A member of St. John's Windish Lutheran Church and active in the Youth Conference, he enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1940, and received his basic training at Fort Monroe, Va. He was subsequently transferred to Fort Eustis, and later to Fort Pen-dleton, both in Virginia. In Sep-tember, 1941, he was promoted to the rank of corporal. From the latter camp he was sent to Hawali, arriving on January 7, of this year. Early in Fall of this year he was ordered to report at an offi-cers' training school, at Miami, Fla., arriving in this country on No-vember 13. The course, he said, will be of three months duration, and he is also planning to take a course in statistics at Harvard University. For some time he has been enrolled in a corresponding course at the Uni-versity of Wisconsin. During his service he has won medals for sharpshooting and ex-pert gunnery, and he also wears a pin denoting one year' service prior to December 7, 1941.
