An Exciting Tale Of Murder Most Foul



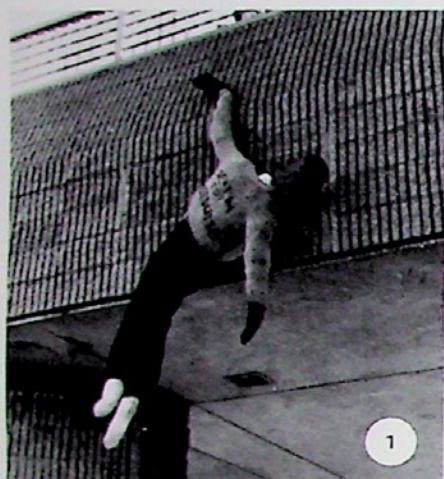

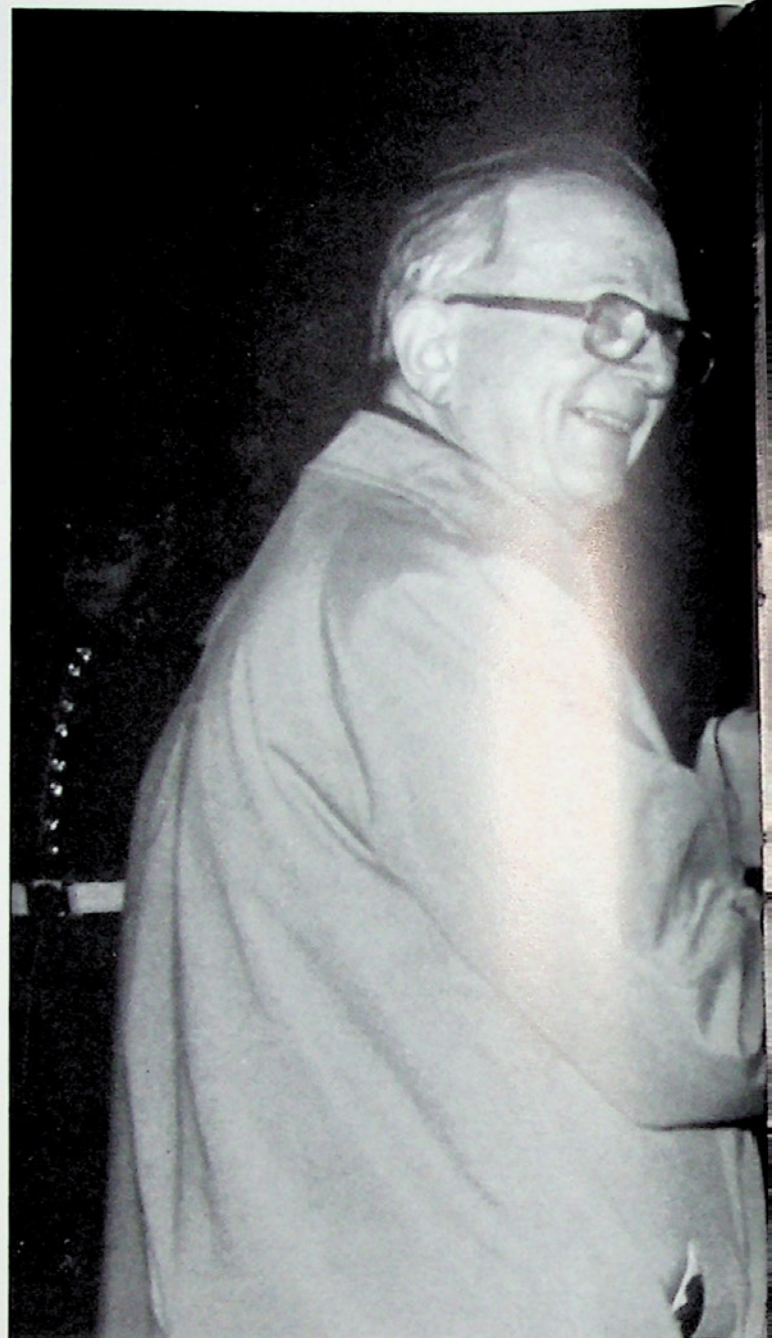
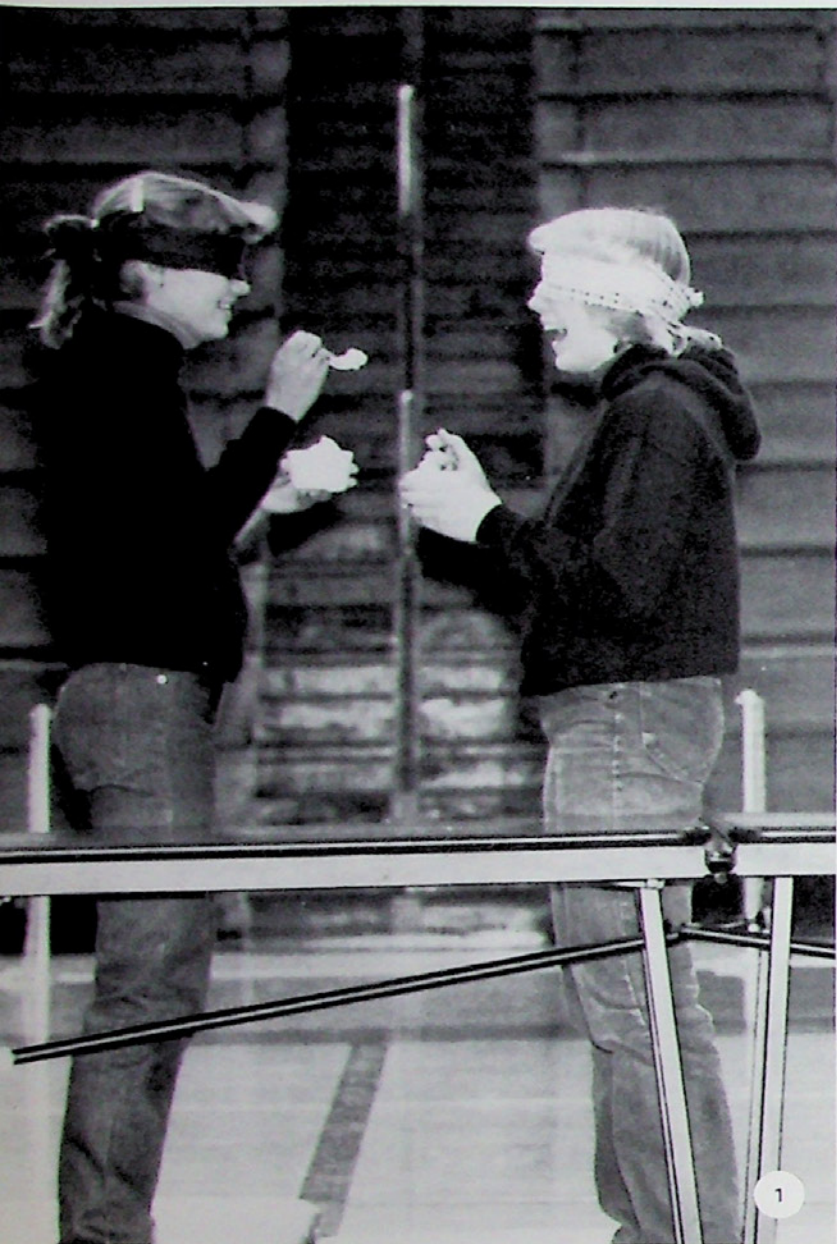
In order to keep everyone in suspense, the Homecoming court was not introduced until the very

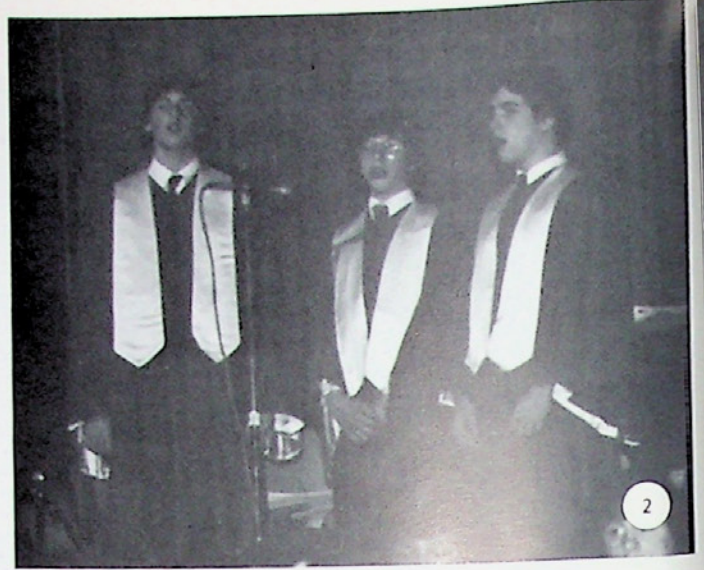

The series of sketches featured



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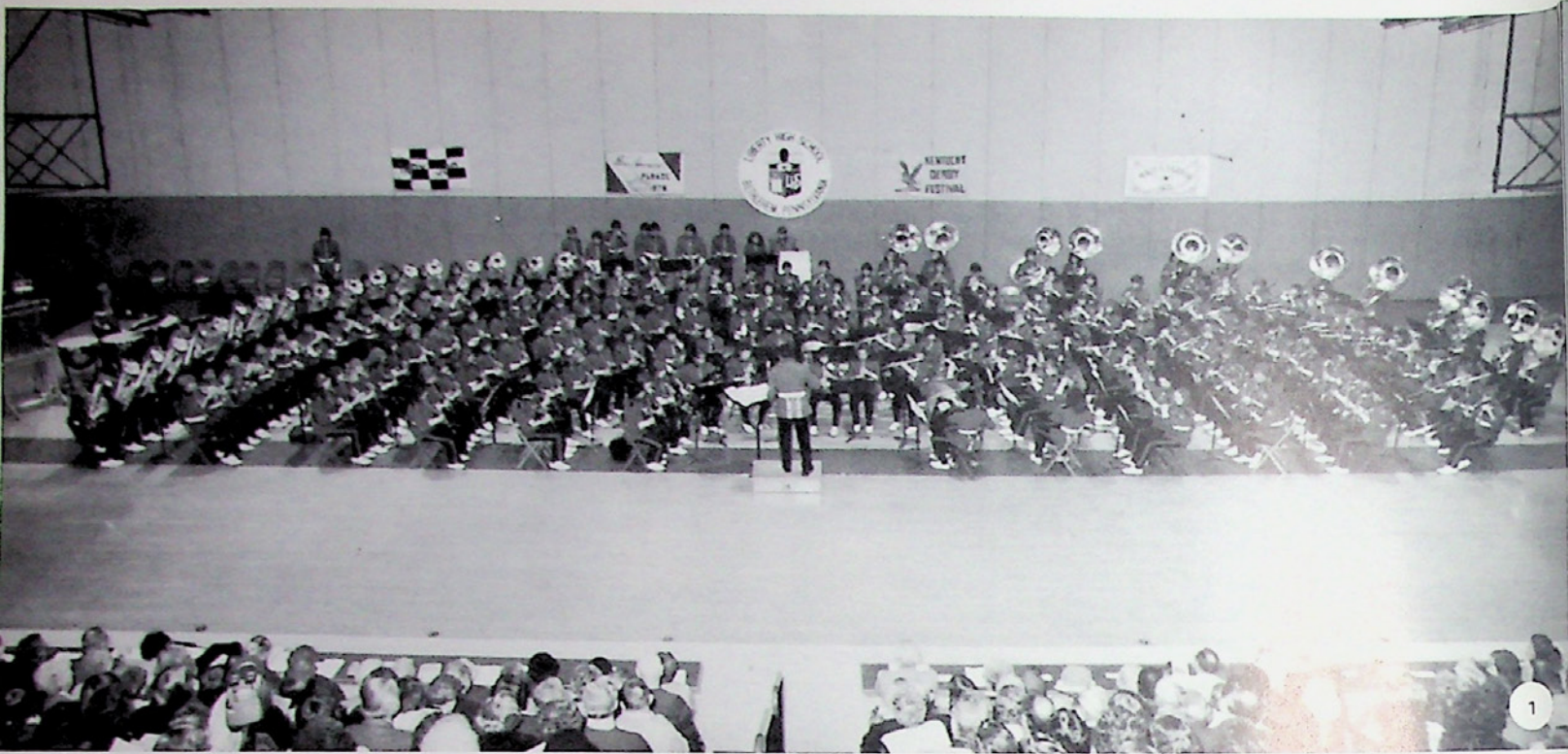

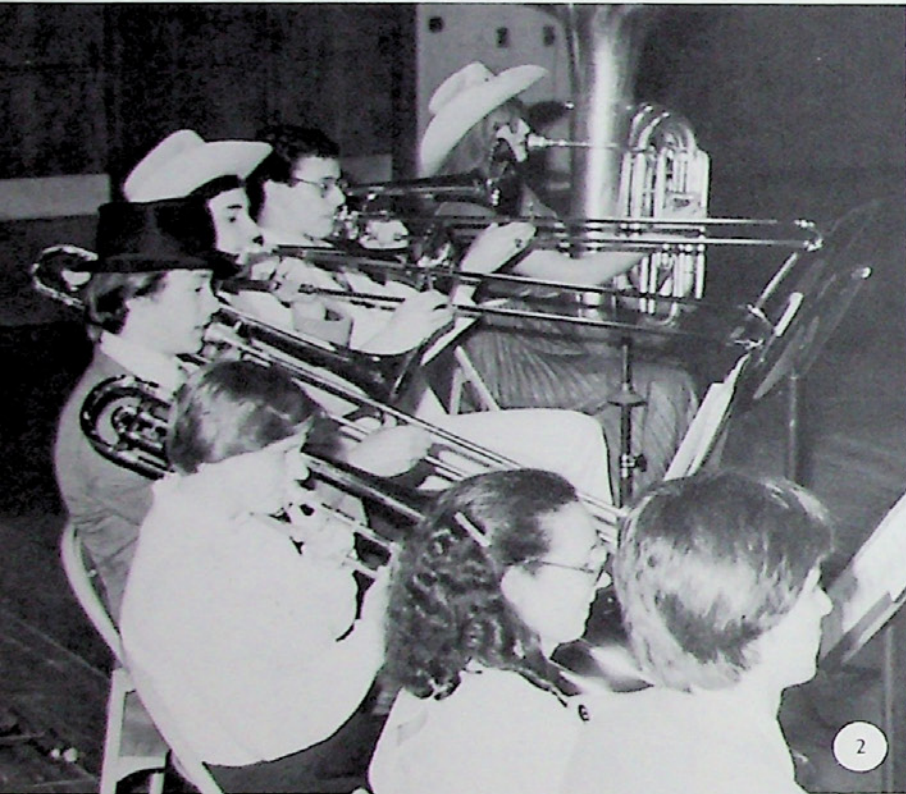
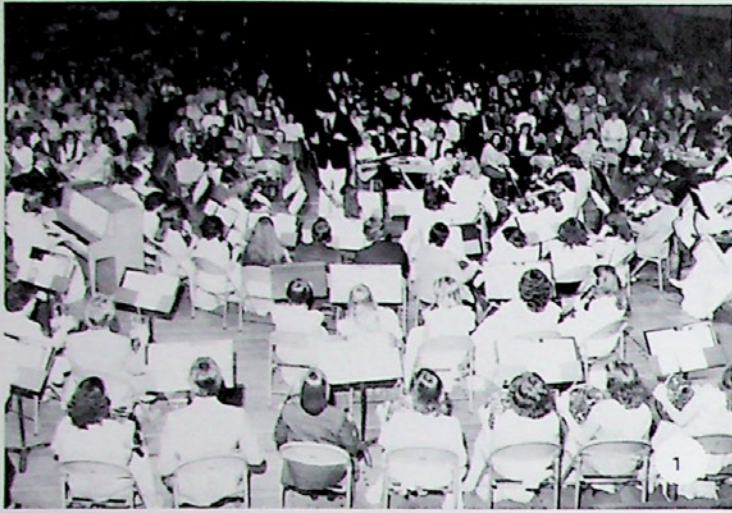

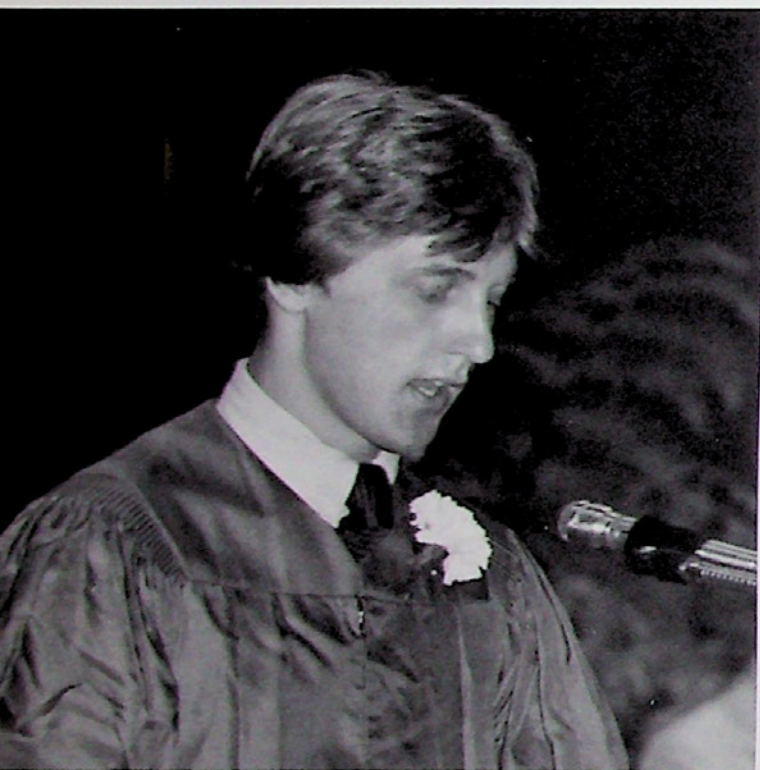


On Tuesday, June 15, 1982, another academic year at Liberty High School came to a close. Great was the excitement as Memorial Gymnasium began to fill with parents, relatives, and friends of the Class of 1982. At 7:00 p.m., as the orchestra prelude came to a close, the audience grew silent with expectation. Moments later members of the school board and officers of the school district, followed by the LHS administration,

guidance counselors, class advisers, and class officers appeared at the doorway, and, to the martial strains of Verdi's "Grand March" from *Aida*, the procession began. A roar of applause marked the entrance of the graduating class clad in traditional red and blue gowns. When the procession was complete, all stood and joined in the singing of the National Anthem, after which the invocation was given by Class President William

H. Buck.

The graduation theme was "As a flower of the field." Class Speaker Carolyn Stull spoke on "Roots of the Past," stating, "Our high school years have given us great reserves of experience from which to draw, and we must draw from them if we are to grow and flourish." Faculty Speaker Andrea Wuerth told the class, "We are the seeds of tomorrow, and I have a dream that when each of us

On a more solemn note, LHS not only bade goodbye to its seniors, but also to Assistant Principal



John F. Spirk. Mr. Spirk had been a deputy administrator at Liberty for the past 14 years.

In memory of Kraig Yurchak, a member of the class who was killed in an automobile accident a year ago, a scholarship was given by the Yurchak family. It will be awarded annually to any graduating senior who will attend an accredited four-year private college or university. Charles Matz, who will attend Moravian College in

the fall, was the first recipient.

Presentation of the graduating class was made by Superintendent Robert L. LaFrankie, and awarding of diplomas was made by School Board President Arthur Larky at which time came the traditional movement of the tassel from the left to the right side of the mortarboard.

As the program drew to a close, Class Treasurer Elizabeth Veruki presented the class memorial gift,

which represented a joint effort with the Class of 1981 and provided the school with landscaping and the new flagpole located in the front of the school.

The farewell was given by Class Secretary Gordon Kunkle, and then all stood to sing the alma mater. As the now-graduated seniors departed from the gymnasium, each took with him or her the many memories shared with friends at Liberty High School.



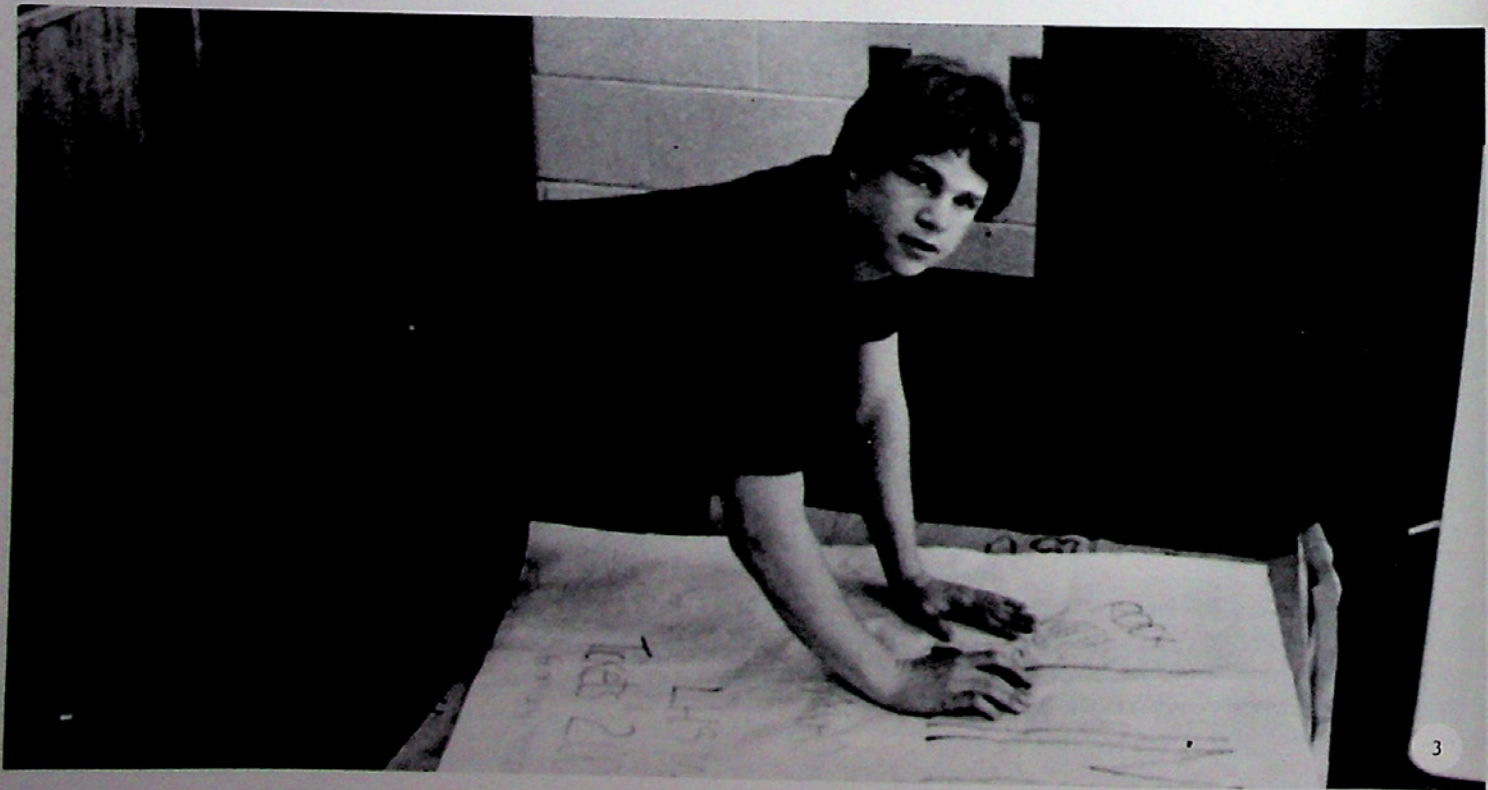
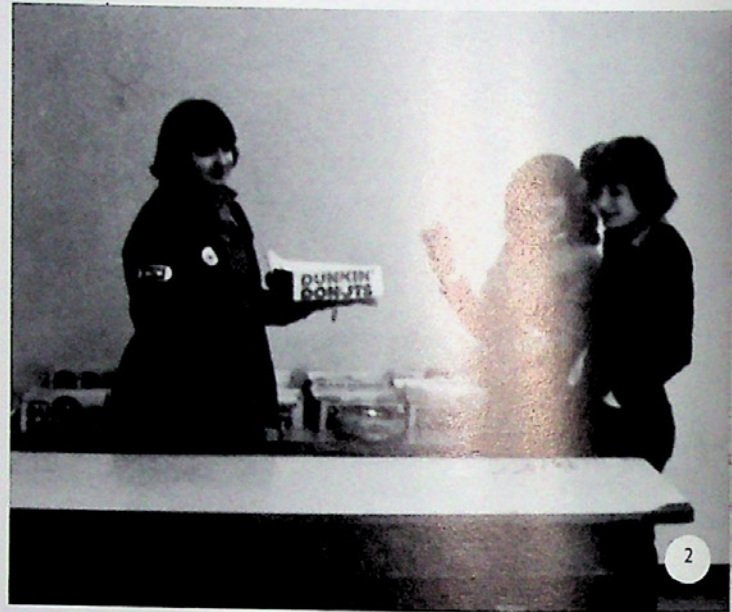

ing day.

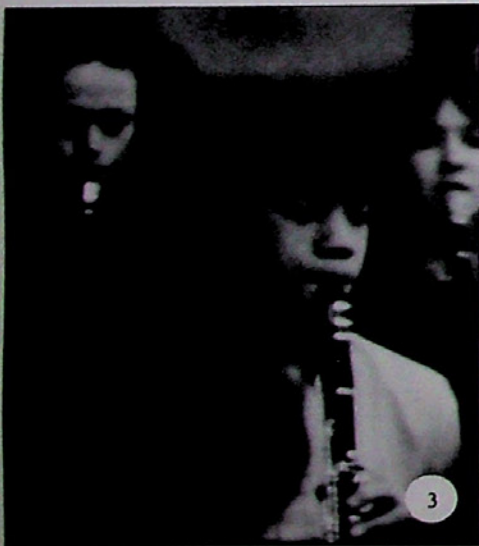

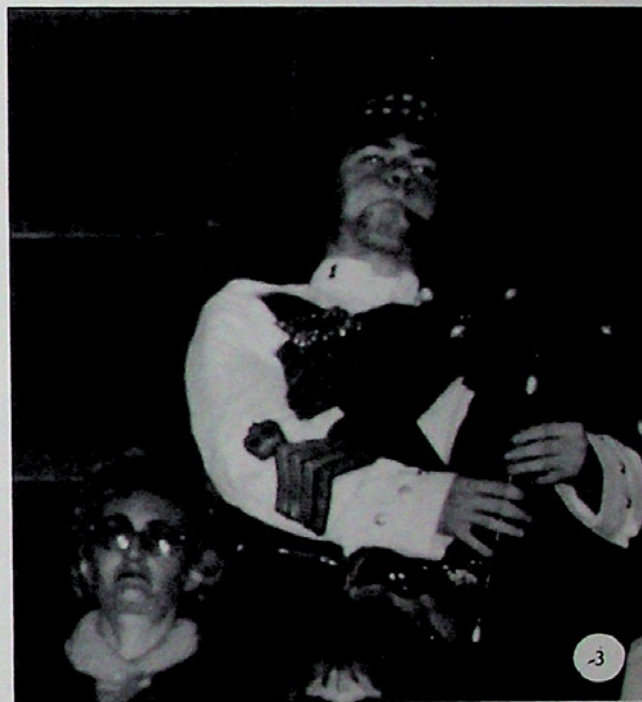
Martial Echoes Of The Highlands

genuine enthusiasm that has come to be the LHS majorettes' trademark.

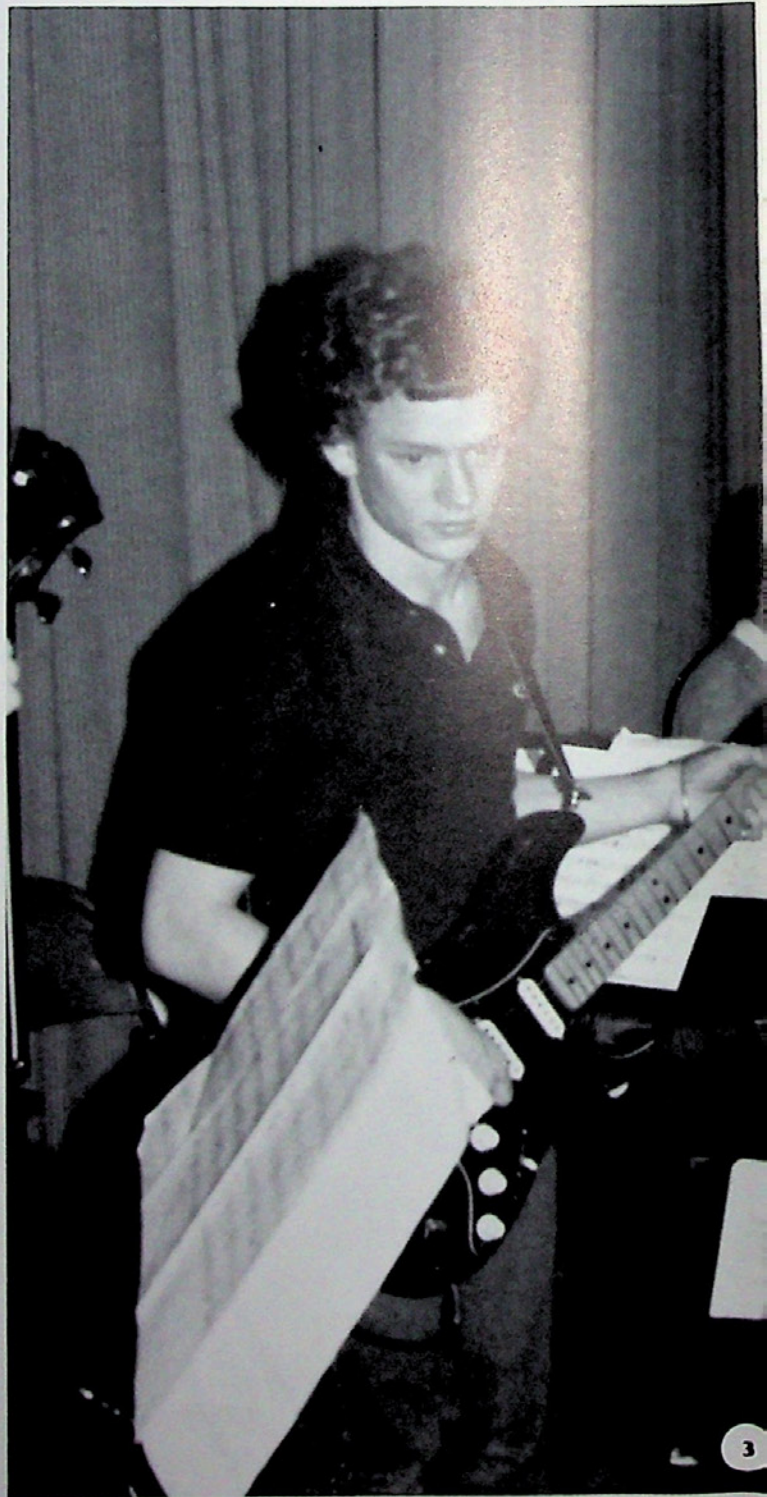

has not changed at all.

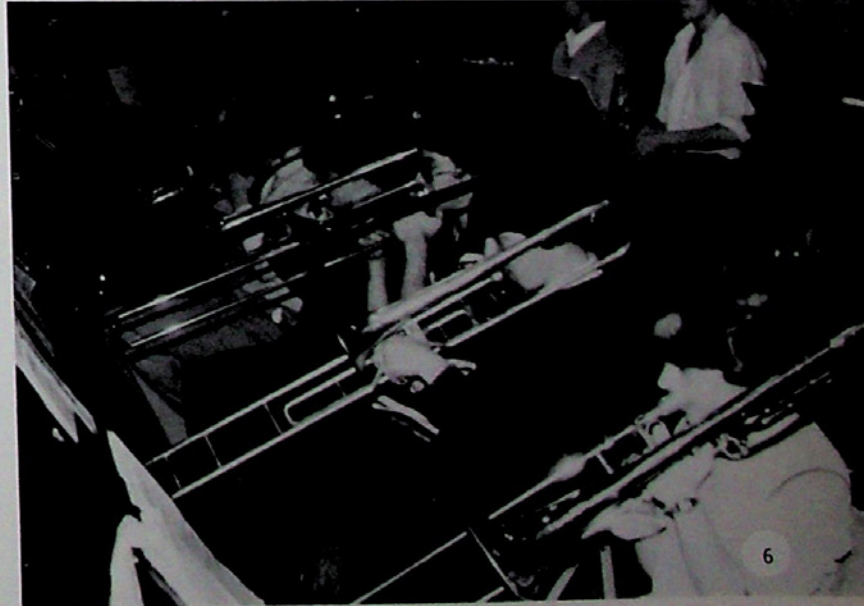

Music, Musicians, And A Mister





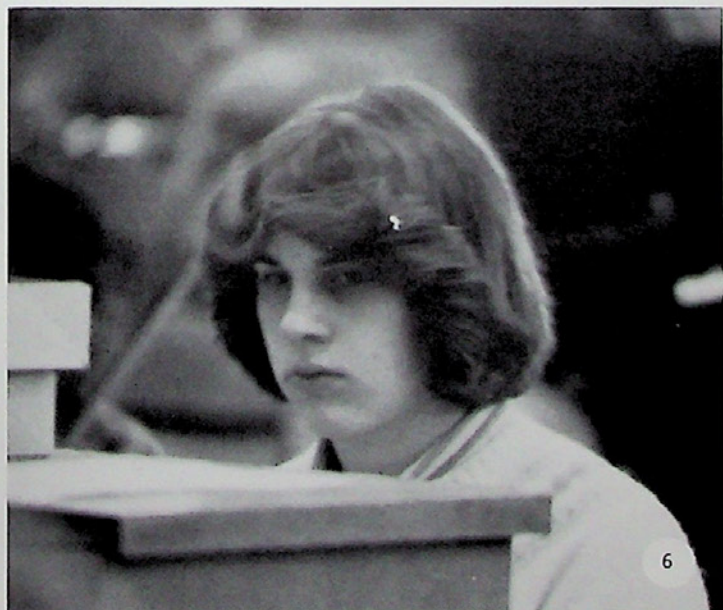
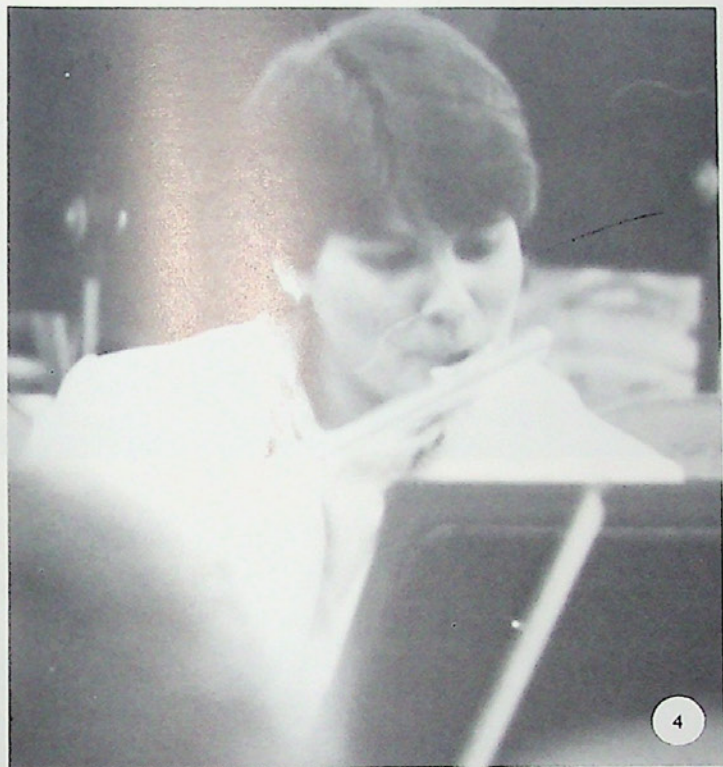

The debaters were not quite as

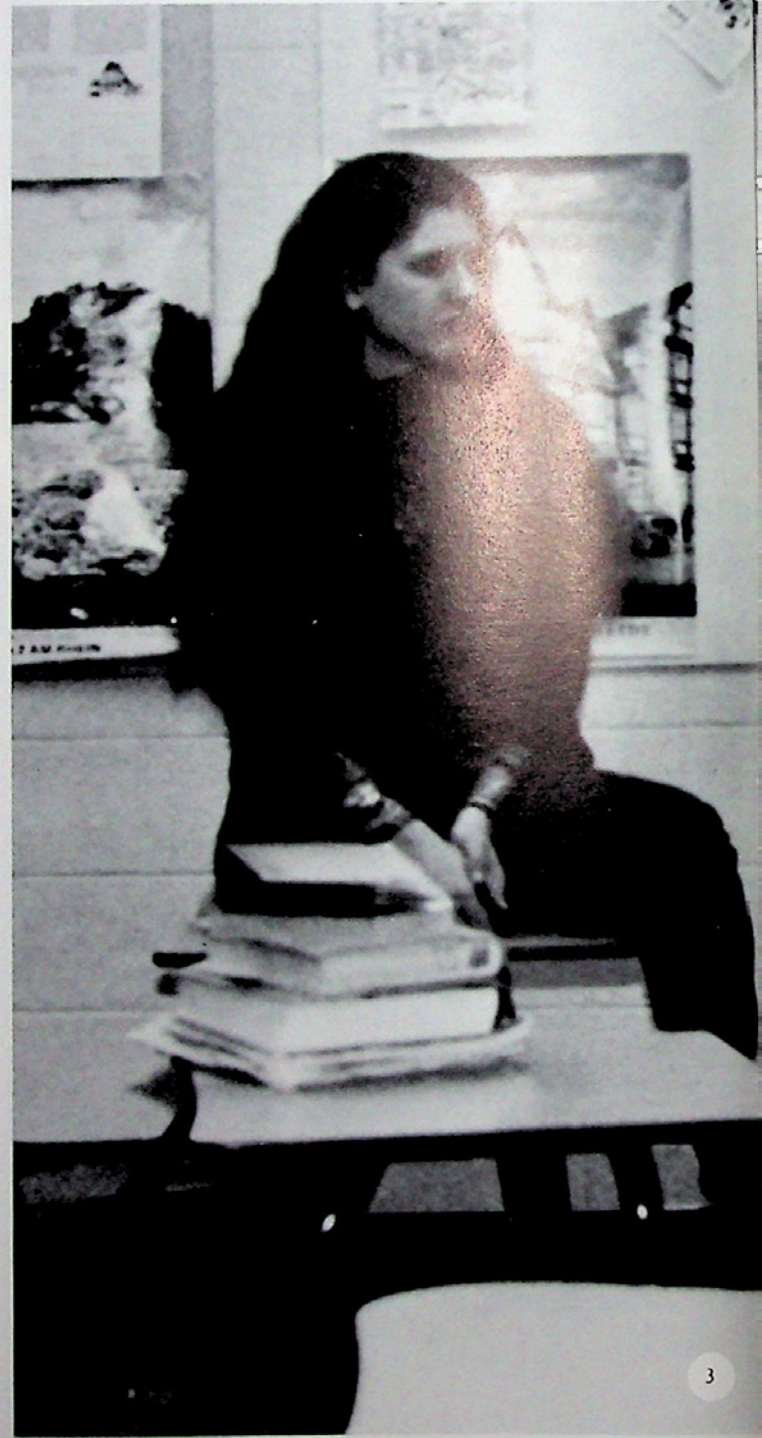

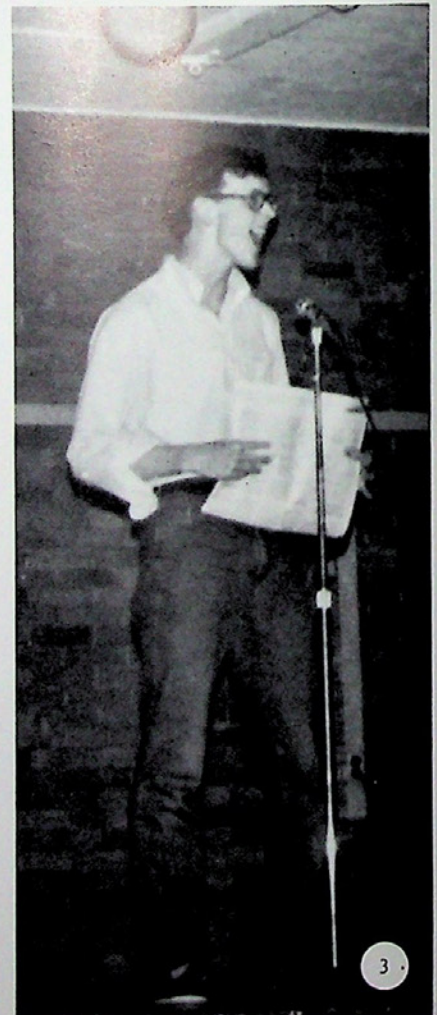

Special recognition must be given to Gordon Kunkle, editor-in-chief, for his dedication and

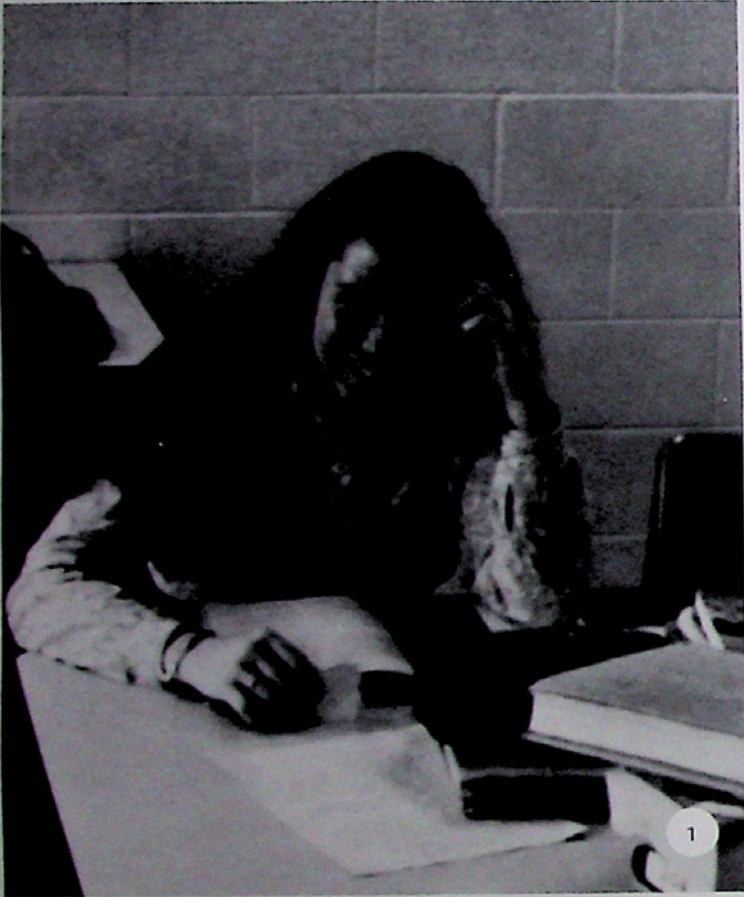

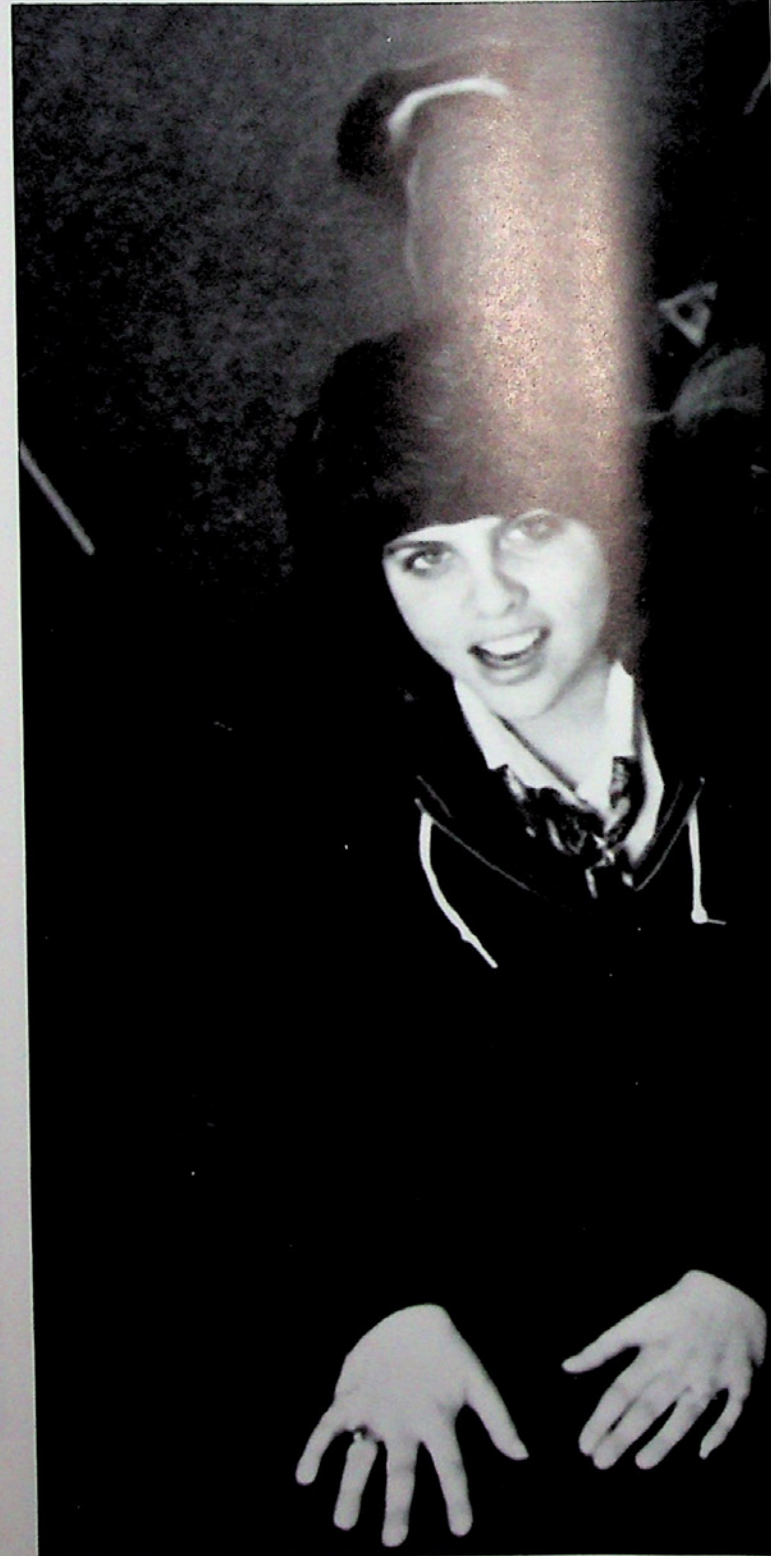
# YOUNG WRITER

The staffs of this prestigious

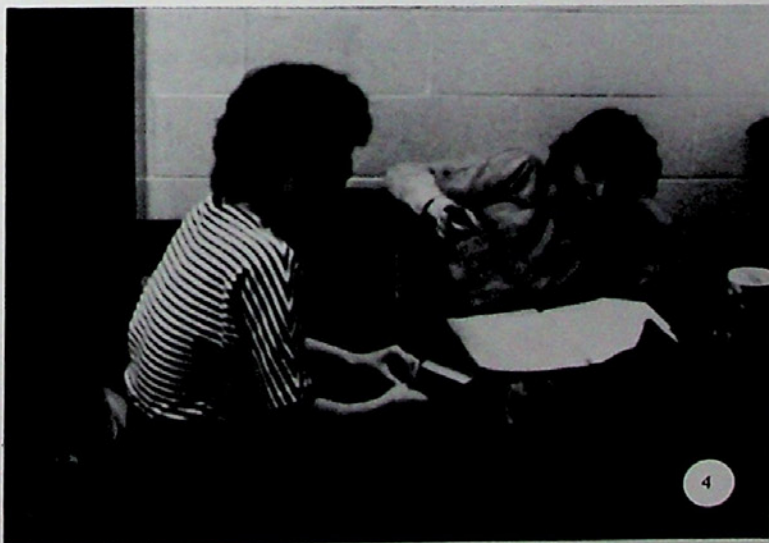

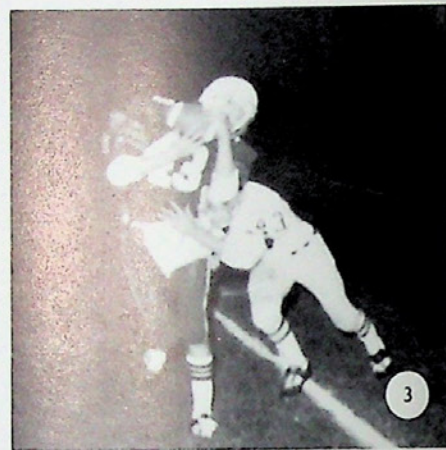
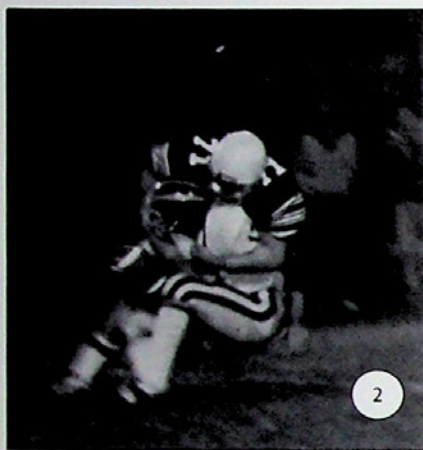

A missed blocking assignment, a broken play, a lost fumble, a lapse in concentration — over and over, like a coach's worst possible nightmare come to life, these

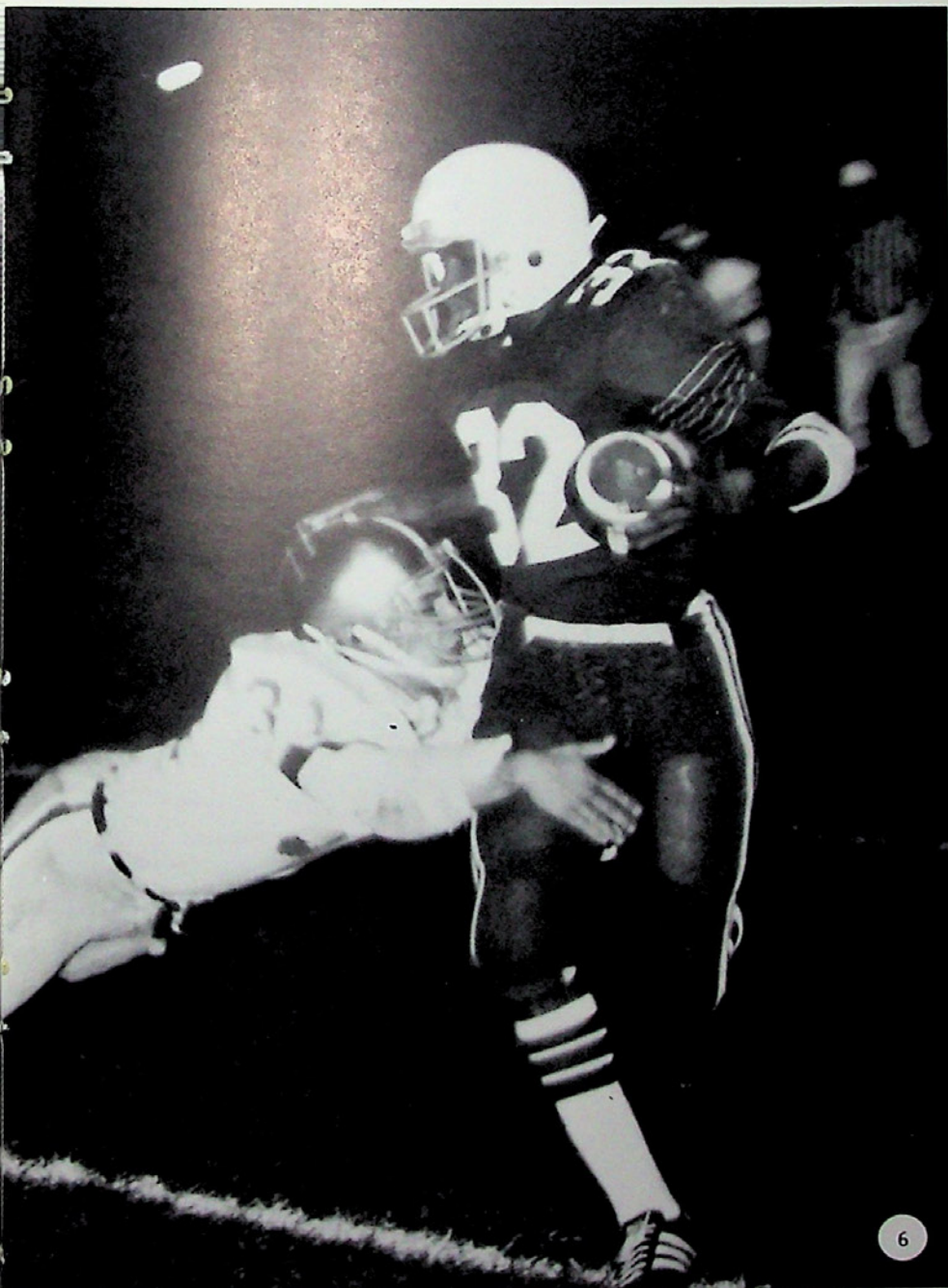

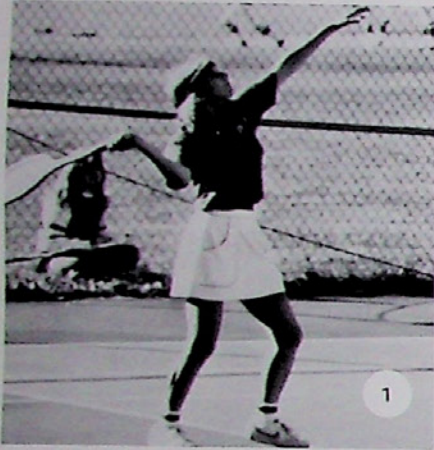

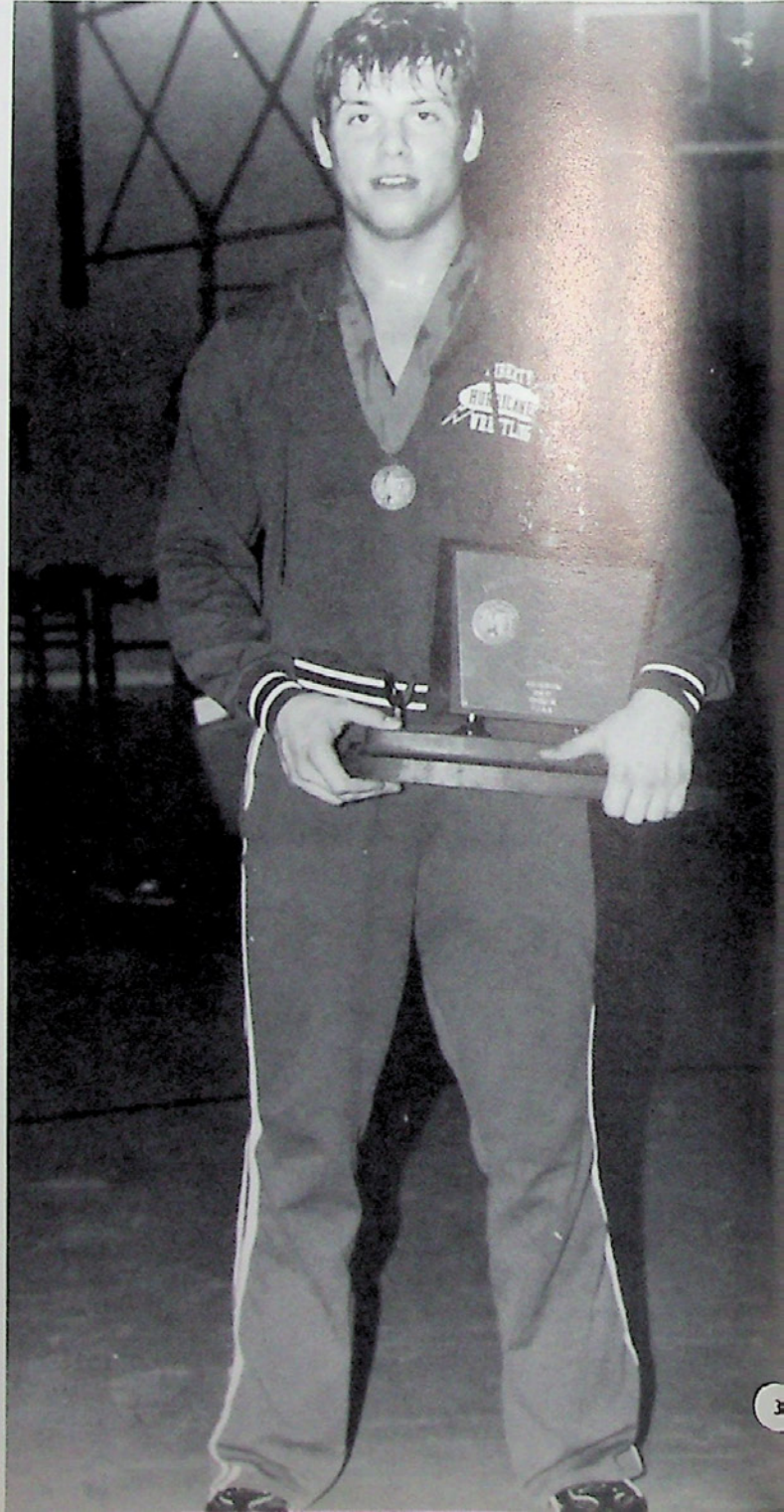

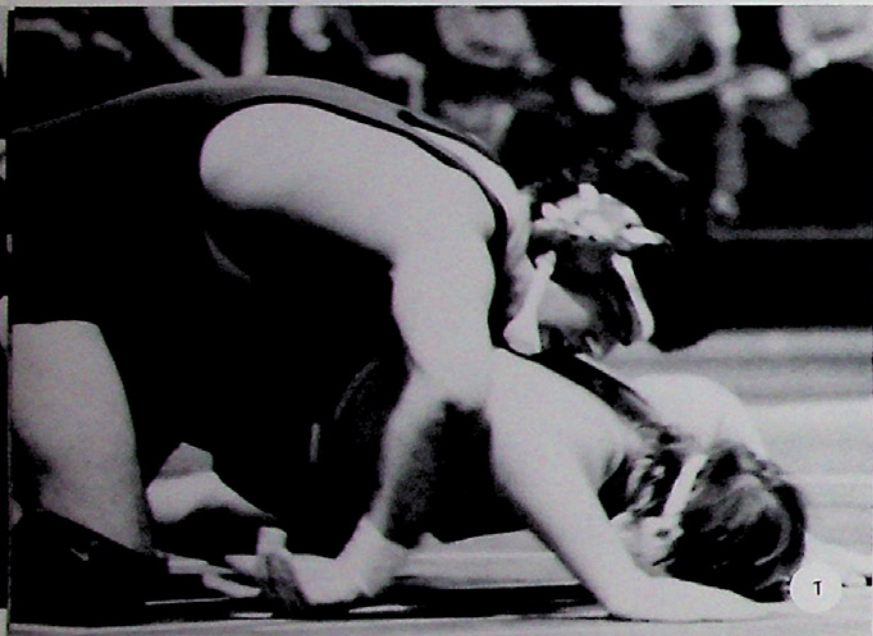

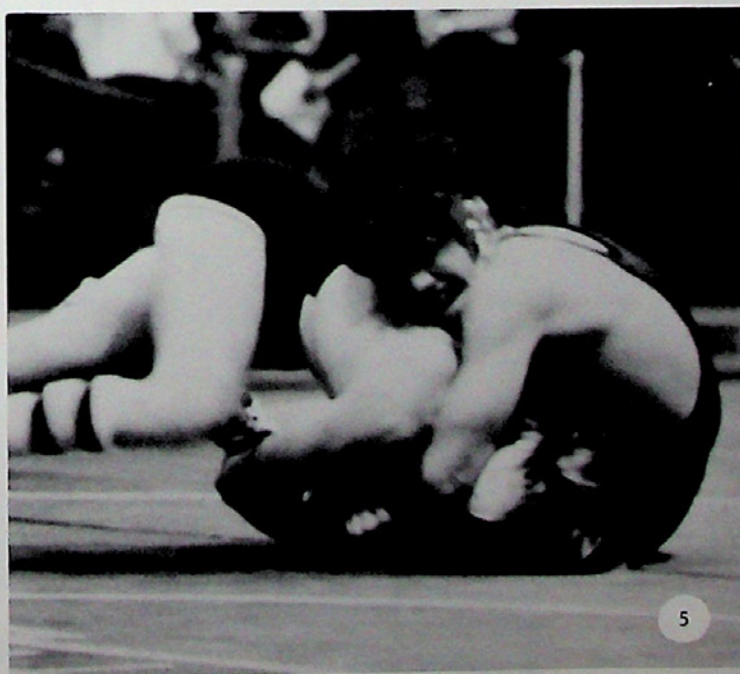
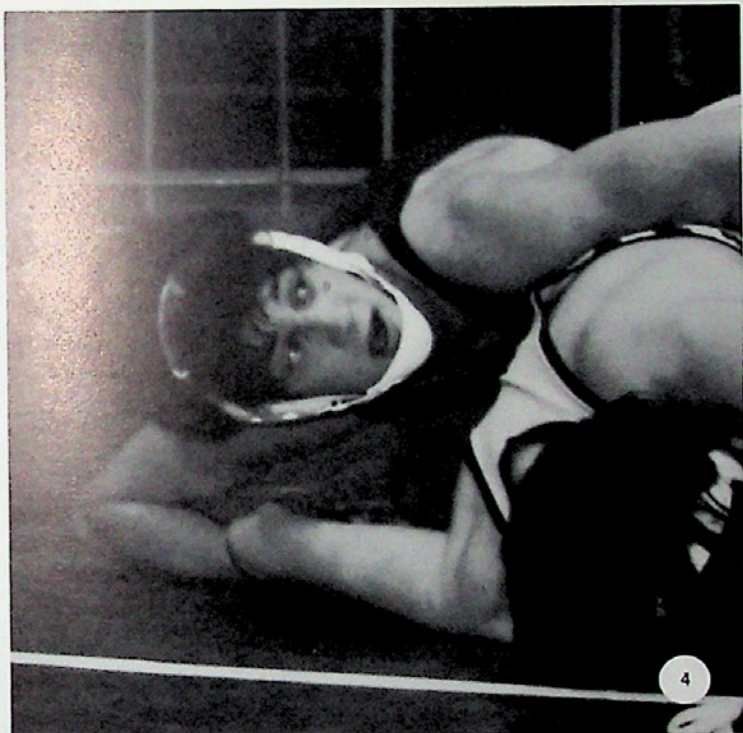
Green wasted no time in compiling an undefeated record. He also won an individual title in the Top Hat Tourney.

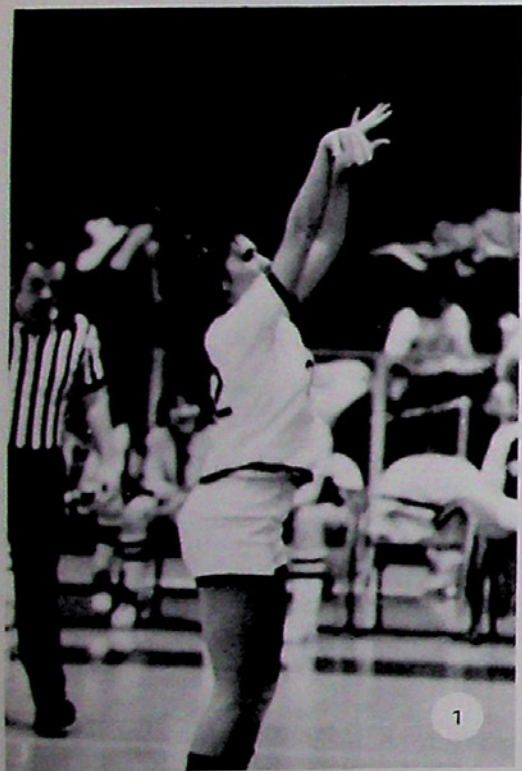

## Learning To Do A Lot With A Little

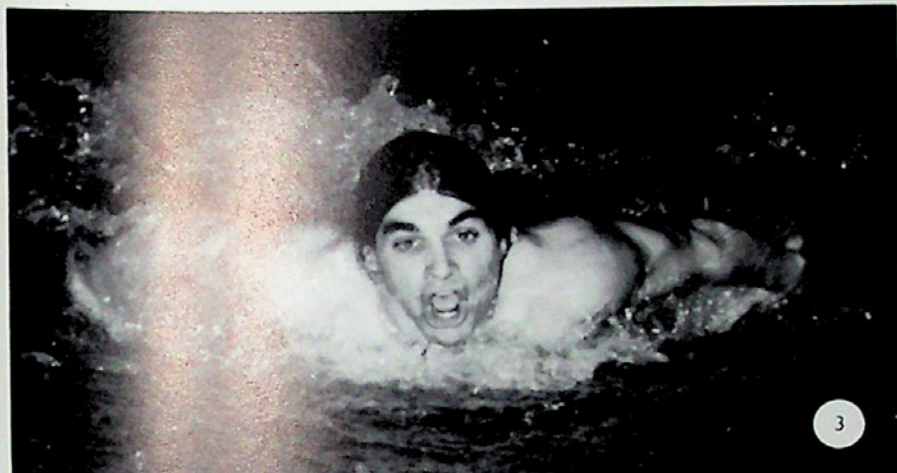
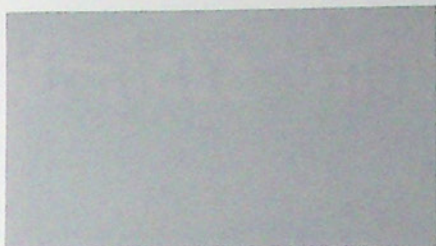

That Really Count

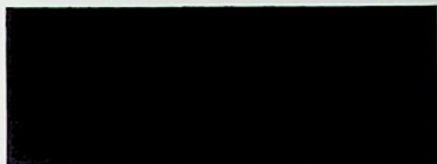

Overall the team played some fine defense and had some good offensive outbursts, but there just

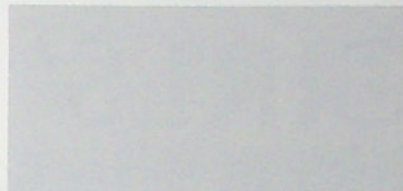

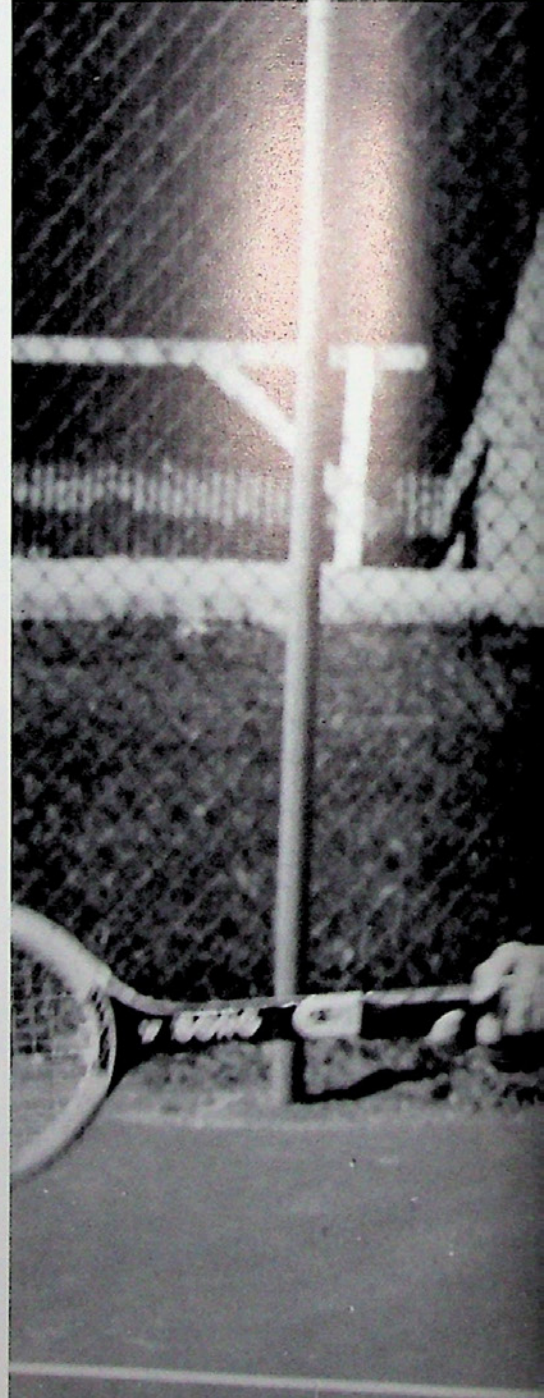

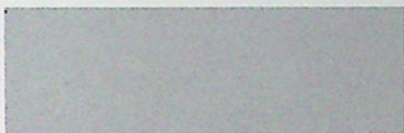
Slow Out Of The Blocks

# The academic story of Liberty High

In his 34th year as principal of Liberty High School, Charles Klein provided for the smooth running of the school community. Aiding the principal were Mr. John Saunders and Mr. John Spirk, who gave their time and effort unselfishly in the handling of disciplinary actions. Because of the tireless work of these three gentlemen, Liberty High School continued to provide an excellent educational environment for its students.

The guidance department consisted of five counselors who directed and scheduled students in courses suitable to their interests and aptitudes. This staff consisted of Mrs. Jean Hafner, Mrs. Jean Trend, Mr. Joseph Belletti, Mr. Robert Frey, and Mr. William Zieger. Under their supervision, students were able to select from the wide variety of courses offered by the mathematics, science, English, social studies, language, and business departments.

With emphasis on a sound grammatical background and appreciation of all the literary forms, the English department strove for a creative approach to teaching. Instructors tried to furnish students with a firm knowledge of language and literature, ranging from mythology in tenth grade to Chaucer in the senior year. The department, headed by Mrs. Sally Campbell, offered courses geared to the general as well as the college preparatory student, and also offered various elective courses, such as creative writing and journalism.

The social studies department, supervised by Mr. Philip Fair, offered the student a solid approach to the political background of the United States and other nations of the world. In tenth grade students were exposed to World Cultures and the histories of foreign countries. American Cultures, in eleventh grade, traced the history of the United States and the founding fathers of the original colonies through present-day problems and policies. The senior program offered government and several electives, ranging from economics to sociology.

The mathematics department, under the direction of Mr. Harry Buss, offered an extensive choice of courses for students. Full-year subjects ranged from Basic Math Skills to Calculus, while semester courses included College Board Math, Medical Math, Math of Chance, and many others.

The science department, supervised by Mr. Robert Buffman, announced that this year would see the largest number of students ever enrolled in this course area. Liberty offered Physiology, Biology, Physics, and Chemistry. Two programs became available for only the second time, Biology C and Advanced Placement Chemistry. Through major courses and electives, students were educated in such a manner as to give them the opportunity to further their experience in college or pursue science-related occupations upon graduation.

The language department, headed by Mr. Richard Hafner, offered Spanish, German, French, Latin, and Russian. Students were allowed to choose one or more of these five languages and continue their learning for as many as four years. The first and second years were devoted primarily to teaching students the basic vocabulary and sentence structure of each language. In the third and fourth years, students developed fluency in reading and speaking. They also increased their vocabulary while acquiring a greater knowledge of the literature and culture of the country. Tapes, films, and magazines, aside from the daily textbooks, were used in helping the students to understand the language.

Business courses gave enrolled students an opportunity to qualify in a chosen field. The program offered five major sequences to acquire the necessary skills to compete in the business world, namely accounting, clerical skills, secretarial, distributive education, and general business. Led by Mr. Glenn Koplín, these teachers shared a common goal of making these courses a great opportunity for business majors.

Bethlehem Area Vocational-Technical School consisted of approximately 1900 students from a number of public and private schools in the area, including Liberty High. The students were divided into 35 morning or afternoon classes, including electronics, horticulture, cosmetology, and auto mechanics, among others. Annual trade shows gave the students an excellent opportunity to display their talents.

Along with these major courses, Liberty High School had other important programs in both required and elective areas. With growing interest in physical fitness, students signed up for a wide variety of activities in physical education, including football, jogging, tennis, basketball, swimming, dance, archery, gymnastics, volleyball, and weightlifting. The department was headed by Miss Sandra Seidel.

The bi-lingual program helped those to whom English was a new language. Geared primarily to Hispanic students, it was created to aid them in learning sufficient English so as to enable participation in regular classes as soon as possible.

The highway education program was very important to students also. A requirement for graduation, this course offered thirty class hours of lecture, on-the-road training, and use of a simulator. Many found this program helpful, not only because it provided them with information about the safe operation of a motor vehicle, but because insurance rates were lowered for those who had successfully passed the course.

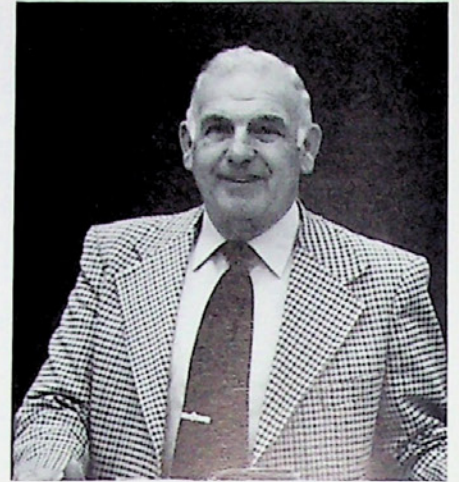
The Cooperative Diversified Occupations Program was a special area that gave students the chance to gain invaluable experience in a job situation while allowing them to stay in school. By spending half of their day in school, students with financial problems were able to earn money and get an education at the same time. Mr. Robert Kishbaugh directed the very successful program.



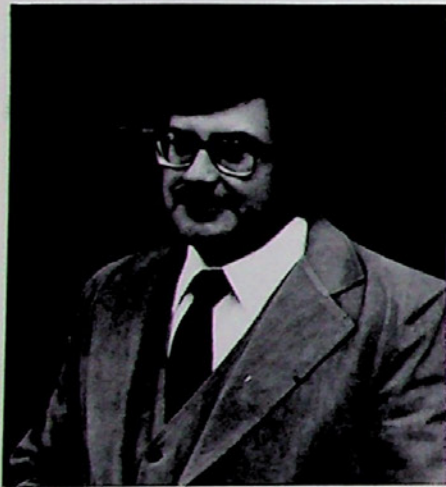
