Mr. and Mrs. John F. Magee of Easton, was the gunnery officer on the U. S. Destroyer Burns, which wiped out a four-ship Japanese convoy when the American forces swarmed into the Marshall Islands ten days ago. Announcement of the action was made by the Navy two days ago and permission to announce that Ensign Magee was in the ship's complement has been given by the Office of Censorship to the Globe-Times.

Ensign Magee Jr. is the husband of the former Helen Thomas Steph-enson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Stephenson of the Saucon Valley. He is a graduate of Exeter and Yale University and at Yale was captain of the crew and was awarded the Yale trophy as the year's outstanding athlete in 1942. He has been in the Navy 18 months.

The Burns, commar ed by Comdr. Donald T. Eller, was assigned to the invasion fleet and temporarily separated from the task force, was returning to her assigned station when she sighted the four Japanese standing exploits of the war.

Prior to entering the service he was employed by the Central Railroad of New Jersey.
