


Orchestra provides music for community






Skiers soar down slopes of Vermont




Mermaids present theme of "Grease"





Foreign exchange students welcomed










Diligence trademark of library club


Key Club teaches members citizenship



Hoop Girls, Pep Club encourage enthusiasm










Opening of patio highlights achievement of student association



1973-74 school term sees beginning of new mathematics club





The Stage Crew spent many long hours after school and evenings working on the sets. They also made sure that the backstage and equipment were in working order at all times.










Senior class initiates "Football Festival"









Juniors, seniors dance in the moonlight











Bruising ground game keys gridders' success










Intramural programs attract hundreds

Zavacky chosen new head basketball coach




Hurricane matmen finish with 8-5-1 log




















Edwards' no-hitter highlights baseball season










Volleyball team enjoys successful season

Girls' softball ends winning season





Young tennis team compiles 7-2 mark



Other members of the unbeaten squad included Charlie Knauss, Dylan Spadt, Curt Hoyak, Tom McGorry, and Ray Spangler.







After a highly successful first year of operation during the 1972-73 school year, the Humanities program was expanded this past term to include an even greater number of students. Further expansion of the course, which correlates American history and literature on the junior level, is anticipated for next Fall. Mr. C. Barry Lutz, English Department chairman, was especially pleased with the results and expressed a desire to initiate a similar program on the sophomore and senior levels.





A wide range of electives was available to students last year, including courses in art, music, and English. These courses were designed to supplement the students' schedules and to provide for personal enrichment.




Sciences examine natural phenomena


Personal satisfaction key to Industrial Arts


1974 class officers promote school enthusiasm
