

Kubaritz, Michael

Dies In Battle On French Soil

July 11 ^{AUG 5} 1944

Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kubaritz of Butztown, were notified by the War Department Thursday that their son, Pfc. Michael Kubaritz, was killed in action in France on July 11.

Pfc. Kubaritz was inducted July 23, 1941; received his basic training at Camp Croft, S. C., and from there was sent to Fort Meade, Camp Blanding, Fla. In October, 1942, he

left for overseas duty and was in England until D-Day.

The last letter received from the young man was written in a fox-hole on July 10, the day he was killed.

Besides his parents, he is survived by three sisters, Anna, Mary and Olga, at home; one brother, John, in the Army of the United States, who just returned to the States after two years overseas duty and is now stationed at Fort Dearborn, N. H.

He was a member of the Ukrainian Catholic Church and attended Coolidge School at Butztown. He was employed in the Drop Forge Department of the Bethlehem Steel Company before entering the Army.

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
