S-Sgt. W. Henry Hurt Delivering 'Stars and Stripes'

THE 135TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, England—Dropping copies of the Paris edition of the Stars and Stripes to his men in the fox-holes they occupied in Belgium during a lull in the fighting, Staff Sergeant Walter M. Henry, 26, of Holland, Pa., leader of an infantry reconnaissance squad, was wounded when a couple of shells landed his way just as he reached the last fox-hole. He is now recovering at this United

States Army general hospital in England, where he has been awarded the Purple Heart.

"Sgt. Henry is making rapid progress and is now participating in a rehabilitation program, after which he will be ready to return to duty," said his war surgeon, Captain Lyon Steine, of New York City, New York.

Before he entered the Army, in 1941, Sgt. Henry was assistant secretary of the Seabar Company, Philadelphia, Pa. He attended Lehigh University. His wife, Mrs. Barbara Henry, lives on Heckewelder Street, Bethlehem, Pa. Three of his brothers are also in the service. They are Sergeant Roland Henry, with the Signal Corps in England; Sergeant George Henry, serving

with the Air Force at Adams Field, Arkansas, and Corporal S. Allan Henry, with the Air Force in India.

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
