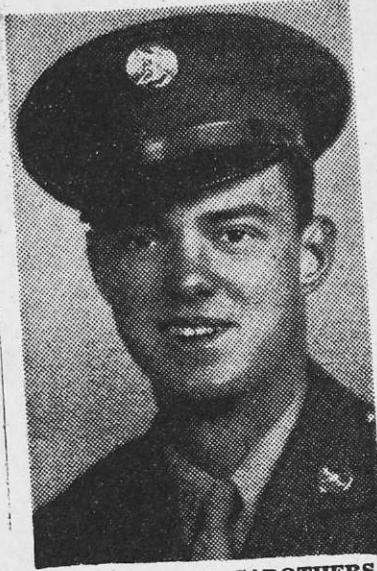

Pfc. Carothers Dies In Action In Belgium

Mr. and Mrs. Harry O. Jones of 428 High Street, received word from their daughter, Mrs. Richard S. McKinley Jr., of Wayne, that her son and their grandson, Pfc. James M. Carothers, had been killed December 21 while fighting with the 30th Division in the vicinity of Stavelot, Belgium.

The young man was previously reported missing in a telegram received by his mother last Saturday and Tuesday a second War Department message reported him killed.

Pfc. Carothers was graduated from Franklin Academy and was in the employ of the Bethlehem Steel Company in this city at the time he entered the Army in January, 1943. He received his basic training at Camp Tyson, Tenn., and further training at camps in California and Colorado. He was sent overseas in August of this year.

He is survived by his mother and one sister, Miss Ann Carothers, a student at Vassar College; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jones. Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Jones of Cloverleaf Street are an uncle and aunt and Mrs. Charles Chamberlin of East Broad Street is a great-aunt of the young man.
