## Local Soldiers Among First To Enter Vienna

First Lt. Robert C. Scott, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. Robert C. Scott, formerly of Asheville, N. C., now of this city, and Cpl. Charles J. Cyecsek, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cyecsek, Route 1, Hellertown, were among the first Americans to enter the city of Vienna as members of General Mark Clark's United States Forces in Austria.

Lt. Scott, assistant secretary of the Allied Commission, Austria, secretariat, entered the service in April, 1941, and was commissioned in August, 1942. He has been overseas since February, 1945.

USFA, his new organization, will function under General Clark as an army of occupation in the American section of Austria, exercising military control over governmental agencies during the rehabilitation period.

Scott is a graduate of the Univer-

sity of North Carolina and holds the degree of M. B. E. from the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration. His wife, Mrs. Ethel Lindstrom Scott, lives at 2907A Levin Street, Alexandria, La.

Cpl. Cyecsek, a member of the 4523rd Quartermaster Car Company, which is attached to Headquarters, USFA, was employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company before joining the American forces in April, 1943.

Assigned to overseas duty in October, 1943, Cpl. Cyecsek served with the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division in the Italian campaign and was assigned to the 15th Army Group in January. Cpl. Cyecsek wears the Europe-Africa-Middle East campaign ribbon with three battle participation stars.
