Papa Young, informed that the stork had visited back home, and that baby and mother, the former Renia Anthony, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Anthony, of East Allen Township, were doing well, took his pen in hand and struck off a letter to his daughter.

"I miss both of you so darn much but at times like these no one can complain because it's to uphold freedom, that we always want to cherish for dearest ones like you and Mother," the happy soldier wrote his daughter.

Sending along a cute little handkerchief as a gift, the happy Dad suggests to his baby that she "get all the lovin you can, because when I come home you won't have a chance. God bless you and keep you till we meet," the letter adds.

Sergeant Young is a son of Clerk of Quarter Sessions Walter J. Yuong and Flossie Young, of Lower Nazareth Twp., Bethlehem, R. D. 1. Another of the Youngs' sons, Robert S., also a technical sergeant, is also serving in the Mediterranean theater. And his brother, Walter, has nothing on him, for the stork visited the Robert Youngs June 4, a daughter Roberta Grace being born to Mrs. Young, the former Grace Smith. The latter's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith, live in Hanover township.

The Walter Youngs, Sr., have another son, William J. Young, who saw service in the Army before Pearl Harbor. He has since been discharged and is now with his wife, the former Dorothy Greenmoyer and their daughter, Karol, in Hanover township.

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
