LEHIGH CO. Two 911 dispatchers recognized

Lehigh Co 911 dispatchers Zach Bilder and Zara Collins were recognized for helping deliver babies in separate emergency calls during the May 10 Lehigh County Commissioners' meeting.

On April 17, with the help of PowerPhone, Collins was able to provide instructions during an active labor, helping to deliver a baby boy just before the arrival of EMS.

Less than a month later, on May 9, Bilder answered a similar call, helping a woman in active labor also deliver a baby boy prior to EMS arriving at the scene.

Chair Geoff Brace took the opportunity to remind everyone of the importance of the sometimes-overlooked work of the county's 911 dispatchers. It's "the regular reminder that the 911 system takes in all kinds of calls. And sometimes, the good news is the birth of a child in our community. That it happened twice in a couple of weeks ... they will remember that, for the rest of their career, I'm sure."

In other business, Jonathan Strauss was appointed to Lehigh-Northampton Airport Authority for a term expiring Dec. 31, 2026.

Beth Halpern was appointed to Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority for a

BAPL reopens with new floor plan

At an April 29 open house, the Bethlehem Area Public Library unveiled its newly renovated first floor to the general public. At a cost of \$450,000, which was raised through gifts, bequests, donations and fundraisers, the reference desk is now centrally located and new lower book shelves give a more open and better lit feel to the first floor.

"I'm thrilled," says executive director Josh Berk, "and it's a complete transformation in a short period of time."

Berk says a new computer lab is also coming.

The new configuration, with the reference desk centralized and shelves radiating outward from it, reminds one of a wheel with spokes.

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Bethlehem Food Co-op hires its first manager

The Bethlehem Food Co-Op has hired its first-ever general manager, who joined the organization May 1.

Following a national search that began last fall, the co-op's board has named Eric Shamis of Easton to the new position. He will work closely with the board to guide the fit-out of the store in the space leased from Peron Development, as well as the hiring of employees and opening of the store.

Said Shamis: "I am thrilled to take part in the historical movement that is creating a community hub in the heart of Bethlehem. It's an exciting opportunity to offer healthy, locally sourced and reasonably priced food

in a fun and inviting atmosphere."

The co-op, which was organized in the fall of 2011, is working to bring a community-owned, 'everyone welcome' grocery store to 250 E. Broad St., Bethlehem. The full service market is scheduled to open in late 2023.

"We're excited to have found Eric to lead us into the next important phase of the Bethlehem Food Co-Op," said Carol Ritter, chair of the co-op's board. "His experience and values are a great fit for our organization, and we are very excited to begin working with him."

Homicide arrests

Lehigh County District Attorney Jim Martin and Allentown Police Chief Charles Roca have announced arrests in a homicide investigation.

Three men are charged with the Aug. 31, 2022 killing of 22-year-old Najeer Lane of Allentown. Lane died from a gunshot wound to the back.

Xavier Grenon, 33, of Whitehall; Legious Robert Minder Jr., 21, of Bethlehem, and Frederick Antwan Marks Jr., 23, of Bath; are all charged with firearms infractions, aggravated assault, conspiracy to commit homicide, attempted homicide and homicide.

Hearts of Gold shines brighter

The Pediatric Cancer Foundation of the Lehigh Valley (PCFLV) raised \$249,000 at its 2023 Hearts of Gold Gala March 25. Guests enjoyed cocktails, dinner, dancing, and a live auction of children's artwork conducted by auctioneer Jason Douglas Houser.

The not-for-profit's sold-out fundraiser was hosted at the Centennial Catering and Conference Center in Center Valley. Its 350 guests brought in \$39,000 more than 2022's successful gala.

Former WFMZ anchor and reporter Will Lewis presided as the guest emcee. Currently a reporter with Fox affiliate Queen City News in Charlotte, North Carolina, Lewis remains involved with area nonprofits in the Lehigh Valley.

Singer-songwriter Kendal Conrad performed "Miss You All the Time" by O.A.R. The social media influencer from Pottstown is known for her single, "Leader of the Pack."

"It is really critical this year for us to come together to honor and remember the seven children that we lost in the past year," said Executive Director Michelle Zenie. "While we celebrate all of our warriors, this year is particularly about honoring and remembering those children." The relative high number of young patients who lost their battles against cancer includes Aiden, Sal, Tommy, Mary Jane, Alexandra, Sarrah and Hailey.

The parent of Hailey, a cancer warrior who passed away in November 2022, was keynote speaker Mike Mientus from Pennsburg.

"In our Hailey we had a princess finally, after years of waiting," sadly recalled Mientus while describing how he and his wife, Emily mourn the loss of their

daughter in November 2022 at age 7.

"We have two older boys and it finally got to the point when we were having a really great time in life," he remarked. It all changed with the devastating diagnosis of Stage 4 kidney cancer that claimed Hailey's life after a nightmarish four year battle.

Mientus expressed gratitude for the many levels of support PCFLV provided their family.

Currently a Verizon technician, Mientus is a 1997 graduate of DeSales University and played on the school's basketball team. He

later toured with the Harlem Globetrotters and various pro leagues until 2001.

The Heart of a Warrior Award was presented to Allentown residents Bill and El Sugra for their support of PCFLV through the Bill Sugra Memorial Fund. The nonprofit is named for their son, who perished in the 2001 terrorist attack on the World Trade Center.

"Miss You All the Time," a pair of ceramic angel wings, fetched the higher price at \$20,000. The piece was created by the bereaved parents who lost children to cancer in 2022. They

include Emily and Mike Meintus, along with Jashua Ortiz and Dominique Williams from Orefield who are grieving for their 2-year-old son, Aiden, who passed away in May 2022.

The winning bid was awarded to President Dennis Hower and Secretary Treasurer Brian Taylor from Teamsters Local #773 based in Whitehall.

"We made the donation in honor of one of our members whose daughter is fighting Stage 4 brain cancer," explained Hower. "We would love to hang

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Council okays resolutions, ordinances

HANOVER (LECO) TWP.

During the Hanover Township, Lehigh County, Council meeting May 3, council passed two resolutions, a conditional use correction, a hearing and ordinance adoption and accepted a proposed settlement.

Resolution 2023-38 granted final land development approval for the Patriot American Parkway Lot 3 warehouse to Exeter 1112 American Land LLC at 1112 American Parkway, Allentown.

Resolution 2023-39 provided preliminary/final land development approval for Sysco Corporation's Lot 5B at 865 Willowbrook Road.

An open record to correct the conditional use for Sysco, Lot 5A at 800 Willowbrook Road was accepted by council.

Council held a public hearing to introduce bill 2023-02 as an ordinance in chapter 27, sections 27-201, 27-402 and adding section 27-1105 of the statutory code of Hanover Township, which is the zoning ordinance. It establishes food processing, preparation, packaging and related distribution permitted as a conditional use and establishing the dimensional standards for such use and special conditions for such adjoining a residential zoning district.

Council introduced bill 2023-03, amending chapter 16 of the statutory code. It adds a new part four, establishing rules and regulations for the use of the portion of the D&L Trail in Hanover Township.

The ordinance prohibits the use of motorized vehicles, fire, cooking, consumption of alcoholic beverages, obstructions, entering or exiting at unauthorized points, solicitation, weapons, disorderly conduct and environmental disturbance, regulates animals, special events and open hours and fixing penalties for violation of the rules.

Council also approved the proposed settlement of the Target real estate tax appeal.

All resolutions and ordinances are available for view to the public by contacting the township office.

Township Manager Melissa Wehr requested township residents mark their calendar for the 2023 Hanover Township Community Night, scheduled for 4-7:30 p.m. Aug. 22. More information will be forthcoming.

Wehr also reported the

township is reviewing the process of updating its comprehensive plan for inclusion in the River Central Comprehensive Plan, which is being developed with assistance from the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission.

River Central Lehigh Valley is a multimunicipal effort that includes Catasauqua Borough, East Allen Township, Hanover Township, North Catasauqua Borough and Northampton Borough. Visit planrivercentral.org for more information.

Wehr noted the quality and satisfaction of Hanleco employees are evidenced

by the long tenure of some of the 11 township employees. Vicky Roth and Forrest Graver celebrated their 35th anniversary with the township this year. Other long-tenured include Joe Fragnito with 32 years, Dave Strongowski with 26 years, Steve Rusyn with 25 years and Pina Romano with 24 years.

That is a collective 177 years of service to the township.

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LVPC updates county council on reviews

Commission says area expected to grow by 100,000 by 2050

NORTHAMPTON COUNTY

Members of Lehigh Valley Planning Commission were present at the May 4 Northampton County Council meeting to provide the annual report.

During 2022, LVPC performed more than 1,200 reviews, including stormwater management, subdivisions and traffic impact studies. A total of 566 of those reviews were done for Northampton County.

The board also reviews residential proposals and reviewed

more than 6,400 of them in 2022.

Per square foot, non-residential proposals were largely industrial in Northampton County, with commercial, retail and office proposals significantly smaller.

The planning commission is currently working on a walk audit to increase safety and a climate plan to reduce greenhouse gases.

According to David Jan, LVPC economist and data scientist, the Lehigh Valley is expect-

ed to grow by 100,000 people and 74,000 jobs by 2050. That number equals out to about 3,000 people per year.

Northampton County specifically is estimated to increase by 16 percent, or by 50,400 people.

These predictions are made every four years and help municipalities, businesses and schools plan every part of the community.

"That probably seemed like a lot, but in reality, it just scratches the surface of what we

were able to accomplish in 2022," said LVPC Vice Chairman Chris Amato.

In other business, county Executive Lamont McClure announced the federal government is ending the federal public health emergency for COVID-19.

McClure said county employees will no longer have to wear masks or have their temperature taken before entering the building, as of May 12, and new employees are no longer required to be vaccinated against COVID-19, except those at Gracedale.

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Behind the Plate: A look at the Orioles

It's not just about the struggles of the defending National League champion Phillies or the Mets. Or the surprising rise of the Dodgers or the recent resurgence of the Yankees.

The baseball world shouldn't forget the Baltimore Orioles.

These A.L. East-leading Orioles are beginning to rekindle memories of the great Baltimore teams of the late 1960s and early 70s that featured Frank Robinson, Brooks Robinson, Boog Powell and Jim Palmer to name a few.

In this week's edition of my Behind the Plate column, I'll take a look at the highflying Orioles and their dominant predecessors, as well as the Phillies and Mets' pitching woes, and other related topics around the diamond.

Where was that pitch: Both the Phillies and Mets have begun this season with some major pitching woes. The Yankees have had their share of injuries on the mound, but they recently have shown signs of heading in the upward direction.

As for the Phillies, they began Saturday's play with a team ERA of 4.68, ranked 24th in MLB and a tad ahead of the 25th Mets (4.78). The Yankees were seventh with a 3.73 account.

Phil Plops: With Aaron Nola and Zack Wheeler at the top of the rotation, and veteran Tjuan Walker leading the back end, the Phils looked poised to defend their NL crown.

Not so. It has been a disastrous start for the Fightins' with Nola and Wheeler trying to find their groove, and little support from the rest.

Nola (4.45 ERA) and Wheeler (4.06) have shown signs of breaking out of their slump, while Walker (6.53) has still struggled. Youngster Bailey Falter (0-7, 5.13) had to take a trip to Lehigh Valley, and fellow youngster Matt Strahm (2.81) has been the most consistent starter. Reliever Craig Kimbrel (6.19) hasn't been consistent.

The Phils claimed ex-Dodger starter/reliever Dylan Covey off waivers as a possible stop gap to help bolster the starting staff. Ranger Suarez is back in the rotation, and it should help. However, there is little to run through the pipeline from Lehigh Valley.

Through 44 games, the Phils staff had 11 saves, a WHIP of 1.39, and the team had more errors (22) than double

After winning the district title last year and making a run to the

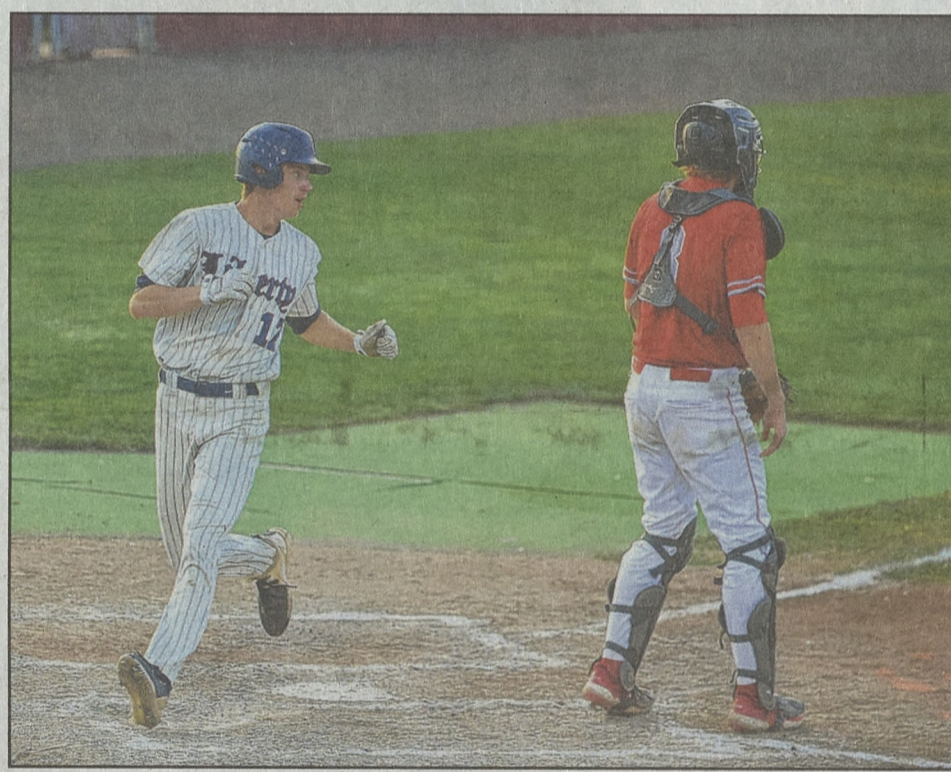

When Jeff Karam stepped down as head coach of Bethlehem Catholic's wrestling program this spring, the shoes to fill his role were always going to be big.

Mike Cole feels excited about that opportunity to step in and take over Karam's role, as he was announced the new head coach of the Golden Hawk program last week.

Cole, who is an assistant coach and computer science teacher at Hunterdon Central in New Jersey, now takes over a program that has won nine PIAA team titles, including a sweep of last year's individual and team tournament championships.

"It was always in my plans

to be a high school teacher and a wrestling coach," said Cole. "We're from Pennsylvania and we always talked about going back to PA and when this opportunity came up, I thought it was a chance I couldn't pass up."

His coaching career has spanned at Division-I Clarion University, Rutgers University and Caldwell, North Hunterdon and Hunterdon Central high schools.

"I never really cared if I was a head coach or not throughout my career," said Cole. "The opportunity to lead an influence the caliber of wrestlers and the community of Bethlehem Catholic is what got me excited. I got to meet the majority of the team and parents over the weekend and

everyone was very welcoming."

The Hawks return eight wrestlers from last year's state championship team, including state champions Keanu Dillard, Nate Desmond and Kollin Rath.

"What excited me the most about this position is that Bethlehem Catholic is already great and I have to be very specific and smart about keeping them there," he said. "My idea is I'm not going to change anything until I learn everything that's going on. I plan on retaining the coaching staff and keeping it the same and figure things out. 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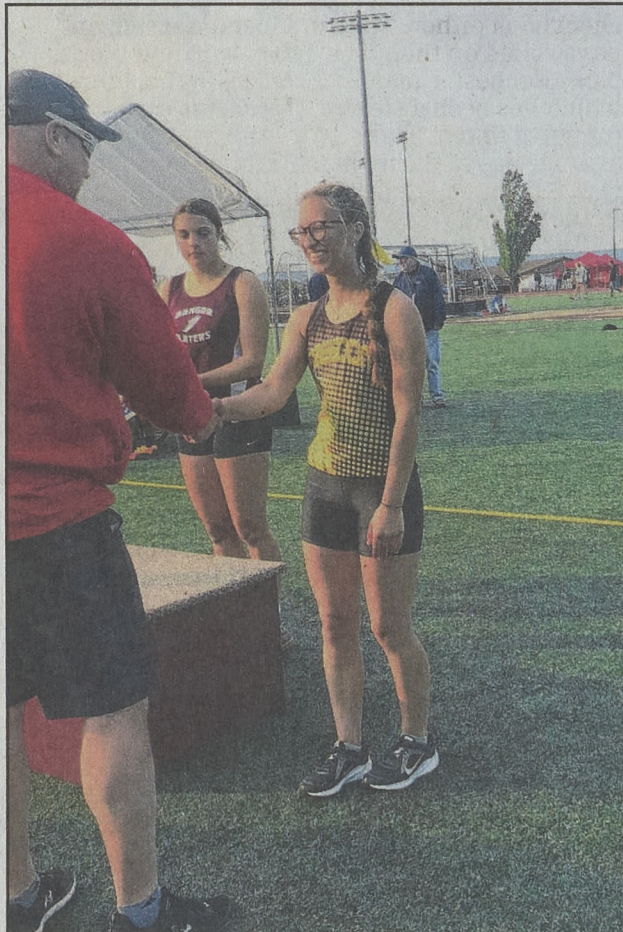
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Bethlehem Catholic's Mekhi Britt receives the bronze medal for the 800 meter run at the District XI Class 3A Track and Field Championships on May 17.

Mets Miscues: Like the Phillies, the Mets' staff also has had its shares of problems. Injuries to starters Just Verlander and Dan Scherzer have slowed the anticipated fast start. Through 46 starts, Scherzer had six starts and Verlander had three. There already have been plenty of red flags waved as to whether the 38-year-old Scherzer and 40-year-old Verlander are starting to show their age.

Japanese import Kodai Senga has been their most consistent starter (4-2, 3.71), while David Peterson has imploded (1-8, 8.08). Tyler Megill also has been able to steer a somewhat steady course (5-2, 3.88).

Entering Sunday's doubleheader, the Mets' staff had a 1.38 WHIP with 13 saves. Their defense behind them

has been better than the Phillies, as they had committed 15 errors and turned 42 double plays.

High In The Nest: Through their first 44 games, the Orioles had a 28-16 record and were 3.5 games behind the Rays. In any other division, Baltimore would have been in first place.

Yet, this isn't your recognizable lineup compared to the likes of Robinson, Powell, and Palmer from the past. Instead, it is a bunch of relatively no-name youngsters with a no-name manager.

Brandon Hyde has re-energized the club over the last four years as the club's skipper, and he was baseball's Manager of the Year last season for his team's 21-game improvement from 52 to 83 wins. It was the first time Baltimore was over the .500 mark since 2017 when Buck Showalter led them to 89 wins.

The O's front office

hasn't done it with a big checkbook either. They have relied on their Triple-A Rochester team, which has been a steady funnel of talent. The average age of the team is 27.62, fourth youngest in the majors.

You may have to look twice at the names of Austin Hays, Cedric Mullins, Ryan Mountcastle, who have been among the team's offensive leaders. Mullins was the O's All-Star representative in 2021.

On the mound, it has been Dean Kremer, Tyler Wells, and Kyle Gibson in the rotation, and Felix Bautista and Danny Coulombe in the bullpen. The team's batting average is a modest .253 and their staff ERA is 4.13, both not typically reflective of first-place teams.

If you're an Orioles fan, these names are now household ones.

These Orioles don't have the glaring numbers from the teams of the past. From 1968-80,

the Orioles didn't have a losing season, and they won one World Series in their three appearances.

During their heyday, they had one of baseball's best lineups with Powell at first, Davey Johnson at second, Mark Belanger at short, and Brooks Robinson at third. Paul Blair was in center, Frank Robinson in right, and Don Buford in left. Elrod Hendricks was behind the plate with Andy Etchabarren. (Johnson spent parts of the 1977 and '78 seasons with the Phillies and had 10 homers and 50 homers in 122 games.)

Along with Palmer, Dave McNally, Mike Cuellar, and Pat Dobson formed one of the game's most successful starting staffs. Do you remember right handed submarine reliever Eddie Watt? (Watt was sold to the Phillies after the 1973 season and appeared in 42 games in 1974. However, he had

lost his touch, and was released before the '75 season.)

In their 1970 championship season, Palmer, Cuellar, and McNally had a combined record of 58-27 and the team won 108 games. The next year, they won 101 games. I remember seeing the game from Memorial Stadium in Baltimore with the camera angle from behind the plate.

This current Orioles' harvest may not reach the lofty levels of their predecessors, but they have brought some baseball fever back to a stoic baseball town with one of the game's most attractive ballparks.

Baltimore Sammy: Many of you may have forgotten that former Phillie Phanatic manager to begin the 2010 season. Unfortunately "Sammy" never got on track, and was relieved of his duties after a 17-3 start, and was replaced

by Showalter.

Oates, Johnson, and Maz, and Oates: Along with Samuel, ex-Phillies Johnny Oates had a three-year stay (1991-94) as an O's manager, and Johnson (1996-97) and ex-Met Lee Mazzilli (2004-05) each had a two-year stint.

Trivia Time: Who is the only team not to play in a World Series? It's the Seattle Mariners, who were swept by Houston last year in the ALDS. They appeared in the ALCS in 2001 - the year they had 110 wins - and also in 1995.

Who are the teams that haven't won a World Series? Try the Padres, Rockies, Rangers, Brewers, and Rays.

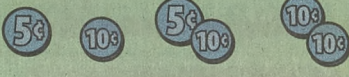

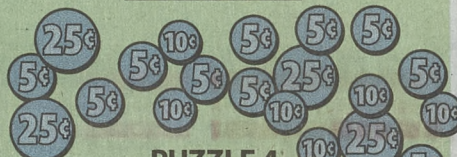

Board approves 2 Long proposals

Representing Historic Bethlehem Museums and Sites, architect Jeffrey Long was granted two certificates of appropriateness for separate project proposals for his client at the Historical and Architectural Review Board's regular May 3 meeting.

Accompanied by CEO LoriAnn Wukitsch, Long first received approval to replace a failing and historically inappropriate deck and egress steps along the south elevation of the 1869 Luckenbach Mill at 459 Old York Road. The replacement steps are to be constructed with pressure-treated wood and composite materials to match the existing ramp and egress steps at the north wall of the building. Long explained the materials were selected as the building is located within the Colonial Industrial Quarter in an area that is prone to flooding.

Contractor Donald Sorensen assisted Wukitsch and Long in securing permission from HARB for their proposal to replace a crumbling stucco over concrete block garden wall at the Kemerer Museum of Decorative Arts Gallery at 427 N. New St.

The new wall for the corner of N. New and W. Wall is to be of brick. The applicants and board agreed on the

darker red brick and the color of the mortar from samples provided by the Sorensen. The new construction, along with its iron details, is to match the existing brick walls along the north and west perimeters of property.

The properties are owned and managed by Historic Bethlehem Museums and Sites. Acutely familiar with historic guidelines Long serves as historic officer for the Historic Conservation Commission.

Troy Long from Paul Wright Roofing successfully obtained COAs for his two clients at 407 and 409 Center St. for roof replacement for their connected one-story garages at the rear of their lots.

The worn slate will be replaced with GAF Slateline Antique Slate shingles with copper

valleys and flashing with the drip edge to be white aluminum. The entire roof at 407, owned by George White, is to be replaced.

Beale Fowler, owner of the neighboring property at 409, chose to have the alley-facing roofing replaced while retaining the original slate on the side facing the back lawn.

Representing 26 W. Market St., contractor Joshua Ugden quickly received approval for sanding, prep, priming and painting the circa 1813 house. The proposal was considered "in kind," as there will be no change of colors. Repairs to a windowsill are to be made to exact dimensions, pitch and profile and will be of solid mahogany.

Gwendolyn Romeril

is listed as the owner of the property.

Voting for the above proposals was unanimous.

Having been approved at the April meeting for multiple project proposals, Erica and Brandon Horlick returned with a request to change the COA to allow GAF Timberline HDZ shingles in a slate color in lieu of the already approved GAF Slateline shingles for their home at 17 East Church St.

They said they had been told by their contractor the Timberline shingles were less expensive than the GAF Slateline Antique Slate shingles.

The vote was 4-1 to deny the substitution. The majority stated they were okay with the color and texture of the proposed shingles, but not the tapered pattern, as it does not resemble slate. Joe McGavin was the dissenting vote.

The Historical and Architectural Review Board regularly meets the first Wednesday of every month to review all exterior changes proposed to buildings in the Bethlehem Historic District north of the Lehigh River. When a proposed project receives a certificate of appropriateness from the board, applicants must wait for City Council to vote on it before proceeding. Meetings can be viewed on YouTube.

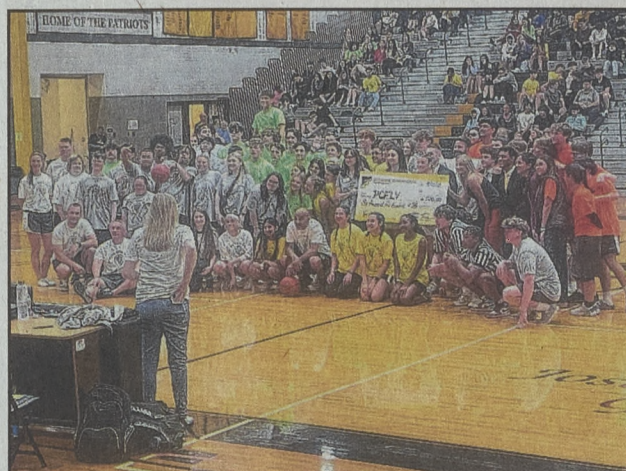

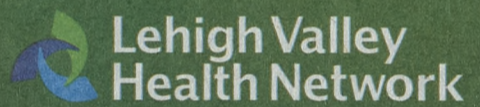

Ballet Guild of Lehigh Valley brings 'Cinderella' to Zoellner

Pennsylvania Youth Ballet-Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley (BGLV) presents its spring performance, "Cinderella," May 27 and 28, Zoellner Arts Center, Lehigh University.

With a cast of nearly 100, this is the first time in seven years that BGLV is performing the beloved fairy tale, set to the music of Sergei Prokofiev.

Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley Artistic Director and Choreographer Karen Kroninger Knerr says that the ballet version of "Cinderella" premiered in 1945.

The folk tale of the archetypal servant girl dates back 2,000 years in many variations. The earliest-known version was recounted by Greek philosopher, Strabo, between 7 B.C. and 23 A.D., about a Greek slave who

'Galaxy' of summer cinema

It's called "Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 3."

The volume in the movie is more like a 10.

"Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 3" is loud, especially in the Imax at AMC, where the movie was seen for this review.

For fans of the Marvel Cinematic Universe, "GOTGV3" should be a terrific ride, with lots of action scenes and lots of interaction in the scenes between the main characters.

Let the summer movie season begin. Admittedly, that's now the first weekend in May.

Thanks mostly to the Marvel Cinematic Universe, the start of the summer season is weeks earlier than what used to be the traditional start at the Memorial Day weekend.

In the "GOTGV3" screenplay written by James Gunn, who directs the movie, dialogue-driven character development is emphasized.

You really feel that you can identify with the characters, even if they have green skin (That would be Gamora, played by Zoe Saldana), or have antennae (That would be Mantas, played by Pom Klementieff) or are a raccoon (That would be Rocket Raccoon, voiced by Bradley Cooper).

"GOTGV3" is really an origin story about

Rocket Raccoon, who recalls his life in flashbacks throughout the movie.

Rocket Raccoon is the result of experiments on animals that include other critters: an otter, Lylla; walrus, Teefs, and rabbit, Floor. Each is oddly adorable in a Tim Burtonesque way.

What's amazing about "GOTGV3" is that not for a moment do you doubt the reality of the character of Rocket Raccoon, and his friends, who are depicted with incredible realism in the Computer-Generated Imagery (CGI).

It's a long way from the days of "Looney Tunes" cartoon characters. You care about a raccoon. Let me repeat that. You care about a raccoon, who is walking on his hind legs

and talking. Normally, you would be chasing a raccoon from the trash cans.

And you have to give credit to the actors, who are emoting behind lots of makeup and pros-

tics, amidst special effects that don't dwarf them or overwhelm them and during chaotic, often difficult to follow action scenes.

This goes for the voice actors, too, especially

Bradley Cooper, who voices Rocket Raccoon with incredible emotion and conviction.

"Pints, Pounds and Pilgrims" revival: Crowded Kitchen Players revives an original play, June 2 - 18, Charles A. Brown Ice House, Bethlehem.

"Pints, Pounds & Pilgrims" is inspired by a trip to Ireland in 2000 by members of Theatre Outlet, a former Allentown theater company, to stage an original Irish tragedy, "Crackskull Row," on the Island of Inishbofin off the coast of Connemara, County Galway. "Crackskull Row" was written by Irish-born playwright Honor Molloy and starred her mother, Yvonne Voight Molloy.

Ara Barlieb and Pamela Wallace, co-founders of Crowded Kitchen Players, were on the board of Theatre Outlet, and produced a documentary, "Pints, Pounds, and Pilgrims," about the trip and the production of the play.

When Barlieb, Wallace and Kate Scuffle and George B. Miller, Theatre Outlet managing and artistic directors, respectively, reminisced about the Irish adventure, Barlieb decided to write a farce inspired by the experience.

In the play, a manic English director feverishly rehearses her long-suffering cast in an original Irish tragedy, "A Bad Year for Potatoes," intended as the headlining event of an arts festival on the remote island of Inishbofin. Meanwhile, the director of a struggling American dinner theater mistakenly believes his troupe has been invited to perform the bedroom farce, "Undressed for Dinner," at the same festival.

The show chronicles what happens when the two theater companies, one versed in the Shakespearean classics from London, and the other specializing in bawdy dinner theater from Hoboken, N.J., are scheduled to perform in the same theater, at the same time, on the same night.

ing the reasons why you are not allowing him to spend time with his friend at his house. Go over the rules that you have established in your own home and tell him that those rules are not being followed at his friend's house. Therefore, he will not be able to spend time with him anymore," said panelist Wanda M. Arroyo.

"Talk to the other parents. Say you're not comfortable with them being alone at the park. Explain, 'These are my boundaries for my child. If you can't follow them, your son is welcome to come to our house,'" noted panelist Denise Continenza.

"Invite the parents to your home so you can talk with them and get to know them. Communicate your expectations when your son goes to spend the night at their house," Arroyo said.

"Don't make excuses," said panelist Pam Wallace. "Say, 'You are

10-years-old and this is what I'm comfortable with."

Wallace said. "It's about being direct and honest," agreed Stefanyak.

"Take it on yourself. Say, 'I know I'm over-protective, but these are the rules,'" Continenza said.

"Talk to him if he struggles with not being allowed to do this. He may think, 'Should I do it or not?' Have a conversation about guilt. Ask, 'How would it feel to know these are the rules and not follow them?'" Daniels said.

"You can also invite your son's friend to your home so he can spend the night in your home, where you can control everything and you get to know him," Arroyo said.

An alternative is to arrive early and watch the boys yourself, Continenza suggested.

"By this age, children have cell phones. Tell him he needs to text you regularly so you can keep tabs on him," Daniels said.

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Men, do not worry about this examination

Q: My doctor says it's time for a colonoscopy. Please tell me I shouldn't worry about this exam.

You definitely shouldn't worry. I've had the three major tests for colon cancer: sigmoidoscopy (very uncomfortable), the barium enema (a nightmare) and the colonoscopy.

I was given anesthesia for the colonoscopy and all I recall is getting on the examining table, feeling like I had a cocktail and waking up in recovery as rested as if I had a late-afternoon nap on the beach.

The colon, or large bowel, is about a five-foot tube that connects the small intestine to the rectum. It removes water and nutrients from digested food.

The colonoscopy is the gold-standard procedure for colon-cancer detection. The colonoscope is a slender, flexible, lighted tube with a video camera at its tip. The examining physician inserts the tube into the rectum. The scope inflates the colon to

provide a better view. The camera sends pictures of the inside of the colon to a TV monitor. The exam takes 30 to 60 minutes.

During the procedure, a doctor can remove most abnormal growths such as polyps with tiny tools passed through the scope. Most polyps are benign, but some can turn into cancer. By getting the polyps early, a colonoscopy can avoid a major operation.

Patients are given pain medication and a moderate sedative. Discuss sedation with your doctor in advance. People I know who've had the procedure have experienced different degrees of alertness, recall and discomfort.

After the exam, you might feel some cramping or gas, but it should stop within one hour. By the next day, you should feel normal. You'll probably need someone to take you

home because it takes a while for the sedative to wear off.

If your initial colonoscopy is clear and there are no polyps detected, you should schedule your next colonoscopy in 10 years. However, if polyps are detected during your colonoscopy, your physician will recommend you follow up within one to five years, depending on the type of polyp.

Now for the bad news. The preparation for a colonoscopy is awful.

Preparations vary. You take either pills or liquids to purge the colon completely. You may need an enema. You will spend a lot of time on the throne.

My doctor prescribed the liquids; they taste awful and you have to drink a lot of them. Next time, I plan to ask if I can take the pills.

During the 24 hours before the exam, you have to drink only clear, non-alcoholic liquids. You can eat only soft foods such as Jell-O. And nothing can be red because it could be confused with blood.

Your diet may permit liquids up to two to four hours before the exam. My doctor required total abstinence on exam day.

There are other colon exams available. These include Virtual colonoscopy (CT colonography), sigmoidoscopy and barium enema.

CT colonography uses Computerized Axial Tomography (CAT) scanning, a minimally-invasive procedure. CT colonography is an alternative for patients who are at risk of complications from colonoscopy such as patients who are frail. If a virtual colonoscopy finds significant polyps, they have to be removed by conventional colonoscopy.

As with a colonoscopy, a two-foot sigmoidoscope is a slender, flexible, lighted tube with a tiny video camera linked to a monitor.

In a sigmoidoscopy, the doctor inspects only the lower parts of the colon.

A barium enema, or lower Gastrointestinal (GI) examination, is an X-ray procedure. To make the intestine visible on an X-ray image, the colon is filled with a contrast material containing barium, a silver-white metal.

married the king of Egypt.

who bond as a family. It's this sense of family, of caring and of protecting each other that wins the day, and the movie-goer, in "GOTGV3."

The repartee between the characters is that of friends, say, buddies in a pick-up playground basketball game or at a beach volleyball game. Of course, in "GOTGV3," the stakes are much higher, nothing less than the future of the galaxy.

"GOTGV3" has the sense of an epic science fiction film, not unlike "Star Wars" in its band of brothers aspect, or "Star Trek" in its traveling between worlds. You get on board with the Guardians crew and hang on for the humor, the thrills and dear life.

In addition to Rocket Raccoon, other memorable characters in "GOTGV3" include Zoe Saldana as Gamora, who portrays a conflicted character who challenges the authority of the Guardians team.

Mantas, played by Pom Klementieff, is delightful and fun.

It's Chris Pratt as Peter Quill, aka Star-Lord, who is at the center of the Galaxy. As leader of the Guardians, he's sensitive, humorous and sincere.

Others in the cast of note include Dave Bautista as Drax, a loveable lummox; Chukwudi Iwuji as The High Evolutionary, the mad scientist and villain of the story; Sean Gunn (brother of James Gunn) as Kraglin, who has some nice moments; Karen Gillan as Nebula, as deep a character as the shade of her blue skin, and Will Poulter as Adam Warlock, a super hero with arrested development.

Vin Diesel voices Groot as only he can. Sylvester Stallone has what amounts to a cameo role as Stakar Ogord, a Ravager.

As with previous films in the series, "GOTGV3" provides a mix-tape of 1970s, and now through the 2000s, pop-rock hits on the soundtrack, often providing a segue between scenes, introducing an important scene and heightening the emotional content of a scene.

"Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3" is the final movie in the trilogy. There was "Guardians of the Galaxy" (2014) and "Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2" (2017), each directed by James Gunn, who also directed "The Suicide Squad" (2021). "GOTGV3" is the 32nd film in the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU).

However, the end-credits promise: "The Legendary Star-Lord will return."

We look forward to seeing where the Guardians next take us in the Galaxy.
