





JOSEPH RISBON

The club activities gave the Latin students an opportunity to work co-operatively on programs of common interest and to broaden their knowledge and appreciation of the Romans, their language, and their world.





This is the group of young naturalists of our student body, that is known as the Nature Study Club of Liberty High School. They are not a hiking club, (a term which they would resent), because they hike only as far as they can study.

Mr. Warren M. Horne, crafts instructor, is the faculty advisor. The primary aim of the club is to create in the members a sincere interest in nature. In addition to this, the purpose of the club is to train students to become horticulturists, landscape gardeners, botanists, zoologists, druggists, foresters and nature counsellors at summer camps.

During the winter months indoor meetings are held. At each meeting the members respond to the roll call with some phenomenon in nature that they had observed, heard or read about since the previous meeting. Oral and written reviews, based on the field trips, collections, and instructions are occasionally given. A special assignment was the collection of twelve different seeds and fruits in the fall, which were identified during the winter months, under lessons based on the difference between fruits and seeds. A special study of birds was made during the winter months. Mr. Horne based his lessons on the songs and bird calls of 72 different birds of North America, as recorded in the laboratory of ornithology, of Cornell University. He also used koda-chrome slides in connection with the recordings. At other times the members of the club participated in the program by pointing out the different birds from colored plate charts, at the same time they heard the recordings, which were so realistic that the club actually enjoyed "field trips indoors."

The club enjoyed a special field trip to study the flora of spring and the birds in the month of May, when Miss Gibson was their hostess at her summer home at Mount Pocono, for their annual spring social





DRAFTING SHOP



In the industrial world we find that drafting is a necessity.

In the Vocational Department of Bethlehem High School there are three separate drafting shops. Mr. Alexander is in charge of the Freshman Class in which he familiarizes you with most of the drawing equipment. Drafting as a whole is very difficult. For this reason Freshmen are taught simple, mechanical, and architectural drawings which will equip them for their second year's work.

Mr. Andrucci is the instructor of the Sophomore Class. Here he develops their previous year's work into neatness, accuracy, and precision. They are taught to detail and assemble mechanical drawings along with reading of blue prints, inking, tracing, and developing blue prints.

Besides mechanical and architectural drawings there is structural work which is supervised by Mr. Dubbeling. Structural Drawing consists of detailing beams and columns. This is one of the most important phases in the drafting department. For this reason the Junior and Senior Draftsmen spend their last two years in this important field.

We are more than grateful for the opportunities that we have obtained through our trade. In previous years, draftsmen from our school have been employed by the Bethlehem Steel Company. Our school made it possible for their success and now we are hoping for the same success.



ELECTRIC SHOP

Under our capable instructor, Mr. Joseph Risbon, we, the graduating class of the electrical shop, have learned a great deal in our three years with him.

In the electrical shop we learned the fundamentals of electricity, house wiring, wire calculations, A. C. and D. C. theory, motor work and winding. We also had experience of maintenance iobs in the different shops.

Our last year with Mr. Risbon, we felt, was the best year any student could have in school. Although we studied and worked hard, we found time to discuss personal problems that dealt with school work and problems outside of school. It was with his understanding and good advice toward our problems that helped us learn the work without difficulty.

In our annual open house, electrical shop had one of the best displays in school. The boys showed they have talent and knowledge in the field of electricity.

When next fall rolls around, we feel that we shall miss going back to school more than anyone, for the years we spent there were good, both in work and play. We hope that the graduating classes following us will have good years as we have had.



MACHINE SHOP



Technical High School has three machine shops. Each shop teaches a certain part of the machinists trade to the student. The students are placed in the shops according to the grade they are in. The students in Machine Shop rotate every third month.

In Mr. Ross's shop the students have an opportunity to use the newer machines. Mr. Hope teaches the students to run the milling machines, shapers, and the power hacksaw. In Mr. Hibberd's shop there are the benches, vises, drill presses, and the do-all saw. In this shop we do a lot of filing, repair work, and our do-all project.

The three years course at Tech is planned so that each grade has several projects to complete in a year. Along with each project comes a blueprint and procedure. Also accompanying the latter are questions and reading material which has to be done in order to make a good grade. Each student must work to the best of his ability in order to pass the course.

Our Machine Shop does much repair work for the Bethlehem School District, Water Department, and Fire Department. In addition to these we do whatever work has to be done around the school and for the faculty.


We at Technical High School are proud to see that so many of our past graduates have made good in their respective occupations. Many of the boys are now working in our local industries. We feel sure that this department and its instructors will continue their good work in the future as they have done in the past. We hope that the boys who have graduated and who will graduate will be a credit to the community and to the school.



WOOD SHOP

From the time of the earliest settlers to the present day, wood has been the basis of many of our industries. Wood was the one product which the settlers of America depended upon. All of their homes, furniture, and many of their tools were made of wood.

The wood working industry ranks third among our industries, despite the vast number of substitutes for wood. It employs thousands of people to produce useful as well as beautiful articles. Wood has sometimes been called "the indispensable material of mankind."



The wood shop is one of the most important shops in our school. It is a spacious, well-kept shop. Mr. Donald L. Detweiler, the instructor, has encouraged the students to take an interest in the study of wood, its sources, its uses, the value of it, and the care and use of tools and machinery.

Woodworking in itself is a fascinating art. The creative ability of the boys is expressed in woodworking. This trade trains the hand as well as the mind.



AUTO SHOP



Auto Mechanics is a trade which appeals to many boys, simply because of its practical uses. Due to this fact, year after year, the auto shop has an overflow of eager applicants who wish to learn the trade.

The shop is small in size but large in experiences. Because of the small floor area, some students do the practical work, while others study the theory for a future assignment. Theory is the most practical subject in this shop.

The instructor in this shop is Mr. H. K. Pierce, an experienced auto mechanic, who has been in this trade for many years.

Many of the students in this course are from the rural sections, and are particularly interested in auto mechanics because of the close relationship between this work and the operation of farm machinery.

The work done in the shop is done strictly by the students. They bring in cars from their own families and from other students. No ou side work is done other than that done on the school trucks.

Close relations exist among the school, automobile dealers of this area, and through them several national manufacturers. This relationship assures almost every student a desirable position either in or outside this area.



PRINT SHOP

Men, women, and children of all parts of the world want to know the latest news of the day, the reports of stock markets, sports, and other items of interest. In the cities large printing shops are in operation, probably running two or three shifts a day, printing newspapers and other materials.

In small towns where a few hundred people live, a printing office of some kind will be found, passing out a weekly journal or gazette. In many towns people come from the rural districts or mountains to a post office or general store to get their newspaper. Newspapers and magazines bring to the eyes of the public the wonders of the world, as well as luxuries and the necessities of life.




The printing trade is taught in the Bethlehem Vocational Department under the most ideal conditions. The shop is divided into three departments. The composing room contains about two hundred and sixty cases of type, eight type cabinets, furniture cabinets, and a proof press. The press room consists of a Kelly press, a Miehle vertical press, a 10" x 15" C. and P. press, a Hartford, Press, and an 8" x 12" C. and P. press. The binding room has a paper cutter, stitcher, perforator, automatic folder, and a paper drill. The shipping room, where all the jobs are packaged. Printing for the Bethlehem School District and various high schools is done here.

The shop is under the direction of Mr. A. W. Hunsinger, who is a very capable teacher of printing. This can be seen in the way that groups are taught the fundamentals of various processes of printing. This enables students to go into industry and specialize in the art of printing.



RADIO SHOP




Approximately thirty students spend half their time at Tech studying about something which helped win the war, entertains millions of people each day, and is now helping the people of the world to know just a little more about each other—the radio.

Under the able instruction of Mr. Hartman, the radio course is considered to be the most difficult one at Tech. It is not quite so easy and wonderful as most students think; it requires a sound background in mathematics, a thorough understanding of the principles of electricity and magnetism, and, unlike many courses where previous material learned may soon be forgotten, "old" material must be remembered because one concept leads to and is based on another.

The radio course itself is actually divided into two parts: academic and applied. Academically, the students study theory, work theoretical problems, and hold long discussions concerning the various problems and theories. In respect to applied work, the Juniors build a 5 tube superheterodyne radio if time permits. In their senior year, the students get acquainted with the characteristics and uses of the oscilloscope, vacuum-tube voltmeter, signal-generator, and many other instruments.

The radio industry is one of the fastest growing in the United States. The radio course at Tech offers a good foundation to those students interested in entering the radio field.

Sounds Familiar? Many times during football and basketball seasons, our teams have been cheered on to victory by our peppy cheerleaders.


The squad consisted of five boys and eight girls. This year we had only three veterans remaining. The ten new recruits were selected last spring.




MAJORETTES

This year there were three things different from other years. The first one was a head majorette, Irene Brady, who wore a different uniform and led the other majorettes in their drills.



The Bethlehem High School football team opened their 1949 season against Southern High of Philadelphia. The Bethlehem boys showed plenty of potential talent although losing 27-10. It was

the first time in many a year that the Liberty lads dropped an opening verdict.

In their second outing the "Red Hurricane" swept their second Philadelphia rival of the year, Overbrook High, right off the field. Five of Coach Johnny Butler's proteges scored, while holding Overbrook scoreless. Len Capuano led the way scoring 12 of the 34 Bethlehem High School points.

Phillipsburg was Bethlehem's next opponent. The Garnet and Gray of Phillipsburg took the measure of the Butler Boys by a 13-7 score. The final gun found Bethlehem desperately trying to pull this one out on the Phillipsburg one yard line. Len Capuano went 58 yards in the first period for Bethlehem's only score.

In the fourth game of the season Coatesville, for the second successive season, nosed Bethlehem out by a 6-0 score. Although the Red and Blue of Bethlehem outdid the visitors, according to statistics, they couldn't convert their surplus 116 yards into a touchdown.

Bethlehem High upset the dopesters on October 14 to garner their second victory of the campaign. Billy Bauder put the foot, into football, by booting 2 points. After the touchdown, one of which provided the winning margin, Len Capuano scored his fourth and fifth touchdowns, to lead the Hurricane. The final score was: Bethlehem 14-Reading 13.

The Red Rovers of Easton, sporting a 5 game winning streak, became the next victim of the rampaging Hurricane. Easton fell by the wayside 13-6. Len Capuano again scored the 2 Bethlehem touchdowns.

The Hazleton Mountaineers were treated roughly by the Liberty Lads. Len Capuano scored 2 T.D.'s, while Bob Lasko and Howie Johnson both dented the goal line, once. The final score was 27-0. For the 4th successive week, Len Capuano scored 2 T.D.'s, while Bethlehem was punishing

In their next game Coaches Preletz and Troxell took the team out of the state to best P'burg, N.J., 59-47, for their eighth victory.





A.C.C. defeated Bethlehem 72-65 for the Vikings third win of the season over the Bethlehemites.


On February 14, the Red Knights of Reading succumbed to the basketballing of a fair Bethlehem crew. The final score was 65-46.

These boys and the others on the team were instrumental in making the 1949 season one of the best soccer years completed at Bethlehem High School.






The Bethlehem wrestlers concluded their 1950 season by defeating Northampton wrestlers 23–13.

All in all, the Liberty Lads won 3 meets while losing 5.





The most important event of the year was the joint aquacade, with the Boys' Swimming Club, which was performed for the public on January 25 and 26 and showed the accomplishments of the club members.



When we returned after the Christmas vacation, I remember how excited we were about the impending election of our own class officers. Then, too, I remember, we were introduced to our class advisors—Miss Doris Harrison and Mr. Nevin Cook.

Next we got together with the sophomores to elect officers for the Student Council. Now it was our turn to campaign, and we came through with Kenneth Pulley as president; Bob Cook as vice-president; Mary Donchez as secretary; Gail Edgar, social activities secretary; and Marilyn Bennet, treasurer.

We had one more election that year—the election of our class officers for the senior year. Surprisingly enough, we re-elected each and every one of our junior class officers.

And somehow it was June again, and there was the usual rush to get everything done in time for finals. After a tough siege with the exams, we were glad to say goodbye to school for a little while.

Another September, another school year, and we were seniors at long last. How can I describe our feelings as we walked through the familiar halls those first few weeks of September, 1949? The sophomores looked to us for advice and guidance, and the juniors treated us with the proper reverence and respect.

Suddenly we found ourselves in a whirl of activities—Cauldron questionnaires, requests for Cauldron pictures—activities labeled "For Seniors Only".

With a touch of nostalgia we matched the football games, attended the pep dances (sponsored by us, this time), and the pep meetings.
