Local Sailor Serves As "Lookout" Aboard Carrier

Marino Rosco, S 1/C, is one of the lookouts who serve as the "eye of the ship" aboard a U. S. carrier in the western Pacific.

With the safety of the ship, as well as the lives of their shipmates, depending upon their alertness and accuracy, lookouts are chosen for good vision and ability as ship and plane recognition experts. Their stations are on platform levels high above the water, each man being assigned a sector of the horizon. During battle Rosco is exposed but his work goes on. Despite the danger, many of them prefer their station because they offer grandstand seats for the action.
