superintendent khouri and dr. brown resign

Resigning amid the turmoil of his fourth year as superintendent of the Bethlehem Area School District, Dr. John W. Khouri left his major plans for Liberty in the drawing board stage. The laboratory classroom center was intended to be only the first in a series of sweeping changes initiated by Dr. Khouri. He envisioned Liberty as a "school on the move" in which an independent student could work unrestricted on his own interests.

The rift which split the school district, causing the resignations of the superintendent and his assistant, Dr. Roy Brown, could be attributed to no single source, but resulted in the loss of two top administrators.

In 1969-70, Mr. Charles A. Klein entered his twenty-third year as principal of Liberty High School.

Optimistic about the years to come, he expressed the "greatest satisfaction" in seeing renovations finally take place. With repairs to the cafeteria and the construction of a new building already progressing, he faced a mountain of paperwork concerning every aspect of the school's function. Nevertheless, he was seldom too occupied to confer with a student in need of assistance. Mr. Klein, more than anyone else, personified Liberty High.

Mr. John F. Spirk's fourth year as an assistant principal at Liberty was one of innovation. A liberalized dress code was introduced, and students gained more freedom to wear what they wished to. His duties included matters relating to discipline, attendance, and student extra-curricular activities as well.

With a dedicated spirit, Mr. John C. Saunders took on the responsibilities of curriculum management and teaching records. He was also involved in the data processing of report cards, scheduling, and attendance.




all phases of english stressed by teachers

It has become an established fact at Liberty that English class is more than learning by rote. This year the English Department, under the supervision of Mrs. Ronnee Moyer, for the first semester, upheld that tradition. The nineteen teachers developed a program which, covering three years, established in each student a strong foundation in all phases of the language. After exposure to seemingly endless grammar, usage, composition, and literature courses, the senior was well prepared for any post-graduation endeavor.

English Department teachers also conducted classes in creative writing and journalism and supervised the newspaper, magazine, yearbook, and other extra-curricular activities.







all five language divisions offer wide range of courses

With an experienced staff and increasing facilities, the Language Department, headed by Miss Muriel Wilson, introduced the student not only to the rudiments of other languages, but to foreign cultures as well. The five divisions — German, Russian, Spanish, French, and Latin — presented courses ranging from introductory classes to third-or fourth-year programs involving extensive reading. Fifth-year, advanced study classes were also available to seniors.

The eleven Language Department teachers used films, outside speakers, revised texts, and the language labs to enhance the educational experience. In addition to the regular classroom sessions, each language had its own club which enlightened the members on the culture of different countries. The National Federation of Students of German, a new organization, provided extracurricular activities for ambitious students.





Miss Eckert served as the school nurse. Approval of gym and swimming excuses, and all matters concerning the dispensary were conducted by Miss Eckert.


































vo-tech school offers new, expanded fields for career placement

The Vocational-Technical School offered courses necessary to students in keeping pace with their changing technological society. Placing equal importance upon mental as well as manual skills, the school was primarily oriented for job placement rather than as a preliminary to college.

In its rapid expansion, Vo-Tech added several new subjects such as Data Processing and Cosmetology. One of the most important fields enlarged was Distributive Education. Stressing business ethics, law, and operation, this course gave the student an opportunity to gain on-the-job work experience concurrent to his classroom requirements.





practical arts departments aim to meet

the needs of students

This year, the Home Economics department worked for a better understanding in all areas of homemaking by students, teachers, and the entire community. The instructors who taught Home Economics, Mrs. Young and Mrs. Lieberman, tried to emphasize the importance of homemaking to happy family living. No new courses were added this year because of the change of location of the department in the near future. There were several electives, however, such as Child Care, Home and Family, Advanced Foods, Advanced Clothing and Homemaking, which all students were allowed to take.

The Occupational Education Department, instructed by Mr. Loupos, Mr. Kishbaugh, Mr. Senavitis, and Mrs. Rentko, was designed to meet the needs of students in becoming self-directing and self-supporting members of the community. The 66 students enrolled in this course learned through actual job experience with 31 cooperating employers in the area. They were employed in city government, school district operation, and hospitals. The students worked in the afternoon five days a week, and took courses in English, mathematics, economics, and Occupational Exploration during the morning.








'we build' exemplifies conscientious key club





enriching background — goal of culture club





President this year was Cathy Royer, vice president, Julian Allen, secretary, Janice Voorhees, and treasurer, James Werley.







choraliers vocalize at various civic affairs














young writer, literary magazine contains art, writing






Staff members agree on one of Rose Ann Cassano's suggestions for a cover.



Exchange Student Eren Savash came to Bethlehem from Adana, one of the largest cities in Turkey. The family name Savash, which translates as "war," was awarded to Eren's grandfather for his service under Ataturk in Turkey's fight to become a republic.

In coming to the United States, Eren sought to meet and understand people of another culture. She found that the differences between the countries were not great. There were, however, certain things to which she had to adapt. For example, the predominance of Christianity in this country as opposed to Islam in Turkey isolated Eren in her observance of Ramadan, a month of strict fasting. She also found that in school she was only required to take four subjects; in her native land, fifteen had been mandatory.

As a representative of an unfamiliar country, Eren often found herself giving informal talks to interested students. Consequently her year of study at Liberty not only broadened her own outlook on life, but increased the awareness of others with whom she came in daily contact.








mermaids praised for "sentimental journey"






booters take third in district xi competition





gridders record 7-2-1 slate; best since '55


donchez goes all-state

"Unbelievable!" summed up the feelings of the fans this year as Liberty's gridders plowed their way to a 7-2-1 season, rebounding from last year's winless slate. Equipped with a powerful offense, Coach Robert Buffman had his best season since arriving at Liberty in 1967. The team's only defeats came at the hands of Neshaminy and Dieruff. The one tie was a 14-14 stalemate with William Allen.

Fullback Tom Donchez received the first all-state football award to be presented to a Hurricane athlete since 1957. He carried the ball 240 times for 1,388 yards and won the Joe "Ripper" Rich scholastic scoring trophy for his ninety-eight points, tops among Bethlehem gridders. Senior Stan Reybitz earned an all-state honorable mention ranking as one of the outstanding ends in the state. Quarterback John Fistner scored thirty eight points himself and showed great leadership on the field.

The team finished with their best record since 1955, and their first winning season in twelve years. In the final game of the year, against Freedom, the Hurrican blew the Patriots all the way back to 1776 with an overwhelming victory of 50-7.





Ron Nagle and Tom Brunnabend, both in their first year on the team, finished first and second, respectively, for the Harriers in most of the meets.






cagers improve record freedom beaten twice; woodard leads scoring


liberty lassies paced by rupert and schock





5-5-1 season posted; fritz and filipos are named regional champs






marksmen place first in southern division



hartenstine sets mark in district xi finals


The Hurricane track team, paced by Tom Donchez and Mike Hartenstine, finished a tough 1970 campaign with three wins and five losses.


veteran netmen score high under new coach







599 seniors of the class of 1970 assembled in the Memorial Gymnasium to participate in the Baccalaureate Service and Commencement Exercises arranged in their honor.


