Almeida, of Allentown, who as an AAF captain was killed in a plane crash in the Far Eastern theatre of war early in 1942. Commissioned at Randolph Field, Texas, in 1940, he was promoted to the grade of first lieutenant the fol-lowing year, advanced to a captain's rank in May, 1942, and in January.
