

## DIETMAR HERZOG ART IS LANGUAGE

## Art Is Language:

Diane LaBelle: You have told me that the theme of this series is "Large Symbols". Is this a new idea for you?

Dietmar Herzog: No, it is not. Where I studied seven years ago, I had this idea but I stopped it to work on other things. This work was still present on the walls of my studio during this time but it was in the background. I don't know why I remember this idea now. I don't know.

DL: When did you come back to this concept?

DH: October and November of last year. I remember when the idea became part of my imagination- in my studio in Germany, two artists came

to see me to go with them to have coffee. They commented on how happy I looked and I knew that I had this concept inside my head. I remember hoping that the artist friends did not stay much longer so that I could start my new work. The idea was in my head and I felt good.

DL: Was this work that you wanted to do in Bethlehem, as part of the artist-in-residence program?

DH: At first, I had another program planned to do in Bethlehem but then I felt that I had to go on with this work. I looked at the pictures that I made

seven years ago when I first had the idea. I decided what was good and asked what can I do better now from seven years ago. What is different now?


DL: In creating this work, you begin with text. What text do you use?

DH: Different philosophical texts such as Goethe's *Metamorphosis*, and other poets, also Rudolf Steiner, and text from art history. I am very interested in writings of great authors. I am inspired to work with these texts, to draw on them and to interact with them. This is the beginning of my artistic journey. While reading the text, I underline and write comments, and make marks in the margin - all as direct reflections of the text. When the

text is completely separated from these graphical processes, the marks I made become visible and autonomous. They have an individual rhythm and carry my reaction to the text within them. The power of the contents of words, their relationships and connections changes to a graphical expression - the line.

The concept of a word, with its subjectivity, emotion, and spirit, is thereby lifted from a linguistic to a graphical-artistic plane. For example, relationships and comparisons between words are continued by arrows; emphasis is achieved through underlining, and concentration of the text occurs by means of circles.

The result is a sort of "visual language", which creates a graphical text of equivalent meaning.



DL: So the title of this series relates to this process?

DH: Yes, the title of this series is "Large Symbols".

And it is always about the next picture for me. I look at the ones I do and I think about the next one.

Dietmar Herzog is the fifth artist in residence at the Banana Factory and the second artist in residence from Bethlehem's sister city in Germany, Schwaebisch Gmuend.
