Her Husband's Picture Seen In Magazine

A picture of the staff of "Stars and Stripes," U. S. Army publication, sitting about the conference table in the newspaper's offices in the London "Times" building and printed in the June "National Geographic" magazine, brought unexpected delight to Mrs. Harry Harcher and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Clymer, 519 Sixth Avenue, Bethlehem.

Seated third from the right in the group Mrs. Harcher discovered her husband, Captain Harcher, who is associate editor of the overseas sheet.

Captain Harcher is the son of Mr.

and Mrs. Andrew Harcher, 318 West Fourth Street. He entered the service October 1, 1941 as a second lieutenant and was sent to Iowa, where he lived for a time with his wife and 2-year-old daughter, Helen. In June 1942 he was promoted to first lieutenant and joined the staff of "Stars and Stripes" in London. He later flew to Africa and helped put out the African edition for the boys of the AEF. He remained there four months.

A graduate of Bethlehem high and Lehigh University, Captain Harcher was among the men of the first convoy to land in England.
