
Service Rewarded

The letter went on to state, "By such real and tangible contributions your son and the son of many American women have made possible our great victory in Europe."

The young sergeant was em-ployed in the offices of the P. B. and N. E. R. R. here at the time of his enlistment in the Army Air Corps January 5, 1942. He has been serving over-seas since the fail of 1942, when he landed in Africa, then moved up through Sardinia, Corsica and Southern France. France.
