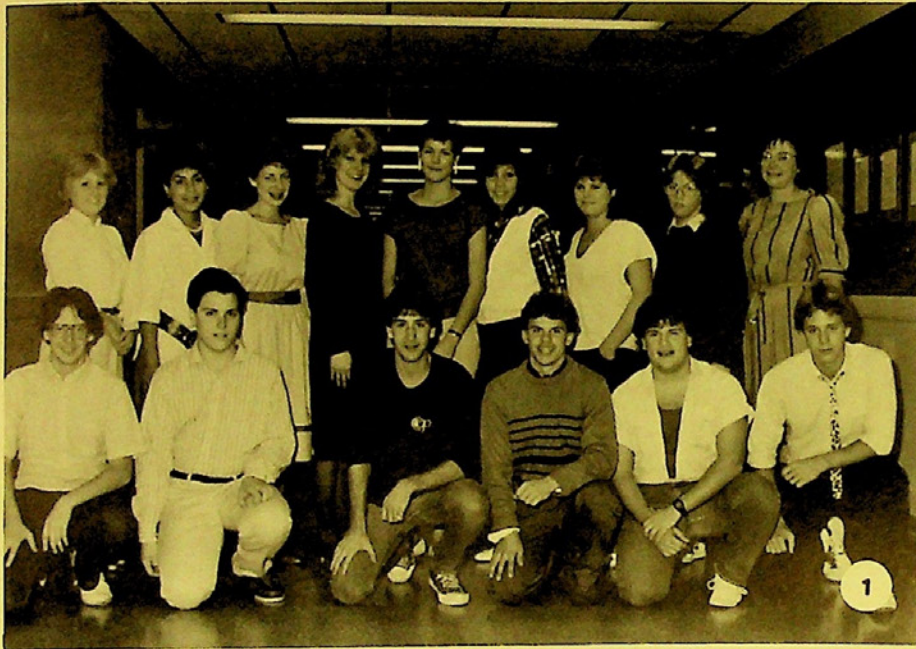


# Business Is Their Middle Name

The Liberty High School Mathematics Team, coached by Miss Doris Helms, is chosen on the basis of its members outstanding written tryouts to represent the school in contests sponsored by various area colleges. The team practiced throughout the year in order to develop speed, accuracy, versatility and reasoning ability in problem solving. The record of the Liberty High School Mathematics Team is unparalleled in a many-county area. The team won more events than all other high schools in the Eastern Pennsylvania region combined. In the Muhlenburg College

competition held annually for the past eight years, Liberty has won the contest every year. In the past ten years that the East Stroudsburg contest has been held, Liberty has won seven times. The Lehigh University contest has been held for five years. Of the six awards given each year, Liberty has won half or more of all awards. 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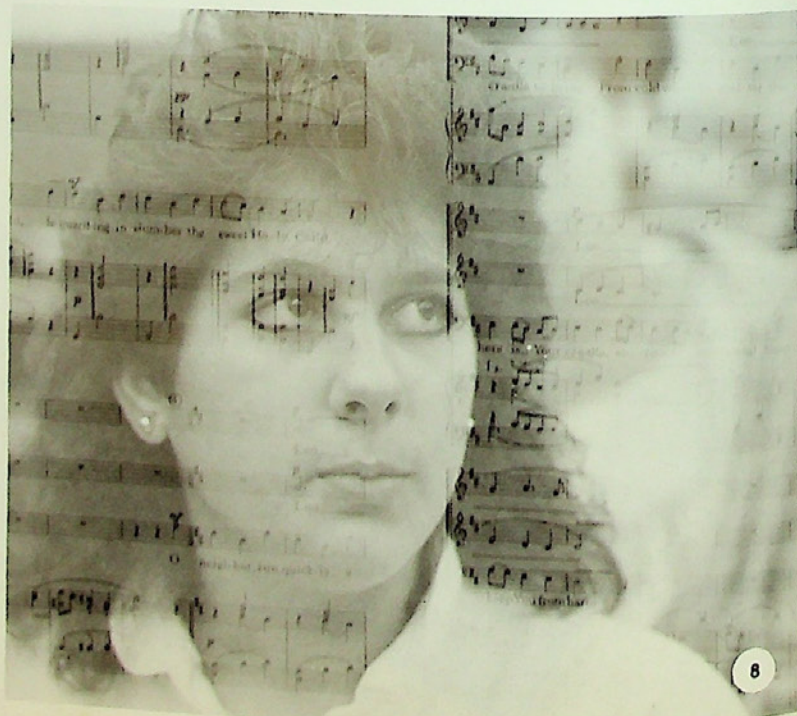


## Young Voices Develop Vocal Talent

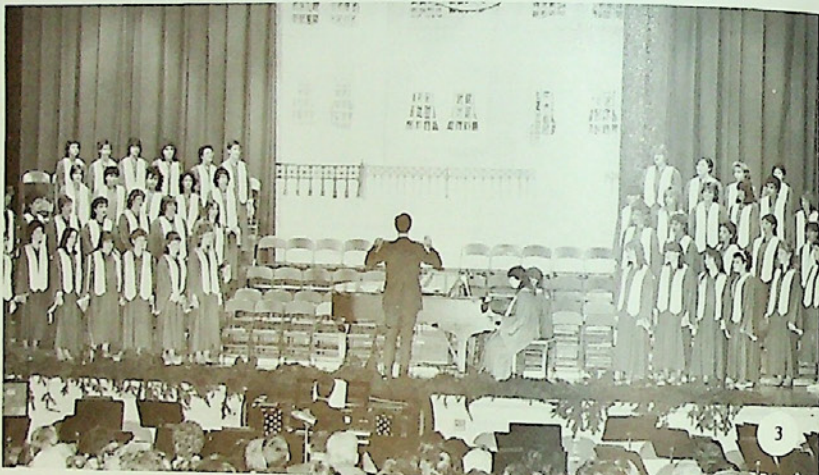
# Musicians Herald The Holiday Season

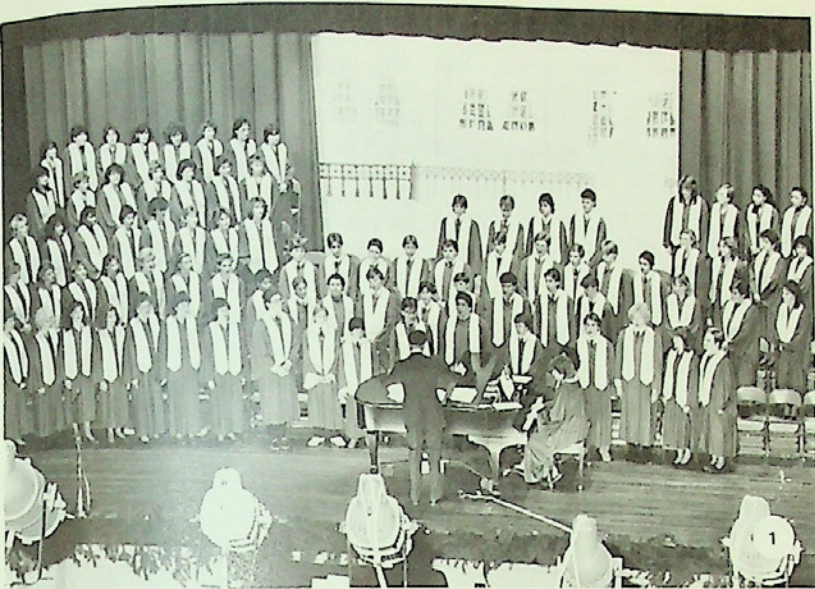
men. The orchestra performed the "Christmas Festival" during the offering and combined with the vocal groups for "Christmas Tonight" which included a series of popular

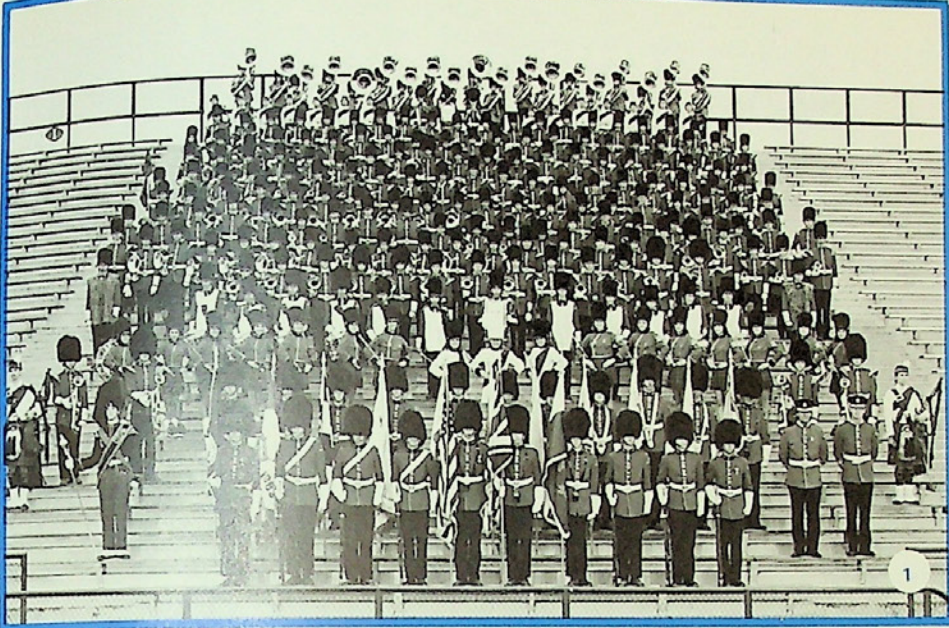

## Practice Leads To Pride In Performance

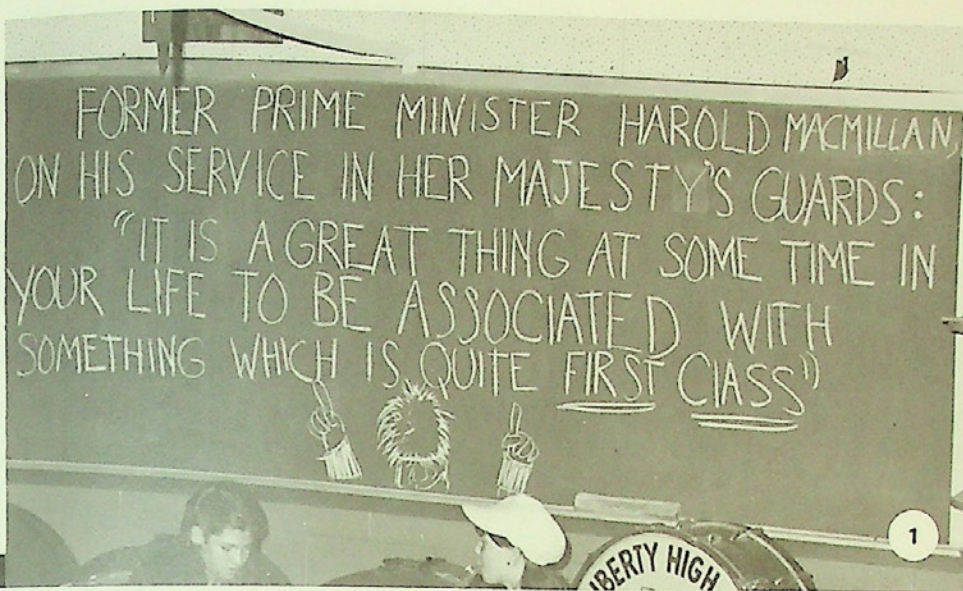

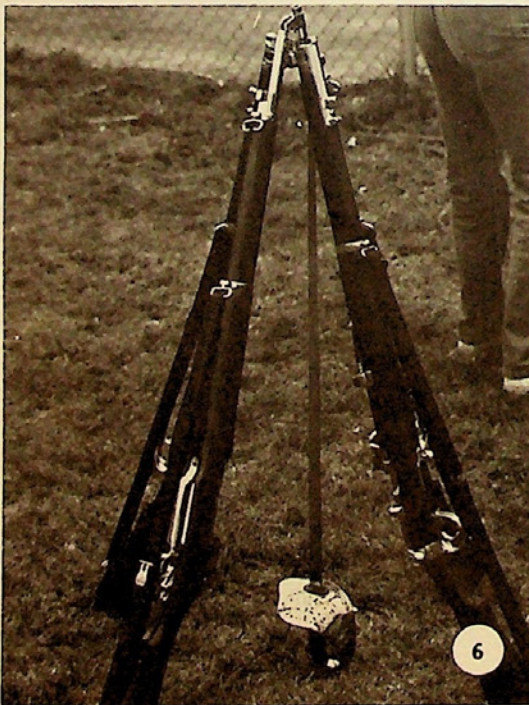
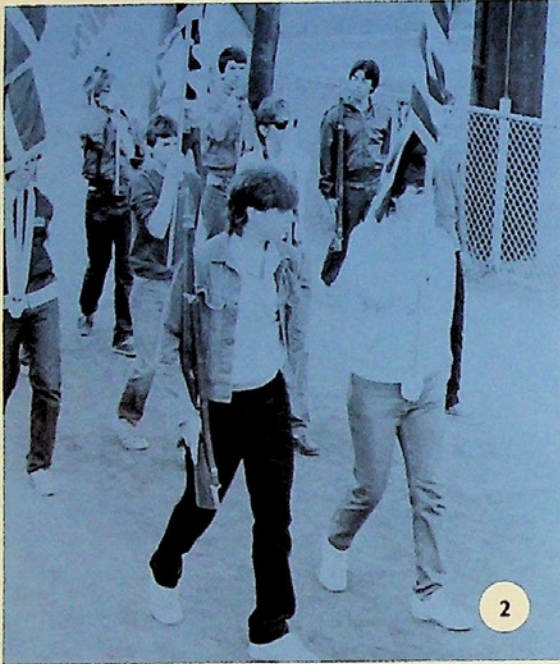


## Personification Of A Tradition

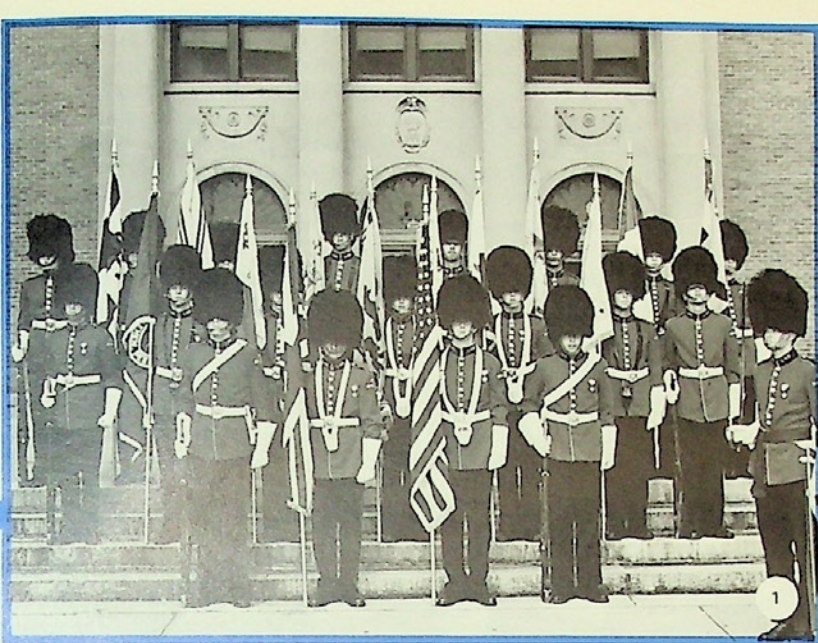

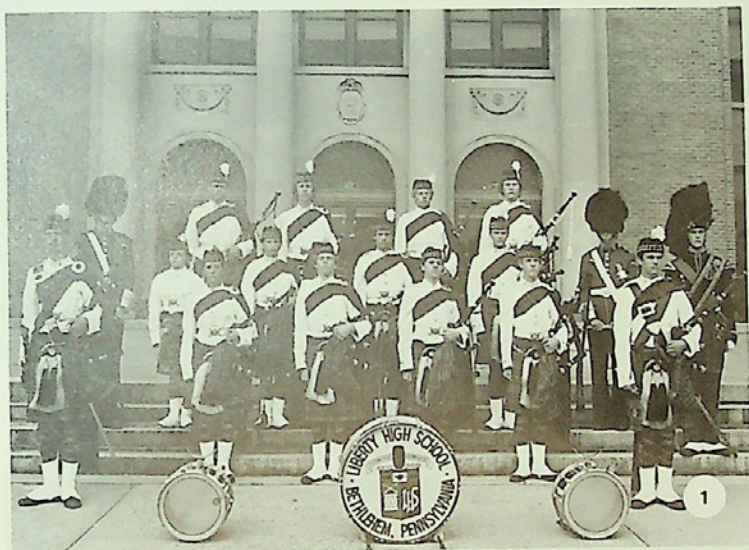
# Tunes Of The Scottish Capture Culture

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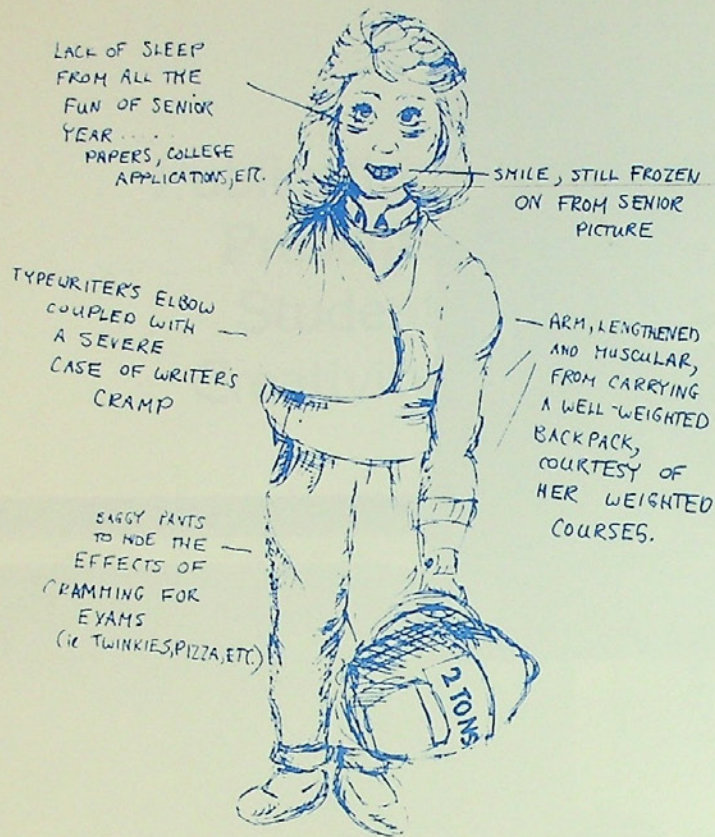

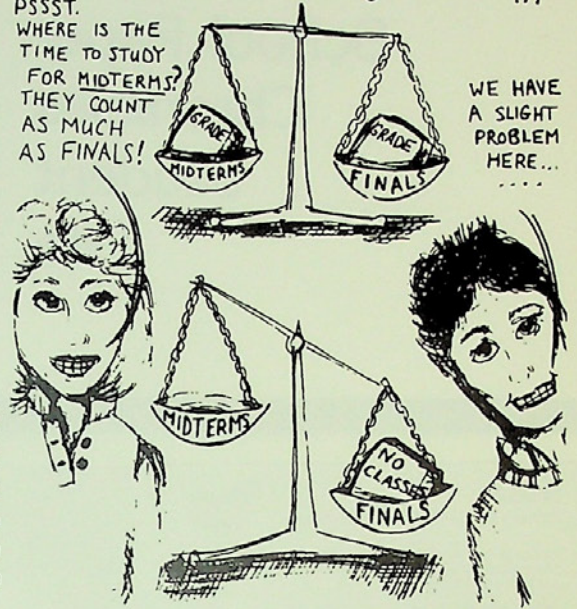
which allows them better preparation time

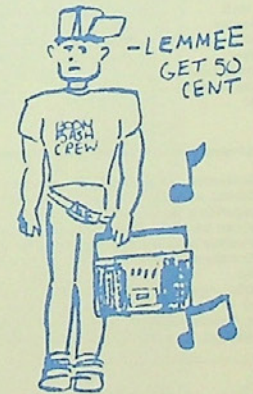
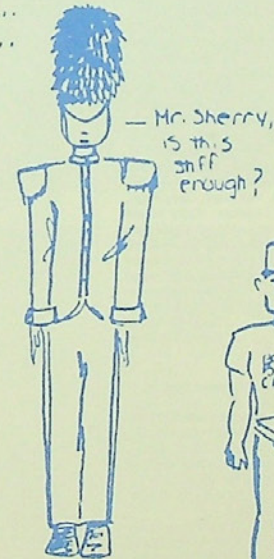
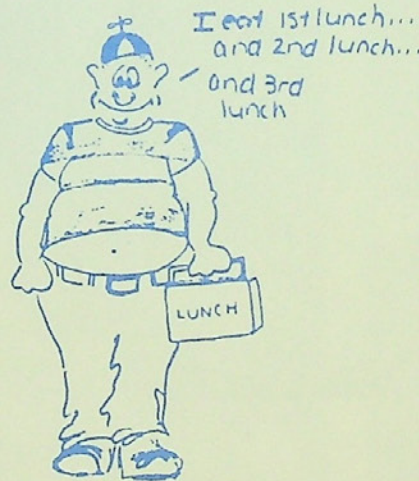

Creon arrives with news that the murderer of Laius must be found. Although Jocasta, the wife of Oedipus, knows the truth, she conceals the information from her husband. When a messenger reveals that Oedipus is the son of Laius and Jocasta, Jocasta hangs herself and Oedipus blinds himself so he will remain alive but suffer in accordance with the fate of a tragic hero.

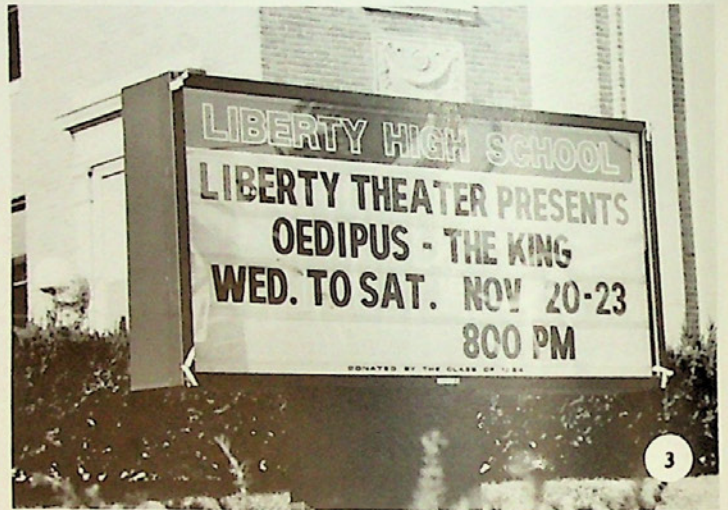


# Unique Approach To Thespian Arts

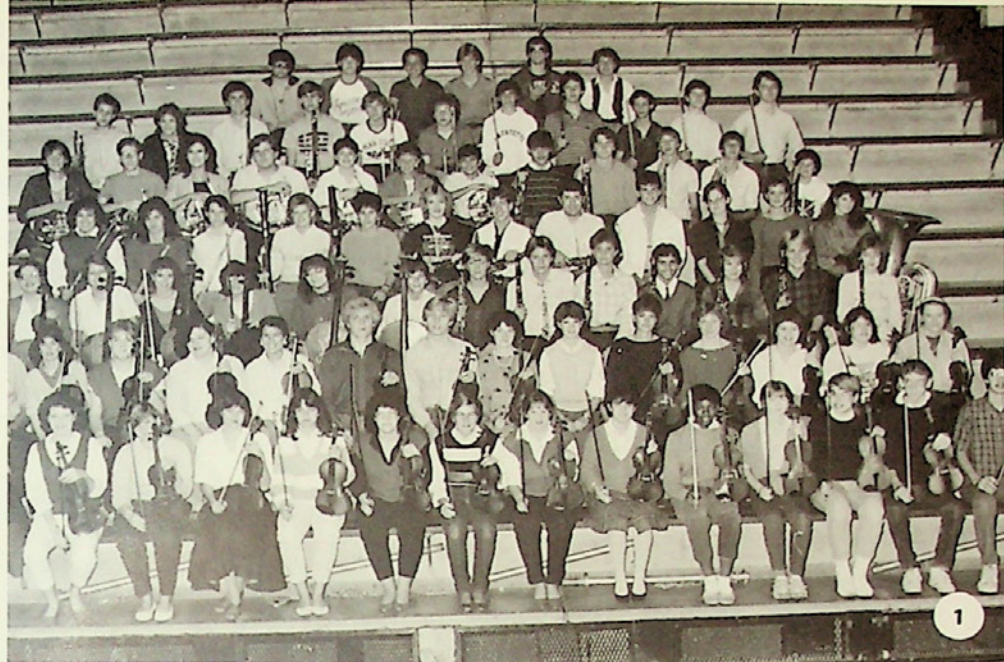
The orchestra members enthusiastically looked forward to the spring and their annual Pops Concert which has become a very pop-

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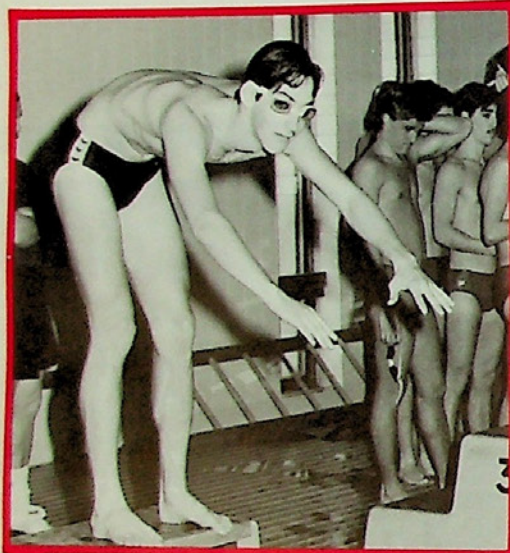

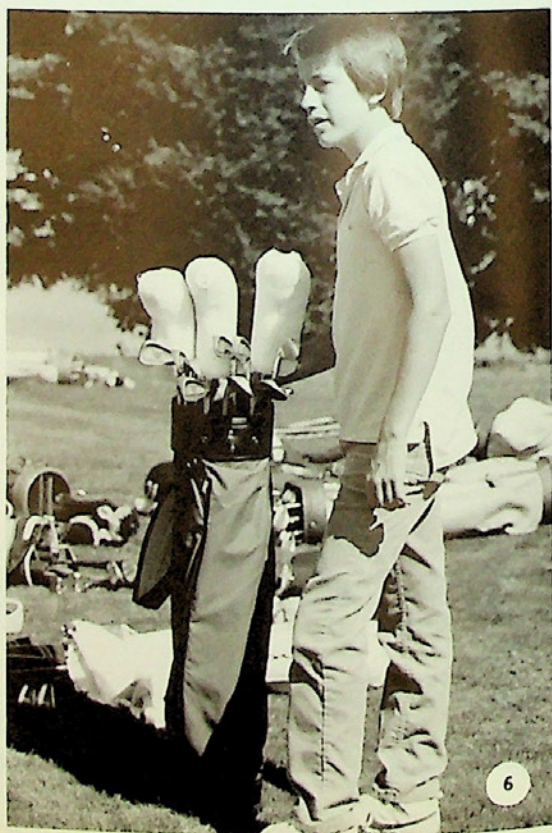
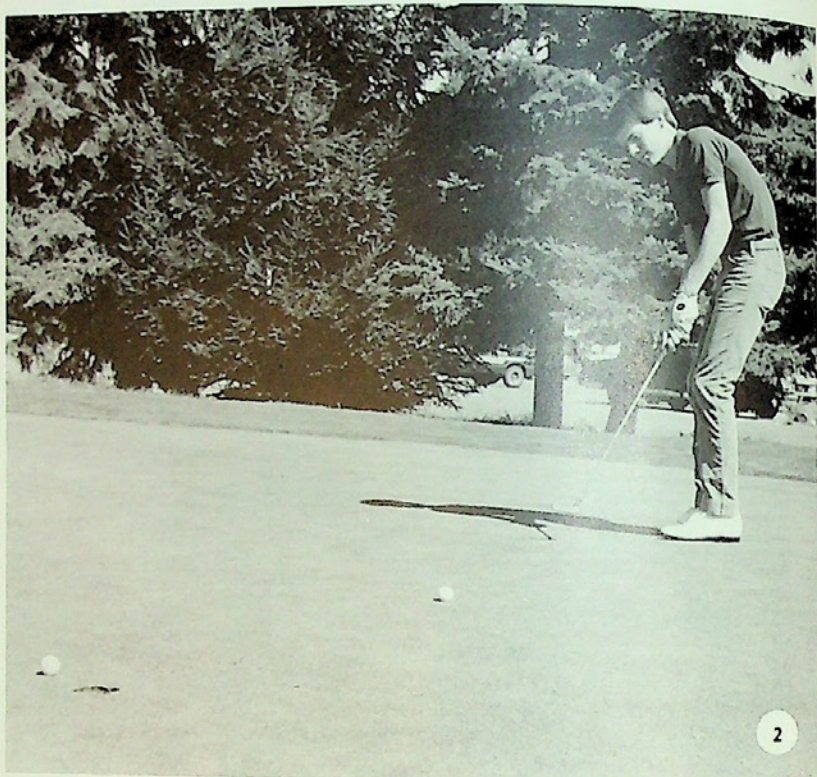
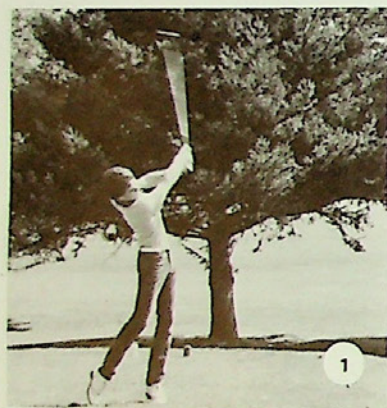
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# Youth Tackles The Fairways

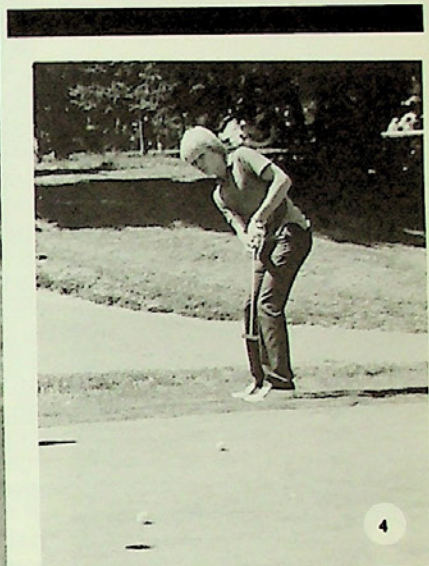

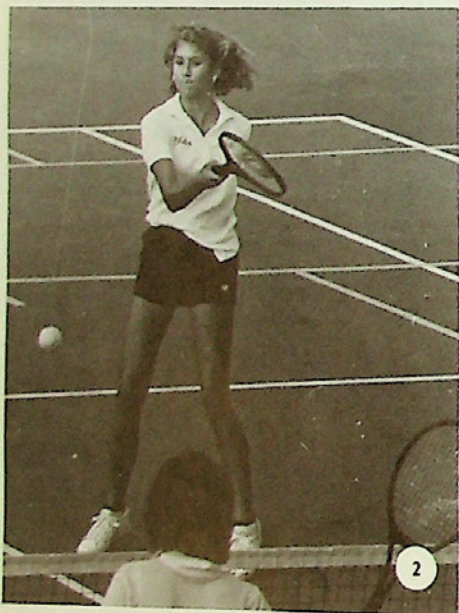
# Individuals Capture The Spotlight

Coach Loupos is looking forward to next year and the return of many top players. While praising the performance of the entire team, he noted Rij, a freshman, achieved a 9-2 record.



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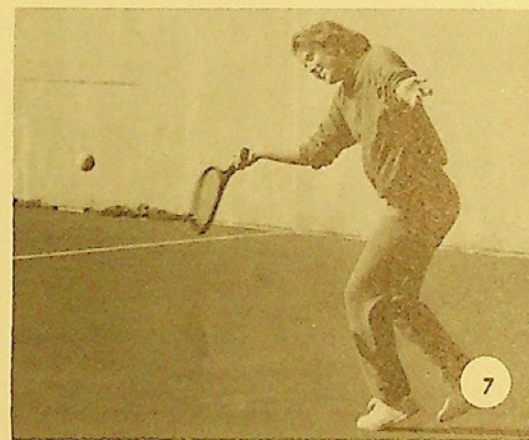
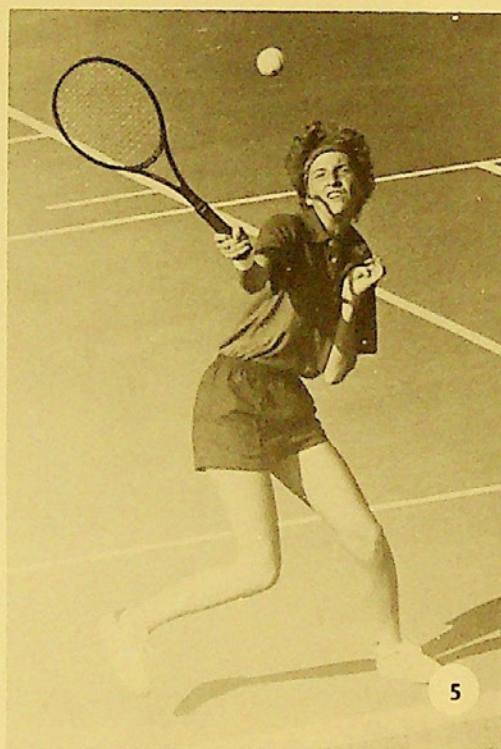

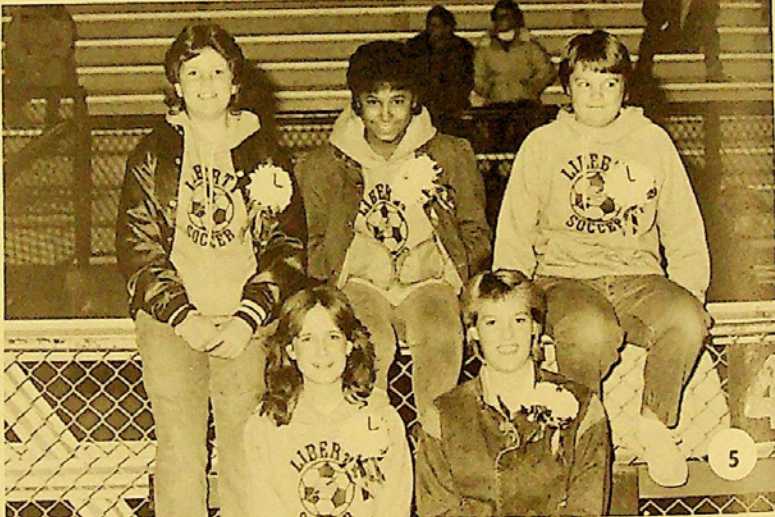


# Booters Pressure The Elite And Finish Strong

Coach Bounassi and Coach Ruth are both anxiously looking forward to next fall's cross-country season. Their expectations are high for the talented and experienced underclassmen.

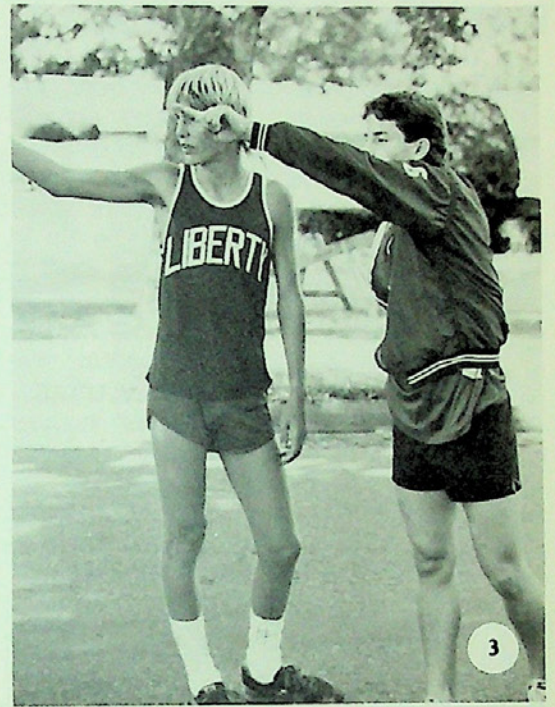

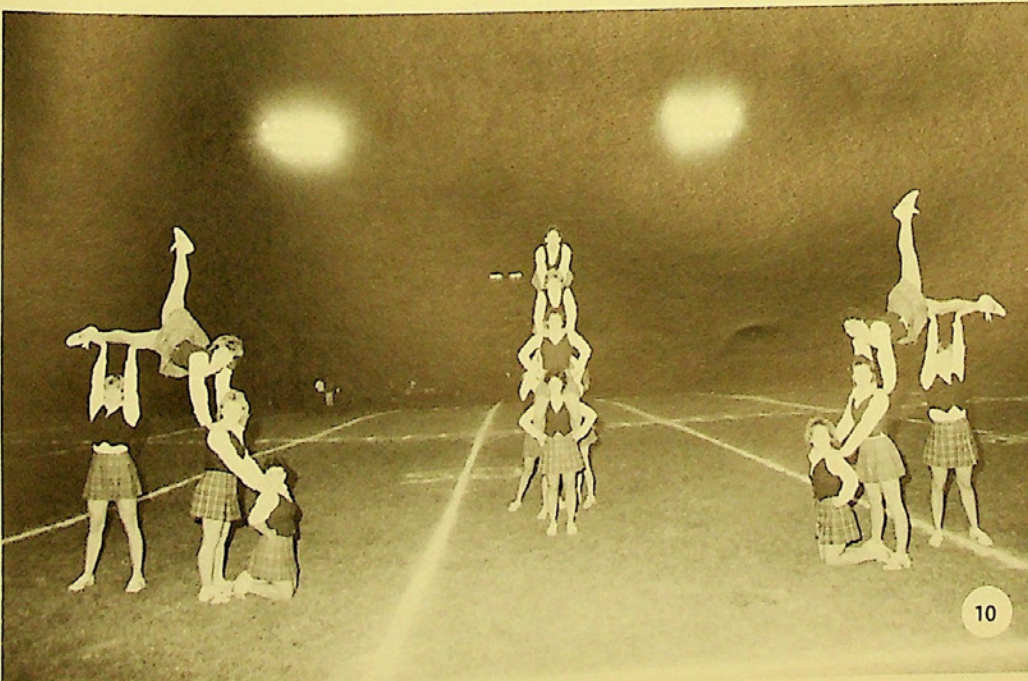


# Cheerleaders Excel In Competition

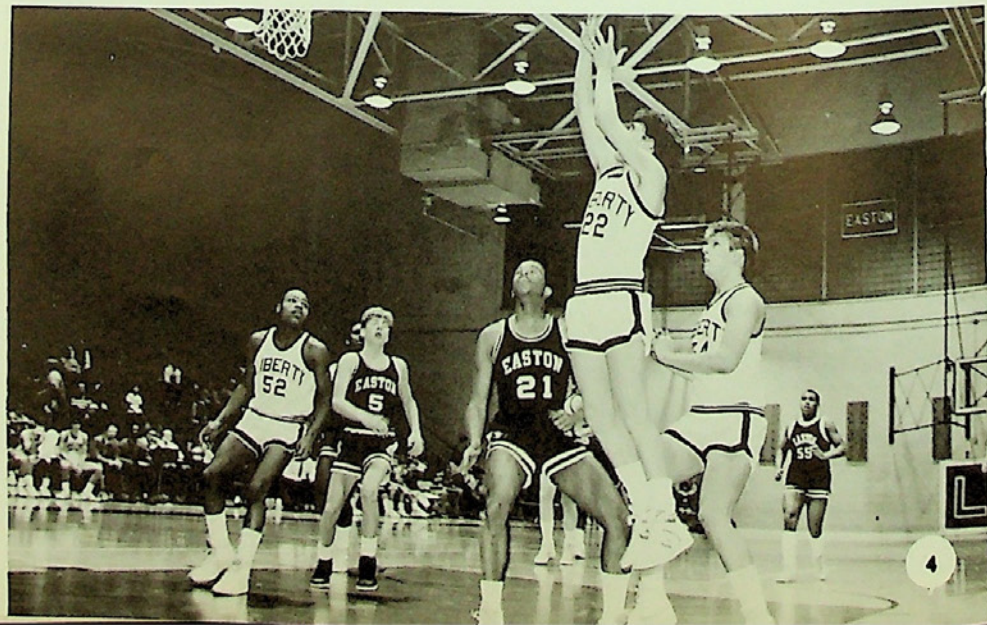


# JV Score Second Half Improvement

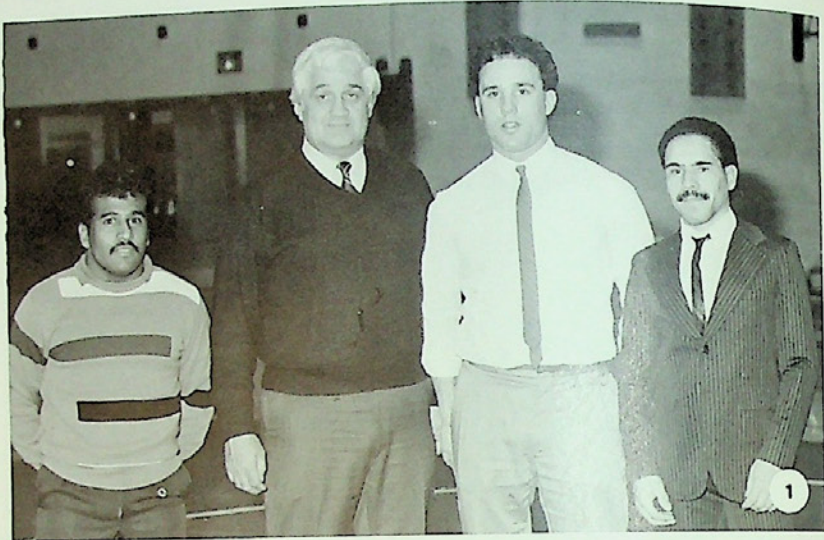
# Team Pins Down Championship

# Extensive Practice Pays Off

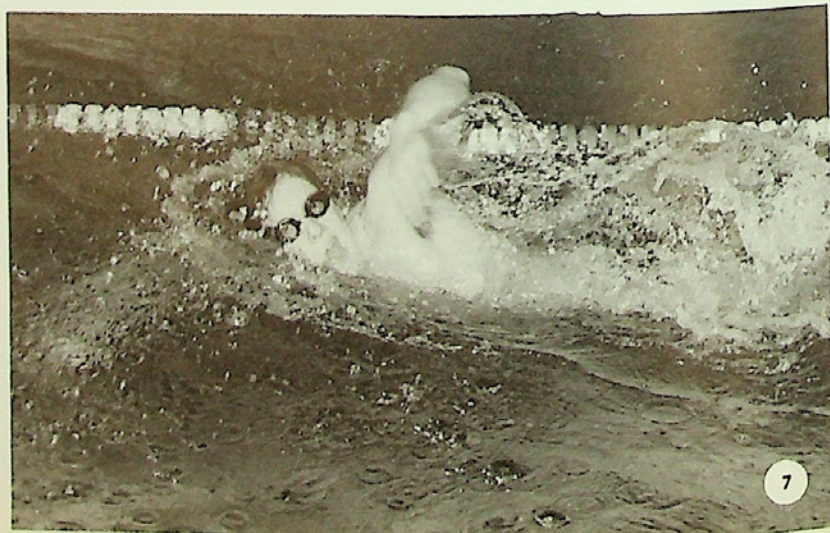

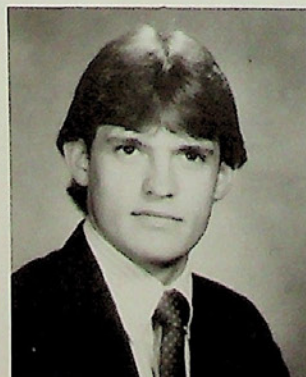
### Freshmen At Liberty?

whether it be the child in all of us or the child of age, which offers hope only to see it fade as the child becomes an adult.

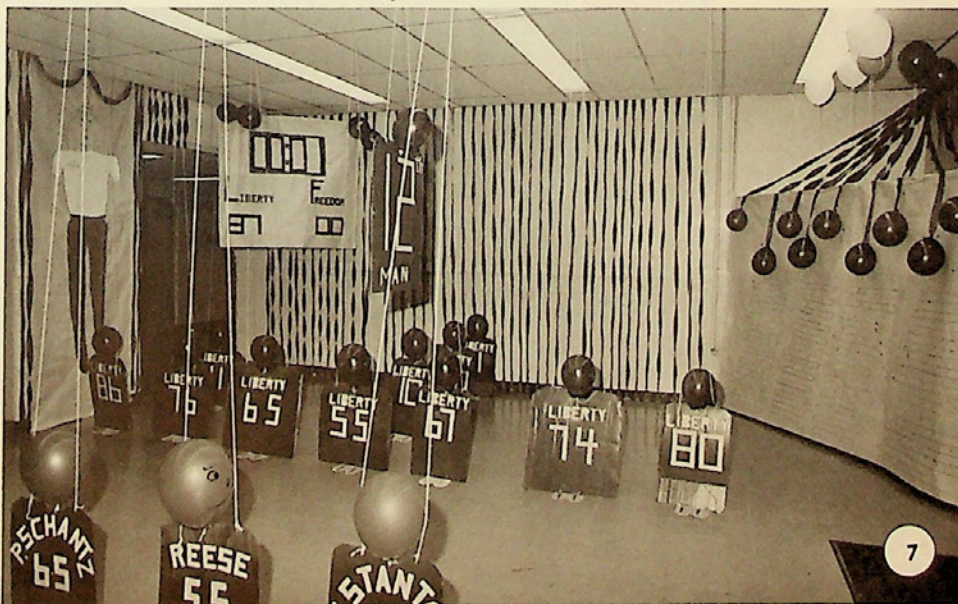
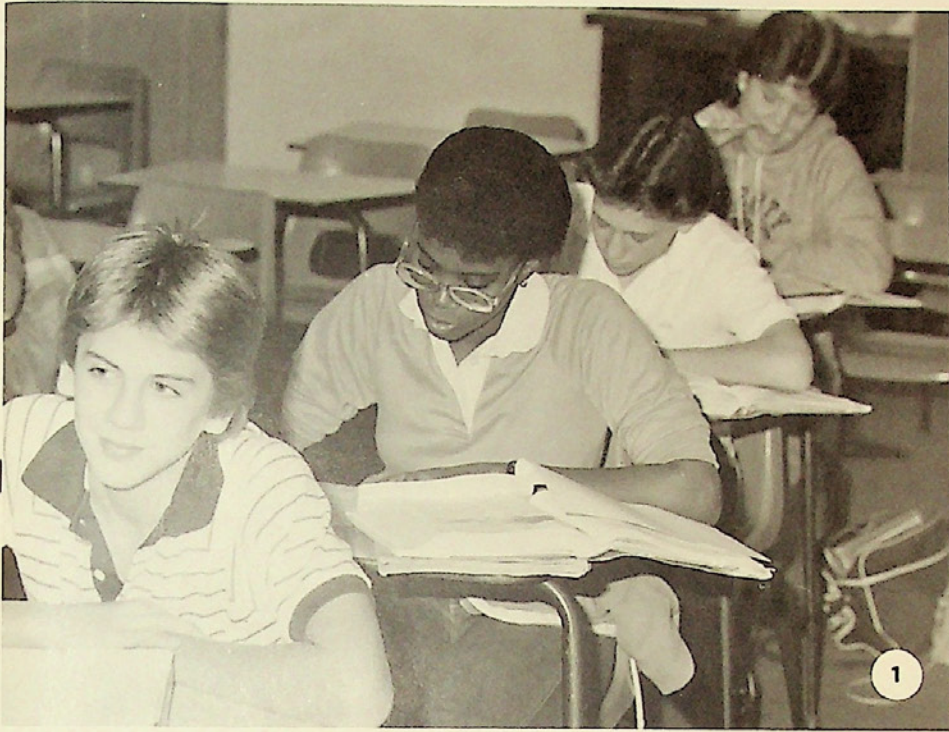

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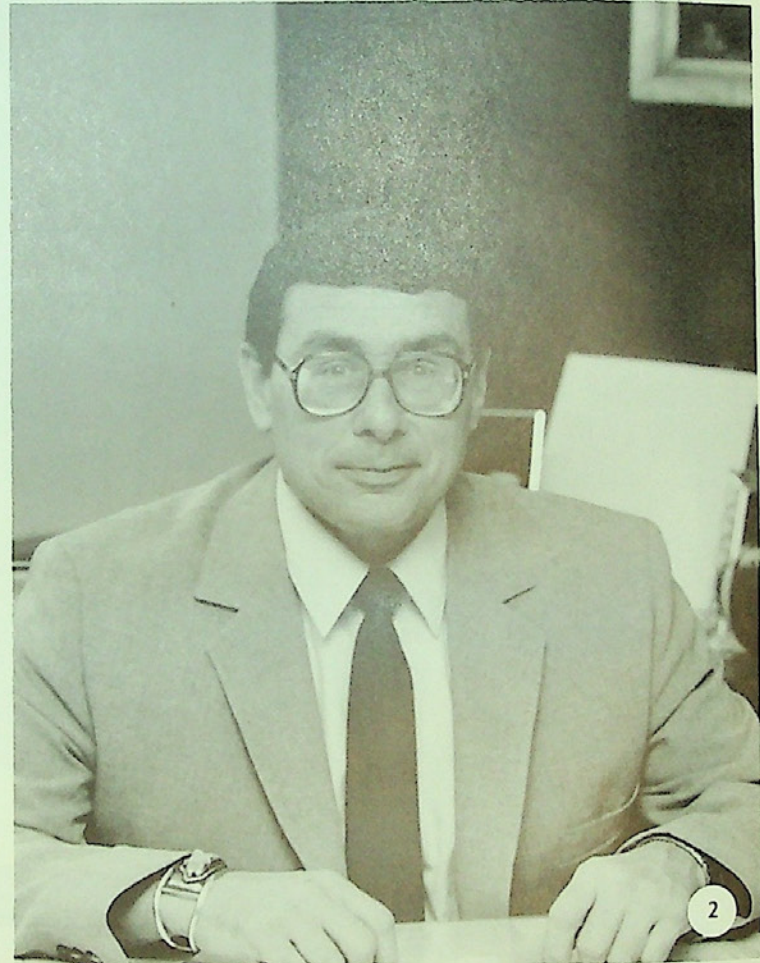


## Doluisio: Blockbuster Three Years

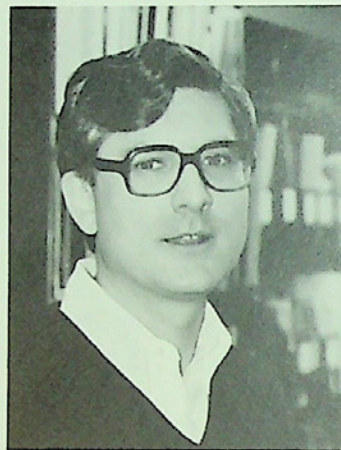


# Guidance And Nurses

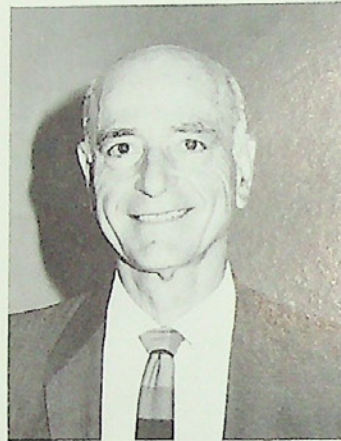


# Social Studies Department

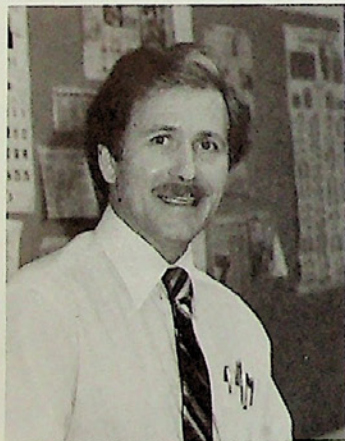

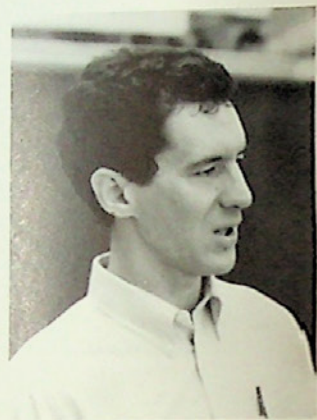


# Science Department

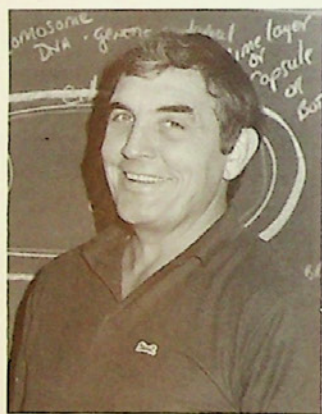

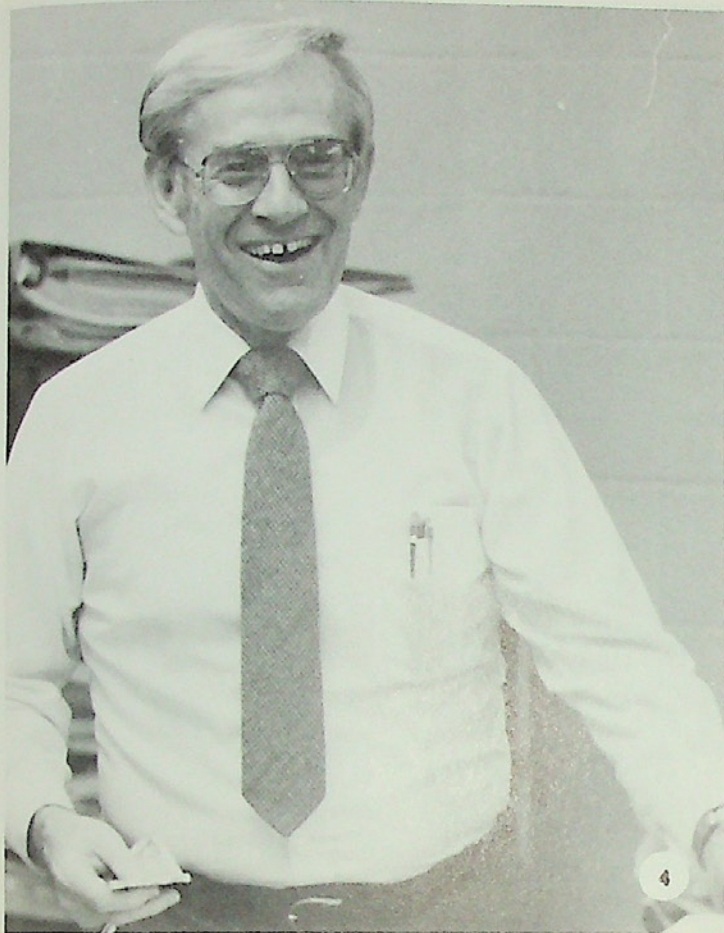


## Business Department

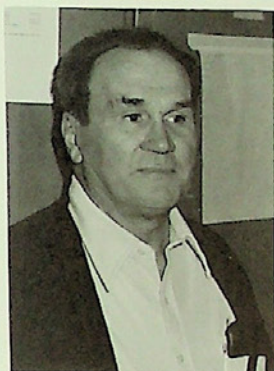




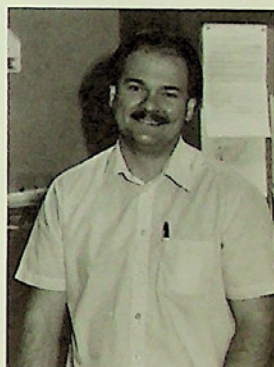
# Practical Arts Department

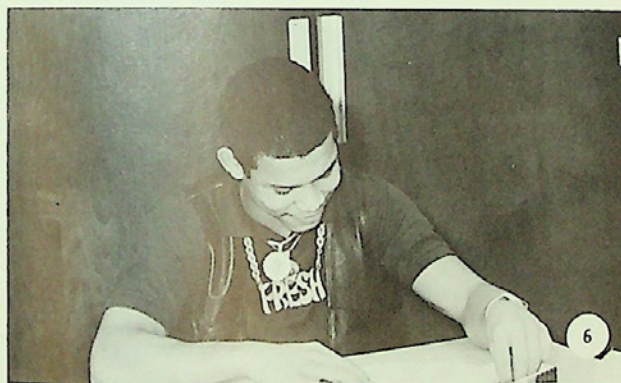
