

### SOLDIER ON FURLOUGH; SERVED IN HAWAII

Corp. Stephen Kutos, Jr., to Enter  
Officers' Training School.

Corporal Stephen Kutos, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Kutos 220 East Fifth Street, a member of Uncle Sam's forces for almost three years, and among the first troops to land in Hawaii following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, is enjoying a fifteen-day furlough with his parents.

A member of St. John's Windish Lutheran Church and active in the Youth Conference, he enlisted in the U. S. Army in 1940, and received his basic training at Fort Monroe, Va. He was subsequently transferred to Fort Eustis, and later to Fort Pendleton, both in Virginia. In September, 1941, he was promoted to the rank of corporal.

From the latter camp he was sent to Hawaii, arriving on January 7, of this year. Early in Fall of this year he was ordered to report at an officers' training school, at Miami, Fla., arriving in this country on November 13.

The course, he said, will be of three months duration, and he is also planning to take a course in statistics at Harvard University. For some time he has been enrolled in a corresponding course at the University of Wisconsin.

During his service he has won medals for sharpshooting and expert gunnery, and he also wears a pin denoting one year' service prior to December 7, 1941.
