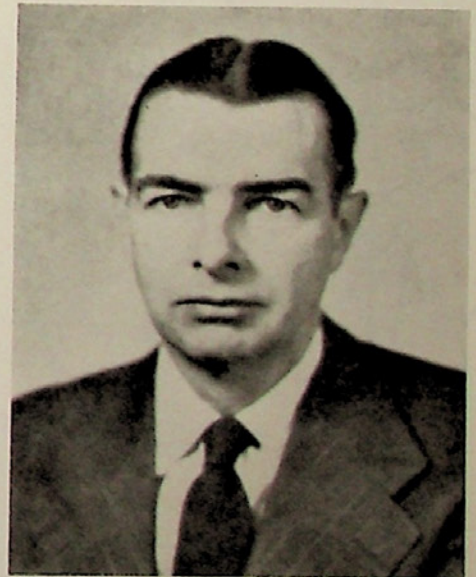


DR. PAUL SIDNEY CHRIST

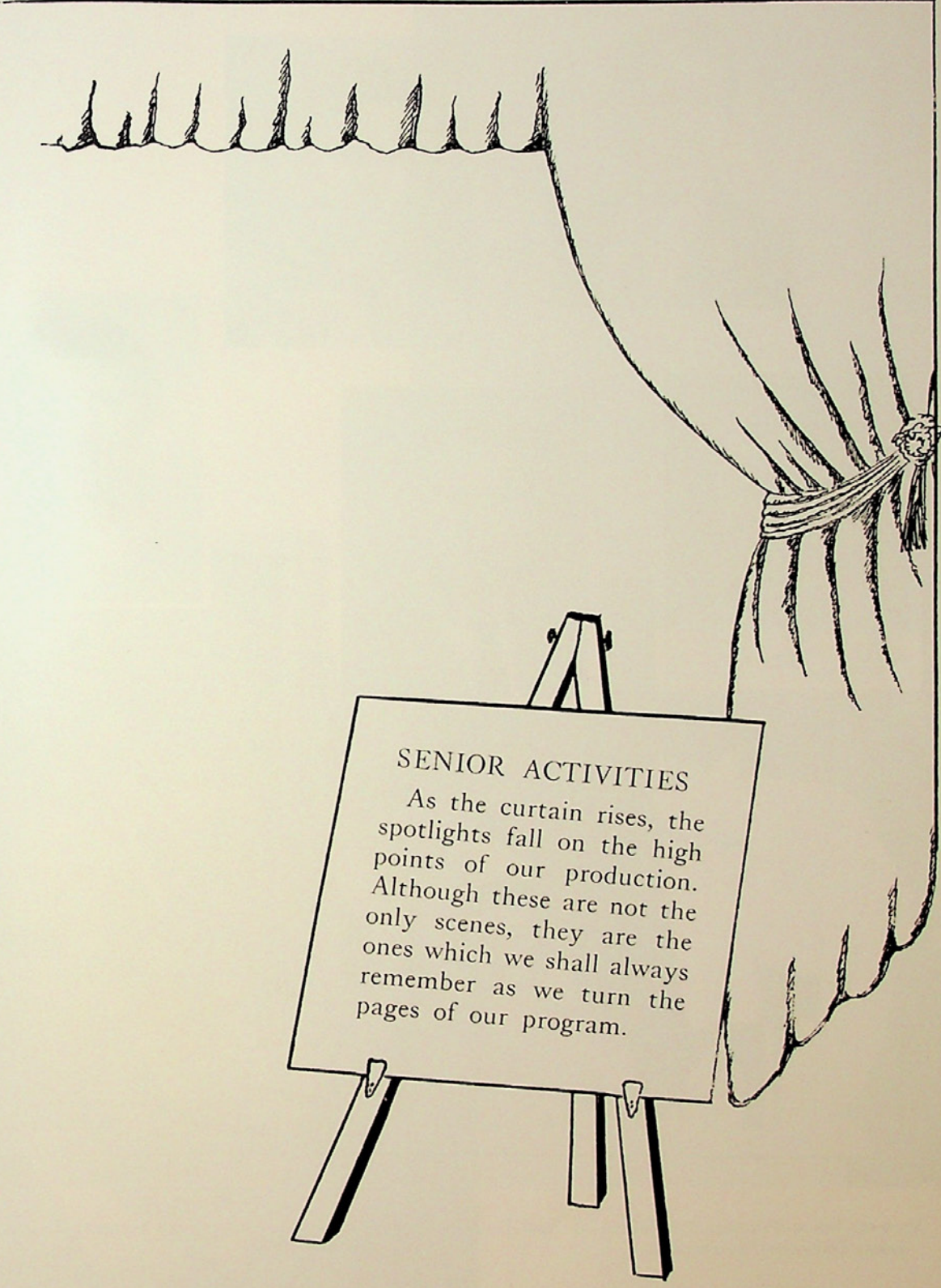
MR. NEVIN J. COOK

Mr. Klein helped in every way possible, suggesting gifts that would be helpful to the school.

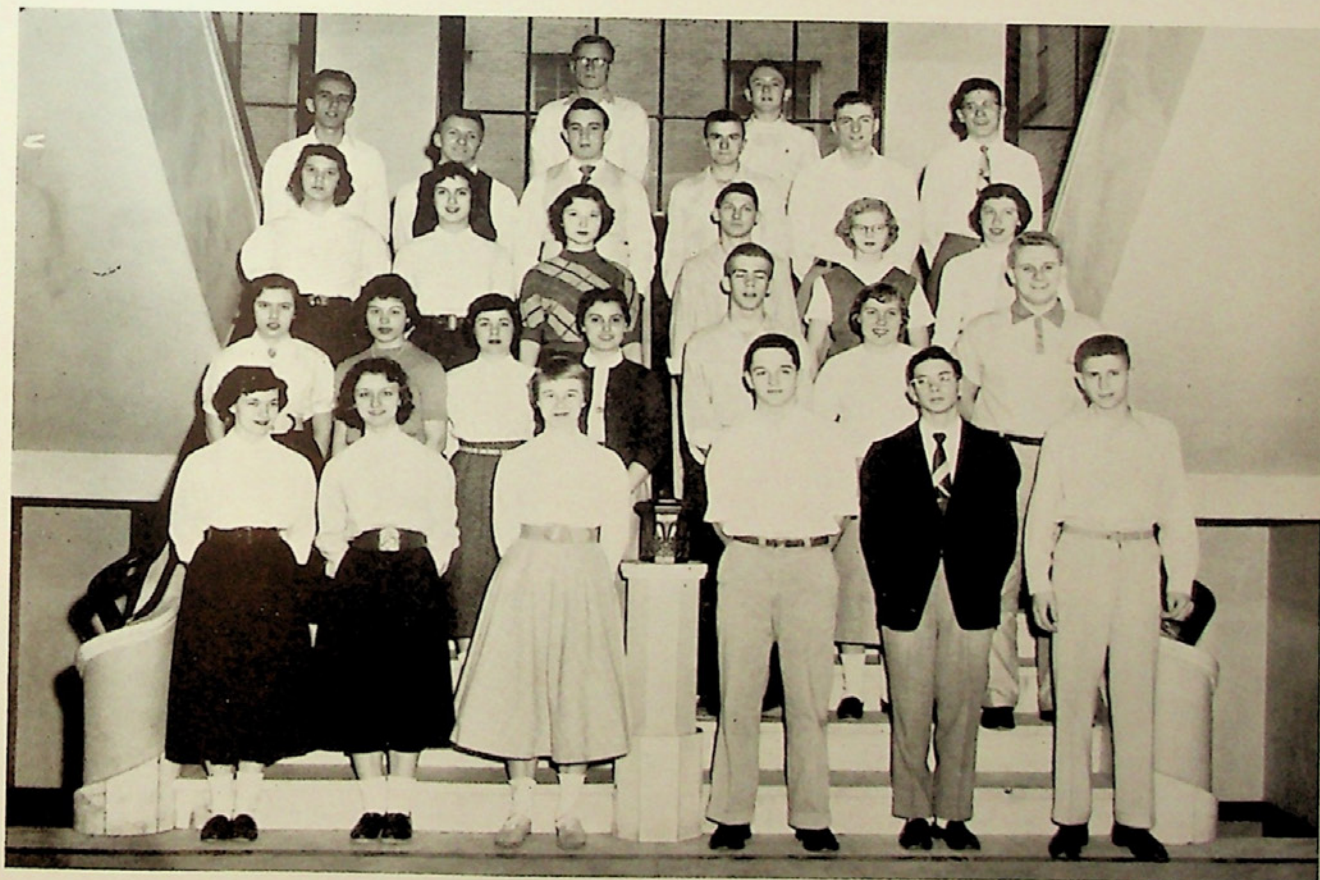

In addition, all the representatives who went on the trip to New York had a wonderful time and learned a lot about newspaper work which will be valuable to them in the future.

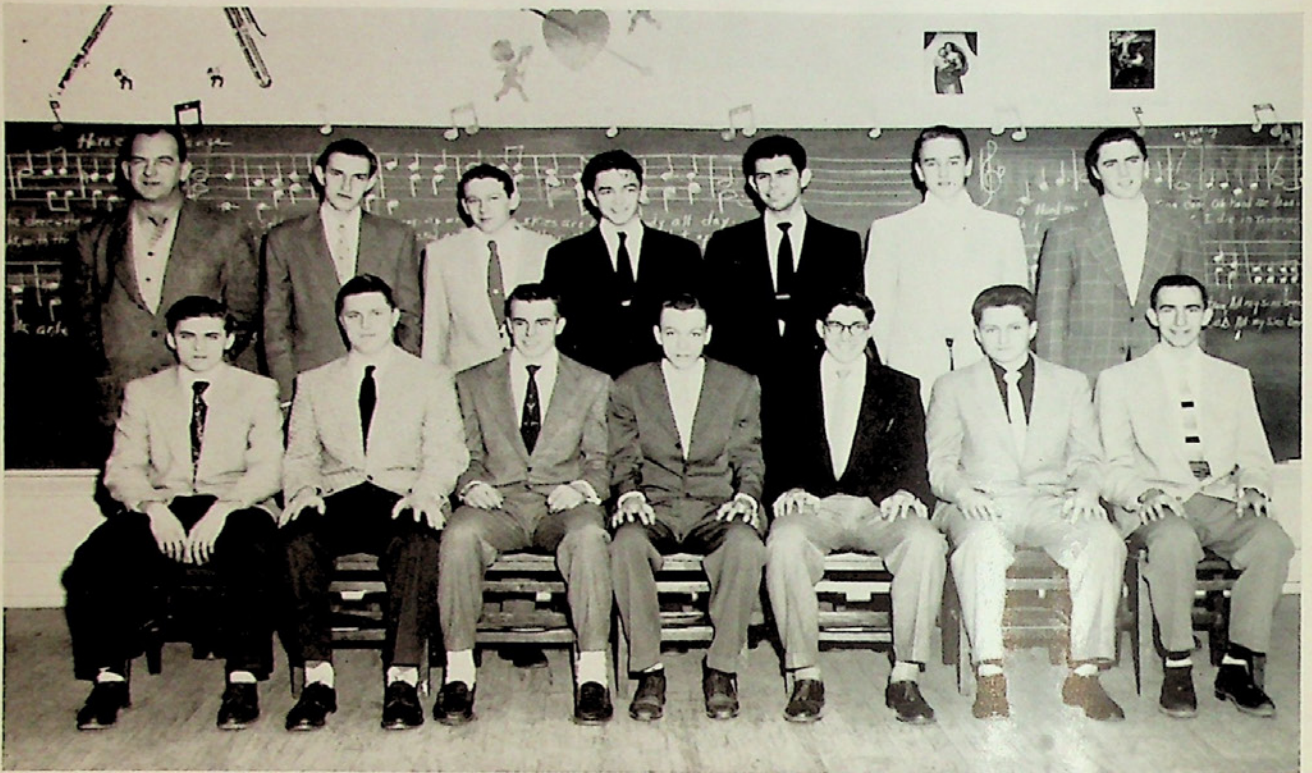


SNAPPY SKETCHES HUGH SUCCESS

The Debating Club, or Societas Honoris as it is officially known, serves a distinct purpose in the growth of its members. Some of the activities sponsored by the club during the school year are the following: a radio broadcast in the form of a debate, an annual dance, numerous coke and candy sales, and most important of all, a trip to either New York or Washington.

ART LEAGUE

The Art League, which meets after school on each Wednesday, is directed by Mr. Doney, art instructor, and provides for the members a richer and fuller understanding of art. Various art techniques not available in class are introduced through the Art League.

This year the activities included: caring for Liberty's art galleries, Memorial Hallway, hanging art exhibits, decorating the Christmas tree in the lobby, providing the art assembly programs, participating in the Christmas Vespers, sponsoring an Art League Dance and Spring Festival, and making posters for various occasions throughout the 1954-1955 school year.

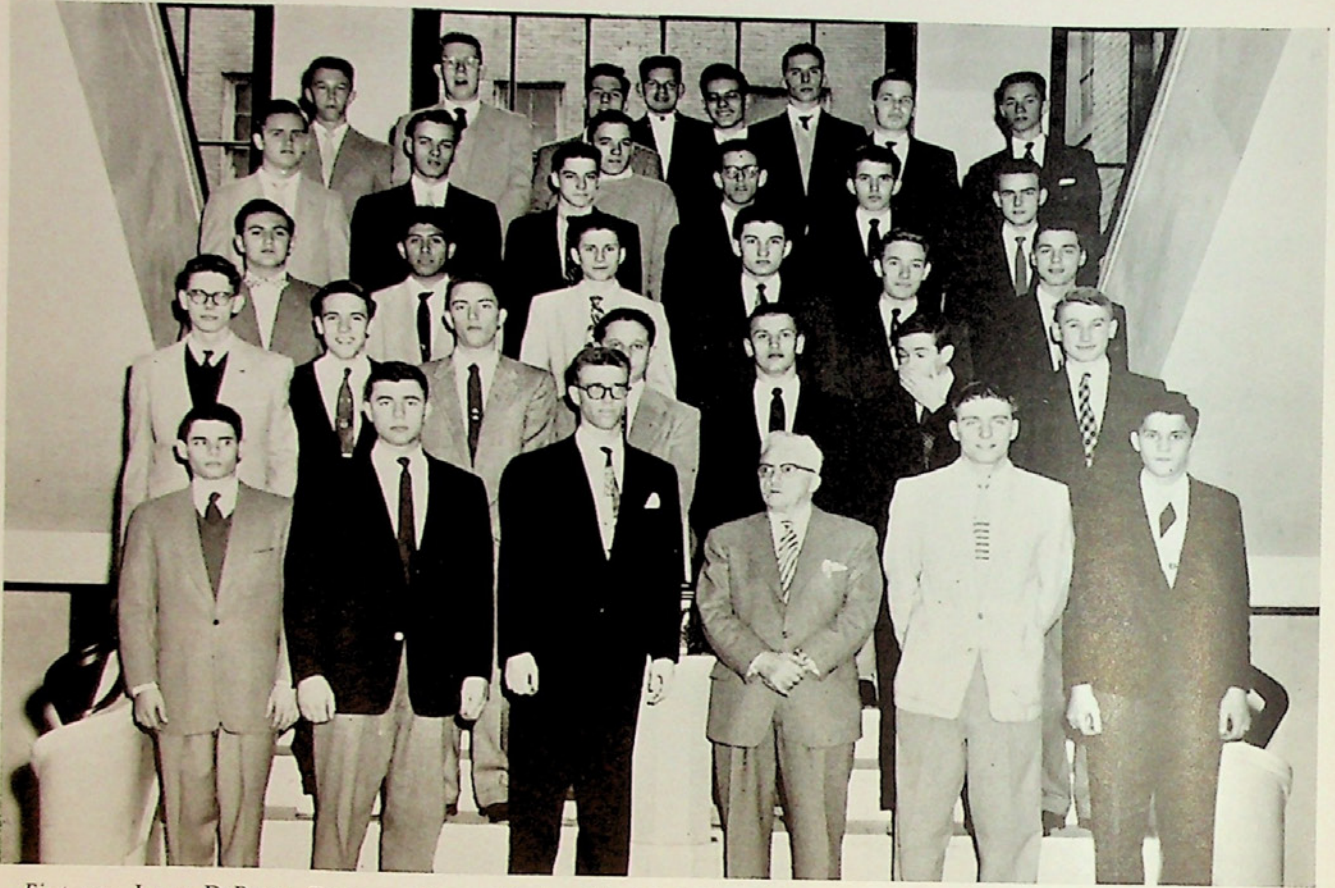

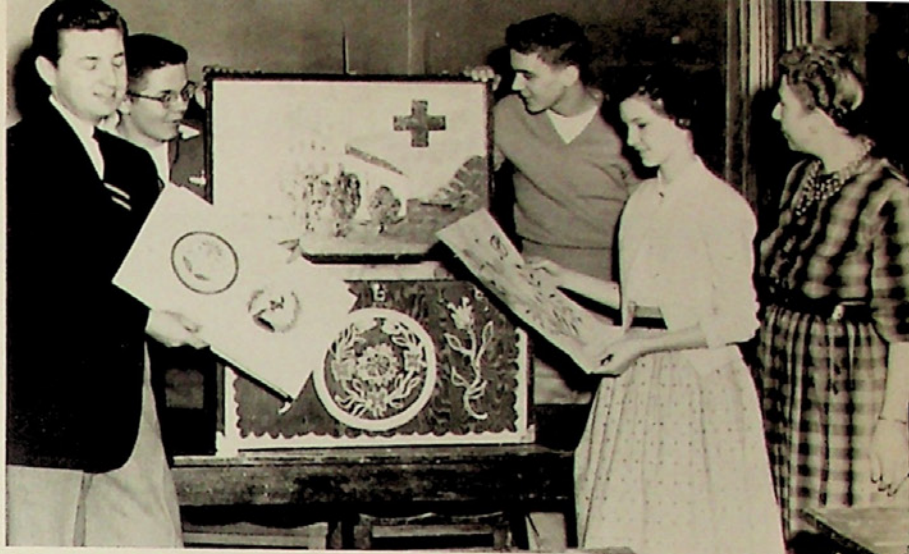

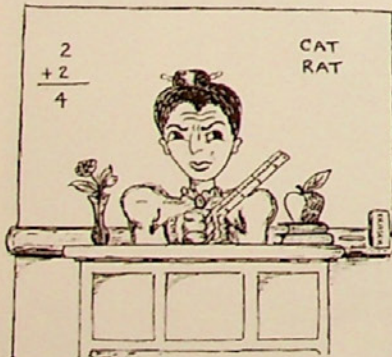

This year as in the past four years, The Young Writer has been published as a medium through which all junior and senior high school students of this city might display their talent for writing.

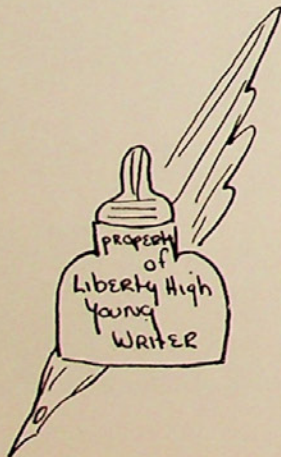

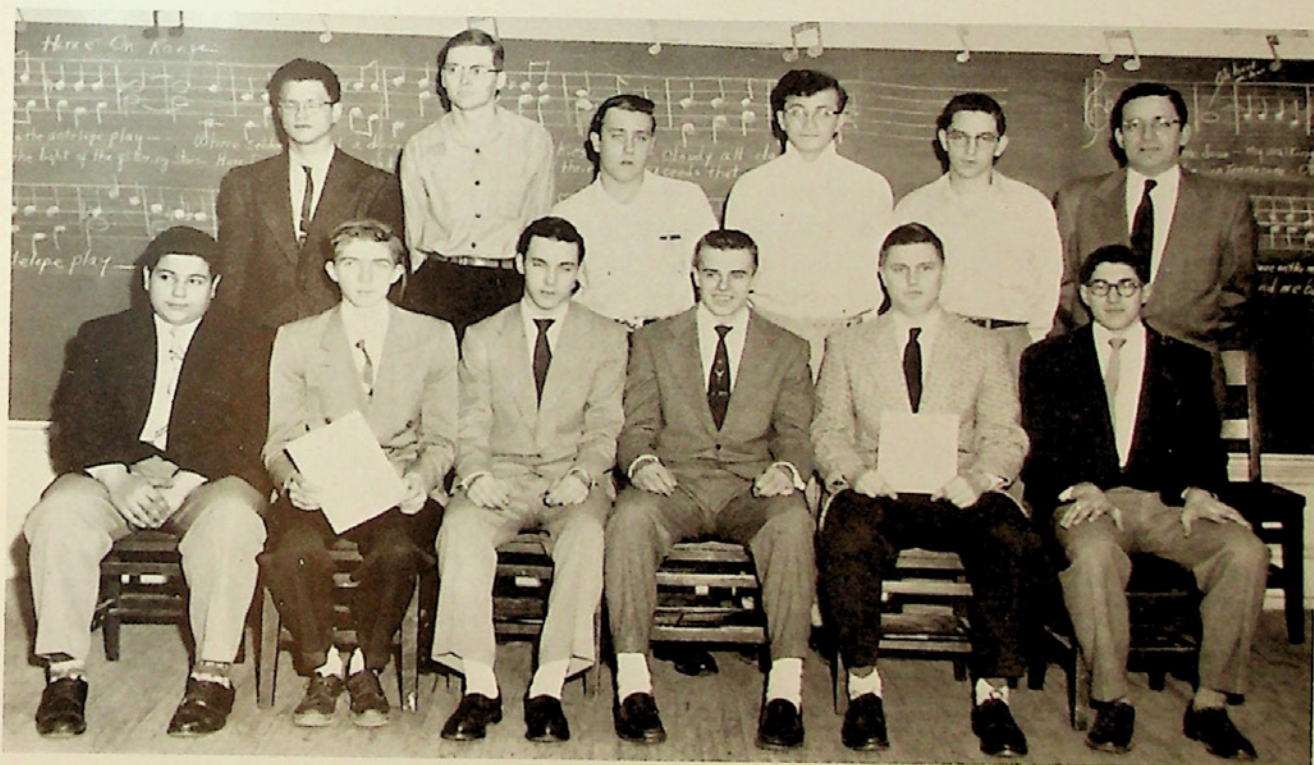
TECH YOUNG WRITER

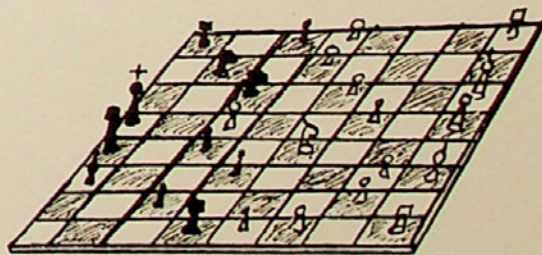

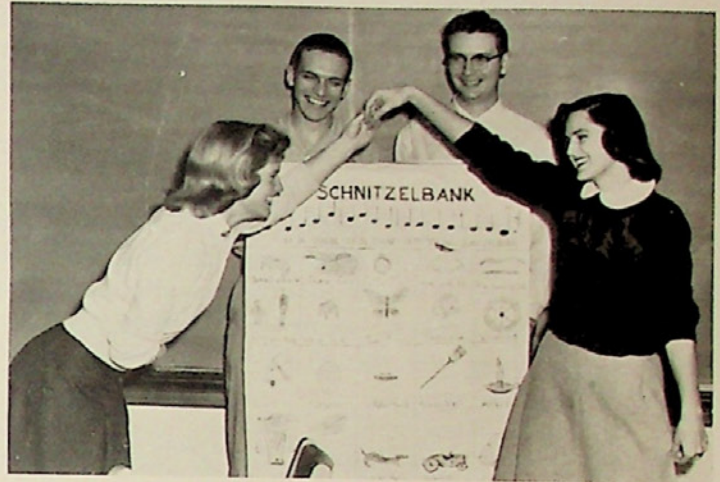

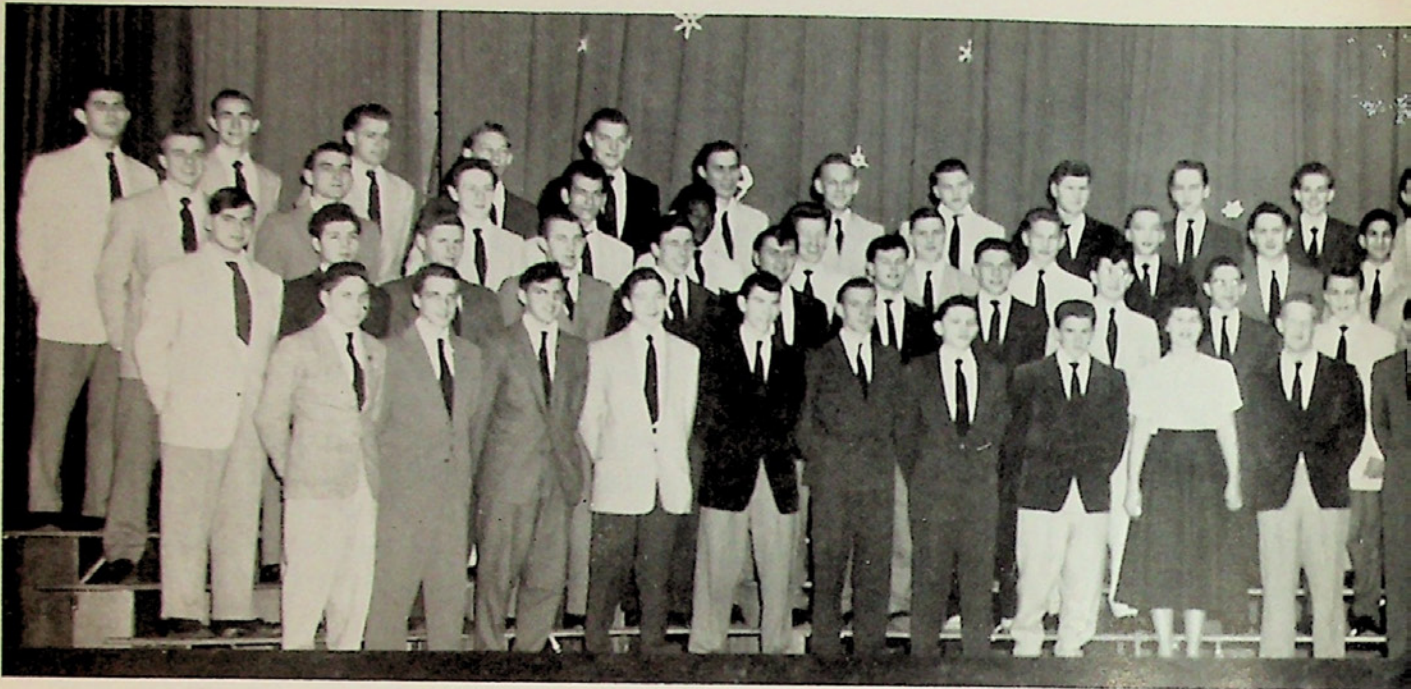

TECH GLEE CLUB

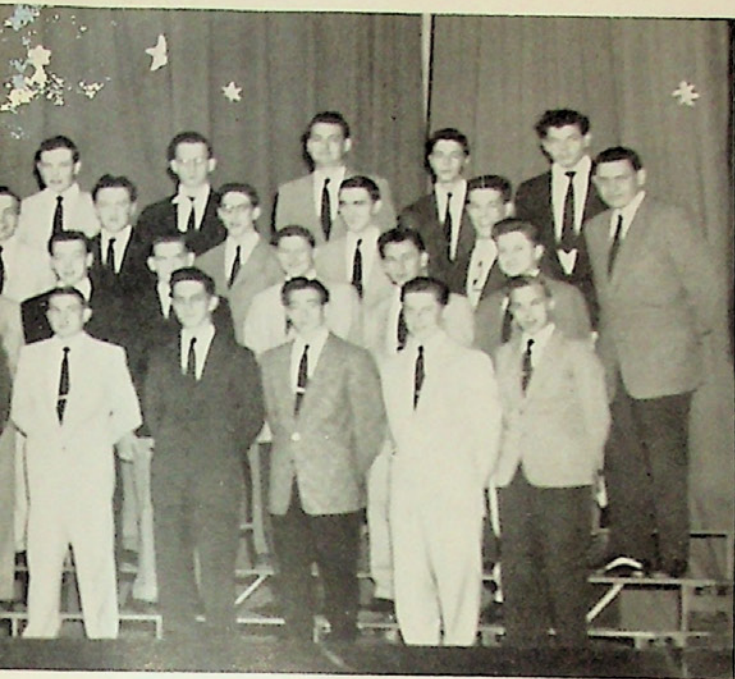

In England and America, music has never been more vital than it is today. The United States has contributed many works rich in promise to this great time honored art.

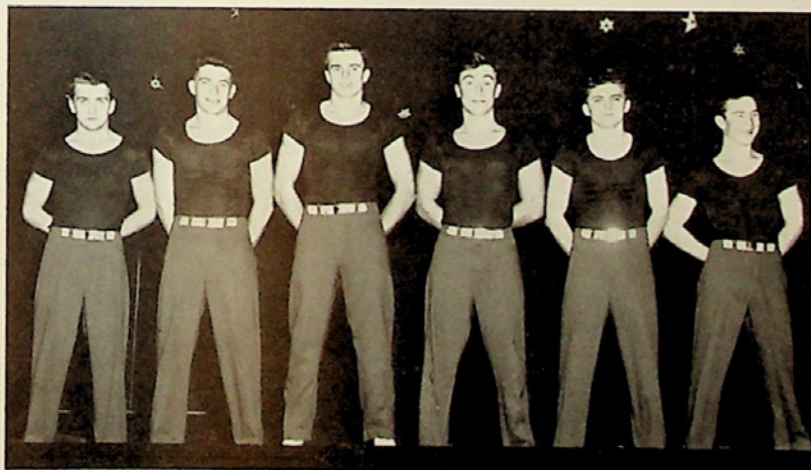

The Future Craftsmen of America is a club which enrolls students who plan to become tradesmen following graduation. The club is under the guidance of Mr. Dubbeling, instructor in the drafting shop. The goals sought by the club are the following: to promote the spirit of craftsmanship; to prepare for a worthy occupation; to become an efficient producer in order to meet the economic needs of a good citizen; to develop industrial leadership; to promote cooperation between industry and the school; to build public respect for one's vocation; and to encourage habits of safety.



The plan and program of the Future Craftsmen of America is designed to fit the particular conditions and situations of groups of trade and industrial preparatory students. It is continually striving to improve the craftsmanship of its members, and it is also attempting to create better fellowship among boys who are going out into the industrial world.

Until Mr. Dubbeling took over, the club had been in a state of suspension, for it had not operated actively prior to 1953. At the present time it is well organized and is one of the most popular clubs in the school.

AUTO SHOP

The auto business is not an easy one. To most people a mechanic is only a grease-monkey, but he is much more than that. A good mechanic must be alert, agile, and skilled in his knowledge of the automobile.

The demand for mechanics is growing greater with each passing year. The automobile industries in Detroit are producing about twenty million cars annually. It was discovered in a recent survey that one out of every three families in the United States are owners of automobiles.

With the great number of cars in the country, it is no wonder that mechanics are constantly in demand.

Most of the trade schools today have auto shops, in which the students are taught the fundamentals of the auto trade. After graduation, if the boy still wants to be a mechanic, he seeks employment in a garage. This is the procedure by which many men who are top mechanics today have achieved their skill.

Tech's auto shop is taught by two experienced men, Mr. Vallone and Mr. Leidig. Mr. Leidig is a newcomer to Tech. He teaches engine work and mechanical work. Mr. Vallone, a veteran, teaches the auto body repair work in the auto shop.



DRAFTING



To be a good draftsman you must first get the training and experience that is so important.

There are different types of drafting. Architectural drafting is concerned with drawing house plans. Mechanical drafting has to do with the drawing of different mechanical parts. Structural drafting involves the drawing of beams and columns which form the framework of a structure.

Instruction plays an important part in learning the drafting trade for all the important fundamentals must be mastered. In the drafting shop each individual works on an assigned sheet, which must be completed with great accuracy. A good bit of checking over to make sure of every dimension is necessary. Neatness is just as important as accuracy and precision, for if a drawing is not neat, it will be hard to find important dimensions.

Drafting is an important phase of the manufacturing industry, for all of the articles that are produced in a manufacturing plant are first drawn up on paper by a draftsman.

The future of the draftsman is a bright one. There are more openings than graduates in many areas. The working conditions are the best you will find anywhere.



ELECTRICAL SHOP

Invisible, yet it gives us light with all the colors of the rainbow. Weightless, yet it lifts and hauls loads weighing thousands of tons. Occupying no space, yet it passes through all space. What is it? The answer is that even after more than 2,500 years, we do not know exactly what electricity is.

We know only some of the things it does and how to make it do these things. These things we have known for only a short time, for it was just about 110 years ago that Michael Faraday and Joseph Henry discovered the principle of the dynamo.

Without electrical power the world could not hope to continue on its rapid pace. All industry would cease to operate.

In our three year course, we try to cover as much of the electrical field as possible. We learn the theory of electricity. The different types of motor circuits, motor windings, and motor operations are discussed in the shop.

We owe a great deal of gratitude to our able instructor, Mr. Risbon, for the effort he has made to teach us the practical theory and practice of electricity.



MACHINE SHOP



In our shop we had training and lectures on how to properly run and operate the machines so they will be kept in good condition. We also had training in safety.

We had two new teachers in our shop this year, Mr. Herbert Ross Jr. and Mr. Anthony Cacciatore. These men will run the shop next year when Mr. Herbert Ross Sr. retires. He has been the shop teacher for many years.

Mr. Ross Jr. is in charge of the milling shop. In this shop, jobs of rectangular shape are cut to size. Mr. Anthony Cacciatore is in charge of the lathe shop. Here round stock is cut down to shape and size.

A machinist today is one of the most important men in industry because he makes equipment so necessary for our protection against enemy nations. Many other articles used in homes, industry, or most anywhere else, also require top machinists somewhere along the line of their production.

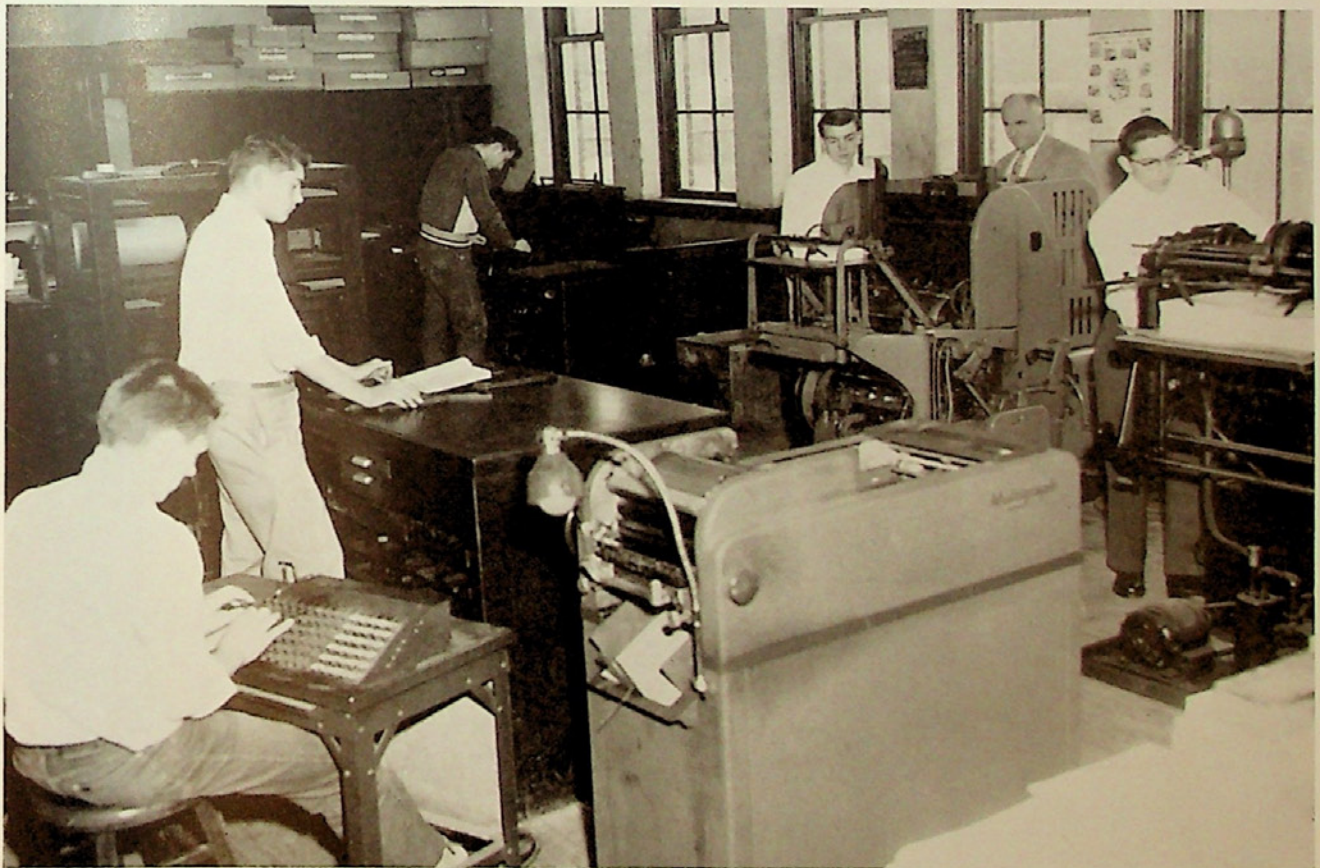


PRINT SHOP

Business could never exist without the printed word. With text-books and novels, pamphlets and newspapers, tickets and tax-bills, no man can evade the printed word. To destroy civilization, an A-Bomb or an H-Bomb wouldn't be necessary. Destruction of the printed word would be sufficient.

Printing dates back as far as the year 868 A.D. when the oldest known book in existence, "The Diamond Sutra," was printed in China. This was when Block Printing was used, seven centuries before Gutenberg's invention of moveable type. This took a very long time, because each letter had to be carved separately. Today a man can hand set a page with moveable type in a few hours, and with a Linotype, a page can be arranged in a few minutes.

Tech boys are taught by Mr. Arch Hunsinger, a man who is well skilled at this trade. They are taught the essentials of type, proofreading, getting a form ready to be put to press, the operation of several types of presses, bindery work, and the small details that make a skilled printer.



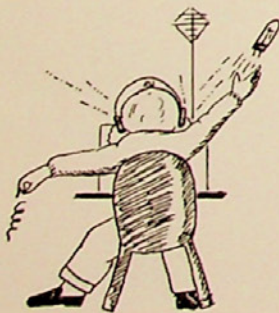
RADIO SHOP



Radio is an Art of Communication. At least one radio is owned by almost every family in the United States. Because of this, many repairmen are needed to help these sets stay in good repair and operation.

Radio Shop at Tech is one of the best equipped shops in the school. The equipment in this shop is very expensive and delicate, and must be handled with very much caution and care.

Radio Shop study requires a high mathematics mark with a good knowledge of algebra because of the many formulas that must be learned and used in course study of radio.



In the student's first year at Tech, in the radio shop, he studies electrical theory and learns the use of meters. He also studies some of the formulas necessary to master electron theory.

In the student's second year, he makes a thorough study of alternating current, magnetism, and the study of the oscilloscope.

In the third and final year, the student repairs and builds radios, as a means of experience for the future. After these things have been accomplished the student is able to get a job in this field knowing he has been properly trained in Radio.

CABINETMAKING

Woodworking is an old craft dating back thousands of years, as indicated by stone woodworking tools uncovered in various parts of the world. Metal woodworking tools dating back to about 5,000 B.C. showed a vast improvement over the earlier stone tools. With the introduction of metal tools came an expansion in building of articles made from wood, and a trend toward specialization. Early cabinets were little more than rectangular boxes used for storing valuables. Gradually workers began to specialize in the field.

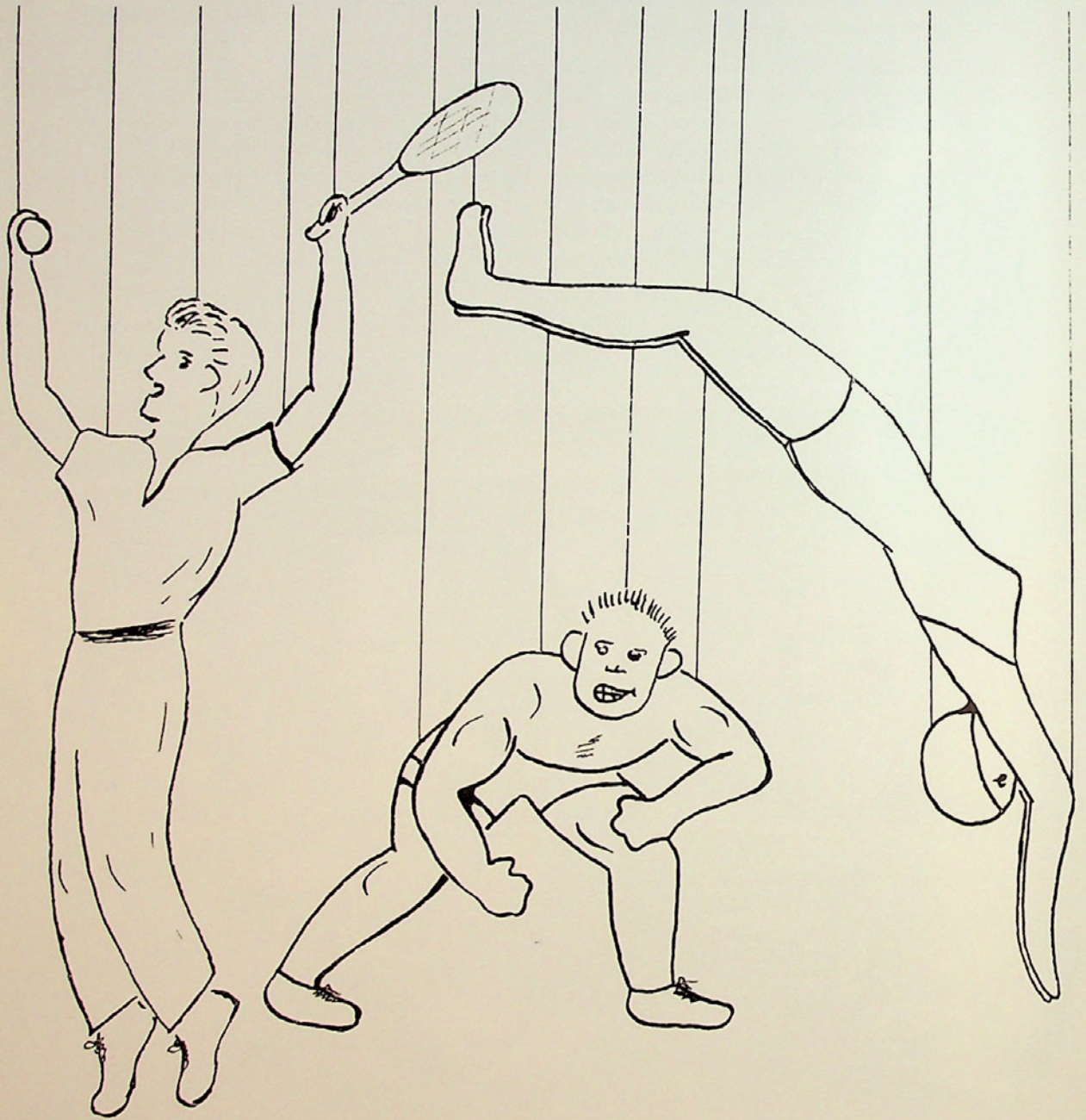


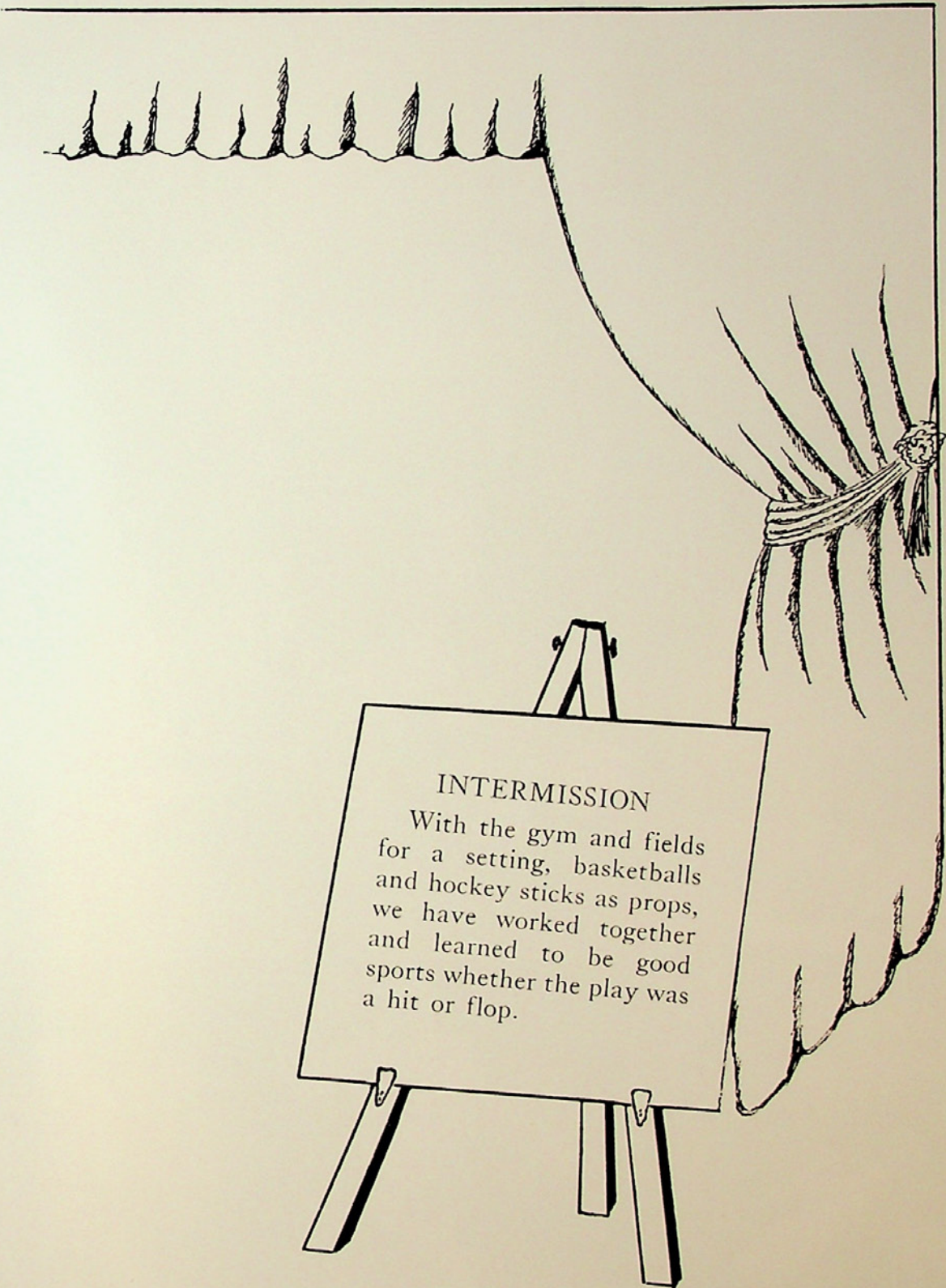
Regardless of specialization, the cabinetmaker is essentially a worker in wood, performing such jobs as cutting, shaping, and assembling store fixtures, office equipment, and home furnishings. The cabinetmaker must be able to use both hand and machine woodworking tools; he must have a thorough knowledge of the materials used in the trade. He must be able to lay out and dimension cabinets and other items of wood, to read blueprints and make various kinds of joints, to install hardware such as hinges, catches, and drawer pulls, and to perform all these tasks with skill and precision.

Mr. Don L. Detwiler, who is our instructor, is doing a fine job in preparing the boys for the field of cabinetmaking. We think he has done a fine job producing future cabinetmakers.

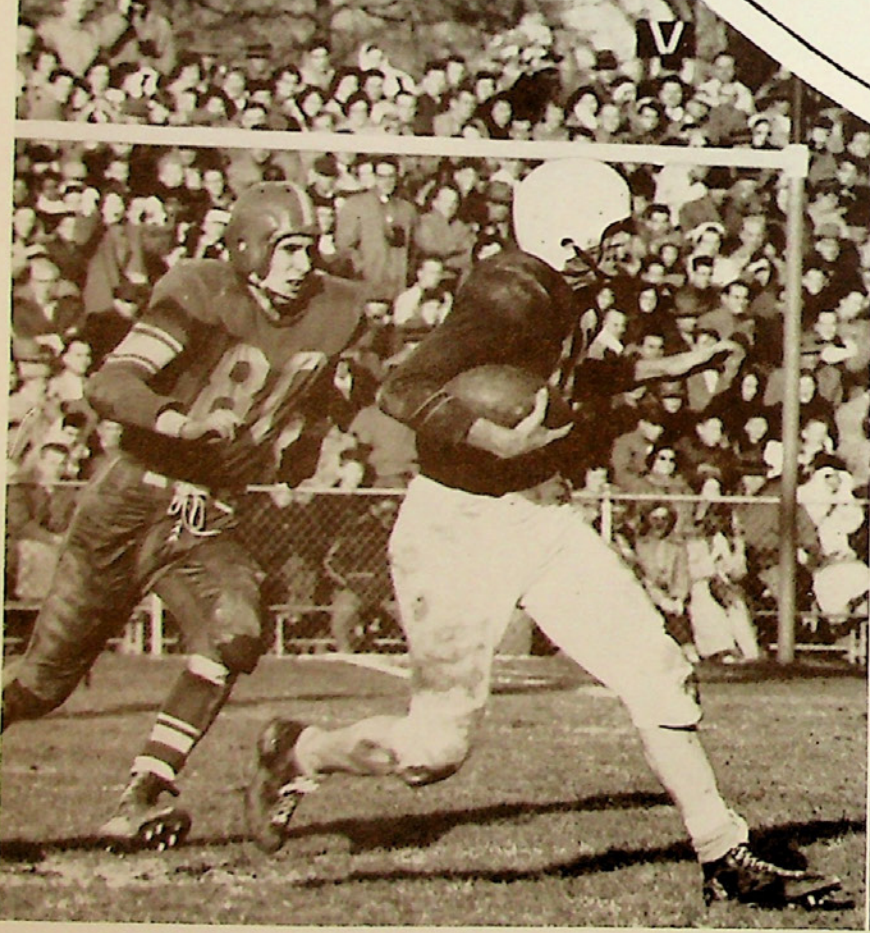

VARSITY FOOTBALL

Under the tutelage of new head coach, Warren Harris, the Red and Blue football forces campaigned through a ten game schedule which culminated in a record of five victories, three ties, and two defeats.

In the initial encounter, the Hurricanes fought on even terms with the interscholastic football champions of Philadelphia, Southeast Catholic, dead-locking them in a 7-7 contest. In the next two games, Bethlehem, scored impressive wins of 33-13 and 47-0 against Southern Philadelphia and Allentown Central Catholic respectively. The football fortunes of Bethlehem ground to an unexpected stop when an underrated Hershey Industrial combine stalemated Bethlehem, 13-13. The Hurricane gathered momentum in the week following the Hershey game and swept past Reading, 20-0 and had enough steam left to mow down Easton 13-9. At this point the Red and Blue eleven suffered the loss of its outstanding tailback, Andy Maconyi, and thus weakened had to face an undefeated West Scranton team. West Scranton and Bethlehem battled on even terms the game winding up in a 13-13 tie. Following this game the Harris men ran into real trouble before a capacity crowd at Phillipsburg, New Jersey. The Scarlet and Gray of P-Burg administered to Bethlehem its first setback, 19-13.

The next game was a lopsided contest Bethlehem beating Camden Catholic 34-0. This victory set the stage for the biggest game of the season with traditional rival, Allentown. Bethlehem, after many lean years was rated an even choice by the dopsters to score a victory. But Thanksgiving Day came and went and with its passing went the hopes of the Bethlehem High cohorts; the Allentown jinx still held and the Canary and Blue gladiators went home with a 7-0 victory.

Andy Maconyi at tailback and Lou Capuano at guard were the most outstanding players for Bethlehem during the season. But they were ably supported by Jim Bauder, Mike Preletz, and Charlie Hartranft in the backfield and by Ronnie Check and Frank Szvetecz on the line.

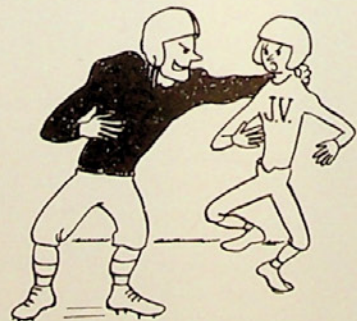

Unfortunately, the team was unable to get into the playoffs due to the two morale-killing defeats at the hands of Allentown.

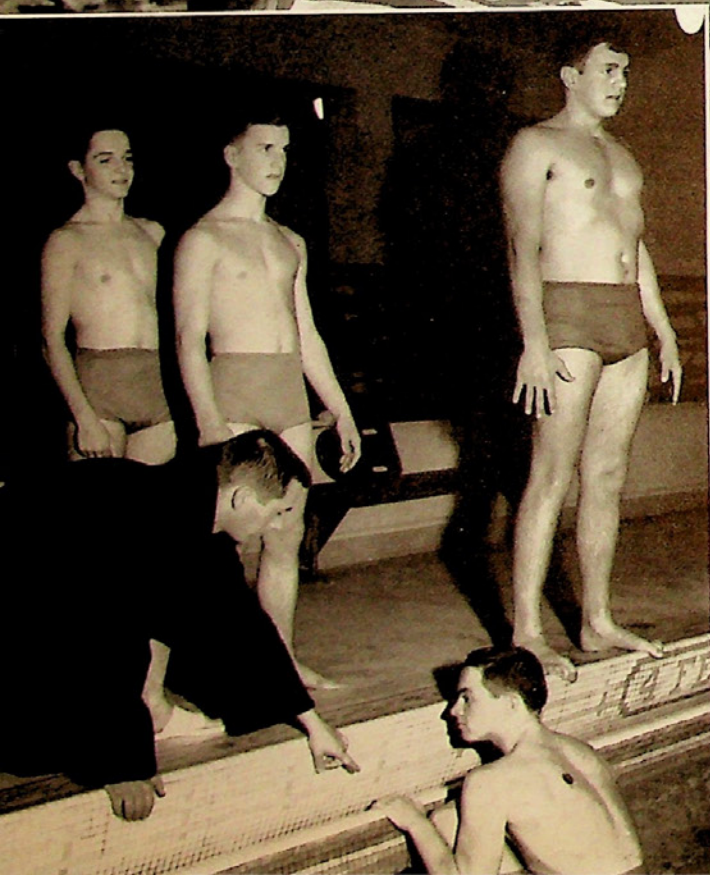

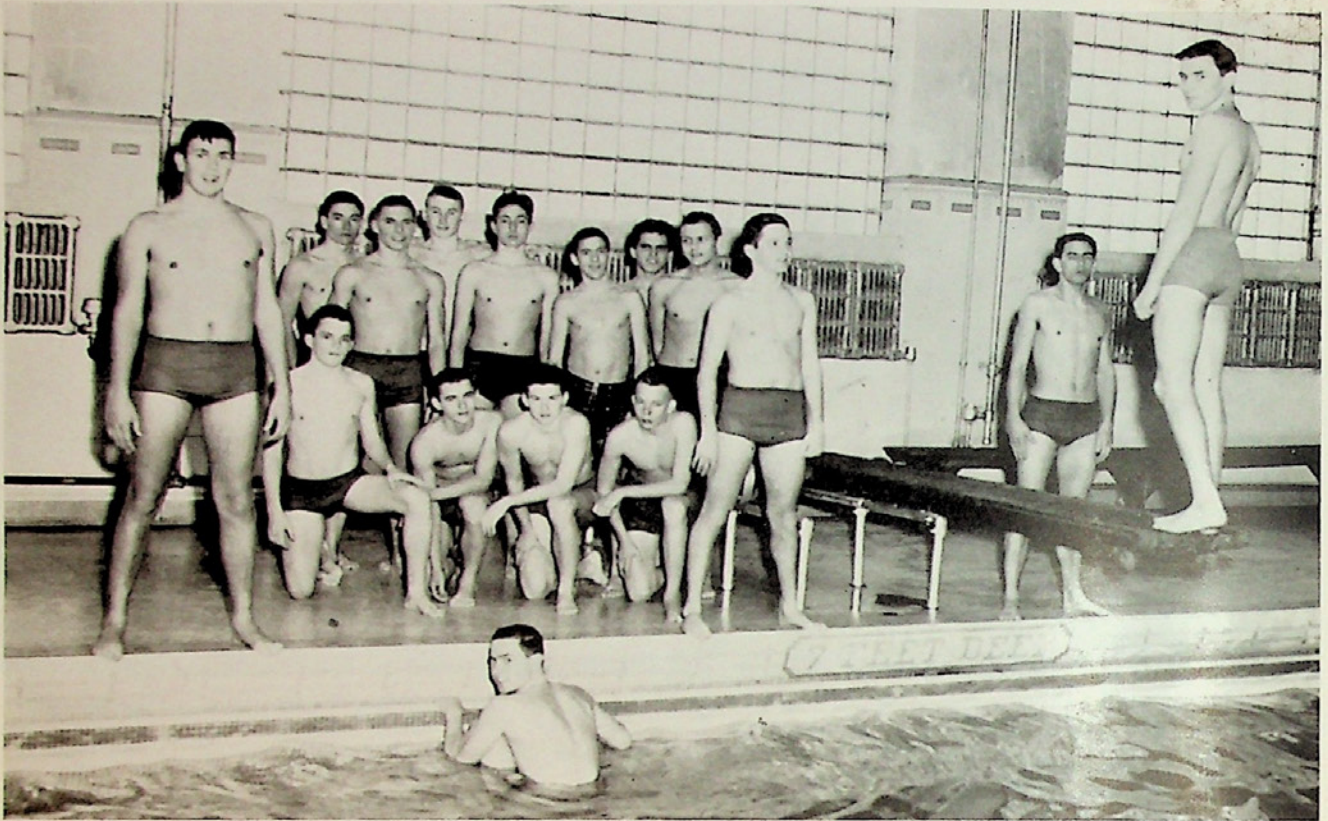

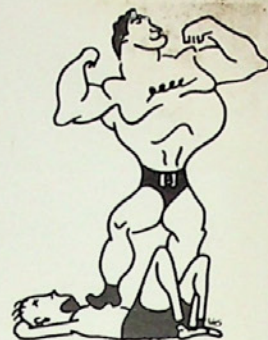
WRESTLING

Shortly before school had started, ground had been broken for the new basketball palestra which has been named Memorial Gymnasium in memory of those who gave their lives in World War II and in the Korean conflict. Memorial Gymnasium holds almost four thousand people and will be used for the 1955-1956 basketball season. The technical building will be used for the first time at the opening of school in September of 1955.

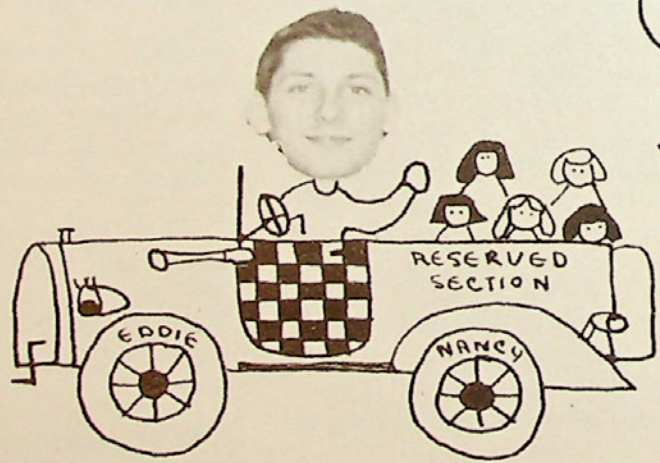
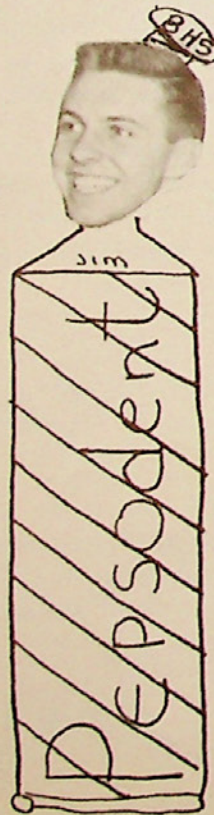
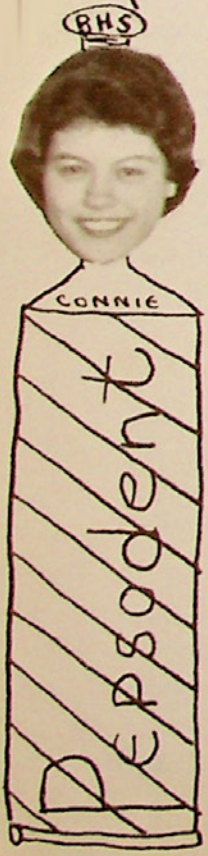
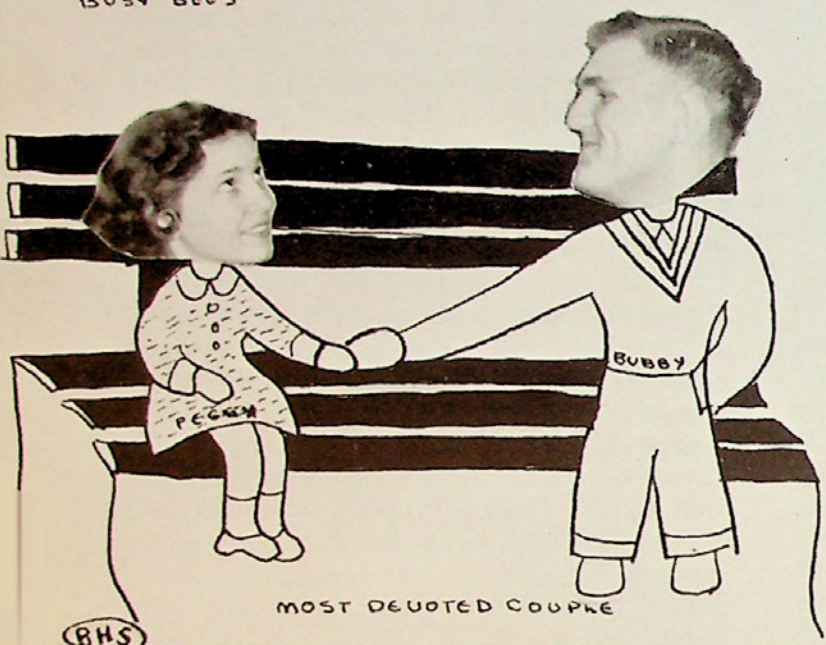
My chauffeur was waiting at the airport when the plane landed. He drove me to Bethlehem where I visited my parents, relatives, and friends.
